

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



IN RE: REGINALD EVANS

1 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: It is now 2:00.
2 The Election Commission will come to order.
3 The purpose of this meeting is to hear the
4 protest of Mr. Reginald Evans in two races.
5 We have read the letter of Mr. Evans dated
6 November 10, 2022 which sets forth the
7 grounds of his protest for the two races.
8 Mr. Evans, are you ready to proceed?

9 MR. EVANS: Yes, sir.

10 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Okay. Are there
11 any candidates for either City County Ward
12 One or School District Area Nine present?

13 (No response)

14 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: There is none.
15 Mr. Evans, do you have an opening statement?

16 MR. EVANS: Not -- I have nothing, Mr.
17 Chairman.

18 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Evidence -- I would
19 like to start this proceeding with the definition
20
21 of protest. Just for the record -- what is a
22 protest? "A protest is required by law to be
23 specific in particular grounds. It must state
24 facts sufficient to apprise the contestee of
25 the cause for which the election is contested.

IN RE: REGINALD EVANS

1 This requirement is not a mere technicality
2 but must be -- strictly be followed as upheld
3 by various levels of the court systems of
4 the State. What a protest is not -- it is
5 not an opportunity for a failed candidate
6 to get the spotlight or voice their dissatis-
7 faction with the outcome of an election by
8 making broad accusations or unfounded
9 speculations." All right. Also, "A protest
10 is not the time to discuss philosophical
11 differences of training candidates on the
12 electoral process or anything of that sort."
13 All right. That being said, Mr. Evans, if
14 you are ready to proceed, we will listen
15 to your evidence.

16 MR. EVANS: Yes, sir. Mr. Chairman,
17 Mr. Chairman, could we ask Director Jefferson
18 some questions?

19 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: As long as the
20 statements are related to your protests.

21 MR. EVANS: Yes, sir. All right. Good
22 afternoon, Ms. Jefferson.

23 MS. JEFFERSON: Good afternoon, sir.

24 MR. EVANS: How are you?

25 MS. JEFFERSON: I'm great. How about you?

1 MR. EVANS: All right.

2 MS. JEFFERSON: Great.

3 MR. EVANS: Would you give us your title?

4 MS. JEFFERSON: Director of Registration
5 and Elections, and I have a card for you.

6 MR. EVANS: And how long have you been
7 Director?

8 MS. JEFFERSON: Forty-four plus years.

9 MR. EVANS: Is that an elected position
10 or appointed?

11 MS JEFFERSON: Appointed position.

12 MR. EVANS: You were appointed by who?

13 MS. JEFFERSON: The Board.

14 MR. EVANS: Board of who?

15 MS. JEFFERSON: The Board of Registration
16 Election along with the, slash, Legislative
17 Delegation.

18 MR. EVANS: Okay. So, that is an appointed
19 position?

20 MS. JEFFERSON: Yes, sir.

21 MR. EVANS: Thank you. Question. A couple
22 of weeks ago before the election, I asked you a
23 question about me not appearing on the Sample
24 Ballot for Ward One. Remember that?

25 MS. JEFFERSON: I do recall.

1 MR. EVANS: I talked with the City Clerk,
2 Ms. Hammett, who said that she passed along all
3 of the information to you.

4 MS. JEFFERSON: She did.

5 MR. EVANS: And what happened in that
6 process?

7 MS. JEFFERSON: We checked with the State
8 to see whether that was done, and the State is
9 the one who puts out Sample Ballots, the South
10 Carolina State Election Board, on their website.
11 We don't put out Sample Ballots; the State
12 Election Commission in Columbia does.

13 MR. EVANS: So, from this end, the Ward One
14 race was ---

15 MS. JEFFERSON: I didn't see that.

16 MR. EVANS: What was it you saw?

17 MS. JEFFERSON: I didn't. This is what I
18 was informed by the Clerk, the City Council
19 Clerk, Ms. Linda Hammett. And I told her I would
20 notify the State Election Commission since they
21 are the ones who put it out there; we don't do
22 it.

23 MR. EVANS: So, they therefore corrected
24 the problem and put it ---

25 MS. JEFFERSON: I can't say that they

1 corrected the problem; what I'm saying is, I
2 never took the time to look to see whether it
3 was out there or not. I know mine was out
4 there because certain information that are
5 asked for that only the voter would know.
6 I could give my date of birth and the last
7 four digits of my Social, but I couldn't give
8 yours.

9 MR. EVANS: Right. So, I gave mine. I
10 saw the Sample Ballot, and I saw that Ward One
11 was not on the Sample Ballot, ---

12 MS. JEFFERSON: Uh-huh (affirmative
13 response).

14 MR. EVANS: And then I informed you.

15 MS. JEFFERSON: You informed the City
16 Clerk, Linda Hammett.

17 MR. EVANS: Linda Hammett.

18 MS. JEFFERSON: Linda Hammett in
19 turn informed me. So, I told her I would
20 call the State Election Commission and
21 have them check for you.

22 MR. EVANS: You didn't see that as a
23 problem?

24 MS. JEFFERSON: I didn't, because if
25 you look at the Sample Ballots that we

1 had provided in our office, your name was
2 on them. All of them.

3 MR. EVANS: It was on the Official Ballots?

4 MS. JEFFERSON: Sample Ballots was listed
5 at every precinct, and your name was on the
6 Sample Ballots.

7 MR. EVANS: Not the one that I had
8 generated off the computer.

9 MS. JEFFERSON: I didn't see what you
10 generated off the computer, sir.

11 MR. EVANS: You didn't ---

12 MS. JEFFERSON: No, sir, I didn't.

13 MR. EVANS: Would you take a look at that?

14 MS. JEFFERSON: Sure.

15 MR. EVANS: Mr. Chairman, if you have one
16 of these ---

17 MS. JEFFERSON: I don't see your name on
18 this one.

19 MR. EVANS: Right. That's the one I
20 generated off the computer.

21 MS. JEFFERSON: Okay.

22 MR. EVANS: I'd like for the Chairman to
23 take a look at it.

24 MS. JEFFERSON: All right. I'll give it
25 to him.

IN RE: REGINALD EVANS

1 MR. EVANS: I'll do it. (He provides
2 Chairman with copy).

3 MS. JEFFERSON: Okay.

4 MR. EVANS: Mr. Chairman, when I actually
5 downloaded that off the computer for Area One,
6 several ballots, Ward One was not there. I then
7 go with Linda Hammett. Linda informed me, "All
8 this" -- and it was corrected on the spot,
9 perfect with the name.

10 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Mr. Evans, I think that
11 will be proof -- I think this would have been a
12 more fruitful piece of evidence that that date
13 that you printed this might have reflected --
14 well, is proof, but that conversation where Linda
15 Hammett was informed and she was aware of that.

16 MR. EVANS: Okay.

17 COMMISSIONER STRICKLAND: Mr. Evans, I have
18 a question for you. You said off the computer.
19 I presume you mean off the SC Votes for the
20 South Carolina ---

21 MR. EVANS: Yes, sir.

22 COMMISSIONER STRICKLAND: -- website?

23 MR. EVANS: Yes, sir.

24 COMMISSIONER STRICKLAND: So, it was first
25 filed and it hadn't changed during this

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election for Ward One?

MR. EVANS: For Ward One.

COMMISSIONER STRICKLAND: All right. When you downloaded it, you also saw this where it said, "If there's any questions, you should contact the Director," and it lists her as the Director on that Website; right?

MR. EVANS: If it's a nonpartisan, and I filed this with the City which was Linda Hammett.

COMMISSIONER STRICKLAND: But you got that page from the website, and the website says, "If there's an issue here, contact your Director of Elections in Sumter County," which is her?

MR. EVANS: Yes.

COMMISSIONER STRICKLAND: Okay.

MR. EVANS: All right. So we have gotten that. Ms. Jefferson, can you tell us it's a possibility that when they redrew the lines for Area Nine and Ward One, that you assured voters that they would get a new registration?

MS. JEFFERSON: That's correct.

MR. EVANS: And what was the first date you gave to Registration?

MS. JEFFERSON: I don't remember.

IN RE: REGINALD EVANS

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1 MR. EVANS: Would it be September 22nd?

2 MS. JEFFERSON: That's fine, if you're
3 remember that. I'm saying I don't remember
4 that.

5 MR. EVANS: Okay.

6 MS. JEFFERSON: And when we wanted cards
7 mailed out, there was an issue with them
8 printing them at the State Election Commission.

9 MR. EVANS: Another problem?

10 MS. JEFFERSON: Well, I wouldn't say a
11 problem; there was an issue.

12 MR. EVANS: What was the issue?

13 MS. JEFFERSON: You would have to call
14 the State Election Commission; we don't
15 print cards in Sumter. The State Election
16 Commission in Columbia does.

17 MR. EVANS: So there was an issue with
18 the printing of the cards?

19 MS. JEFFERSON: I think you need to call
20 to find out what the issue was.

21 MR. EVANS: That's where the contest
22 was. That's what is contested ---

23 MS. JEFFERSON: I don't see that being
24 contested on what you sent here. This is
25 something that you are trying to bring out

IN RE: REGINALD EVANS

1 prior to.

2 MR. EVANS: Well, I have it in that
3 letter.

4 MS. JEFFERSON: No, sir. That's not
5 in your letter. And what you're asking
6 now does not have -- there's no relevance
7 to what you sent to the Chairman of the
8 Board.

9 MR. EVANS: Mr. Chairman, allow me to
10 review what we're here for, Mr. Chairman.
11 We are -- the direction here is evidence and
12 all of this deals with issues that were
13 brought forth on this formal protest. Now,
14 the issues here were -- one was, I was
15 informed that people outside the Ward was
16 given the opportunity to vote in the election.
17 What I am getting at is, there was a problem
18 with sending out the registration forms
19 and the registration cards. That's why
20 people got Voter Registration out of the
21 north of Byrd Street because they were
22 voting in the wrong precinct.

23 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Let me stop
24 you right there, Mr. Evans. All right.
25 Now, the attorney or whatever I know

IN RE: REGINALD EVANS

1 we -- your job was to bring evidence
2 to us, not just speculations, not your
3 opinion or how you feel about the things.
4 I tried to make that straight.

5 MR. EVANS: Yes, sir.

6 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: So, do you
7 have evidence of individuals who fall
8 in the category you're talking to --
9 talking about?

10 MR. EVANS: Not -- no, they didn't
11 want to come forth ---

12 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: All right.
13 I appreciate ---

14 COMMISSIONER MOORE: The other problem
15 is the Voter Registration Card is not used
16 for voting. It has to be a photo ID with
17 the name of the voter on it.

18 MR. EVANS: I didn't use that.
19 I early voted; I didn't show my ID.

20 COMMISSIONER BLANDING: You early
21 voted and didn't show ID; where did you
22 early vote?

23 MR. EVANS: The courthouse.

24 COMMISSIONER BLANDING: And you didn't
25 show ID?

IN RE: REGINALD EVANS

1 MR. EVANS: I didn't show ID.

2 COMMISSIONER BLANDING: You had some
3 type of something verifying the fact that
4 you voted and it was you?

5 MR. EVANS: Voter Registration Card.

6 COMMISSIONER BLANDING: And it was you?

7 MR. EVANS: I didn't sign it.

8 COMMISSIONER BLANDING: You didn't sign
9 the Registration Card?

10 MR. EVANS: I didn't have to.

11 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Again, Ms. Jefferson
12 and Commissioners, let's speak to the items
13 that are a part of this official ---

14 MR. EVANS: My apologies, Mr. Chairman.

15 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Yes, sir. Yes, sir.

16 MR. EVANS: When you get down to the count
17 and I went through the numbers on the count,
18 and this is a direct -- the reason I am here
19 is because the variance was just too big in both
20 places. I see six hundred (600) votes in the
21 Area Nine. Okay. But only sixty-five (65)
22 votes for Ward One. And I went through it
23 in the City Council race, Ward One, Palmetto
24 Park was not included in the precinct count,
25 and the School Board race, Area Nine, Folsom

IN RE: REGINALD EVANS

1 Park was not counted in the election. So,
2 that -- and remember the fact that in Ward
3 One, there were three races, and Number Two
4 and Number Three -- Number Two was Anthony
5 Gibson, and he received twenty (20) of the
6 sixty (60) votes. Number Three was Gamble,
7 and he received twenty-three (23) which
8 means there was a twenty (20) vote difference
9 which was less than One Percent (1%) which
10 automatically should have called for a recount.

11 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: All right. Mr.
12 Evans, you understand the process of under
13 votes and over votes when it comes to
14 elections in the city?

15 MR. EVANS: Yes, sir. That's why I
16 said, the variance was too big. That's why
17 I say five hundred people in Folsom Park
18 didn't vote for Ward One, even though it was
19 counted. That's why I'm asking for a re-
20 count, to look at each ballot, each region.
21 Do another recount in another area. It was
22 less than One Percent (1%) between Area Four,
23 between Canty and Hilton. Less than One
24 Percent (1%); that should have automatically
25 triggered a recount. No recount was done.

IN RE: REGINALD EVANS

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1 Yet, they run forth with a runoff election.

2 Okay.

3 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: A recount would
4 have been -- if there was a recount, it wouldn't
5 have been for the whole district, not just for a
6 specific precinct, which was not ---

7 MR. EVANS: I want a recount. The recount
8 should have been for Ward One.

9 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: What was the final
10 -- total for that race? Regardless of how
11 many votes.

12 MR. EVANS: He ---

13 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Yeah, I know. I'm
14 trying to get at -- you're talking about a
15 recount. I'm not understanding your reasoning
16 here. You're saying that a recount should
17 have been generated because ---

18 MR. EVANS: If it's less than One Percent
19 (1%).

20 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: The difference in
21 the total amount that you garnered versus the
22 next contender was less than One?

23 MR. EVANS: Right.

24 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Well, that's the only
25 time a recount is automatically generated,

IN RE: REGINALD EVANS

1 whenever there's a One Percent (1%) difference --
2 I mean, less than One Percent (1%), say, between
3 the two candidates.

4 MR. EVANS: Thank you. So, what I'm
5 saying is One Percent (1%) difference between
6 Candidate Two and Three.

7 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: In one precinct.

8 MR. EVANS: More than one.

9 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: In more than one,
10 period.

11 MR. EVANS: Yeah.

12 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: But over the total
13 amount of votes casted that -- so, the total
14 between you and your next competitor was less
15 than One Percent (1%)?

16 MR. EVANS: On second -- more than One.
17 The total was nine hundred and ninety-eight (998)
18 votes cast.

19 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Okay.

20 MR. EVANS: In Ward One, there was two
21 thousand three hundred and seventy
22 (3,370) votes cast.

23 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Okay.

24 MR. EVANS: Now, I'm telling you that all --
25 that is a lot -- fourteen hundred (1400) people

IN RE: REGINALD EVANS

1 did not vote in Ward One. I understand there
2 could be a split difference with District Eleven.
3 But the total number in Ward One was twenty-three
4 hundred (2300). Only nine hundred and ninety-
5 nine (999) people voted for City Council in
6 Ward One. In the nine hundred and ninety-nine
7 (999), the twenty (20) vote difference between
8 Gamble and Gibson is less than One Percent (1%),
9 which should have triggered a recount. Then I
10 say that in Ward One, District One, they did not
11 include the Palmetto Park precinct.

12 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: So, the total votes
13 that you got in Ward One was how many?

14 MR. EVANS: I think it was -- I see sixty-
15 two (62).

16 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: How many?

17 MR. EVANS: Sixty-two (62).

18 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Sixty-two (62).

19 MR. EVANS: Total votes. In Area Nine, I
20 received six hundred (600). Ward One overlaps
21 Area Nine.

22 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Let's stay with
23 one district -- one race at a time. Let's
24 look at City Council, District One. You had
25 sixty-two (62) votes; the next highest --

IN RE: REGINALD EVANS

1 there was one by Joe Brown and had three
2 hundred and thirty (330). That does not
3 fall within the One Percent (1%) guideline
4 for a recount. That's according to the law.
5 The One Percent (1%) is the total number of
6 votes.

7 MR. EVANS: No, no, no. That's
8 the total ---

9 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Total of votes cast.

10 MR. EVANS: Yes, uh-huh.

11 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: If the difference
12 between Candidate A and Candidate B is less
13 than One Percent (1%), then we automatically
14 do a recount.

15 MR. EVANS: Right. That includes runoff.

16 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: So the two, three between
17 Derrick, Gamble and Gibson was less than One
18 Percent (1%). So, the bottom line is the law
19 speaks -- it's something with this. The
20 law speaks on runoffs to be generated by
21 -- an automatic runoff; it would have to be a
22 One Percent (1%) difference between the two
23 highest vote getters, and that's not the case
24 here. So, I can tell you right now that's
25 not eligible for a runoff in School District

1 Nine, ---

2 MR. EVANS: Excuse me, Mr. Chairman.

3 And the fact that Palmetto Park was not
4 included in the count?

5 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Palmetto Park.

6 Do we have all the precincts?

7 MR. EVANS: Let me see. I just got
8 this this morning, Mr. Chairman. (Presents
9 document).

10 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: That's the count.

11 MR. EVANS: Palmetto Park isn't included
12 in that count.

13 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: So, Ms. Jefferson, do
14 you have any idea how many voters were eligible
15 for -- do you have School District Nine ---

16 MR. EVANS: It's more than one.

17 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: More than one. City
18 Council, Ward One.

19 MR. EVANS: Five Hundred votes.

20 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Five hundred (500).

21 MR. EVANS: That cast their votes ---

22 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: And how many that are
23 eligible to vote in Ward One?

24 MR. EVANS: Five hundred (500).

25 MS. JEFFERSON: And how many votes for

IN RE: REGINALD EVANS

1 Council?

2 MR. EVANS: I didn't go with that part
3 because I -- just the mere fact that it wasn't
4 challenged makes an issue for me.

5 MS. JEFFERSON: I don't have that. It's
6 probably in the office where my register is
7 kept.

8 MR. EVANS: Yeah, and that ---

9 MS. JEFFERSON: And, of course, Palmetto
10 Park wasn't on that protest letter either
11 because we would have had the information
12 handy and ready.

13 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Right. So, City
14 Council One, Ward One. Do we have a copy of
15 the map that was used on Palmetto Park in that
16 district?

17 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Yes, we do. We'll see.

18 MR. EVANS: Now, Palmetto Park is Willow
19 Drive, I believe, and that's Broad Street.

20 MS. JEFFERSON: No, sir. Palmetto Park
21 is Central Carolina.

22 MR. EVANS: Yes.

23 MS. JEFFERSON: Actually, not Willow Drive.

24 MR. EVANS: Folsom Park is Willow Drive.

25 MS. JEFFERSON: Folsom Park is Willow

IN RE: REGINALD EVANS

1 Drive Elementary School ---

2 MR. EVANS: And that's ---

3 MS. JEFFERSON: -- along with Swan Lake.

4 We have extended that voter ---

5 MR. EVANS: Okay.

6 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Okay. Well, Mr. Evans, I
7 really need you to show me where the precinct
8 -- I mean, where the eligible voters in Ward
9 One met. Do you have a list of voters for
10 Ward One -- I mean, from Palmetto Park that
11 came to vote and didn't have an opportunity
12 to vote? Do you have a list of those?

13 MR. EVANS: The only way you can do that
14 is recounts.

15 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Huh?

16 MR. EVANS: The only way you can do that
17 is recount. Like, each individual ballot.

18 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: Right. Again, we are
19 trying to be transparent and try and listen
20 to you and all that, but you understand, this
21 Hearing we are here, for us to be able to rule
22 in your favor -- I don't want to get too far
23 ahead of myself -- but if you brought us
24 evidence of voters who say they went to vote
25 and were denied the opportunity to vote or

1 whatever, if you had witnesses along those
2 lines, we could consider that. But as of
3 right now, this is not much more than
4 speculation as to why these people didn't
5 vote, why there was ---

6 MR. EVANS: I'm saying that in this
7 total amount, nine hundred and ninety-nine
8 (999), five hundred (500) people out of
9 Palmetto Park was not included in that
10 count.

11 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: You don't know
12 that five ---

13 MR. EVANS: Because it says that
14 five hundred (500) people in that
15 precinct could have decided not to vote
16 in that particular race ---

17 CHAIRMAN BRUNSON: And it would
18 have gotten zero on the tallies.

25 installation. And the under count, over count,

4 that if there is a Two Percent (2%), less than

8 Palmetto Park would have made a difference to

South Carolina Code of Law Section 5-15-130. Procedures for contesting results of election. Within forty-eight hours after the closing of the polls, any candidate may contest the result of the election as reported by the managers by filing a written notice of such contest together with a concise statement of the grounds therefor with the Municipal Election Commission. Within forty-eight hours after the filing of such notice, the Municipal Election Commission shall, after due notice to the parties concerned, conduct a hearing on the contest, decide the issues raised, file its report together with all recorded testimony and exhibits with the clerk of court of the county in which the municipality is situated, notify the parties concerned of the decisions made, and when the decision invalidates the election the council shall order a new election as to the parties concerned. Neither the mayor nor any member of council shall be eligible to pass on the issues arising in any contest in which he is a party. I Reginald Evans, am contesting the results of Sumter City Council Ward One and Sumter School District Area Nine election which I appeared on both ballots.

My two reason to contest the election results in both elections is: 1. I was informed that people outside of ward one and area nine was given the opportunity to vote. I would ask if any north of Byrd street was able to vote in arca nine and ward one? 2 After reviewing the attached unofficial results in two precincts. Morris College 1,304 cast votes and 266 under votes. In Folsom Park 1,832 cast votes and 947 under votes. The ward one was not in Folsom Park ballot? I cannot determine if all votes were counted or because of the position of ward one and area nine people did cast a vote for those races? This is the bases for contesting the results.


