1 assault and battery of a high and aggravated nature.

2 THE COURT: And the 2012 contributing to the
3 delinquency of a minor, what is the history of that,
4 Solicitor.

5 MS. PATTERSON: Your Honor, that was handled by our
6 office. As far as I can tell, it involved a 13-year-old
7 girl that was dating Mr. Brown's nephew. And she was over
8 to the house. She informed law enforcement that Mr. Brown
9 provided her alcohol and also he rubbed on her body parts.

10 The victim in that case, she didn't cooperate with
11 our office and that's the reason it was pled to the
12 delinquency of a minor.

13 THE COURT: All right. Now, anything further,
14 Solicitor?

15 MS PATTERSON: Yes, sir, Your Honor. You heard the
16 facts. David Ray Brown -- he preyed upon 13 then 14 year
17 old Complainant when he was 41 years old. He took
18 advantage of her maturity, then he blackmailed her into
19 having sex with on at least four occasions. There's no
20 telling how long this would have continued had Complainant not
21 gotten the courage to disclose when she did.

22 And on behalf of the State, Your Honor, we are
23 asking for a significant prison sentence.

24 THE COURT: Thank you, Solicitor. Anything
25 further?

1 MS. PATTERSON: No, sir, Your Honor.

2 THE COURT: Thank you.

3 Mr. Stitely?

4 MR. STITELY: Yes, sir, his family is here. I'll
5 probably let them do most of the addressing. My request is
6 that you consider due to the time, closeness in the
7 offense, you consider running concurrent sentences. I
8 think his mother and his aunt and one of his good friends
9 would like to address if the Court will permit it.

10 THE COURT: And I'll be glad to hear from anyone
11 you'd like for me to hear from Mr. Stitely.

12 MR. STITELY: One at the time, please.

13 State your name please, fully, so the court
14 reporter can write it down. Speak clearly.

15 THE COURT: Would you pull that microphone toward
16 her, Mr. Stitely.

17 MR. STITELY: Yes, sir.

18 THE COURT: All right, and tell me your name.

19 MS. SWARTZ: Katherine Elizabeth Swartz.

20 THE COURT: All right. Ms. Swartz, I'll be glad to
21 hear from you.

22 MS. SWARTZ: Hi. I want to apologize to the family
23 first of all for this. I want to address the Court to let
24 them know that what Davey did is not excusable, but we have
25 severe mental illness that runs in our family. His dad is

1 my -- his father and my mother are brother and sister.

2 THE COURT: Then y'all are first cousins.

3 MS. SWARTZ: Double first cousins. His mother is
4 my dad's sister. So it's like brother and sister. Mental
5 illness runs on both sides and I understand what Davey did.
6 And we grew up together. We lived together -- I mean every
7 time we were moving, the whole family -- it was all of us.

8 Davey was abused as a young kid. Okay? He was
9 confined to his room. His father was very abusive. I
10 don't think that Davey or his sister, Sandy Brown Lynch
11 really had the room to mature. And the way I see Davey and
12 know Davey, he may be a 44-year-old man right now, but
13 mentally, he like between a 15 to maybe high 18. I would
14 say no higher than 17. So he cannot intellectually
15 communicate or not has he ever had a relationship with say
16 a 30 year old woman. Even a woman five years to his age,
17 he doesn't have the mental -- like, he's like a 15 year old
18 boy manipulating this little girl, like they do in high
19 school.

20 I'm not trying to make excuses for Davey, but I do
21 want to let the Courts be aware of this mental illness. My
22 brother has it. He has 15 different personalities. I
23 suffer from it. My sisters and brother suffer from it.
24 His whole side of the family is really bad. Really bad.
25 They don't have the education, the maturity. I don't even

1 think that Davey could live on his own in a house or a
2 little apartment by himself because mentally he is between
3 15 and 17 years old. And that's why he associates himself
4 because he can't -- you know what I'm saying,
5 intellectually communicate.

6 I'm not making excuses for Davey whatsoever. But I
7 just want to put a little bit of his family past into this
8 where it shows that he was abused. He was locked up in his
9 room as a teenager. We were either outside all day, can't
10 come in for water, had to drink from a water hose. And his
11 dad was crack all of our hineys, like -- yeah. So it was
12 like, he just didn't have any room. He didn't have a
13 healthy, loving upbringing like, you know. That's all I
14 want to say.

15 But it's not that, you know, Davey is this
16 pedophile and even though he was a 41 year old man,
17 mentally me was a 15, 16 year old guy and I don't think
18 he's ever going to outgrow that, and I think he does need
19 some sort of counseling. Because some of us got it. His
20 sister's getting it. But it's just, you know, it's
21 insurance. It costs money. I mean I legally attempted
22 suicide because I couldn't get the help I needed, but I'm
23 here today and I'm happy and full of life, you know,
24 because I was able to research and get my help. Where he
25 lives, I don't know -- well, you haven't, but where he

1 lives is in a trailer. It's not -- it's kind of broke
2 down, old. You know, there's no people, it's isolated, so
3 I just -- I just don't feel that he had the healthy
4 upbringing, you know -- with his mother's loving, but his
5 dad, the way it was he just stopped -- he just stopped
6 growing as a kid because of the abuse.

7 THE COURT: Thank you, Ms. Swartz. Ms. Swartz, let
8 me ask you, how much education do you have?

9 MS. SWARTZ: I graduated from high school. I went
10 to real estate school and I also was in cosmetology school
11 before I got into a major accident, so now I'm like,
12 retired.

13 THE COURT: You're retired?

14 MS. SWARTZ: Kind of, yeah.

15 THE COURT: And what was your most previous
16 occupation.

17 MS. SWARTZ: Cosmetologist.

18 THE COURT: And how long did you do that.

19 MS. SWARTZ: I was in school for it. I was just
20 about done and I got -- some guy on the phone rear-ended me
21 at a stop light and -- actually I'm walking today because
22 of the spinal cord stimulator. And I'm like no pain
23 medicine and it's like great. So...

24 THE COURT: Thank you. Thank you very much,
25 Ms. Swartz. Thank you for being here.

1 MS. SWARTZ: Thank you.

2 THE COURT: Thank you for being here.

3 MS. SWARTZ: Thank you for your time.

4 MS. STITELY: Judge, his family and friends are
5 here, Your Honor. I think that's all --

6 MS. SWARTZ: This is my family -- this is my
7 brother.

8 MR. STITELY: Yeah, and that's one of his best
9 friends and his wife. Just want to show their support,
10 Judge, to show that he does have a network of family and
11 friends that do love him and want to see him when he gets
12 out.

13 I can tell Your Honor, briefly, he does have a 9
14 year old male child and a two month old male child, male
15 child. You saw his fiance in the courtroom. She was the
16 younger black haired woman in her mid to late 20's. She's
17 taking care of the kids, so she couldn't be here today.
18 That's what he has to get out to, Judge. He definitely
19 needs some treatment and I'd ask Your Honor to consider
20 running his sentences concurrent due to the time frame. It
21 wasn't an extended period over like multiple years and
22 multiple victims. It's a horrible case, but the time frame
23 was over a one week span, so I'd just as you to consider
24 that.

25 THE COURT: Now, his 9 year old child -- and a two

1 month old, did you say?

2 MR. STITELY: That's correct, Judge.

3 THE COURT: The mother of those children are --

4 MR. STITELY: Different mothers. The one was in
5 the courtroom for the younger child.

6 Where is your older son?

7 THE DEFENDANT: At my mother's house.

8 MR. STITELY: At his mother's house.

9 THE COURT: At his child's mother's house? Is
10 that --

11 MR. STITELY: With your mother?

12 THE DEFENDANT: With my mother.

13 MR. STITELY: Paternal grandmother. With
14 Mr. Brown's mom.

15 THE COURT: With Mr. Brown's, mother?

16 DEFENSE ATTORNEY: Yes, sir. And as you heard I
17 think I asked him, Judge, he does construction day work,
18 kind of work.

19 THE COURT: And the young lady that was here last
20 week that you just described, the dark headed young lady,
21 that's his girlfriend?

22 MR. STITELY: Girlfriend, fiance, the mother of the
23 child that was born the tail end of 2015.

24 THE COURT: What age is she?

25 THE DEFENDANT: 21, and she actually fell in love

1 with me and it happened.

2 THE COURT: On the internet?

3 THE DEFENDANT: No, actually she's the -- she used
4 to date my nephew.

5 THE COURT: She was dating your nephew.

6 THE DEFENDANT: Yeah. He was like -- I don't
7 know...

8 THE COURT: How old is your nephew?

9 THE DEFENDANT: 19, I think.

10 THE COURT: Anything else, Mr. Stitely?

11 MR. STITELY: No, sir, Your Honor.

12 THE COURT: Anything you'd like to say, Mr. Brown?

13 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir. This is actually not who
14 I am. It just happened. I mean it was like -- it was like
15 it wasn't meant to be, you know, what I mean. It was -- I
16 was lonely -- I mean I'd been in a relation for 16 years
17 and I got out of the relationship -- well my ex-wife took
18 my son for months. And then I fought custody. That was
19 really mental to me and besides my hard life as a childhood
20 of my dad, I just been struggling through my whole life.
21 I've just been needing affection. And just, you know, I
22 had Facebook, and I would just comment on everybody's
23 status, it didn't make -- it didn't matter who it was. I
24 didn't go on profiles, I didn't scroll down I -- I didn't
25 look at their age, where they're from, I just commented.

1 And I got a lot of -- what you call it a lot of remarks
2 saying, Why am I commenting, you know, just a lot of bad
3 stuff.

4 But I had like three or four profiles on there
5 because I used to play games on there, my two years of
6 being single out of 16 years. And you have a lot of
7 profiles so you can send yourself gifts. It's just some
8 stupid games on there. And then to -- I turned to drinking
9 like really bad and I didn't want to put drinking or any
10 kind of partying on my really, truly profile, David Ray
11 Brown, you know, that showed pictures of my son, my family,
12 my true self, and I used the other profiles for, I think,
13 it was -- I had David Rowling Blunts or something like
14 that. Just showing liquor all the time snuff like that.

15 I was drinking like a fish, taking drugs, and I
16 just -- I wasn't -- it affected me being alone, you know
17 what I mean? The companionship of a girl and then somehow
18 or another I got that profile and -- just to talk to
19 people.

20 THE COURT: What profile is that?

21 THE DEFENDANT: The -- the one -- that -- which --
22 the Justin --

23 MR. STITELY: Justin Goodwin, Your Honor.

24 THE COURT: Justin Goodwin?

25 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir. I made that profile just

1 because -- I mean a lot -- on the cell phone, you can can't
2 really -- if you looked at everybody's profile on a little
3 tiny cell phone and looked at that age and everything, I
4 really didn't just didn't really pay attention to that. I
5 just commented and then one thing led to another. Just
6 started -- wasn't thinking what profile I was on, I guess.
7 I'd even -- even on my other profiles I'd talk to people.

8 But I just got to talking, I guess, to her -- **Complainant**
9 and it clicked and, you know, emotionally. I felt sorry
10 for her. She was -- what I was told she wasn't having a
11 good life either. Like I didn't want to bring it out, but,
12 you know. That's why I got her a birthday present.

13 That, I mean, that's why I got her birthday
14 presents. It was like she didn't receive things and stuff,
15 you know. People at school talked about her, called her --
16 they called her a whore and a slut and all this stuff; and
17 I always just said don't listen to them. You know, it
18 become -- I really -- I wasn't like falling in love, like,
19 I just sort of like, cared about her, you know what I mean?
20 Like I wanted to help and it was like she.

21 And then she would text my phone and I wouldn't
22 text her. Sometimes I would, but she did text me. I mean,
23 if you can look at the records or whatever, early in the
24 morning, first thing in the morning before she went to
25 school, good morning and all this and I'd answer. I'd just

1 naturally answer without even thinking, just being a
2 friend.

3 And -- so I wouldn't -- it wasn't nothing like I
4 was stalking out this girl because she was the only one I
5 was paying attention to as in needing help, I guess the
6 help I needed, is when I was a child is the way I was
7 feeling. Because if it was that way, then I would have had
8 hundreds of girls, you know what I mean?

9 THE COURT: Not exactly.

10 THE WITNESS: Well, I mean what I'm saying is, this
11 girl told me that she never got nothing and all this stuff
12 and she -- everybody talked crap about her at school and
13 this and that, and it just caught me, man the way I used to
14 get treated. And so, I mean, it didn't end up to mean
15 nothing. And I just, it didn't mean to be like the way it
16 was or the way it sounds.

17 I just beg mercy of the Court and I'm sorry to the
18 family, sorry to her, **Complainant**, and it won't never ever happen
19 again.

20 THE COURT: All right. I'm going to ask you a
21 question. You don't have so answer it if you don't want
22 to, but State's Exhibit Number 2.

23 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

24 THE COURT: Who is that?

25 THE WITNESS: I don't know him.

1 THE COURT: So you just got that off of the
2 internet and used it as your profile picture as Justin
3 Goodwin.

4 THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.

5 THE COURT: You don't have to answer that if you
6 don't want to.

7 And then State's Exhibit Number 1, again you, you
8 don't have to answer it if you don't want to. Who is this?

9 THE DEFENDANT: That's me.

10 THE COURT: And you sent a friend request to
11 Complainant back in September using State's Exhibit Number
12 1? You don't have to answer that if you don't want to.

13 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir, but that was after --
14 that was after I was already friends with her on that
15 Justin Goodwin. It wasn't before.

16 THE COURT: All right. Anything else you'd like to
17 say, Mr. Brown?

18 THE DEFENDANT: The objection, the reason for
19 meeting up was to be social. It wasn't for what it meant
20 to be or was or whatever was said. It was to have that
21 company, that talk. I know it seems like, you know,
22 there's no interaction between, but always -- you can ask
23 my whole family, I've never acted my age. I've always
24 acted, you know, like with my 9-year-old son, I'd, you
25 know, I'd be like 13, 14 years old around him, you know

1 what I mean. But when I needed to be, you know what I
2 mean, like job interviews or whatever, selling at the flea
3 market or whatever, I'd be, you know -- but, you know, but
4 the intentions for what was said is untrue it was only for
5 companionship that I wasn't getting.

6 THE COURT: How old is your ex-wife?

7 THE DEFENDANT: My ex-wife -- well now she's
8 probably 27, 28.

9 THE COURT: All right. And how long have you been
10 divorced?

11 THE DEFENDANT: Well, I'm not -- I've been
12 separated -- I couldn't get a divorce. I didn't know where
13 she lives. Because I was going to marry --

14 THE COURT: How long have you been separated?

15 THE DEFENDANT: Five years.

16 THE COURT: Five years. Anything further?

17 MR. STITELY: Nothing, Your Honor.

18 THE COURT: Thank you, Mr. Stitely.

19 Anything further from the State?

20 MS. PATTERSON: No, sir, Your Honor.

21 THE COURT: All right. I've taken into account the
22 totality of the circumstances involved, both from hearing
23 the trial last week and what has been presented today in
24 both aggravation and mitigation. Specifically I do take
25 into account your abusive upbringing. I was very impressed

1 with the presentation and appearing to be heartfelt remarks
2 by your cousin, Ms. Swartz. I take into account that
3 you've had family support throughout the trial of the case,
4 both family and friends.

5 I do the take into account your criminal history,
6 all of it, but more specifically the fact that you've had
7 two previous contributing to the delinquency of a minor,
8 one as recently as 2012.

9 I am not blinded, however, to the seriousness of
10 the criminal conduct that you engaged in. I thought about
11 it about lot over the weekend to distance myself from the
12 trial itself and analyze it in my mind. The word predator
13 is used a lot in these types of circumstances and generally
14 we think of a predator many times as being a stranger kind
15 of lurking in the shadows or lurking around particular
16 neighborhoods or areas where they can be within arms length
17 of their prey whether their prey be members of a different
18 gender or their prey could be money or their prey could be
19 drugs or what have you. It doesn't always have to be a
20 human prey.

21 This shows now to me, the net that can be cast by a
22 predator, that one becomes then a cyber predator, which is,
23 I don't know, more dangerous than the one that just is
24 walking the streets to see his or her prey, but at least
25 certainly can march towards the predatory gold in a

1 different corridor. And many times predator use bait and
2 that's what you did with State's Exhibit Number 2. And
3 prey is, many times unwary. You have a young lady who was
4 also raised in a rural environment -- nothing whatsoever
5 wrong in being raised in a rural environment, but I've not
6 been there -- like your cousin said, I haven't been to
7 where you lived except probably -- never have, never have,
8 but there's isolation.

9 But in additionally to that there's that immaturity
10 perhaps of being naive, of being of that young age and
11 people talk on Facebook. And I can say well, I just wanted
12 a friendship, I just wanted to be a friend. Well, then you
13 would not have had to abuse and sexually batter her in a
14 field by a deer stand four times. You would not have had
15 to threaten her with the exposure of the photographs.

16 Given your abusive background and history, that
17 doesn't equate to lack of intelligence. You're an
18 intelligent young man, Mr. Brown, but you were selfish, not
19 self-less. If you want the help somebody, help them. But
20 all you did was help yourself. That's all you did. And
21 the DNA report confirms it.

22 And so now, I guess, both -- the four times it
23 occurred and then, of course, the fifth, sixth, seventh,
24 and eighth time it occurred because Complainant had to
25 get up here and testify, it just repeats. You know,

1 Mr. Brown, some wounds never heal.

2 2016-GS-32-00160, David Ray Brown, jury having
3 convicted Mr. Brown of criminal sexual conduct with a
4 minor, a victim 11 to 14 years of age, second degree
5 maximum sentence is 20 years; is that correct? As to each
6 count?

7 MS. PATTERSON: Yes, sir.

8 THE COURT: As to one 160, the defendant is
9 committed to the State Department of Corrections for 20
10 years. On 2016-GS-32-00161, defendant is committed to the
11 State Department of Corrections for a determinate term of
12 20 years. That is concurrent.

13 On 2016-GS-32-00163, criminal sexual conduct with a
14 minor second degree, the defendant is committed to the
15 State Department of Corrections for a determinate term of
16 20 years. That's concurrent.

17 2016-GS-32-00162, criminal sexual conduct with a
18 minor second degree defendant the committed to the State
19 Department of Corrections for a determinate term of 8
20 years. That is consecutive.

21 He is to be given credit for all time served. He
22 is subjected to the sexual offender registry upon his
23 release from the department of corrections. I recommend
24 mental health counseling.

25 Good luck to you -- good luck to you, Mr. Brown.

5. In cases not subject to ADR, the Chief Judge for Administrative Purposes, upon the motion of the court or of any party, may order a case to mediation.
6. Motion of a party to be exempt from payment of neutral fees due to indigency should be filed with the Court within ten (10) days after the ADR conference has been concluded.

The State of South Carolina (Respondent), making its Return to the Application for Post-Conviction Relief filed on February 11, 2019, would respectfully show this Court:

I. Procedural History

David Ray Brown (Applicant) is presently incarcerated in the South Carolina Department of Corrections pursuant to orders of the Lexington County Clerk of Court. During its January of 2016 term, the Lexington County Grand Jury indicted Applicant with four counts of criminal sexual conduct with a minor, second degree (2016-GS-32-00160, -00161, -00162, and -00163). Applicant was represented by Benjamin A. Stitely, Esquire, and Assistant Solicitors Rhonda W. Patterson and Shannon Davis prosecuted the case on behalf of the Thirteenth Circuit Solicitor’s Office. On January 19-21, 2016, Applicant proceeded to a trial before a jury, with the Honorable R. Knox McMahon presiding, and was convicted as indicted on all counts. On January 25, 2016, the Judge McMahon sentenced Applicant to twenty years’ imprisonment for three of the charges, with all three running concurrently, and an eight-year, consecutive sentence on the fourth, and with credit for time served.

On January 29, 2016, Mr. Stitely filed a Notice of Appeal on behalf of Applicant. Chief Appellate Defender Robert M. Dudek perfected the appeal, and filed an Anders¹ brief. The South Carolina Court of Appeals affirmed in an unpublished opinion. State v. Brown, 2018-UP-116 (2018). The Remittitur was sent on April 10, 2018.

II. Application for Post-Conviction Relief

In his Application for Post-Conviction Relief, Applicant alleges that she is being held in custody unlawfully based on:

1. Ineffective assistance of counsel
 - a. Detrimental reliance
 - b. Failed to advise
2. Due process violations
 - a. Undue delay of documents
 - b. Vindictive prosecution
3. Prosecutorial misconduct
 - a. Perjury
 - b. Fraud
4. Involuntary plea

Applicant prays for relief as follows: “Vacate, Reverse Convictions, Remand for New Trial.”

Attached to this Return and incorporated by reference are the records of the Lexington County Clerk of Court regarding the subject convictions, the records from Applicant’s direct appeal, Applicant’s records from the South Carolina Department of Corrections, and Applicant’s Post-Conviction Relief Application. Respondent reserves the right to amend this Return upon receipt of any relevant materials.

¹ Anders v. California, 386 U.S. 738 (1967).

III. Response to Claims of Ineffective Assistance of Counsel

In a post-conviction relief action, an applicant has the burden of proving the allegations in the application. Rule 71.1(e), SCRPC; Butler v. State, 286 S.C. 441, 334 S.E.2d 813 (1985). When an applicant alleges ineffective assistance of counsel as a ground for relief, the applicant must prove “counsel’s conduct so undermined the proper functioning of the adversarial process that the trial cannot be relied upon as having produced a just result.” Strickland v. Washington, 466 U.S. 668 (1984); Butler, 286 S.C. 441, 334 S.E.2d 813.

Courts use a two-pronged test in evaluating allegations of ineffective assistance of counsel. First, the applicant must prove counsel’s performance was deficient. Under this prong, attorney performance is measured by its “reasonableness under professional norms.” Cherry, 300 S.C. at 117, 385 S.E.2d at 625 (citing Strickland). Courts presume counsel rendered adequate assistance and made all significant decisions in the exercise of reasonable professional judgment. Butler, 286 S.C. 441, 334 S.E.2d 813. The applicant must overcome this presumption to receive relief. Cherry v. State, 300 S.C. 115, 386 S.E.2d 624 (1989). Second, counsel’s deficient performance must have prejudiced the applicant such that “there is a reasonable probability that, but for counsel’s unprofessional errors, the result of the proceeding would have been different.” Cherry, 300 S.C. at 117-18, 386 S.E.2d at 625.

Strickland requires that trial counsel must be given leeway to make reasonable strategic decisions. No particular set of detailed rules for counsel’s conduct can satisfactorily take account of the variety of circumstances faced by defense counsel or the range of legitimate decisions regarding how best to represent a criminal defendant. Strickland v. Washington, 466 U.S. 668, 688-689 (1984). “Representation is an art, and an act or omission that is unprofessional in one case may be sound or even brilliant in another.” Id. at 691. Therefore, judicial scrutiny of counsel’s

performance must be highly deferential. *Id.* at 689. Where counsel articulates a valid strategic reason for his action or inaction, counsel's performance should not be found ineffective. Roseboro v. State, 317 S.C. 292, 454 S.E.2d 312 (1996); Underwood v. State, 309 S.C. 560, 425 S.E.2d 20 (1992); Stokes v. State, 308 S.C. 546, 419 S.E.2d 778 (1992). Courts must be wary of second guessing counsel's trial tactics; and where counsel articulates a valid reason for employing such strategy, such conduct is not ineffective assistance of counsel. Whitehead v. State, 308 S.C. 119, 417 S.E.2d 529 (1992).

When an application "alleges specific instances of ineffective assistance of counsel which are not conclusively refuted by the record before the lower court, a question of fact is raised which can only be resolved by an evidentiary hearing." Sharper v. State, 279 S.C. 264, 265, 305 S.E.2d 247, 248 (1983). However, in this instance, Applicant does not provide any supporting information for his claim, and Respondent is unable to properly interpret Applicant's allegations or provide a response. As to Applicant's allegation of ineffective assistance of counsel, Respondent moves herein for a more definite statement so that it can effectively respond through an amended or supplemental return.

IV. Motion for a More Definite Statement

Applicant's allegations lack specificity or supporting facts. The Uniform Post-Conviction Procedure Act requires that the Applicant must ". . . specifically set forth the grounds upon which the application is based." Section 17-27-50 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina (1976). In an application for post-conviction relief, it is incumbent upon Applicant to make at least a *prima facie* showing which would entitle him to relief before an evidentiary hearing will be scheduled and held. Welch v. MacDougall, 246 S.C. 258, 143 S.E.2d 455 (1965); Blandshaw v. State, 245 S.C. 385, 140 S.E.2d 784 (1965). Furthermore, Rule 8(a), SCRPC, requires all civil pleadings include

“a short and plain statement of the facts showing that the pleader is entitled to relief.”

Applicant has failed to state with any specificity the specific facts giving rise to his allegations. Respondent therefore moves pursuant to Rule 12(e), SCRCPP, to require Applicant to provide a more definite statement of all of his allegations and to require Applicant to file an amended application well in advance of the hearing scheduled in this matter. If Applicant fails to file a timely and responsive amended application setting forth specific allegations for relief, Respondent reserves the right to move to dismiss this allegation or claim.

V. Discovery Issues

Applicant must specify any claims he intends to raise at the post-conviction relief evidentiary hearing. Any claims not specifically laid out in this post-conviction relief application or in amendments will be opposed by the State at an evidentiary hearing pursuant to §§ 17-27-10 to -160 of the South Carolina Code of Laws and Rule 71.1 of the South Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure. See also Rules 15(a)-(b), SCRCPP. All claims should be made well in advance of the evidentiary hearing. Because Applicant is represented by counsel, the attorney, and not Applicant, is the only individual authorized to file amendments to this application. See Rule 11, SCRCPP. *Pro se* filings will not be considered at the post-conviction relief hearing. Respondent reserves the right to request that any amendments withheld until the last minute be stricken because of undue prejudice to Respondent. See Rule 15(a), SCRCPP.

Pursuant to § 17-27-150 of the South Carolina Code of Laws, Applicant may not invoke formal discovery processes to issue subpoenas or otherwise obtain discovery materials unless granted leave from the Court upon a showing of good cause. Furthermore, Respondent requests that all potential exhibits and materials used to produce potential expert witness testimony be sent to Respondent well in advance of the evidentiary hearing. Respondent reserves the right to request

a continuance and oppose witness testimony and exhibits that are withheld until the last minute resulting in undue prejudice to Respondent.

VI. General Denial of Allegations

Each and every allegation contained within the Application not expressly admitted, qualified, or explained in this Return is hereby denied.

VII. Conclusion

WHEREFORE, Respondent requests that this Court require Applicant to amend his Application in order to provide a more definite statement and supporting facts as to the allegations so that Respondent may appropriately respond, and thereafter convene an evidentiary hearing on the allegations.





On February 11, 2019, David Ray Brown (“Applicant”) filed an application for post-conviction relief collaterally attacking his 2016 convictions for four counts of second-degree criminal sexual conduct with a minor (2016-GS-32-00160; -00161; -00162; -00163). The State (“Respondent”) filed its return to the application on June 4, 2019, moving for a more definite statement as to Applicant’s claims. On March 29, 2021, Applicant filed a motion for authorization to engage in discovery. Respondent would show unto this Court as follows.

Applicant’s discovery requests, generally.

The Uniform Post-Conviction Procedure Act provides, in part, that “[a] party in a noncapital post-conviction relief proceeding shall be entitled to invoke the processes of discovery available under the South Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure if, and to the extent that, the judge in the exercise of his discretion and for good cause shown grants leave to do so, but not otherwise.” S.C. Code Ann. § 17-27-150(A). Applicant’s motion indicates that he seeks authorization from the Court to engage in discovery because “Counsel for Applicant is not in possession of the discovery from the trial counsel and other files necessary to support [Applicant’s] case.” Notice of Motion and Motion to Authorize Discovery at 1, Brown v. State, No. 19-CP-32-00624 (Lexington, S.C., Ct. Common Pleas, Mar. 29, 2021). Counsel for Applicant notified the undersigned by email on

April 20, 2021, that Applicant, by making the motion, is specifically seeking to obtain the following: “the complete SLED file, complete chain of custody and related information, cell phone records including site tracking, text messages, photos and extractions, victims mental health/counselling records, doctors records from previous treatment and SANE nurses notes, photographs, recordings of all interrogations, [and] a ‘pre-sentence report’ considered by the judge”

Applicant’s requests for items presumably included in defense counsel’s file.

Applicant’s motion concerns some evidence that presumably was included in the file of the defense lawyer who represented Applicant at trial, a copy of which has (presumably) been provided to Applicant already. This evidence includes Applicant’s request for “the complete SLED file, complete chain of custody and related information, cell phone records including site tracking, text messages, photos and extractions, . . . photographs, recordings of all interrogations, [and] a ‘pre-sentence report’ considered by the judge”

The undersigned discussed Applicant’s motion on April 21, 2021, with the defense lawyer who represented Applicant at trial. Based on that conversation, the undersigned believes that almost all of the evidence that Applicant is seeking is in defense counsel’s file, which is available to Applicant upon request. Furthermore, much of this was already addressed at Applicant’s trial. Law enforcement officers performed two extractions of the photographs and text messages on the minor victim’s phone. Trial Tran. 230-32, 308-15. The minor victim’s phone records were admitted into evidence at trial over the objection of Applicant’s defense lawyer. Trial Tran. 287-94. Applicant voluntarily gave a sample of his DNA to law enforcement officers, which was used by a forensic scientist at SLED for a comparison to DNA found on the minor victim’s panties.

Trial Tran. 248, 345-86. A records custodian for Verizon testified that she had turned over information about the company's cell towers to the prosecution; those records were the subject of Applicant's defense lawyer's cross-examination of an expert witness. Trial Tran. 305, 333-37. Respondent opposes the motion with respect to these items because the issues they concern were already addressed at trial or the items are likely available to Applicant by way of defense counsel's file.

Applicant's requests for the minor victim's records.

Respondent opposes Applicant's motion with regards to any records concerning any treatment that the minor victim received after suffering a sexual assault in the past, including any notes made by a sexual assault nurse examiner ("SANE nurse"), and any mental health or counselling records for the minor victim.

First, the transcript gives no indication that there are any records relating to the past sexual assault. At a pre-trial hearing before Applicant's General Sessions trial, the assistant solicitor notified the trial court that the minor victim had disclosed to the SANE nurse, while undergoing a sexual assault examination following her disclosure that Applicant had raped her, that she had been raped three years before the sexual assaults at issue at trial occurred. Trial Tran. 57-58, 78. The assistant solicitor moved that that information be excluded from evidence pursuant to the Rape Shield Statute. Trial Tran. 78. Applicant's defense lawyer agreed with the assistant solicitor that it would be inappropriate for any evidence to be introduced at trial about the minor victim's statement to the SANE nurse that the minor victim had been sexually assaulted three years earlier. Trial Tran. 82. Neither party questioned the victim or the SANE nurse about that statement at trial. Trial Tran. 104-207, 261-82.

The minor victim was not being examined by the SANE nurse about the previous assault, only about the more-recent sexual assaults that she suffered at the hands of Applicant. The minor victim's statement to the SANE nurse should be best understood as information that she disclosed to the nurse while supplying background information in response to the nurse's questions. Respondent's request for records, particularly any from the SANE nurse, is probably based upon an incorrect assumption about the facts of the case.

Second, any documents subject to Applicant's request would likely be inadmissible. South Carolina law provides, in part, that "[e]vidence of specific instances of the victim's sexual conduct, opinion evidence of the victim's sexual conduct, and reputation evidence of the victim's sexual conduct is not admissible in prosecutions under Sections 16-3-615 and 16-3-652 to 16-3-656. . . ." S.C. Code Ann. § 16-3-659.1(1). This statute is commonly referred to "as the 'rape shield' statute." State v. Tennant, 394 S.C. 5, 18, 714 S.E.2d 297, 303 (2011). "The State has a legitimate interest in encouraging victims to report crimes and to present testimony against offenders. That interest is served by discouraging the oftentimes pointless and sometimes cruel treatment of victims who testify." State v. McCoy, 274 S.C. 70, 73, 261 S.E.2d 159, 160 (1979). The State's interest in "protecting victims of sexual abuse from needless harassment, humiliation, and unnecessary invasions of privacy" is valid. Barbe v. McBride, 521 F.3d 443, 459 (4th Cir. 2008) (quotation omitted). "[T]he state's interest in protecting criminal sexual conduct victims is stronger than the right of a defendant to attack such a victim's character in a manner that has limited or no relevance to the question of guilt." State v. Finley, 300 S.C. 196, 201, 387 S.E.2d 88, 90 (1989) (citations omitted). The evidence that Applicant seeks is evidence of specific instances of the minor victim's sexual conduct. That evidence would not have been admissible in Applicant's underlying criminal

trial. See Skeen v. State, 325 S.C. 210, 217, 481 S.E.2d 129, 133 (1997) (finding that any testimony from the minor victim about his prior sexual activities, if Skeen's defense lawyer had tried to elicit any, would have been barred by the rape shield statute) (citation omitted).

There are some exceptions to the rape shield statute's general prohibition on the admission of evidence regarding a victim's sexual conduct beyond those that the statute expressly provides. See Finley, 300 S.C. 196, 387 S.E.2d 88 (1989) (finding that the trial court erred in excluding evidence that the victim engaged in sexual relations with another in the defendant's presence on the night before the defendant allegedly attempted to assault the victim sexually because the defendant's right under the circumstances to present evidence that the victim was falsely accusing him out of fear that he would disclose her sexual conduct with the other man trumped the State's interest in protecting the victim from disclosure of her sexual acts with a third party); State v. Grovenstein, 340 S.C. 210, 515, 530 S.E.2d 406, 409 (S.C. Ct. App. 2000) (holding that evidence of a minor victim's prior sexual experience is relevant to demonstrate that a defendant is not necessarily the source of that victim's ability to testify about alleged sexual conduct); State v. Lang, 304 S.C. 300, 403 S.E.2d 677 (S.C. Ct. App. 1991) (finding that the trial court erred in excluding evidence that the victim was a homosexual when the defendant was introducing the evidence of the victim's sexuality in order to impeach the victim's credibility after the victim denied on the stand that he was a homosexual). Applicant has given this Court no basis upon which to conclude that one of those exceptions may apply in this case.

Even when an exception to the rape shield statute applies, the admission of the evidence is nevertheless "subject to a determination of whether the prejudicial effect of the evidence outweighs its probative value." Grovenstein, at 219, 530 S.E.2d at 411 (citing Rule 403, SCRE); see State v.

Williams, 409 S.C. 455, 465-67, 761 S.E.2d 770, 776-77 (S.C. Ct. App. 2014) (finding that the trial court did not abuse its discretion in excluding evidence that the stepbrother of one of the minor victims had forced the victim to have oral sex with him because the probative value of the evidence was low and because the admission of the evidence could have confused the jury if used at trial in the way that the defendant intended). “Although the Confrontation Clause ‘tips the scales’ in favor of permitting cross-examination if it could reasonably be expected to have an effect on the jury, a court may prohibit cross-examination for impeachment purposes when the probative value of the evidence that the defendant seeks to elicit is substantially outweighed by the risk of prejudice.” State v. Boiter, 302 S.C. 381, 396 S.E.2d 364 (1990).

The evidence would not be admissible at trial because it is irrelevant to the question of whether Applicant committed criminal sexual conduct with regards to the minor victim. Relevant evidence” is that which has a tendency “to make the existence of any fact that is of consequence to the determination of the action more probable or less probable than it would be without the evidence.” Rule 401, SCRE. Evidence that is not relevant “is not admissible.” Rule 402, SCRE. Evidence that someone else had raped the minor victim in the past would not make the question of whether Applicant committed statutory rape as to the minor victim three years later more or less probable. See State v. Beckham, 334 S.C. 302, 308-18, 513 S.E.2d 606, 609-14 (1999) (finding that the trial court did not err in excluding evidence that there were two men on the night of the murder on the road near the site at which a codefendant disposed of the body of the defendant’s wife and evidence that someone else had been with the codefendant when the codefendant killed the victim and disposed of her body, when all of the codefendant’s actions had been in accordance with the defendant’s instructions, because evidence of third party guilt is limited to facts that are

inconsistent to a defendant's guilt and the evidence the defendant offered would not have exculpated him), abrogated on other grounds by State v. Wright, 391 S.C. 436, 706 S.E.2d 324 (2011). The requirement of relevance can serve as a bar the admission of evidence of a victim's past sexual conduct even when the rape shield statute does not. See Tennant, at 19-21, 714 S.E.2d at 304-05 (finding that the trial court erred in excluding evidence of past sexual conduct between the defendant and the victim in reliance upon the rape shield statute but also that the error was not prejudicial because the evidence was irrelevant).

Likewise, even if there is something in the minor victim's mental health or counselling records regarding Applicant, Applicant has given this Court no reason upon which to conclude that those records would have been admissible at trial.

The evidence would likely be inadmissible because the evidence would have been collateral to the material issue in Applicant's trial. "When a witness denies an act involving a matter collateral to the case in chief, the inquiring party is not permitted to introduce contradictory evidence to impeach the witness." Williams, at 467, 761 S.E.2d at 777 (quoting State v. Beckham, 334 S.C. 302, 513 S.E.2d 606 (1999)). When a witness gives an answer on cross-examination that concerns a collateral matter, "no contradiction will be allowed even for the purpose of impeaching a witness." Williams, at 468, 761 S.E.2d at 777 (quotation omitted). Even if Applicant's defense lawyer were to have asked the minor victim at trial if she had been sexually assaulted three years previously or if she had alleged to the SANE nurse that she had been sexually assaulted three years previously, and the victim had denied it, the lawyer could not properly have used the prior allegation to impeach the minor victim's credibility because the issue would have been collateral

to the issue of whether Applicant committed criminal sexual conduct with a minor by having forcible sexual intercourse with the minor victim on multiple occasions.

Applicant has not provided any explanation of Applicant's need for records about a sexual assault that the minor victim suffered years before she was raped by Applicant, much less an explanation that provides the good cause requirement of the discovery statute. The likelihood that the sought-after evidence would not have been admissible at Applicant's underlying criminal trial gives the Court sufficient reason to deny Applicant's request for court authorization to get that evidence in the litigation of this post-conviction relief case. The Court should deny Applicant's motion with regard to any records regarding the minor victim's past sexual conduct or her statement to the SANE nurse that she had been sexually assaulted three years before she was examined by the nurse.

WHEREFORE, Respondent requests that the Court deny Applicant's motion.



**ORDER DENYING MOTION TO
AUTHORIZE DISCOVERY**

This matter comes before the Court by way of a pro se application for post-conviction relief filed by David Ray Brown ("Applicant") on February 11, 2019, by which Applicant is collaterally attacking his 2016 convictions for four counts of second-degree criminal sexual conduct with a minor (2016-GS-32-00160; -00161; -00162; -00163). On March 29, 2021, Applicant, through counsel, filed a motion to authorize discovery, alleging that a court order authorizing Applicant to engage in discovery was needed because "Applicant is not in possession of the discovery from the trial counsel and other files necessary to support [his] case." Notice of Motion and Motion to Authorize Discovery at 1, *Brown v. State*, No. 19-CP-32-00624 (Lexington, S.C., Ct. Common Pleas, Mar. 29, 2021). On August 25, 2021, the State ("Respondent") served its return to Applicant's motion, arguing that the motion be denied. On April 11, 2022, the parties appeared before this Court at the Lexington County Courthouse for a hearing on Applicant's motion, with Ola A. Johnson representing Applicant and Taylor Z. Smith of the South Carolina Attorney General's Office representing Respondent.

At that hearing, Applicant argued that he needs court authorization to engage in discovery so that he can get the following: (1) a chain of custody form concerning a DNA sample collected



by law enforcement officers from Applicant; (2) medical and/or other records for the victim in the underlying crime concerning her allegation that she had been raped by someone other than Applicant in the past; and (3) the victim's cell phone records. Applicant alleged that Benjamin Allen Stitely ("trial counsel"), who represented Applicant at trial, has given to him some chain of custody information but had not had the beginning portion of the chain of custody form. Applicant stated his desire to get court authorization to subpoena the victim's phone records from cell phone companies so that he could have an expert review them. Respondent argued that it was possible that some of the things that Applicant was seeking in discovery could be in trial counsel's possession, and offered to get a copy of the chain of custody form from the Eleventh Circuit Solicitor's Office or trial counsel and forward it to Applicant. Respondent argued that Applicant's motion should be denied because Applicant was convicted of forcibly raping a minor victim and that Applicant had failed to articulate a reason that the things sought after could be helpful to Applicant's defense and a basis upon which they would have been admissible at trial.

The Uniform Post-Conviction Procedure Act provides, in part, that "[a] party in a noncapital post-conviction relief proceeding shall be entitled to invoke the processes of discovery available under the South Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure if, and to the extent that, the judge in the exercise of his discretion and for good cause shown grants leave to do so, but not otherwise." S.C. Code Ann. § 17-27-150(A). This Court finds that Applicant has failed to show that there is good cause for this Court to grant his motion. First, Applicant has failed to prove that all of the things he is seeking are not available to him through trial counsel's defense file. If trial counsel had the things Applicant is seeking and can provide them to Applicant, Applicant's request would be satisfied in an efficient manner. Second, some of the issues that Applicant raises were addressed at trial. Law enforcement officers performed two digital extractions of the victim's phone. Trial

Tran. 230-32, 308-15.¹ The victim's phone records were admitted into evidence at trial over trial counsel's objection. Trial Tran. 287-94. Applicant voluntarily gave a sample of his DNA to officers, which was used by a forensic scientist at the South Carolina Law Enforcement Division for a comparison to DNA found on the victim's panties. Trial Tran. 248, 345-86. A records custodian for Verizon testified that she had turned over information about the company's cell towers to the prosecution; those records were the subject of trial counsel's cross-examination of an expert witness. Trial Tran. 305, 333-37.

Third, there is no indication from the trial transcript that there exist any records relating to the past sexual assault that the victim disclosed to the sexual assault nurse examiner ("SANE") who examined the victim after her disclosure about Applicant's abuse. At a pre-trial hearing, the assistant solicitor notified the trial court that the victim had disclosed to the SANE that she had been raped three years before the sexual assaults at issue at trial. 


Applicant, by and through his undersigned attorney, hereby amends his application for Post-Conviction Relief. This amended complaint adopts and includes all grounds in the original application filed February 11, 2019 by Applicant. Applicant further alleges as additional grounds regarding his claim of ineffective assistance of counsel as to Benjamin Stitely as follows:

1. Prior to the trial, Applicant's counsel Benjamin Stitely, failed to explain the details of the Applicants case.
2. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely, failed to retain a DNA expert to review the states evidence and testify for the defense.

3. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely, failed to meet with the applicant a sufficient number of times to properly review the evidence and discuss this case with applicant.
4. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely failed to object to the admission of cellular phone text message records based on inconsistencies between the records submitted and those contained within the Verizon records.
5. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely, failed to properly investigate the facts of this case.
6. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely failed to advise defendant to testify and failed to advise him of the importance of explaining the details of when he lost his phone.
7. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely failed to request a jury charge that was more favorable to the defense.
8. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely failed to object to the DNA chain of custody.
9. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely failed to advise applicant of the potential negative impact his statements at sentencing could have on his appeal.
10. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely failed to bring up the other male DNA that was found in the states report.
11. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely failed to object to the states indictments listing multiple incident dates and ranges.
12. Furthermore, the Applicant requests that he be permitted to Amend his PCR application to conform to the evidence presented at the PCR hearing should any new or unaddressed

issues arise during the course of the hearing that have not been specifically addressed in the Application. See Simpson v. Moore, 367 S.C. 587, 627 S.E.2d 701 (2006).



P R O C E E D I N G S

1
2 THE COURT: Yes, sir.

3 MR. ZELENKA: Thank you, Your Honor. The first case
4 this morning is David Brown vs. State of South Carolina,
5 civil action number 2019-CP-32-624. Mr. Brown filed an
6 application for Post-Conviction Relief in an amendment
7 that's filed on his behalf by his court appointed counsel,
8 Ola Johnson, in June of 2023.

9 Mr. Brown is presently incarcerated pursuant to orders
10 of commitment from the Clerk of Court for Lexington County
11 arising from a conviction in January of 2016 for four counts
12 of criminal sexual conduct with a minor second degree. At
13 that time, he was represented by Ben Stitely as retained
14 counsel and the case was prosecuted Assistant Solicitors
15 Rhonda Patterson and Shannon Davis.

16 After the conviction, he was sentenced by Knox McMahon
17 on January the 25th to three counts of 20 years concurrent
18 and on one of the counts of the indictments, eight years
19 consecutive. He took an appeal to the appellate court who's
20 represented by Robert Dudek. In that matter, Mr. Dudek
21 filed an Anders brief and the Court of Appeals affirmed that
22 in an unpublished decision in 2018.

23 In his initial application, he alleged ineffective
24 assistance of counsel, general due process violations,
25 prosecutorial misconduct and involuntary plea. In the

1 amendment filed by Mr. Johnson, he raised approximately 11
2 grounds of ineffective assistance of counsel. Your Honor,
3 if you want me to go through each of those grounds, I can do
4 so.

5 THE COURT: I've got this right here in front of me.

6 MR. ZELENKA: And you do have the amendments in front
7 of you?

8 THE COURT: Yes, sir, submitted by Mr. Johnson.

9 MR. ZELENKA: Great.

10 I've got Mr. Stitely present here as well as the
11 prosecutors involved in the case. Of course, the Applicant
12 has the burden of proof in these matters.

13 I turn it over to Mr. Johnson.

14 THE COURT: Mr. Johnson, anything before you call your
15 first witness?

16 MR. JOHNSON: Yes, sir, one issue. I just wanted to
17 put on the record and take exception to a ruling. There was
18 a previous motion, we filed notice of motion and motion to
19 authorize discovery for Mr. Brown. In that, we were going
20 after records to explore some things he is going to testify
21 about regarding DNA evidence and things like that. There's
22 an order denying this motion and that's dated October 14th,
23 2022, so that's on the record. I just wanted to put that on
24 the record we're taking exception to that again.

25 I'm going to call Mr. Brown. He's my only witness.

1 THE COURT: All right. That's noted for the record.
2 Mr. Brown, if you will come up and be sworn.

3 DAVID BROWN,

4 after being duly sworn, testified as follows:

5 THE CLERK: Thank you. Please have a seat.

6 THE COURT: We'll make sure you get some water. State
7 your name for the record.

8 THE WITNESS: David Ray Brown.

9 DIRECT EXAMINATION

10 BY MR. JOHNSON:

11 Q Mr. Brown, are you ready?

12 A Go ahead, sir.

13 Q Mr. Brown, who represented you for this case?

14 A Ben Stitely.

15 Q Okay. Is Mr. Stitely here in the courtroom now?

16 A Yes, sir.

17 Q And let me ask you, referencing number one on your
18 amended application, Mr. Brown, could you talk to me about
19 how Mr. Stitely failed to explain the details of the case to
20 you?

21 A Excuse me, sir?

22 Q Did he do a good job --

23 A No, sir.

24 Q -- explaining the details of this case to you?

25 A No, sir.

1 Q How many times did he visit with you?

2 A None.

3 Q None?

4 A I went and hired him and didn't see him after that, no.

5 Q Did he hire a private investigator to come meet with
6 you and work your case?

7 A No, sir.

8 Q And what about a DNA expert to get into the details of
9 the DNA evidence, was that important for this case?

10 A It was.

11 Q Did you get an expert hired by Mr. Stitely?

12 A No, sir.

13 Q Did he talk to you about the DNA evidence?

14 A No, sir.

15 MR. JOHNSON: Moving on, Judge, we're going to talk
16 about number three.

17 Q That was the number of times Mr. Stitely met with you,
18 you said zero?

19 A Zero.

20 Q And I want to move on to number four and talk about
21 cell phone records. Why is that important? Text message
22 records, why is that important to this case?

23 A Why is the text messaging important?

24 Q Yes, sir.

25 A Well, for one, you're talking about the text messages,

1 why were they important, first of all, I didn't even have my
2 phone at that time that these text messages they say that I
3 did or assigned my number to, or my used-to-be number to.

4 Q And they used these at trial against you?

5 A Yes, sir.

6 Q And there was an allegation that you had communication
7 with the victim?

8 A Right.

9 Q And they used that to help convict you?

10 A Sure did.

11 Q And at no time did Mr. Stitely hire any kind of a cell
12 phone expert or come talk to you about these records?

13 A No, sir.

14 Q Did he do anything like that to support an objection to
15 the admission of these records?

16 A He did because there was some, like, inconsistencies,
17 like, the dates and the times between the two different
18 extractions. They took one in 2013, but it had, like,
19 everybody that was texting, like, four or five different
20 people. And the new extraction they did a month before
21 trial only had -- it was assigned, they said it was me.

22 Q Okay. And our motion that we filed to authorize
23 discovery, that was partially to go after cell phone records
24 to address that issue and see if we could get an expert down
25 the road; isn't that true?

1 A Correct.

2 Q Okay. And I believe you addressed number four about
3 cell phone records and their importance. On number five,
4 failure to properly investigate. You're saying Mr. Stitely
5 did not retain any type of an investigator to come speak
6 with you about this case to your knowledge?

7 A No, he didn't.

8 Q Number six, let's talk about that. There was some
9 mention on Mr. Stitely failing to advise you the importance
10 of explaining details of a lost -- or when you lost your
11 phone. Now, why is that important for this trial that took
12 place?

13 A Because I didn't have my phone.

14 Q And did that issue come up with the jury?

15 A Yes, sir.

16 Q And what was --

17 A That was the first question the jury come back and
18 asked.

19 Q They wanted to focus on the issue of when you lost the
20 cell phone?

21 A Yes, sir.

22 Q And that's not something you had a conversation with
23 Mr. Stitely about prior to trial?

24 A That's right.

25 Q And you felt that should have been explored and handled

1 better by Mr. Stitely since it was important to the jury?

2 A Yes, sir.

3 Q And regarding jury charges, you felt there should have
4 been a better jury charge or argument for a more favorable
5 jury charge; is that correct?

6 A Yes, sir. Because after the jury come back and didn't
7 get the answer to their question, I feel that the jury --
8 there should have been a jury charge of if there was still
9 any doubt, the favor should go towards the Defendant.

10 Q And is that in relation to cell phone issue or when you
11 lost your cell phone?

12 A Yes, sir.

13 Q Because that's the question they asked?

14 A Yes, sir.

15 Q Now, regarding DNA chain of custody --

16 MR. JOHNSON: Judge, we're moving on to number eight on
17 the amended application.

18 Q DNA chain of custody, that was something that you felt
19 should have been addressed with an expert to review the DNA
20 evidence?

21 A Yes, sir.

22 Q And you did not have that?

23 A No, sir.

24 Q And Mr. Stitely didn't sit down and go over the chain
25 of custody with you and discuss those issues?

1 A No, sir.

2 Q And did you feel like that's something that could keep
3 the DNA evidence out at trial?

4 A Yes, sir. It was incon -- well, it was a partial DNA.
5 It could have been anybody.

6 Q Did they use that to say it matched you and to help
7 convict you?

8 A Yes, sir.

9 MR. JOHNSON: Now, number nine, Judge, we're moving on
10 to number nine.

11 Q Talking about negative statements, I'm going to hand
12 you --

13 MR. JOHNSON: And I've discussed this with Mr. Zelenka,
14 Your Honor. I'm just handing the transcript up.

15 Q On Page 511, starting on Line 20 on 511, kind of
16 spilling over, did you have a conversation where the Judge
17 talked to you at sentencing after you were convicted about
18 the origin of a cell phone communication and an alias or a
19 name of a person that came up? Starting at the bottom of
20 511 on Line 20.

21 A That's right.

22 Q And as you had that conversation on the record, did the
23 Judge ask you a specific question where you made an
24 admission?

25 A Yes, sir.

1 Q Okay. And did Mr. Stitely ever warn you about the
2 dangers of doing that?

3 A No, sir, he didn't.

4 MR. JOHNSON: Judge, we're going to move on to number
5 ten.

6 Q Mr. Stitely, did he talk to you about this issue or
7 bring up this issue about other male DNA that could have
8 been present or was listed in the report?

9 A Did he mention it to me?

10 Q Did he plan with you how to deal with it? Did he argue
11 that sufficiently in front of the jury?

12 A No, sir. There was no kind of defense for me. I had
13 no participation in it.

14 Q And you felt like that could have been beneficial
15 because it's was actual other male DNA involved?

16 A Yes, sir.

17 Q And they used DNA evidence against you?

18 A Yes, sir.

19 Q What was the problem you felt like with the
20 indictments? There was multiple incident dates and ranges.
21 You feel like he did an insufficient job arguing against
22 that and suppressing that or quashing those indictments?

23 A Yeah, closely connected offenses, grouping them
24 together for sentencing purposes.

25 Q Did he make an objection to that?

1 A No, he never did say nothing about it.

2 Q And you were convicted on those indictments?

3 A Yes, sir.

4 Q Mr. Brown, do you have anything else about the evidence
5 or his performance you'd like to mention or talk about?

6 A I'm sure I do. Well, I don't think there was any kind
7 of investigation. I just think he plain out thought I was
8 guilty. I didn't never hear from him throughout two years
9 -- or not two years, about four months. He got hired in
10 September, so three months. I had no participation in my
11 defense. He didn't even know I had lost my cell phone
12 evidently.

13 And when I was a person of interest, I went in
14 voluntarily and talked to the investigators and all that for
15 a whole hour. You know I didn't have to, I could have got
16 an attorney. I told him I had gotten locked up, I knew we
17 couldn't bring this out in court, but if I had took the
18 stand, that's another issue there. But had he talked to me
19 before trial, he would had known I lost my phone in early
20 August. The cell phone records show the thing wasn't even
21 activated until September 15th, I believe. So the jury
22 would have known that and they would have had their answer.
23 That was the first question they come back with.

24 I told the investigator that, so it's in their report,
25 investigator report. It states that I had lost my phone one

1 month after release from jail, which would have been July
2 4th, so that would have put it August, early August I lost
3 my phone.

4 Another thing is the SLED report and DNA report, item
5 4.1 showed that of DNA of two males on that item. He did
6 not bring that up.

7 Q And that's what you testified to earlier, bringing up
8 other male DNA as a possible defense?

9 A Right, that was totally disregarded. It showed, I
10 guess, that she was sexually active and that would have
11 scratched off the rape shield motion to bring in the text
12 messages of all the males that were talking the same sexual
13 talk. But the whole thing was it was all pointed to me
14 throughout the whole trial. It was me, it could be no other
15 male. That was important to have all the text messages and
16 for the jury to know there was another male DNA found on
17 evidence. Nothing was never said about that.

18 And another thing, I was going to testify. My mom even
19 knew I was ready to take the stand. You know, I was
20 oblivious, whatever, and he told me it would be best if I
21 didn't take the stand, everything looked good. That the
22 solicitor has got ways of doing things to make it look bad
23 and it wouldn't be a good idea, so I didn't take the stand.

24 Looking at the extraction report, in the Verizon
25 records, there's 110 text messages that ain't on the Verizon

1 record that they got attached that target number to on the
2 extraction. And, like, seven of them was read out that was
3 not on the original Verizon records. So that was another
4 thing. That number is attached to over a hundred text
5 messages that wasn't on the original Verizon record.

6 Q And those are some of the records you wanted to go
7 after with that motion?

8 A Correct.

9 Q As well as DNA records?

10 A Correct. On the extraction report, there was 110 text
11 messages on there. There's some that's got 2005 on it
12 that's got the target number attached to it. That should
13 have been argued that it didn't match over a hundred text
14 messages that wasn't on the Verizon records. And it started
15 way before, started in 2005. It started in 2005 if you'd
16 look at the extraction report. It started in 2005. The
17 alleged assaults happened in 2013. So that would have been
18 a point to bring up to get this suppressed.

19 Q To suppress it pretrial and not have it come in at all?

20 A That's correct. That's even more evident that, you
21 know, ten years earlier, it's got the number attached of
22 text messages for this extraction here.

23 MR. JOHNSON: Thank you, Mr. Brown.

24 Judge, I don't have anymore questions.

25 THE COURT: Yes, sir.

1 CROSS-EXAMINATION

2 BY MR. ZELENKA:

3 Q Mr. Brown, how old are you today?

4 A 51, as of yesterday.

5 Q Okay. Let me ask you an initial question, one of your
6 allegations is that your lawyer failed to adequately advise
7 you to testify; is that correct?

8 A Yes, sir.

9 Q What would you have testified about?

10 A What would I have testified about?

11 Q Yes, sir.

12 A That I didn't even have my cell phone.

13 Q What would you have testified about concerning the four
14 incidents that you were charged with criminal sexual conduct
15 with a minor? What would you have said about that?

16 A What would I have said about it?

17 Q Yeah.

18 A That I didn't do it.

19 Q That you didn't do it?

20 A Yeah.

21 Q Is that what you told your lawyer?

22 A That I didn't do it?

23 Q Yeah.

24 A Yeah, when I first hired him.

25 Q What exactly did you tell him?

1 A I told him that I wanted to hire him, I didn't do this
2 and I'm innocent.

3 Q After that, you were given a plea offer and you
4 rejected the plea offer; isn't that correct?

5 A That's correct.

6 Q And how was that plea offer relayed to you?

7 A How was it relayed?

8 Q Did the lawyer tell you?

9 A Did he tell me about the plea offer?

10 Q Yeah.

11 A Yeah, he come out there with it.

12 Q Okay. So there was another meeting with your lawyer on
13 your plea offer?

14 A Yeah.

15 Q At that point in time, what did you think the State had
16 charged you with, what you said you were not guilty of and
17 didn't want a plea offer?

18 A What are you asking, sir?

19 Q What did you think you were rejecting a plea offer
20 about? You indicated in your application that your lawyer
21 never went over the details of the case. What did you think
22 this was about?

23 A I rejected it because I knew I didn't do it. I didn't
24 want no plea offer.

25 Q When did you learn about the DNA evidence?

1 A When did I learn of it?

2 Q Uh-huh.

3 A He gave -- no, it was my other attorney that gave me a
4 call.

5 Q You had another lawyer before you had Mr. Stitely
6 representing you?

7 A Yes, sir.

8 Q Who was that lawyer?

9 A David Belding.

10 Q David who?

11 A Belding.

12 Q David Belding a lawyer in this area?

13 A He's from Columbia.

14 Q And why did you hire Mr. Stitely?

15 A Well, I thought my other attorney was trying to
16 pressure me into a plea offer. I felt like he wasn't, you
17 know what I mean.

18 Q Okay. So you already --

19 A I was uncomfortable, so I figured I'd get an attorney
20 in my county right across from the courthouse. That's what
21 I felt.

22 Q Okay. So did you ever tell Mr. Stitely that you did
23 have a relationship with the victim in this case?

24 A Did I tell him that I did?

25 Q Yes.

1 A No, sir.

2 Q Did you say you knew the victim?

3 A No, sir.

4 Q Did you ever say you were in love with the victim?

5 A No, sir.

6 Q Now, you made a statement to the Judge after the
7 conviction, you acknowledged you had a relationship with the
8 victim, didn't you?

9 A I did.

10 Q You did?

11 A I did.

12 Q And was that similar to the information that Mr.
13 Stitely would have had if he put you up to testify?

14 A When I said that?

15 Q Yeah.

16 A No way.

17 Q Pardon me?

18 A I wouldn't have said that.

19 Q You wouldn't have said it then, but you said it after
20 you were convicted?

21 A That's right, I did.

22 Q So what would you have testified about under oath
23 during the trial if you were called since you made a
24 statement in open court to the Judge after you were
25 convicted that yes, you did have a relationship, yes, you

1 acknowledge that the photograph in your attempt to groom the
2 victim in this case was your photograph and that yes, the
3 photograph that were used to connect you to the victim was
4 not your photograph? What would you have testified to? How
5 would you have explained that information?

6 A If I had testified, none of this would have ever
7 happened in closing, whatever, in sentencing because at that
8 time, I had lost hope in the trial and I really -- I was
9 found guilty, so that was the excuse there. And everything
10 I said was everything that was said in trial that was used
11 against me, I just reused it to try to butter up stuff.

12 Q So you were giving a false statement to the Judge about
13 having a relationship, that that photograph was or wasn't
14 your photograph that you volunteered to Judge McMahon?

15 A Yeah, it was false. It was false.

16 Q Let me go through a few more things. When did you
17 learn that there was a second extraction from the victim's
18 telephone that more significantly pointed to your
19 involvement in the communications with the victim in this
20 case?

21 A Through trial.

22 Q During the trial?

23 A During the trial.

24 Q Okay. When did you learn that the DNA taken from the
25 victim may have, also, included other Y chromosome test

1 data? When did you learn that for the first time?

2 A When I did I learn that?

3 Q Uh-huh.

4 A I learned a lot of this stuff after trial. I didn't
5 even know nothing about all this.

6 Q So you're saying you didn't know anything about
7 possibly other individual's DNA prior to the time you walked
8 into the trial?

9 A Yes, sir.

10 Q When did you learn that you had four separate
11 indictments brought against you?

12 A The day of trial.

13 Q But you're aware that there were four incidents before
14 that trial that you were charged with, correct?

15 A I believe I got it in the mail, notice of indictments.

16 Q And the first one would be the month of October, from
17 October 1st to October 31st, correct?

18 A Yes, sir.

19 Q Was that the first incident that you had communicate
20 with the victim?

21 A I didn't communicate with the victim.

22 Q Was that the first matter that you were charged with
23 communicating with the victim and having sexual relations
24 with the victim back there at the deer stand?

25 A It wasn't me, sir.

1 Q I know, but that's what you were charged with?

2 A Yes.

3 Q And you knew you were charged with an incident that
4 occurred in October, correct?

5 A Yes, sir.

6 Q And you're aware that there were three other incidents
7 subsequent to that in November that you were specifically
8 charged on a particular day; isn't that true?

9 A Yes, sir.

10 Q And you were aware of that before you went to trial,
11 correct?

12 A Yes, sir.

13 Q Did you have an alibi for those incidents?

14 A Alibi?

15 Q Uh-huh.

16 A Like, where I was?

17 Q Uh-huh.

18 A No, sir.

19 Q You're just saying it wasn't you?

20 A That's right.

21 MR. ZELENKA: I have no further questions.

22 MR. JOHNSON: Nothing further, Your Honor. We don't
23 have anymore witnesses.

24 THE COURT: Okay.

25 Thank you, Mr. Brown. You may step down and sit with

1 your attorney.

2 Nothing further from the Applicant?

3 MR. JOHNSON: Nothing further, Your Honor, that's our
4 case.

5 THE COURT: Thank you.

6 Yes, sir.

7 MR. ZELENKA: Ben Stitely.

8 BEN STITELY,

9 after being duly sworn, testified as follows:

10 THE CLERK: Thank you. Please be seated. Please state
11 your name for the record.

12 THE WITNESS: Ben Stitely, Benjamin Stitely,
13 S-T-I-T-E-L-Y.

14 DIRECT EXAMINATION

15 BY MR. ZELENKA:

16 Q Mr. Stitely, what's your current occupation?

17 A I am an attorney.

18 Q How long have you been practicing law?

19 A Going on 18 years.

20 Q Approximately what part of your practice is involved in
21 criminal defense?

22 A 99 percent of it.

23 Q And what part of that practice -- or, roughly, how many
24 cases have you been involved in involving criminal sexual
25 conduct?

1 A I'm trying one right now, actually, in Newberry. I
2 picked the jury yesterday. I couldn't put a percentage on
3 it, though.

4 Q Is it a fairly high percentage?

5 A That go to trial. I'd say DUIs and CSCs are probably
6 the two that go to trial more than anything.

7 Q Okay. Generally describe your experience in cases that
8 may involve DNA identification. Is this the first case that
9 you were involved in with this or are there numerous cases?

10 A No. DNA, typically, is involved in any case with a
11 violent crime or a sexual element. I don't know that I've
12 ever had one that didn't have some form of DNA in it.

13 Q Did you have a -- describe your understanding of SLED
14 DNA reports. Were you familiar with those prior to this
15 trial?

16 A Yes, sir.

17 Q Were you familiar with reviewing and cross-examining
18 SLED DNA experts?

19 A Fairly so, I think.

20 Q Were you, also, familiar at the time of this trial with
21 cell phone extractions?

22 A I'd say I'm probably more proficient than most in cell
23 phone data.

24 Q And why is that?

25 A Because of my age. No offense, but I grew up in the

1 cell phone era, so I'm, I guess, hip to the times. I do a
2 lot of cell phone cases, too. Particularly, murder cases,
3 they like to use them. So we do a lot of cell phone
4 extraction cases.

5 Q So in this particular case, you did not hire, according
6 to my understanding, a DNA expert?

7 A No.

8 Q Why did you not do that?

9 A Because his DNA was in the underwear on a sperm
10 fragment. I don't know what further we could have achieved
11 on that. I did attack the DNA person. Actually, it was an
12 interesting case. I think they only went nine alleles out
13 in this case. There is a number of different standards and
14 the odds in this case were not significant, but we couldn't
15 get around the fact that his sperm was in her underwear. I
16 don't know what an expert would have told me other than
17 that.

18 Q And the odds were in one and two, a lot of them one and
19 --

20 A Two --

21 Q -- two --

22 A Yeah.

23 Q Is that correct?

24 A Yes, sir. And I did make a big stink that it had to be
25 unrelated males, too. I said, what if it was a son, what if

1 it was a brother? And the DNA expert said I couldn't tell
2 you that one way or another.

3 Q And let's go to, did you have conversations with your
4 client about that?

5 A Yeah. He was out on bond. He wasn't in jail. So this
6 wasn't a situation -- I mean, he was on the street prior to
7 trial.

8 Q Okay. Following up on that, how often, if any, did you
9 meet with your client prior to trial?

10 A I couldn't tell you the exact amount. Like I said, he
11 wasn't in jail, so it wasn't one of those situations where I
12 could call the jail and get the exact number. But, I mean,
13 he was out. He had my phone number. He could have come
14 into my office.

15 I know in the beginning when he came in, he was set for
16 trial, I want to say, in September. I think he hired me and
17 we got it continued. I went to Ms. Patterson, who was the
18 head solicitor on it, to try to get an offer on the case. I
19 can't remember if it was zero to ten or zero to 15, but they
20 were both nonviolents and she gave us an opportunity to go
21 during the blue light week, which is the last week of the
22 year and do the plea and she was going to be silent on
23 sentencing. Pretty much just read the facts and we could
24 ask the Judge for whatever we wanted. I believe that offer
25 may have been opened before I got involved and got recalled

1 when she put it on the trial docket, so I asked her to
2 reinstate it. Mr. Brown did not want the offer, so we tried
3 two months later, I guess.

4 Q How did you know Mr. Brown didn't want the offer?

5 A We, actually, came up here. We were standing outside.
6 I think I had the paperwork. It may have even been signed
7 once, but he decided he did not want to go forward with it.
8 But I know she brought us up here during the last week of --
9 the last term of December to see if we could resolve it
10 before it went on for trial the next year.

11 Q What kind of actual discussions did you have with your
12 client about the facts of the case?

13 A His defense to me was that they connected and they were
14 in love. And I had to explain to him that that was not a
15 lawful defense to a CSC with a minor based on age. It's a
16 statutory problem. Even if consent was not the issue, it
17 was a statutory consent problem. So I would have told him,
18 David, you can't take the stand and say that because that is
19 an admission of a violation of the statute. It is not a
20 lawful defense.

21 Q And the Defendant at the time of the crime was 41 years
22 old?

23 A Around 40, something like that, and she was 13 or 14.

24 Q 13 and 14 during the timeframe; is that correct?

25 A I believe so.

1 Q From that information that he provided to you, did that
2 affect how you addressed the DNA issue, the cell phone data
3 issue and your recommendations concerning whether he should
4 testify?

5 A It was all relevant. And to kind of hit on it, it was
6 an interesting situation. Not -- once again, not to smear a
7 victim in this case, but she was having conversations with a
8 number of individuals, not just Mr. Brown. And we,
9 actually, had a hearing about it. The solicitor filed a
10 rape shield motion, so we were limited in what we could get
11 into, but I was able to get into some of it.

12 I believe that during the trial, we brought up
13 conversations with, at least, one other individual. I think
14 there was four or five individuals, but the Judge wouldn't
15 let me get into all of that. Once again, not to smear a
16 victim, but this was a situation where there was some
17 questions about her veracity as far as what happened, but I
18 couldn't get around the DNA.

19 Q The jury came back during their deliberations and asked
20 a question about when he list his cell phone. What was your
21 reaction to that?

22 A I don't recall ever having a situation of losing a cell
23 phone. I know that he was called to come interview with law
24 enforcement, so I guess he must have had it at that point.
25 I don't recall the cell phone being lost. I don't recall

1 any defense that it wasn't really him on his cell phone ever
2 being a trial tactic. I don't recall that being anything.

3 Q Okay.

4 A I think it was much more to point out that there were a
5 number of people involved in the cell phone so there wasn't
6 any way to say it was him or just him or whatever.

7 Q Okay. Concerning the DNA chain of custody, did you
8 look at the chain in preparation for the trial --

9 A Yes.

10 Q -- to ensure that everything was correctly done
11 according to the chain of custody law?

12 A I feel like we come up on these in PCRs and we used to
13 be a lot better at DNA chains, but then that bad case came
14 out that said unless it was a glaring hole, the chain was
15 good enough and unless we had some reason to show that there
16 was an actual break. But this was just -- one, he
17 volunteered a swab and two, it was a cutting from her
18 underwear. There wasn't going to be a chain problem.

19 Q And you didn't object to that evidence coming in,
20 correct?

21 A No.

22 Q With respect to his post-verdict statements, what, if
23 anything, did you advise him on how to address any
24 allocution at that particular time with Judge McMahon?

25 A My honest comment to my clients is don't say anything

1 ever. Even when I do pleas, I don't want my clients to open
2 their mouths unless the Judge really, really wants to hear
3 from them. But what he told the Judge is exactly what he
4 always told me about this case and that was the problem with
5 a defense. It was, I'm not going to say surprising, but
6 Judge McMahon typically maxed people out, so maybe it was
7 effective because I honestly would have anticipated Judge
8 McMahon giving him 80 years with all candor.

9 Q With respect to the timeframe listed in any of the
10 indictments, did you see any ability to move to quash those
11 indictments or anything?

12 A No. They were specific enough. There was -- it's not
13 one of those where they said over a ten-year gap. They were
14 pretty targeted.

15 Q Okay. One of them was the month of October and the
16 others were the three on or about the three specific dates;
17 is that your recollection?

18 A Yeah, they were relatively specific. I know there's
19 some law there that the solicitor can't say between 2020 and
20 2022, but these were month and date specific indictments.

21 Q Prior to the trial, did you believe that you had an
22 adequate understanding of the State's evidence to be put
23 against your client?

24 A Yes.

25 Q Now, did you share that information with your client?

1 A Yeah, and I told him he should have taken the plea when
2 we were in the blue light week.

3 Q Did you share with him the DNA results?

4 A Everything I get -- as a rule, if I get a copy of
5 something from the solicitor's office, before I even see it,
6 my girls copy it, do a letter to the client and then put
7 both my copy and the letter to my client with a copy of
8 discovery and we mail it out that day. So yes, it would
9 have been sent to him the day I got it.

10 Q Well, did you share with them both of the cell phone
11 extractions?

12 A Same exact thing, if I got it, he got a copy.

13 Q Did he ever indicate to you the desire to have -- you
14 know, hire a DNA expert on his behalf?

15 A No. There wouldn't have been a benefit to it. In my
16 opinion, there would have been no benefit because his sperm
17 was in the underwear. I don't know how to get around that.
18 But no, he did not ask me to hire an expert.

19 Q Did he acknowledge to you in your discussions with him
20 that his sperm was in her underwear?

21 A I don't think he specifically said that. I don't
22 recall him ever telling me exactly what happened, to be
23 honest. I just remember his defense was that he was in love
24 and they had really connected. That's all he would say. I
25 don't think he ever made any admissions to me about any

1 specific conduct.

2 MR. ZELENA: Thank you, Your Honor. No further
3 questions.

4 CROSS-EXAMINATION

5 BY MR. JOHNSON:

6 Q Mr. Stitely, did you say how many times you met with
7 Mr. Brown?

8 A I do not know. But like I said, he was on bond, so any
9 time he would have come in, he could have or we talked on
10 the phone, but no, I cannot remember specifically. I know I
11 met with him. I know I met with him when we got the offer.
12 I know I met with him, at least, one other time up here, but
13 I can't tell you other than that.

14 Q With a case this serious, do you oftentimes hire
15 private investigators to work these cases?

16 A In the time I've been doing this, I don't know that
17 I've hired a private investigator more than a handful of
18 times. This case, I don't know what benefit would one have
19 been, to be honest. It wasn't a whodunit question. There
20 weren't other extraneous witnesses to interview of anything
21 like that, so I would not have hired one in this case.

22 Q Can you tell what a DNA expert can tell from the
23 evidence without having them review the evidence or is that
24 something that could have been in different, in their
25 opinion could have been different from yours?

1 A I guess it's entirely possible. There was nothing that
2 I saw from the DNA that would have told me that I needed an
3 expert to challenge something, but I guess it's always
4 possible.

5 Q And the same for cell phone records, you did not
6 object, but there are people who are cell phone experts who
7 can go over all the records and determine what quality they
8 are and what they really mean?

9 A Sure.

10 Q And you did not hire a cell phone expert?

11 A Did not hire a cell phone expert.

12 Q The issue of the lost phone, that came back from the
13 jury, so that means they were placing some importance on
14 that issue, correct?

15 A I suppose.

16 Q And that's not something you got into with your client
17 and discussed it?

18 A No.

19 Q Did you do anything to argue a more favorable jury
20 charge for this client?

21 A I don't know what that means.

22 Q Is there anything they could have charged the jury,
23 especially regarding question from the jury regarding the
24 cell phone, is there any way they could have changed the
25 charge to be more favorable do you think?

1 A I think the Judge read the standard reasonable doubt
2 charge. In listening to what he said, I'm guessing he was
3 saying that the benefit should go to the Defendant. I'm
4 fairly certain that's in the standard charge. I don't think
5 we came to an Allen charge, I don't recall, but I don't
6 think there was an Allen charge. I object to Allen charges
7 if they ever do try to give one.

8 Q Okay. And any objection or discussion of DNA chain of
9 custody, that would, also, fall under it could have been a
10 different opinion if you had a DNA expert review it? It's
11 possible?

12 A I don't think it would have changed the chain of
13 custody side of it, but I did not have an expert, no.

14 Q And the statements, you said you advised him not to say
15 anything regarding the questioning from the Judge and all
16 that?

17 A My standard to any defendant is, especially after a
18 trial, is keep your mouth shut if you hope to have an
19 appeal, but I don't recall specifically.

20 Q And you made no objections to indictments?

21 A No.

22 Q And the discussion of other male DNA, is that something
23 that you brought up during the argument in front of the
24 jury?

25 A Well, I mean, I reread the discussion I had with the

1 DNA expert and I did challenge him saying it could have been
2 another male, it could have been another related paternal
3 male, which would have thrown his numbers completely out of
4 whack. I think I, also, argued what a major contributor
5 was. I argued how far he went down the analysis.

6 So I did argue all of that with the DNA expert, but the
7 at the end of the day, I think the unfortunate question that
8 got into the last question by the solicitor on recross, he
9 said David Brown's sperm was in the underwear and that was
10 kind of where we were.

11 Q Okay. Did you produce any written communication where
12 you sent the offer to the client? You said there was an
13 offer and he should have taken it?

14 A I do not know. I do recall being up here standing
15 outside with the sheets in my hand. I don't remember if he
16 had signed them with his previous lawyer and I had gotten
17 them and was sitting there with him talking to him, but I
18 know that we had an offer of either a CSC third or a lewd
19 act, I think it was before the statute changed, which would
20 have been zero to ten or zero to 15 nonviolent and he did
21 not want to take it because he did not want to be in jail
22 over Christmas.

23 Q Okay.

24 A I think he probably would have gotten a prison
25 sentence, but doing a plea that week, I don't even think he

1 would have been maxed out on that singular charge.

2 Q Okay. Did you have a conversation with anybody about
3 this record, the cell phone record that the Judge questioned
4 him about with that other name attached to it?

5 A I don't recall.

6 Q If you have a record with another name attached to it,
7 couldn't that have been another person that you could have
8 talked to?

9 A Entirely possible.

10 MR. JOHNSON: Those are all the questions, Your Honor.

11 MR. ZELENKA: Just one followup.

12 REDIRECT EXAMINATION

13 BY MR. ZELENKA:

14 Q With respect to the jury question, I draw your
15 attention to transcript page 449 and 450 at the bottom where
16 it says jury question.

17 A Okay.

18 Q What was that jury question?

19 A When did David say he lost his phone.

20 Q And is it correct that following that the determination
21 was made by the Court without objection to replay the
22 testimony of the investigator involved in the case, Renee
23 Strickland?

24 A Yes.

25 Q And no further objections were made after that evidence

1 was played; is that correct?

2 A If you look at it, I actually said well, if we're going
3 to play part, I want the whole part, not just the little --
4 I want the entire testimony replayed. So I asked for them
5 to play it all and the Court made its determination.

6 Q And it looks like they did play it?

7 A Yes.

8 MR. ZELENKA: That's it.

9 THE COURT: Thank you. You may step down.

10 MR. STITELY: May I be excused?

11 MR. ZELENKA: No objection.

12 MR. JOHNSON: No objection, Judge.

13 THE COURT: Your Honor, I have asked one of the
14 prosecutors to be here, but in light of the testimony in the
15 case, I am going to decline to call them, but they're here
16 if they want to call them in reply.

17 MR. JOHNSON: I have no more questions and no more
18 witnesses.

19 THE COURT: Any closing arguments before I take this
20 under advisement?

21 MR. JOHNSON: We're not requesting any, Judge.

22 THE COURT: All right. I'm going to take this under
23 advisement. Hopefully get something out to you shortly
24 before I ask for a proposed order.

25 MR. JOHNSON: Thank you.

1 MR. ZELENKA: Thank you.

2 THE COURT: Thank you, Mr. Brown, for being here.

This matter comes before this Court from a *pro se* application for post-conviction relief made by David Ray Brown filed on February 11, 2019. On February 26, 2019, the Clerk of Court initially appointed Overture Walker to represent the Applicant. The Respondent made a Return to the application on May 28, 2019. On September 30, 2019, the Court relieved Mr. Walker and appointed Ola Johnson to represent the Applicant.

The record before this Court shows that on March 29, 2021, Applicant, through counsel, filed a motion to authorize discovery, alleging that a court order authorizing Applicant to engage in discovery was needed because “Applicant is not in possession of the discovery from the trial counsel and other files necessary to support [his] case.” *Notice of Motion and Motion to Authorize Discovery* at 1, *Brown v. State*, No. 19-CP-32-00624 (Lexington, S.C., Ct. Common Pleas, Mar. 29, 2021). On August 25, 2021, the State (“Respondent”) served its return to Applicant’s motion, arguing that the motion be denied. On April 11, 2022, the parties appeared before the Honorable George M. McFaddin, Jr., for a hearing on Applicant’s motion, with Ola A. Johnson representing Applicant and Taylor Z. Smith of the South Carolina Attorney

General's Office representing Respondent. On October 5, 2022,¹ Judge McFaddin entered his order denying the Applicant's motion. The October 5, 2022 order reveals that at the hearing, Applicant argued that he needs court authorization to engage in discovery so that he can get the following: (1) a chain of custody form concerning a DNA sample collected by law enforcement officers from Applicant; (2) medical and/or other records for the victim in the underlying crime concerning her allegation that she had been raped by someone other than Applicant in the past; and (3) the victim's cell phone records.

On June 9, 2023, appointed counsel Ola Johnson made an amended application.

On October 24, 2023, an evidentiary hearing was held before this Court. The Applicant was present and represented by his appointed counsel Ola Johnson. The Respondent State of South Carolina was represented by Deputy Attorney General Donald J. Zelenka. Testimony was received from the Applicant and his trial counsel Benjamin Stitely.

After the hearing, the Court took the matter under advisement. After reviewing all records and evidence before the Court, this Court finds the Applicant cannot meet his requisite burden of proof of establishing he is entitled to post-conviction relief and denies and dismisses this application with prejudice. The Court finds as follows:

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

David Ray Brown (Applicant) is presently incarcerated in the South Carolina Department of Corrections pursuant to orders of the Lexington County Clerk of Court. During its January of 2016 term, the Lexington County Grand Jury indicted Applicant with four counts

¹ The Applicant's counsel at the outset of the October 24, 2023 PCR hearing brought this October 5, 2022, filed October 14, 2022, order denying his discovery request to this Court.

of criminal sexual conduct with a minor, second degree (2016-GS-32-00160, -00161, -00162, and -00163). The applicant was represented by Benjamin A. Stitely, Esquire, and Assistant Solicitors Rhonda W. Patterson and Shannon Davis prosecuted the case on behalf of the Eleventh Circuit Solicitor's Office. On January 19-21, 2016, Applicant proceeded to a jury trial before the Honorable R. Knox McMahon. He was convicted as indicted on all four counts. On January 25, 2016, the Judge McMahon sentenced Applicant to twenty years' imprisonment for three of the charges, with all three running concurrently, and an eight-year, consecutive sentence on the fourth, and with credit for time served for an aggregate sentence of twenty-eight (28) years imprisonment.

On January 29, 2016, Mr. Stitely filed a Notice of Appeal on behalf of Applicant. Chief Appellate Defender Robert M. Dudek perfected the appeal and filed an *Anders*² brief. In the *Anders* brief, the Applicant, through appellate counsel Dudek, raised the following issue:

Whether the court erred by not admitting the sexual text messages the alleged victim was exchanging with other men at the same time she was communicating with appellant, since appellant had the right, under the rule of completeness, to introduce the text messages as a whole for context in support of his defense that the alleged victim used him as the "fall guy" for having sex with her to protect the other men?

State v. Brown, Anders Brief of Appellant, p. 1. The South Carolina Court of Appeals affirmed in an unpublished opinion. *State v. Brown*, 2018-UP-116 (2018). The Remittitur was sent on April 10, 2018.

ALLEGATIONS FOR RELIEF AS AMENDED

In his initial *pro se* Application for Post-Conviction Relief filed February 11, 2019, Applicant alleges that she is being held in custody unlawfully based on:

1. Ineffective assistance of counsel
 - a. Detrimental reliance
 - b. Failed to advise
2. Due process violations
 - a. Undue delay of documents
 - b. Vindictive prosecution
3. Prosecutorial misconduct
 - a. Perjury
 - b. Fraud
4. Involuntary plea

The Applicant on June 9, 2023, made an amended application raising the following allegations as additional grounds regarding his claim of ineffective assistance of counsel as to Benjamin Stitely as follows:

1. Prior to the trial, Applicant's counsel Benjamin Stitely, failed to explain the details of the Applicant's case.
2. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely, failed to retain a DNA expert to review the state's evidence and testify for the defense.
3. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely, failed to meet with the applicant a sufficient number of times to properly review the evidence and discuss this case with applicant.
4. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely failed to object to the admission of cellular phone text message records based on inconsistencies between the records submitted and those contained within the Verizon records.
5. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely, failed to properly investigate the facts of this case.
6. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely failed to advise defendant to testify and failed to advise him of the importance of explaining the details of when he lost his phone.
7. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely, failed to request a jury charge that was more favorable to the defense.
8. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely failed to object to the DNA chain of custody.
9. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely failed to advise applicant of the potential negative impact his statements at sentencing could have on his appeal.

10. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely, failed to bring up the other male DNA that was found in the states report.

11. Applicant's counsel, Benjamin Stitely failed to object to the state's indictments listing multiple incident dates and ranges.

FINDINGS OF FACT AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

This Court has reviewed the testimony presented at the evidentiary hearing, observed the witnesses presented at the hearing, and weighed the testimony accordingly. Before the Court are Applicant's records from the South Carolina Department of Corrections, the transcript of Applicant's trial, the records of the Lexington County Clerk of Court regarding the subject convictions, Applicant's appellate records, and the original and amended applications for post-conviction relief and the Respondent's Return. This Court has reviewed the records submitted to it by the parties, the legal arguments made by the attorneys, and the pleadings. Pursuant to S.C. Code Ann. § 17-27-80, this Court makes the following findings based upon all of the probative evidence presented:

Trial Summary of the Facts

This case arises from a series of incidents between a thirteen-year (13) old female victim and forty-one (41) year old David Ray Brown. Brown found the victim on Facebook where he posed as a younger male in chatting communication with her, under the profile name of Aaron Justin Fills Goodwin. This communication evolved to where he successfully persuaded her to send naked pictures of herself to him. He used this activity to hold something over her. This communication eventually led to four separate occasions of sexual intercourse between the 41-year-old male and child. Eventually after the last encounter, she finally advised someone at school after Brown indicated he would continue to blackmail her. This eventually led to the Applicant's arrest.

The then 16-year-old victim was the State's first witness at trial. Tr.p. 105. She stated she met Justin Goodwin on Facebook and eventually began texting with him every day. Tr.p. 105-107. She told Goodwin her age (13) and thought Goodwin was 17 or 18. Tr.p. 107. She described texting multiple nude pictures of herself to him. They decided to secretly meet in October in a field near a deer stand near her house at 9 pm. Tr.p. 109. Although it was difficult to see, she could tell it was not Justin from the picture that she was provided. Tr.p. 110. She claimed that she kept quiet because she did not know what to do and was scared. She identified the Applicant at trial as the person who claimed to be Justin. Tr.p. 110. The Applicant initially groped her, and she told him "No". He next threw her on the ground and raped her. He then told her that it would be OK. Tr.p. 110-111. She did not scream because she did not want to get in trouble. She confirmed that Applicant penetrated her vagina with his penis in that incident. They were together for around two hours. Tr.p. 112-113.

The victim stated she continued to talk with the Applicant because she liked the attention, but he became abusive when she did not do what he wanted. Tr.p. 112-113. He told her he loved her. However, she claimed that she did not want to meet again and made excuses.

However, she met with the Applicant a second time in November 2013 after she became 14 years old. Tr.p. 113-114. They met at the same spot and he "forced me into sex" again. Tr.p. 113-114. She might have told a friend Robert but did not tell her mother. She claimed she still texted with the Applicant and continued to send him nude pictures because he threatened to expose the earlier ones if she did not do it. Tr.p. 115-116. She stated that she like the attention he gave her

stating that she was beautiful and perfect.³ However, she claimed he threatened her by asserting if she did not sneak out, he would expose the pictures. Tr.p. 116.

She was scared for her college goals if the defendant released her pictures. She was afraid that if the college found out about people sending nude pictures, they probably would not accept her, and her college goal would be ruined. She claimed the defendant used her college goals against her after she told the defendant about her goals. Tr.p. 116.

She stated they met a third time at the same time and place on a Thursday. Tr.p. 117. She declared she again was forced it vaginal sex. Tr.p. 117-118.

She stated they met a fourth time at the same place on a Saturday going into a Sunday. Tr.p. 118. She stated she tried to make excuses, to avoid the meeting, but again he threatened to expose the pictures on Facebook. She stated by that time she was angry about the threats. At the fourth meeting, she again claimed she was forced into vaginal sex. Tr.p. 119. He said they only communicated a little after the fourth event because she told on him that next Monday and he got mad because he was blocked from her on Facebook. Tr.p. 119.

The victim told Ms. Elizabeth [Park-Floyd], her school mental health counselor that next day that she had been raped by "Justin," using the name she had gotten off Facebook. Tr.p. 120-121. She also told the school resource officer Michael Griggs. Officer Griggs used the victim's phone and called Applicant and told him to not call again. Tr.p. 122-123.

³ The victim also described that the Applicant had bought her blue hoodie and pink sweatpants from Hollister, because she had told him it was her favorite store. Tr.p. 1321-122.

She next met with Lexington County Investigator Renee Strickland. She told her about being raped by Justin and that it was not the same person as the photograph in Facebook. Tr.p. 123. Although she was unable to identify the perpetrator during the initial meeting with Investigator Strickland, she asserted she was eventually able to do so. She stated because the real Facebook post of the perpetrator, "David the Guitarist," friended her in August or September and she blocked him because he was too old. Tr.p. 124. She thought it was a week or two after she got the request from "Justin." She also gave Investigator Strickland some panties that she had worn and her cellphone. Tr.p. 124-126. After the initial meeting with Investigator Strickland, she went to a doctor's office in Richland and a rape kit was done. Tr.p. 126.

The victim identified the photograph of David the Guitarist as the photograph she saw on Facebook. Tr.p. 127. After an in camera proceeding,⁴ the victim identified the Facebook picture of Justin as the person she thought she was communicating with. She next identified the picture of David the Guitarist as the person she met at the deer stand four times. Tr.p. 146-148. She testified that the person in Exhibit 1 (David the Guitarist) was the person she met four times and had sex with. Tr.p. 147-148.

The victim, over objection, reviewed State Exhibit 9 which included a series of text messages purportedly between the victim's phone and the Applicant's telephone number. The

⁴ In the in camera proceeding, counsel Stitely objected to the foundation of the Facebook pictures. He also urged that it should open the door to other inquiry of the victim as to why she had turned down other Facebook requests. However, Stitely stated he did not have a problem with her in-court identification, was concerned about the messages related to the posts. The trial court initially opined that it satisfied evidence Rule 901, Tr.p. 131-139. Counsel Stitely further objected to the admissibility of cellphone records through her. Tr.p. 141. Stitely complained that the extractions from her cellphone. Tr.p. 142-144. Judge McMahon found that the victim could testify about her memory of the texts, but the texts have to be authenticated in addition by Detective Phipps. Tr.p. 144-145. The trial court overruled the objections to the Facebook pictures. Tr.p. 145.

messages between them included compliments, among other matters. However, she pointed out messages on November 17, 2013 which indicated he had not deleted all the nude pictures because he stated some were too good. He responded to her he was upset because she had blocked him on Facebook, although she claimed her brother blocked a lot of people. She claimed the series of messages on that date were because she wanted him to delete the photographs that he threatened to post and how it could affect her. Tr.p.162-165.⁵

On cross-examination, counsel developed that the victim did not want her mother to know she was meeting someone. Tr.p. 188. She was advised by Justin that her best friend at the time was also Facebook friends with the alleged “Justin.” Tr.p. 192. She said she made up an excuse about her brother blocking the account. Tr.p. 195. She stated after the second meeting, it did not surprise her that she was having a pleasant text conversation with someone else. Tr.p. 197. She stated that the blackmailing texts must have been deleted from her telephone. Tr.p. 199. She did delete the pictures because she did not want her brother to see them. Tr.p. 199-201. She said that the Applicant gave her a “pinky promise” that he would delete the photographs. Tr.p. 205.

Michael Griggs served as a school resource officer at Sandhills Middle School in Gaston, South Carolina. Tr.p. 208. Griggs remembered that Elizabeth Park Floyd was a mental health worker at the school. She informed him the minor had reported being in a sexual relationship. Tr.p. 211. Griggs told the minor not to delete any of the messages. Griggs said he texted the telephone number that the minor gave him, and he left a text message introducing himself as a police officer. He told the person in the text “not to disseminate the photographs at all,” and not to contact the

⁵ Prior to cross-examination, counsel Stitely referred to State Exhibit 9 relating to texts involving other persons who suggest their participation in sexual activity. Tr.p. 170-176, 178-183. The Court opined that properly framed questions about her demeanor and pleasant texts during the period would be appropriate, but not inferences related to sex with others. Tr.p. 185-186.

minor again. Tr.p. 214-215. He was unable to leave a voice message after he called the number because it had not been set up. Griggs said he started investigating the “Justin Feels Good Goodwin” Facebook account. Tr.p. 217. On cross examination Griggs admitted that the minor told him most of her text messages had already been deleted, and “I only saw a few.” Tr.p. 223.

Former Lexington County Investigator Renee Strickland testified she was assigned the case on November 18, 2003. She spoke with the victim in the presence of her mother. Tr.p. 228. It was indicated to her that the incident happened at night in October and November of 2013 at her property. Tr.p. 229. She was told the victim was 13 at the time and had recently turned 14. She received the victim’s telephone and submitted it for analysis. Tr.p. 230. Strickland looked at the cell phone and saw the texts that Officer Griggs had sent and a few messages but was aware the victim had mentioned deleting some messages. Tr.p. 231. The victim and her mother told her about the Facebook posts and showed her pictures of Justin and David the Guitarist from Facebook. Tr.p. 232-233. Investigator Strickland was able to later identify David the Guitarist as 41-year-old David Brown. Tr.p. 232-233. She learned who the carrier of the cellphones was and prepared a search warrant for the records initially from Sprint and then from Verizon. Tr.p. 234. She received a cell phone record report from Verizon. When asked about whether there were any numbers on the report that interested her, she indicated a certain number was on the report that was consistent with a number reported by Applicant’s mother that she had learned from a booking report. Counsel Stitely objected, and the trial judge then gave a limiting instruction. Tr.p. 237-243. She noted this number appeared on the phone log numerous times. Investigator Strickland learned the number was from a Tracfone but was unable to get subscriber information.

Investigator Strickland met with the Applicant on January 18, 2014 and gave him his Miranda rights, although he was not under arrest at the time. Tr.p. 245-247. In the interview, Brown

told her that the identified number was his number, although he claimed to not have the telephone any longer. Tr.p. 247. She also received a DNA sample from him using a buccal swab kit. Tr.p. 247-248. She submitted the buccal swab to Lexington County Evidence for submission to SLED for analysis. Tr.p. 248-249. She identified the Applicant's buccal swab and three pairs of the victim's underwear she received from the minor when they met. State's Exhibits 14,15,16. She also identified photographs of the underwear she received. Tr.p. 250-251. She indicated that the items did not appear tampered with in any way. Tr.p. 251-252. Strickland stated she submitted the underwear to Evidence and requested they be submitted to SLED for analysis. The items were admitted as evidence without objection from the Applicant. Tr.p. 252-253.

During the interview, Investigation Strickland also found it interesting that the Applicant was wearing similar clothes to those describe by the minor, a grey colored sweater or sweatshirt, blue jeans and work boots. Tr.p. 249.

Investigator Strickland went to the victim's house, reviewed the scene, and located the deer stand. She also stated that she confirmed the birthdate of the Applicant. Tr.p. 254-255.

On cross-examination, counsel Stitely pointed out that the interviews with the minor were on November 22 and 23. She described the victim's demeanor on the first day as a flat affect, not conveying much emotion and that she did not seem scared, embarrassed, or disturbed. Tr.p. 256. She reported that Applicant came to her office voluntarily, voluntarily gave his DNA, and voluntarily gave his phone number. Tr.p. 256-259. She was advised by the Applicant that the number belonged to him at one time, that he no longer had the original phone, that he ported the number to a new phone, but had lost that second phone. Tr.p. 258-259. Investigator Strickland confirmed that the clothing Applicant wore was not uncommon for someone in construction but took notice of it because it was like what had been described by the victim. Tr.p. 259.

Temple Hart, the sexual assault nurse examiner (SANE) at Palmetto Heath Richland described her treatment of the minor victim on November 19, 2013, at 6:06 PM. Tr.p. 264-265. The victim indicated to her that she had been raped on three occasions on November 11, 14 and 16. Tr.p. 267. The victim described it as penile penetration and that she thought it was someone she met on Facebook. Tr.p. 267. Nurse Hart then described her procedure during the examination, including the swabbing of the mouth, vagina and rectum, and checking for injuries. She did not find any injuries, which was not unexpected. Tr.p. 268-270. She collected the panties the victim had on that date. The swabs were admitted without objection after the procedure in sealing the items was developed. Tr.p. 273-276. Nurse Hart stated that she sealed the items and placed them in the refrigerator until law enforcement picked them up. Tr.p. 272. There was some fluid on the panties that she did not identify. Nurse Hart stated that they gave the victim treatment, including sexually transmitted infection testing and gave her medicine to prevent those diseases, as well as medication to prevent pregnancy and antibiotics. Plan B.

On cross-examination, she indicated in her notes that the assailant was Justin Goodwin, and he was a 16- to 18-year-old Caucasian. Tr.p. 279-280. Counsel further pointed out the victim gave three dates in November that she placed in her notes and confirmed the victim did not indicate an October date or she would have noted it. Tr.p. 281. She again confirmed that there were no injuries such as bruising, redness, or swelling when she was examined. Tr.p. 281. She did not find it uncommon in rape cases, but there is no test that exists for rape or that indicates a sexual assault occurred, other than the patient's disclosure. Tr.p. 281. She stated that there is no way to look at a victim's genitals and decide if it was consensual or not. Tr.p. 282. She confirmed the treatment she received was routine based upon an individual asserting unprotected sexual assault and penile penetration. Tr.p. 283.

Senior Analyst Karen Milbrodt with Verizon Wireless testified as a record custodian and presented information from their business records for the telephone number ending in 3982 from July 1, 2013 through November 30, 2013. Tr.p. 287-290. She stated Exhibit 17 were based upon those records from a subpoena is a combination of two records of incoming and outgoing call detail and cell address location combined and redacted from the original. Tr.p. 290. State Exhibit 23 was the complete file and was entered without objection. Tr.p. 291.

The defense objected to State Exhibit 17. Counsel objected to the admission of State Exhibit 17 because it was a document prepared by someone other than Verizon. The trial court found that the document was from her records, State Exhibit 23. State Exhibit 17 was entered over objection by the trial court, citing *State v. Gullede*, 326 S.C. 220, 487 S.E.2d 590 (1997). Tr.p. 293-294.

Milbrodt verified that subscriber information on TracFones is unavailable to Verizon. Tr.p. 295. The logs included the number the subscriber dialed to make the call, the date and time, whether it was incoming or outgoing, length of call, cell tower information. State Exhibit 25 accurately represented the calls extracted from Verizon records. Milbrodt reviewed the documents and specifically note calls made on September 20, 2013 to #8259, on October 3, 2013 to #8259 and on November 10, 2013 to #2310. Tr.p. 298-300. She testified that the content of text messages can only be supplied by Verizon if requested within 3 to 5 days of transmission. Tr.p. 301.

On cross-examination, counsel developed that subscriber information of the Tracfone prepaid service belonged to the supplier and she did not know if they could supply the records or whether the number was ported. Tr.p. 302-304. She testified she was aware of the concept of “spoofing” where a number shows up showing a number rather than the actual number. Tr.p. 305. She said the information does not show who made or received the calls. Tr.p. 306.

Investigator Michael Phipps of the Forensic Services Department of the Lexington Sheriff's Department, over objection, was qualified as an expert in forensic computer examination and forensic cell phone examination and analysis. Tr.p. 311-313. He stated he was asked to examine the victim's cell phone and to look for contacts with # 3982. He performed an initial Cellebrite extraction on December 27, 2013. Tr.p. 314-319. They processed after the initial program was completed with the Cellebrite Physical Analyzer and created a spreadsheet, identify the contact lists, photos, videos, texts, chat screens, music, and third-party applications used for communicating. This is compiled and given back to the investigator on a disk. Tr.p. 319-320. Investigator Phipps stated a second extraction of the victim's phone was done on December 7, 2015 with a newer piece of hardware and updated software. Tr.p. 321-322. The number on the phone searched was #2310 and the targeted number from Verizon was #3982. They were able to find texts on the second dump that they were unable to find on the first dump. Tr.p. 321-322. Investigator Phipps described the map he made using the location data. Tr.p. 324-326. State Exhibit 26.

Investigator Phipps stated the information showed that #3982 dialed #8259 in September, October, and November 2013. Tr.p. 326. After a hearsay objection was made, Investigation Phipps testified about two addresses -one associated with the victim and the other associated with the suspect. Tr.p. 320-330. He referred to a November 5, 2013, entry which showed a call originated from #8982, called #2310 and hit cell tower number 515 which was close to the defendant's location. Tr.p. 331. On November 10, 2013, a call made at 2304 before midnight for 47 minutes and was hit on cell site 534 and in the direction of the victim. He opined that most of the text messages on the cellphone had been deleted and they only recovered partial texts. Tr.p. 534 and cross-examination of Investigator Phipps concerning the map he prepared (State Exhibit 26), he

confirmed there is not a guarantee that the phone is going to hit the cell tower closest to it. Tr.p. 224-225. He also confirmed that it depends on how busy a tower is, and it will find the next available tower. He admitted that the records showed the victim was texting multiple people during the time frame in the extraction from October to November. Tr.p. 337-338. He stated in the forensic version of Cellebrite that they used, they are unable to intentionally add something or take something off the cell phone. Tr.p. 338-339. He stated in this case 99% of the material was deleted to start with and then over-written. He stated that there would be holes and missing pieces throughout the recovery. Tr.p. 339. He stated that they found images in the first extraction but did not have the data with him in court and it was on his forensic examination computer. Tr.p. 340.

On re-direct, Investigator Phipps stated he was sure he looked at the photos after the first extraction. He stated he knew if he saw any photos that would have applied to this case, he would have reported it in 2013. He did not have any recollection of giving the prosecution information about any photographs being applicable to the case. Tr.p. 341.

The trial judge, out of the jury's presence, inquired of the prosecution about the December 2013 report and photographs. Assistant Solicitor Patterson reported there were photographs, but no photographs of naked pictures of what she described she sent to "Justin." Tr.p. 342. Counsel Stitely indicated he was just inquiring because he never received any pictures in discovery. Stitely stated he was not making a Rule 5 violation motion. Tr.p. 342-343. Judge McMahon then confirmed that there were no exculpatory photographs under Brady. Tr.p. 342-343.

Paul Meeh, a SLED Forensic Scientist was qualified as an expert in DNA Analysis and statistical comparison field. Tr.p. 345-347. Counsel Stitely objected to the testimony because someone else at SLED made the cuttings on the specimens he tested. Tr.p. 351. He stated in his conversations with the solicitor before trial that he indicated to them he did not need the chain of

custody who transferred the items to SLED from Lexington County. Tr.p. 352. He was concerned and initially wanted to hear from the individuals who could state where the items, like 4.1, came from. Tr.p. 352. The Assistant Solicitor, Shannon Davis, indicated that Mr. Meeh would testify that he will use his report as a basis for his opinion and that he does have knowledge of the items. Tr.p. 353.

The trial court held an *in camera* hearing on this issue. Analyst Meeh testified about the manner the items were numbered from the parent item in the container to the cuttings including the parent number. For example, in the pouch identified as #5 would have item 5.1 and any hair or debris would be 5.1.1 or 5.1.2. Tr.p. 353-354. This explanation satisfied the defense. Tr.p. 354-355.

Analyst Meeh testified that he received the items including the SANE kit, the buccal swab from Brown, the victim's buccal swab, the cuttings from green panties 4.1, debris of 3 hairs from item 4 and a cutting from other panties as item 5.1. Tr.p. 356. He was also able to get DNA profiles from the buccal swabs from the victim and Brown. Tr.p. 362-363.

As to item 4.1 there had been semen indicated. Tr.p. 365. He attempted an STR DNA Profiling and differential extraction on item 4.1. He was unable to initially get a clean male profile from the regular STR SNA type. He then moved to Y-Typing which is super sensitive because it only works on the male profiles. Tr.p. 366, 369. This was done after resolving that there were appropriate steps taken to avoid contamination. Tr.p. 365-66. He stated he was able to identify a Y profile on the victim's underwear, item 4.1. Tr.p. 369. The Y STR DNA profile of a major contributor to the mixture matches the Y STR DNA profile of David Ray Brown. Tr.p. 370- 376. He described the difference between a major contributor and a minor contributor. He stated the Y on 4.1 is a mixture of two individuals. Tr.p. 371. He opined this did not come from a random

encounter. Tr.p. 375. It was located in the crotch of her underwear. Tr.p. 375. The actual result of probability of randomly selecting an unrelated male having the Y STR DNA profile matching the major contributor is 1 in 240. He stated that a male relative would match, but more than 99% of the world's population would be excluded. Tr.p. 375.

Concerning the other underwear, item 5.1, he found that the Y STR Profile was partial and matched the Y STR profile of the Applicant. Tr.p. 377. As to this profile result it was 1 in 210 match to the Applicant or male relatives Y STR Profile. This item was still 99% exclusion of the population. Tr.p. 377-378. He noted that the victim's DNA profile and profiles from 4.1 and 5.1 were a definite match. In addition, the items matched the victim's STR Profile in a 1 in 206 sextillion chance of a match. He concluded to a reasonable degree of scientific certainty that items 4.1 and 5.1 included the DNA of the Applicant and the victim. Tr.p. 378-379, 386.

On cross-examination, Meeh described the fact that they were testing a simple length of a short random repeat (STR). He further noted the concept of allele frequency or allele distribution. Tr.p. 381. He noted the difference in the certainty he had on the victim's DNA probabilities and the Applicant's potential DNA on the items He described the limitations of an unrelated individuals and how they compute in 4 or 5 categories to take into account interbreeding. He suggested that the statistics he reported were the most conservative. Tr.p. 384. He confirmed the DNA number does not help if it was a father or a son or paternal brother's son would be difficult. He stated that his "fairly certain" response was based upon the underwear and location on 4.1 and the 5.1 was from underwear she reported wore a week later that was collected by the SANE nurse. However, he was not able to put a time with any certainty when the DNA was placed on the specimen. Tr. p. 384-385.

A general motion for a directed verdict was made and denied. In response, the State urged that they had sufficient evidence to support the crime including the dates of birth of the victim and defendant, the cell phone and text records that the Applicant identified as his cell phone number and the DNA evidence involving the Y STR match. Tr.p. 387-88. Judge Newman denied the motion.

The trial court next inquired of the Applicant concerning his right to testify. Tr.p. 390-396. The Applicant indicated to Judge Newman that he made the decision to not testify. Tr.p. 396. Judge Newman concluded although Applicant only had an 8th grade education that his decision to not testify was freely and voluntary and intelligently made. Tr.p. 396.

Judge Newman further learned that the defense did not intend to put up evidence in his defense. Tr.p. 397, 399-400.

Ineffective Assistance of Trial Counsel

Applicant's allegations of ineffective assistance of trial counsel are without merit. In a PCR action, Applicant bears the burden of proving the allegations in his application. *Butler v. State*, 286 S.C. 441, 334 S.E.2d 813 (1985). Applicant must prove his factual allegations by a preponderance of the evidence. Rule 71.1(e), SCRPC. Where the application alleges ineffective assistance of counsel as a ground for relief, Applicant must prove that "counsel's conduct so undermined the proper functioning of the adversarial process that [it] cannot be relied upon as having produced a just result." *Strickland v. Washington*, 466 U.S. 668, 686 (1984); *Butler*, 286 S.C. at 442, 334 S.E.2d at 814.

In evaluating allegations of ineffective assistance of counsel, the reviewing court applies the two-pronged test outlined in *Strickland*. First, Applicant must prove that counsel's performance was deficient. *Strickland*, 466 U.S. at 686; *Cherry v. State*, 300 S.C. 115, 117, 386

S.E.2d 624, 625 (1989). Under this prong, the court measures an attorney's performance by its "reasonableness under prevailing professional norms." *Cherry*, 300 S.C. at 117, 386 S.E.2d at 625 (quoting *Strickland*, 466 U.S. at 690). The proper measure of performance is whether the attorney provided representation within the range of competence required in criminal cases. *Butler*, 286 S.C. at 442, 334 S.E.2d at 814. "Counsel is strongly presumed to have rendered adequate assistance and made all significant decisions in the exercise of reasonable professional judgment." *Id.* (citing *Strickland*, 466 U.S. at 690). "When counsel focuses on some issues to the exclusion of others, there is a strong presumption that he [or she] did so for tactical reasons rather than through sheer neglect." *Yarborough v. Gentry*, 540 U.S. 1, 5 (2003) (citing *Strickland*, 466 U.S. at 690). The Court, in determining deficiency, must affirmatively entertain the range of possible reasons counsel may have had for proceeding as they did. *Cullen v. Pinholster*, 563 U.S. 170, 196 (2011); *Harrington v. Richter*, 562 U.S. 86, 109–10 (2011). "[E]ven if an omission is inadvertent, relief is not automatic. The Sixth Amendment guarantees reasonable competence, not perfect advocacy judged with the benefit of hindsight." *Yarborough*, 540 U.S. at 6; *see also* *Murphy v. Davis*, 901 F.3d 578, 592 (5th Cir. 2018) ("[C]ounsel's performance need not be optimal to be reasonable.").

Second, counsel's deficient performance must have prejudiced Applicant such that "there is a reasonable probability that, but for counsel's unprofessional errors, the result of the proceeding would have been different." *Cherry*, 300 S.C. at 117–18, 386 S.E.2d at 625. A reasonable probability is "a probability sufficient to undermine confidence in the outcome." *Strickland*, 466 U.S. at 694. "This does not require a showing that counsel's actions 'more likely than not altered the outcome,' but the difference between *Strickland*'s prejudice standard and a more-probable-than-not standard is slight and matters 'only in the rarest case.'" *Harrington*, 562 U.S. at 111–12

(quoting *Strickland*, 466 U.S. at 697). “The likelihood of a different result must be substantial, not just conceivable.” *Id.* at 112. “The prejudice analysis requires the court deciding the ineffectiveness claim to consider the totality of the evidence before the judge or jury.” *United States v. Basham*, 789 F.3d 358, 371–72 (4th Cir. 2015) (quoting *Elmore v. Ozmint*, 661 F.3d 783, 858 (4th Cir. 2011)).

In some cases, overwhelming evidence of guilt will preclude a finding of prejudice. “A reasonable probability of a different result does not exist when there is overwhelming evidence of guilt.” *Hillerby v. State*, 431 S.C. 323, 333, 847 S.E.2d 500, 505 (Ct. App. 2020) (citing *Geter v. State*, 305 S.C. 365, 367, 409 S.E.2d 344, 346 (1991)). For evidence to be “overwhelming,” such that it categorically precludes a finding of prejudice, the evidence must include something conclusive, such as a confession, DNA evidence demonstrating guilt, or a combination of physical and corroborating evidence so strong that the *Strickland* standard of “a reasonable probability . . . the factfinder would have had a reasonable doubt” cannot possibly be met. *Smalls v. State*, 422 S.C. 174, 191, 810 S.E.2d 836, 845 (2018).

Amended Allegations One and Three - Failed to Explain Details in Applicant’s Case Failed to Meet Sufficient Times Prior to Trial.

In his initial amended application, Brown contends that counsel Stitely failed to explain the details of his case prior to trial after he was retained. The Applicant testified at the hearing that he did not know much about the details of his case. He claimed that counsel Benjamin Stitely never met with him after he retained him. He also complained that Stitely he did not hire a private investigator or a DNA expert. The Applicant stated that he had an earlier lawyer, David Belding, who he thought was trying to pressure him into a guilty plea offer, after he learned about the DNA evidence match. However, he claimed he felt uncomfortable with Belding, so he decided to hire a lawyer right across from the courthouse who he thought would fight for him. Contrary to counsel

Stitely's testimony, he denied that he ever indicated he was in love with the victim to counsel. He claimed his statement to the trial judge at sentencing that admitted he knew the victim was an attempt to butter stuff up and was said because he had lost hope and was false.⁶

Counsel Stitely stated that he practiced criminal law for over 18 years. He indicated his prior practice had involved criminal sexual conduct cases. He felt he was experienced in DNA matters and cellphone data matters. He stated that the Applicant hired him after an earlier lawyer. when the case was set for a trial in September, and he got it continued. He met with the Applicant prior to trial but could not state the specific amount. Stitely testified that the Applicant was out on bond, so this was not a situation he was on the street before trial. Stitely stated Brown could have come into my office. Subsequently, Stitely stated he went to Assistant Solicitor Rhonda Patterson to seek a potential offer in the case. She indicated to him the possibility of non-violent and to not recommend any sentence, but Brown was not interested in any plea offer. The case was then tried two months later. Stitely indicated that in his discussions with the Applicant there was no defense in the case. The Applicant claimed to him that he and the victim had connected and that they were in love. Stitely explained to him that was not a lawful defense to criminal sexual conduct with a

⁶ In the sentencing proceeding, the Applicant made a plea in mitigation. Tr.p. 508-513. In his statements to Judge Newman, he stated he had three or four profiles on Facebook. He claimed he was drinking "like a fish" at the time and used the Justin Goodwin profile to talk to people. He claimed he did not pay attention to the age of people he was commenting on. He stated when he started talking with the victim, it just clicked. Tr.p. 510. She had indicated to him in their discussions that she was harassed at school and called names and he advised her not to listen to them, claiming he was trying to help her. He admitted that they texted back and forth in the morning before she went to school. He claimed he was not stalking her. He felt she was being treated that same way he had been treated growing up. He admitted the pictures in Exhibit 2 that was on his profile was not him and he did not know who it was. He confirmed that State Exhibit 1 was him. Tr.p. 512. He admitted he sent a friend request to the victim in September under his profile (David the Guitarist) but claimed she had already friended him under Justin Goodwin before. He claimed the reason for meeting the victim social. He claimed, "but the intentions for what was said is untrue it was only for companionship that I wasn't getting." Tr.p. 512-513.

minor. He advised him it was a statutory problem concerning consent. Simply put, Stitely told him that you can't do that because it is not a lawful defense, when he was around 40 years old, and the victim was 13 or 14 years old.

This Court must find that the Applicant has failed in his burden of proof on this allegation based upon the credible testimony of counsel. There is no established "minimum number of meetings between counsel and client prior to trial necessary to prepare an attorney to provide effective assistance of counsel." *United States v. Olson*, 846 F.2d 1103, 1108 (7th Cir.1988) (there is no constitutional minimum number of meetings between attorney and client and observes that an experienced attorney may get more out of a single meeting than a neophyte); *Moody v. Polk*, 408 F.3d 141, 148 (4th Cir. 2005); *Campbell v. Polk*, 447 F.3d 270, 279, n.2 (4th Cir. 2006) ("we cannot conclude that the fact that Campbell's counsel only met with him five times before trial made them ineffective."). "[B]revity of consultation time between a defendant and his counsel, alone, 'cannot support a claim of ineffective assistance of counsel.'" *Davis v. State*, 44 So. 3d 1118, 1130 (Ala. Crim. App. 2009) (quoting *Murray v. Maggio*, 736 F.2d 279, 282 (5th Cir. 1984)); *White v. Godinez*, 301 F.3d 796, 800 (7th Cir. 2002) ("A brief consultation does not by itself establish that counsel's performance was inadequate."); *Chavez v. Pulley*, 623 F. Supp. 672, 685 (E.D. Cal. 1985) ("brevity of consultation time between a defendant and his counsel alone cannot support a claim of ineffective assistance of counsel," especially where the defendant "fails to allege what purpose further consultation with his attorney would have served and fails to demonstrate how further consultation with his attorney would have produced a different result").

The importance of counsel's communication with the Applicant concerning his acknowledgement that he was in love with the victim undermines his complaint about counsel's performance:

The reasonableness of counsel's actions may be determined or substantially influenced by the defendant's own statements or actions. Counsel's actions are usually based, quite properly, on informed strategic choices made by the defendant and on information supplied by the defendant. In particular, what investigation decisions are reasonable depends critically on such information. For example, when the facts that support a certain potential line of defense are generally known to counsel because of what the defendant has said, the need for further investigation may be considerably diminished or eliminated altogether. And when a defendant has given counsel reason to believe that pursuing certain investigations would be fruitless or even harmful, counsel's failure to pursue those investigations may not later be challenged as unreasonable. In short, inquiry into counsel's conversations with the defendant may be critical to a proper assessment of counsel's investigation decisions, just as it may be critical to a proper assessment of counsel's other litigation decisions. . . .

Strickland v. Washington, 466 U.S. 668, 691, 104 S. Ct. 2052, 2066, 80 L. Ed. 2d 674 (1984). See *Bagwell v. State*, 410 S.C. 259, 265, 763 S.E.2d 630, 633 (Ct. App. 2014); *Reeves v. State*, 415 S.C. 366, 376, 782 S.E.2d 747, 752 (Ct. App. 2015).

This Court must find that counsel Stitely adequately communicated with the Applicant prior to trial and provided the details of the case. This Court finds as a fact, based upon the credible evidence of counsel Stitely, that he was advised by Applicant that he was in love with the minor victim and that that he had engaged in the relationship. This information from the Applicant guides the nature and extent of further communication and actions by counsel. The Court further finds that the Applicant was aware of the DNA results that linked him with the victim's underwear and of the cellphone data that was consistent with his own communications with the victim. The Applicant has failed to show any piece of evidence he was not aware of prior to the trial since he essentially confirmed the existence of the crimes with his communications. The Court further rejects that Applicant's assertion that they met zero times after Stitely's retention. This Court finds that prior to the trial the Applicant was advised that his theory of a consensual relationship with the minor victim did not provide a defense to the charges of criminal sexual conduct with a minor.

He has failed to show deficient performance.

Similar, the Applicant has failed to show Sixth Amendment prejudice. There is no evidence or other matter presented to this Court that further discussions would have impacted on the trial in any matter. His allegations one and three must be dismissed.

DNA

Allegation Two – DNA Expert Not Retained.

In his second allegation, he complains that counsel failed to retain a DNA expert to assist in his defense. As noted above, SLED DNA Analyst Paul Meeh testified at trial about the specimens from two of the victim's underwear being consistent with the Applicant's Y-STR DNA Profile. Tr.p. Tr.p. 370-379, 386. The applicant testified that they did not talk about DNA evidence and thought that they could have kept out DNA evidence because there were other DNA possibilities. Counsel Stitely testified that he did not hire a DNA expert because his DNA was on DNA fragment from the victim's underwear, based upon his conversations with his client. He stated that he was familiar with DNA and fairly familiar with DNA evidence prior to the trial. He acknowledged there were a number of standards and that the odds in the statistical data were not significant.

This Court must find the failure to retain a DNA expert was not ineffective assistance of counsel. First, as the trial record conclusively shows in the above summary related to witness state witness Meeh, counsel Stitely revealed a sound understanding of the DNA evidence in this case, particularly since his client had earlier advised him about his admitted relationship with the victim so that his DNA on the items would have been a possibility. The Applicant and trial counsel were aware of the DNA results prior to trial and the Applicant indicated he was aware of the results before he retained Stitely to represent him. There is no evidence presented as to what a retained

DNA expert would have done to aid the defense. *See Dempsey v. State*, 363 S.C. 365, 370, 610 S.E.2d 812, 815 (2005) (“[C]ounsel’s decision not to call an expert witness to rebut the state’s expert witness was a legitimate trial strategy,” (citing *McLaughlin v. State*, 352 S.C. 476, 575 S.E.2d 841 (2003))) The initial question is normally whether these alleged failures were deficient. Under *Strickland*, there is a strong presumption that counsel rendered adequate assistance and exercised reasonable professional judgment in making all significant decisions in a case.

“[C]ounsel has a duty to make reasonable investigations or to make a reasonable decision that makes particular investigations unnecessary.” *Strickland v. Washington*, 466 U.S. 668, 691, 104 S.Ct. 2052, 80 L.Ed.2d 674 (1984). A decision “not to investigate must be directly assessed for reasonableness in all the circumstances, applying a heavy measure of deference to counsel’s judgments.” *Id.* This Court must conclude that counsel was not deficient in his decision not to retain an independent DNA expert. The decision by Stitely to not retain a DNA expert was a reasonable strategy since it would likely not have led to favorable results.

Assuming arguendo that the Applicant’s counsel was deficient, this Court must find that Brown has also failed to show Sixth Amendment prejudice. Other than the Applicant’s testimony, the Applicant did not call any witnesses to testify concerning the DNA evidence or need for a DNA expert. It is merely speculative that these allegedly favorable expert witnesses would have aided in his defense. *See Dempsey v. State*, 363 S.C. 365, 369, 610 S.E.2d 812, 814 (2005) (“A PCR applicant cannot show that he was prejudiced by counsel’s failure to call a favorable witness to testify at trial if that witness does not later testify at the PCR hearing or otherwise offer testimony within the rules of evidence.”); *see also Porter v. State*, 368 S.C. 378, 386, 629 S.E.2d 353, 358 (2006) (“Mere speculation of what a witness’ testimony may be is insufficient to satisfy the burden of showing prejudice in a petition for PCR.”); *Frasier v. State*, 306 S.C. 158, 160-61, 410 S.E.2d

572, 573 (1991) (finding trial counsel was not deficient in failing to procure an expert witness to challenge DNA evidence presented at trial where the record established that counsel vigorously cross-examined the State's DNA experts and attacked the accuracy of the evidence); *Lorenzen v. State*, 376 S.C. 521, 531, 657 S.E.2d 771, 777 (2008) (citing *Frasier v. State*, 306 S.C. 158, 410 S.E.2d 572 (1991)). As noted above on the deficiency prong, Sixth Amendment prejudice has not been shown by the prepared and vigorous cross-examination. *See also Moorehead v. State*, 329 S.C. 329, 334, 496 S.E.2d 415, 417 (1998); *Porter v. State*, 368 S.C. 378, 385–86, 629 S.E.2d 353, 357 (2006). This Court finds that the Applicant has failed to prove either deficient performance or prejudice under the Sixth Amendment related to this allegation. It must be dismissed.

Allegation 8 – Failed to Object to DNA Chain of Custody

In his eight amended allegation, he contends that counsel should have objected to the admission of evidence based upon an alleged lack of the chain of custody prior to going SLED Analyst Paul Meeh. As noted above the evidence, the initial evidence of the chain of custody of the underwear, DNA swabs, and DNA testing was presented through then Lexington County Investigator Renee Strickland and SLED Analyst Meeh. Strickland indicated the victim and her mother brought the underwear to her which she sealed, placed in Sheriff's Department evidence with directions to send it to SLED and it was sent to SLED. Tr.p. 124-126, 252-253. She personally took the DNA swabs from the Applicant and similarly sealed those and had them sent to SLED. Tr.p. 247-249. Nurse Temple Hart, the SANE nurse took swabs from the victim, as well as the panties the victim was wearing that date, sealed them and placed them in the refrigerator until law enforcement picked them up. Tr.p. 272-276. During SLED Analyst Meeh's testimony, counsel Stitely affirmed that he had advised the State that he was not challenging the chain of custody

concerning the transfer of items to SLED. Tr.p. 351-352. The trial court held a hearing at that point to resolve to counsel Stitely's satisfaction, his concerns about the chain. Tr.p. 354-355.

In the Applicant's PCR testimony, he testified that his counsel allegedly failed to discuss those issues with him, and he felt, in hindsight, that counsel could have kept the evidence out. He asserted that there was partial DNA evidence and speculated it could have come from anybody. Brown testified that in his review of the SLED report, other male evidence was found on the materials that suggested she was sexually active, and it could have removed the Rape Shield Statutes availability, which he also complained about. Counsel Stitely stated this case was interesting because the minor victim was having text conversations with other males. At that pretrial motion hearing, counsel speculated that the DNA being used against the Applicant could be one of the other individuals in the texts. Tr.p. 101. However, the trial court denied the admissibility of those text records under the Rape Shield Law. S.C. Code § 16-3-659.1. *See* Tr.p. 77-102. Counsel testified that he looked at the DNA chain of custody and was unable to show a break in custody. He noted the Applicant had volunteered to do the DNA swab and there was not going to be a DNA issue in the case.

The Applicant has failed to show that counsel was deficient. He has failed to show that there was an actual break in the chain of custody related to the DNA evidence specimens. The Applicant presented no evidence about a break in the chain that counsel should have pursued at trial. As noted, counsel did not object to portions of the chain witnesses prior to trial and was satisfied with Meeh's testimony addressing his concerns. The Applicant has failed to show that counsel's investigation into the chain was negligent, or that his decision related to the presentation was deficient.

Additionally, Sixth Amendment prejudice was not shown. As above, his speculation is insufficient to show counsel's intentional omission in failing to require the presentation of the complete chain would have resulted in Sixth Amendment prejudice. With the absence of evidence of a break in the chain, there is no reasonable probability the result of the proceeding would have been different. The Applicant has failed in his burden of proof. This allegation is denied and dismissed.

Allegation Ten - Failed to Bring Up Other Male DNA in the State's Report.

In his tenth allegation, the Applicant asserts that his counsel failed to present evidence of other males DNA that was in the State's DNA Report. Counsel stated that he re-read the Report, and he did challenge that it could have been another paternal male relative could not be excluded, as stated in the Report. Tr.p. 383-385. He also included these questions about relatives in his argument before the jury. Tr.p. 427-428. Analyst Meeh further indicated that also on item 4.1 was a second Y contributor. Unredacted State Exhibit 29 was introduced at trial which was the SLED DNA Report. Tr.p. 368.⁷

The Applicant's assertion must be denied. As counsel Stitely credibly testified, he did refer to the male relative information in the State's DNA report both during his examination and closing argument. His performance cannot be deemed deficient. Further, prejudice cannot be shown because the unredacted SLED Report was presented to the jury. Tr.p. 368. He failed in his burden of proof in showing either deficient performance or prejudice.

Allegation 4 – Failed to Object to Text Message Records

⁷ State Exhibit 29 included the following language related to item 4.1: "Paternal male relatives of David Ray Brown may not be excluded as the contributor of this profile. Due to low level DNA, the partial Y-STR DNA profile developed from the minor contributor to this item is not suitable for interpretation."

In his fourth allegation, the Applicant contends that counsel failed to object to the admission cellular of text message records based upon the inconsistencies in the records admitted and those from Verizon. At the hearing, the Applicant complained that there was inconsistency inn the two extractions done by the State. He further suggested that counsel should have retained a cell phone expert. He also generally complained that there was a second extraction done before the trial. The Applicant further asserted that he did not have his cell phone at the time of the incident.⁸ He said the phone number he used to have was used against him. He stated that although there was an allegation that he had communication with the victim, there was no investigation to support its admission of the texts by his lawyer. He further claimed that his counsel did not know that he lost his phone. The jury had asked a question about the phone that should have been answered in the testimony. (“When did David say he lost his phone” Tr.p. 450).⁹ Further he claimed that there were a series of records that were not in the original extraction and Verizon records so he contended that everything should have been suppressed.

At the time of the PCR hearing, counsel Stitely did not recall that there was an issue about the lost cell phone. However, the trial testimony reveals that counsel made specific inquiry about the cell phones of the Applicant. Counsel further stated that he was more proficient than most

⁸ During the trial, counsel Stitely brought out in his cross-examination of Investigator Strickland that when he was interviewed by her that he no longer had the either that original phone that he acquired the telephone number or the second phone that was lost. Tr.p. 258-259. However, he did confirm that the identified telephone number was his number at one time. Tr.p. 258. See also, Investigator Strickland on direct discussing the Applicant indicating he did not have the original phone and that he had lost the second phone that he had ported the identified number. Tr.p. 247.

⁹ In response to the question, the jury was replayed the testimony of Investigator Strickland’s testimony after Judge Newman gave a cautionary instruction. Tr.p. 453-486. On direct examination, she indicated that he did not have the original and had lost the second phone that he had ported the number. Tr.p. 472. The second discussion concerning the lost phone is at Tr.p. 483-434.

lawyers in matters concerning cellphones. He did not see a defense to the use of the cellphone data connected with the phones. He confirmed that he did not hire a cell phone expert.

First, counsel initially objected to Exhibit 17 concerning cell phone records because it was different than her Verizon records in State Exhibit 23, but the objection was overruled. Tr.p. 293-294. A failed strategy does not constitute deficient performance. *People v. Kevorkian*, 248 Mich.App. 373, 414–415, 639 N.W.2d 291 (2001). As shown in the trial summary, there were two extractions of the victim’s cell phone using different software versions of Cellebrite, including the most recent version just prior to the trial. Tr.p. 314-322. Investigator Phipps made a map using the cellphone cell tower data. Tr.p. 324-326. On cross-examination, counsel sought to limit the impact of the cell tower data by noting it is not as accurate as it may appear because of the ability to ping any tower if it is more available than the closest tower. Tr.p. 224-225.¹⁰ Counsel was also able to bring out that a significant number of text messages had been deleted prior to the extractions. Tr.p. 339

¹⁰ In 2020, after this trial, the South Carolina Court of Appeals in *State v. Warner*, 430 S.C. 76, 89, 842 S.E.2d 361, 367 (Ct. App. 2020), aff’d in part and remanded, 436 S.C. 395, 872 S.E.2d 638 (2022), affirmed the trial court’s admission of cell site location information (CSLI) testimony, and joined the many other jurisdictions that have deemed CSLI reliable enough to pass the Rule 702 gate, citing e.g., *United States v. Hill*, 818 F.3d 289, 298 (7th Cir. 2016). The Applicant has failed to show the existence of any theory of excluding the testimony in 2015. The vast amount of case authority would not place reasonable counsel on notice of a deficient advocacy if they did not vigorously seek to keep out such evidence. *United States v. Graham*, 796 F.3d 332, 364 (4th Cir.2015) (“... a cell phone connects to the cell tower emitting the strongest signal, and that cell sites in urban areas have a two-mile maximum range of connectivity. He testified further that, aside from proximity, factors such as line of sight and volume of call traffic may affect the ability of a particular cell tower to connect to a phone, but in any case the phone must be located within two miles of any cell tower in the Baltimore area in order to connect to it.”) *United States v. Ransfer*, 749 F.3d 914 (11th Cir.2014) (Custodian of records OK to talk about cell phone pinging to nearest tower. Id. at 937–938; “Detective Christy ... explained ... The cell phone will “ping” the nearest tower unless it is at capacity, in which case it will ping the next available tower. Accordingly, the cell phone tower records are an approximation of the phone’s location at the time of the call.” Id. at 931, n. 18). *United States v. Davis*, 785 F.3d 498, 501–02 (11th Cir.2015):

Further, counsel Stitely at the pretrial motion hearing on the State's rape shield statute motion urged that some of the texts in question with the defendant and other individuals may be relevant under the rule of completeness in light of the crosstalk occurring. Judge Newman deferred ruling until the actual presentation of evidence. Tr.p. 58-59. The defense counsel later urged the admission of text messages with Robert Aarddd and Dalton Harcy. See also Tr.p. 90-101. Judge Newman opined that the messages about sexual act and pregnancy test discussions. Tr.p. 101.¹¹ During the victim's testimony, the text messages she had from her cellphone were presented in Exhibit 9. In her testimony, she referred to a certain text made on November 17. Tr.p. 161-165.

Counsel Stitely made a motion to allow the admission of text messages involving another person, Dalton Marcy, which included sexual statements to the victim. Tr.p. 170-171. He urged to allow its introduction because it was particularly relevant to the time period the state had introduced with the specific text messages on the same hour and within 2 hours after an assault took place and that she was talking to another male about his penis. Tr.p. 171. He sought the opportunity to cross-examine her about those texts. Tr.p. 172-176, 178-185. Judge Newman, upon the defense motion, limited the admission of the texts to evidence that she was having pleasant conversations with a third party and demeanor evidence, but denied the admission of any evidence of sex or inferences of sex in those conversations. Tr.p. 186. Counsel made his limited inquiry about this "pleasant conversation" at Tr.p. 197, l. 1-16.

The Applicant has failed to show that his counsel was deficient. He apparently claims that because he claimed he lost his cellphone that should make the admission of messages related to the telephone number he admittedly owned inadmissible. This is a jury issue, not an issue of admissibility and goes to the weight of the evidence, not its admissibility. Particularly, other than

¹¹ This issue was raised in the Anders brief of the Appellant in the direct appeal.

his statements to Investigator Strickland, there was no evidence to support his claim of a lost phone presented to the jury. However, other than the Applicant testifying, there was not suggested how this information could have been addressed by counsel. Nevertheless, the jury twice heard the self-serving statements in which the Applicant had claimed the phone was lost during the testimony of Investigator Strickland and reheard it when it was replayed during the deliberations.

Similarly, like his assertion that a DNA expert should have been retained, his belated assertion that a cellphone expert should have been retained has not shown either deficient performance or prejudice. Defense counsel was aware that the Applicant had been communicating with the victim based upon his own discussions with him. The Applicant has not presented any evidence that either of the extractions were done in error or that the cell phone extraction and CSLI witness was improperly qualified. To the contrary, the record reveals that the extractions were done consistent with the standards at the time the case was tried in 2016. The Applicant has failed to present any basis to have challenged the extractions as a matter of law or fact.

The Applicant asserted during the hearing that his trial counsel was ineffective because he failed to call an expert on the matter of the cellphone and on the matter of the cellphone pings. Other than broadly asserting that trial counsel should have retained an expert on “cellphones” and cell towers or pings, the Applicant does not explain what the expert would have testified to, how it would have been beneficial to Applicant’s case, and how it would have undercut the state’s against him. (See generally *id.*).

Aside from his testimony and his trial counsel's testimony, Brown again did not offer any other witnesses to testify on his behalf at the PCR hearing. Therefore, it is merely speculative that these allegedly favorable expert witnesses would have aided in his defense. *See Dempsey v. State*, 363 S.C. 365, 369, 610 S.E.2d 812, 814 (2005); *Lorenzen v. State*, 376 S.C. 521, 530, 657 S.E.2d

771, 776–77 (2008).

In summary, counsel was not deficient as it related to cellphone and the admission of certain text messages.¹² He failed to present a legal reason to exclude the data at trial that counsel either did not consider or was unsuccessful in presenting. Similarly, he failed to meet his burden in showing Sixth Amendment prejudice where the state’s case was overwhelming based upon the testimony of the victim, the corroborative nature of the identification, and the inculpatory evidence of the DNA and there is no reasonable probability that the evidence would have been excluded related to the cell phone extraction, cellphone messages and CSLI location evidence.

Allegation Five - Failed to Investigate Facts.

In his fifth amended allegation, the Applicant generally states, without any specification, that counsel Stitely failed to investigate facts. During the PCR hearing, the Applicant testified he did not have any investigation in his case and complained that his counsel did not hire a private investigator. The Court has addressed the claimed failures related to DNA, CSLI, and text messages related matters above. Other than those assertions, the Applicant fails to assert what “fact” counsel failed to investigate.

Counsel testified that he did not hire a private investigator in the case and asserted that he had only done so in very few situations. He claimed upon his review of the evidence, he saw no benefit in hiring an investigator for the facts. “In any ineffectiveness case, a particular decision not to investigate must be directly assessed for reasonableness in all the circumstances, applying a heavy measure of deference to counsel's judgments.” *Strickland*, 466 U.S. at 691, 104 S. Ct. in

¹² The Applicant has to present a basis to exclude the text messages. This court, like the trial court, must find that the state made a sufficient showing of authentication. *See State v. Green*, 427 S.C. 223, 830 S.E.2d 711 (Ct. App. 2019), *aff'd as modified*, 432 S.C. 97, 851 S.E.2d 440 (2020) (messages on social media from defendant contained sufficient distinctive characteristics for authentication)

2066. “Counsel’s actions are usually based, quite properly, on informed strategic choices made by the defendant and on information supplied by the defendant.” *Id.*

Brown’s trial counsel was aware of Brown’s assertion to him that he was in love with the minor and acknowledged his involvement with her. “[W]hen a defendant has given counsel reason to believe that pursuing certain investigations would be fruitless or even harmful, counsel’s failure to pursue those investigations may not later be challenged as unreasonable.” *Id.*

The Court must find his general complaint about an alleged lack of investigation must be denied. Further, Brown again did not offer any other witnesses to testify on his behalf at the PCR hearing about any missing fact or lead in the investigation, rather than merely pointing to the evidence that was introduced at trial that was unfavorable to him. Therefore, it is merely speculative that these allegedly favorable expert witnesses would have aided in his defense. *See Dempsey v. State*, 363 S.C. 365, 369, 610 S.E.2d 812, 814 (2005); *Lorenzen v. State*, 376 S.C. 521, 530, 657 S.E.2d 771, 776–77 (2008). He has failed to prove both prongs.

Alternately, as will more clearly be set out below, his admission of guilt within the plea in mitigation should foreclose his ability to have post-conviction relief. In the sentencing proceeding as earlier set out in allegation one, the Applicant made a plea in mitigation. Tr.p. 508-513. In his statements to Judge Newman, he implicitly admitted his improper involvement with the minor victim. Tr.p. 508-513. *See Whetsell v. State*, 276 S.C. 295, 277 S.E.2d 891 (1981); *but see Johnson v. Catoe*, 336 S.C. 354, 358, 520 S.E.2d 617, 619 (1999) (distinguishing *Whetsell* to its limited facts).

The South Carolina Supreme Court considered the effect of a post-verdict admission of guilt in *State v. Sroka*, 267 S.C. 664, 230 S.E.2d 816 (S.C.1976). In *Sroka*, the court considered the appeal of a defendant convicted of armed robbery, writing:

We affirm because the guilt of the appellant is conclusively shown by the record and any alleged error could not have been prejudicial. Any doubt about the correctness of this conclusion is eliminated by the admission of appellant in open court, after conviction and during the pre-sentence inquiry by the trial judge, that he had participated in the robbery with a sawed-off shotgun. Further review of the record, therefore, is rendered unnecessary. *State v. Key*, 256 S.C. 90, 180 S.E.2d 888 [(1971)]; *State v. Miller*, 266 S.C. 409, 223 S.E.2d 774 [(1976)].

Id. at 817. For this added reason, he failed in his burden of proof showing prejudice in trial counsel alleged failure to investigate.

Allegation 6 – Failed to Advise to Testify

In his sixth allegation, the Applicant generally contends that he failed to advise him to testify and explain the importance of explaining the details of when he lost the phone. He stated that he was going to testify at trial, but claimed his attorney told him that that it was best that he does not take the stand because everything looked good. The Applicant testified that, in hindsight, he should have testified because the jury asked a question during deliberation about when he lost his cellphone. Contrary to the testimony this Court found credible, counsel Stitely testified that his client had advised him, as stated above, about his involvement with the minor and his communications with the minor.

The Court inquired the Applicant about his right to testify. Tr.p. 390-397. The Applicant waived his right to testify. As noted above, subsequent to the verdict, the Applicant contemporaneously made inculpatory statements to the trial judge at sentencing which would have been inconsistent with his claims of innocence by conceding that he was Justin and had communications with the victim.

This Court must find, in light of the post-verdict statement to the Court that counsel was not deficient in his advice to not testify. Although the Applicant now suggests that he could have addressed their deliberation inquiry about the lost phone which evolved from his earlier statement

to Investigator Strickland, this Court must find more credible the admissions of guilt he made to counsel Stitely and his post-verdict admissions of actual communications and interests with the victim to the extent of almost falling in love with her (Tr.p. 510, l. 18-21), answering her calls to him and purchasing clothes for her. Tr.p. 510-511.

These comments immediately after trial (and after the inquiry by the jury about the phone) were consistent with the information he had provided counsel before trial. It almost contained an admission he was using the phone to communicate with her. Counsel was not deficient in advising the Applicant to testify based upon the version of guilt he was revealing to counsel at the time. As stated before, “[S]olemn declarations in open court carry a strong presumption of verity.” *Blackledge v. Allison*, 431 U.S. 63, 73-74 (1977). His claim that he made these comments only because he had lost hope and that they were false and would not have been said if he actually testified, is rejected by this Court as not credible. His allocution was consistent with his contemporaneous and initial comments to counsel and the suggestions that there was nothing wrong with his consensual relationship with the victim. He has failed to show deficient performance and prejudice under *Strickland*.

Allegation Seven – Failed to Request Favorable Jury Charge

In this allegation, the Applicant claims that counsel should have requested a jury charge that was more favorable to the defense. However, there was no specific jury charge suggested by the Applicant during the PCR hearing or in the amended application. The Applicant just indicated at the hearing in his testimony that he wanted a better charge but did not indicate what it was. If this arises from his claims to his counsel pretrial that his involvement with the victim was consensual and should not be crime, the suggestion for a consent defense was not available because the Applicant was 41 at the time and victim was 13 and 14 years old. See S.C. Code § 16-3-655

(B). Counsel could not be deficient in failing to request a charge that is not available as a matter of law.

The Court, however, must conclude that the Applicant failed in his burden of proof in presenting a particular jury charge that counsel should have requested. Failing to do so, the Court must find that the allegation must be denied.

Allegation 9 – Failed to Advise Applicant About the Negative Impact of His Statements at Sentencing.

In his ninth allegation, he contends that counsel was deficient in failing advise the Applicant about the negative impact of his statements at sentencing. Counsel stated that his general comments to his clients is to not say anything after the verdict. Counsel Stitely stated what he told Judge McMahon is what he told him which was the problem with their defense. The Applicant stated that he did acknowledge his involvement with the victim, but claimed now that it was false, and he was just trying to butter up the judge.

The right to allocution refers to the common law practice of the court “formally inquir[ing] of the defendant whether he had anything to say why sentence and judgment should not be pronounced.” *State v. Phillips*, 215 S.C. 314, 54 S.E.2d 901 (1949); *State v. Trezevant*, 20 S.C. 363, (1884); see also BLACK'S LAW DICTIONARY 40 (5th Ed.1979) (defining “allocution” as “formality of court's inquiry of prisoner as to whether he has any legal cause to show why judgment should not be pronounced against him on verdict of conviction”). See also *Bassett v. Commonwealth*, 222 Va. 844, 284 S.E.2d 844 (1981) (Allocution is the defendant's right to speak on his own behalf after the fact finder determines guilt but before the judge pronounces sentence). See *State v. Stokes*, 345 S.C. 368, 376, 548 S.E.2d 202, 206 (2001).

This Court finds that counsel was not deficient in his advice to the Applicant. The Applicant chose to tell the trial court what he had been telling counsel in his voluntary exchange with the

Court. His exchange with the judge satisfied the requirement for allocution. *State v. Phillips*, 215 S.C. 314, 54 S.E.2d 901 (1949) (noting that a lengthy conversation after plea and before sentence between the court and a defendant would meet the requirement for allocution). Similar, the Applicant failed to show prejudice that the result of the sentencing would have been different to a reasonable probability. On the four indictments, the Applicant was facing an aggregate sentence of 0-20 on each indictment for an aggregate potential sentence of 80 years. Judge Newman sentenced the Applicant to 20 years on each indictment concurrent. Sixth Amendment prejudice has not been shown. The Applicant has failed to meet his burden of proof under *Strickland*.

Allegation Eleven – Counsel Failed to Object to the State’s Indictments

In the final allegation, the Applicant claims that counsel should have objected to the four indictments. He claims he was shown the indictment for the first time at the outset of the trial. He admitted that he was aware prior to trial that he was charged with incidents in October and November prior to the trial and receipt of the indictments. The record shows that he was indicted on January 19, 2016 for criminal sexual conduct with a minor second degree under S.C. Code §16-3-655((b)(1) (14 years of age or less) involving the same victim for separate dates: 2016-GS-32-00160 (on or about November 8, 2013); 2016-GS-32-00161 (on or about November 11, 2013); 2016-GS-32-00162 (on or about November 16, 2013); and 2016-GS-32-00163 (October 1-28, 2013).

Counsel Stitely stated that he reviewed the indictments and that they were written with specific dates. He testified that everything he received in the case he received from the State was provided to the Applicant upon their receipt. Counsel confirmed he had adequate knowledge about the specific dates and prepared to move forward.

The Applicant has failed to show deficient performance with the receipt of the indictments.

There was no assertion that a motion to quash the indictments was available since they were valid on their face and had adequate specificity. The Applicant has failed to prove Sixth Amendment prejudice. The ground is dismissed.

Pro Se Allegations in Original Application.

In his pro se application, the Applicant also asserted that there was a due process violation by an alleged delay in document delivery and an alleged vindictive prosecution. There was no evidence presented in the pleadings or evidence before this Court concerning his due process violation by the delayed delivery of the documents. The evidence concerning the indictments is presented in the above allegation. It does not present a Due Process violation where the Applicant and counsel were aware of the charges. The allegation is denied.

The Applicant also raises conclusory claims asserting “vindictive prosecution,” “perjury” and “fraud” as prosecutorial misconduct. There was no evidence presented in any manner before this Court to support any of those specifications. The asserts are denied based upon lack of proof.

CONCLUSION

Based on all the foregoing, this Court finds and concludes that Applicant has not established any constitutional violations or deprivations that would require this Court to grant his application. Therefore, this application for post-conviction relief must be denied and dismissed with prejudice.


This Court notifies the Applicant that he must file and serve a notice of appeal within thirty (30) days from the receipt by counsel of written notice of entry of judgment to secure the appropriate appellate review. *See* Rule 203, SCACR. Pursuant to *Austin v. State*, 305 S.C. 453, 409 S.E.2d 395 (1991), Applicant has a right to an appellate counsel’s assistance in seeking review of the denial of PCR. Rule 71.1(g), SCRCP, provides that if Applicant wishes to seek appellate

review, PCR counsel must serve and file a notice of appeal on Applicant's behalf. Applicant's attention is directed to Rule 243, SCACR, for appropriate procedures for appeal.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED:

1. That the Application for Post-Conviction Relief be denied and dismissed with prejudice; and
2. The Applicant be remanded to the custody of the South Carolina Department of Corrections.
