Hello, I am reaching out to you on behalf of Mr. Alonzo C. Jeter, III, who has pending litigation in which he is proceeding pro se.

Mr. Jeter asked that I reach out and inform the Court and make you aware of his current dilemma. Mr. Jeter has recently been transferred from Lee Correctional Institution to MacDougall Correctional Institution. Mr. Jeter, proceeding pro se, has a Civil Rights lawsuit which is currently pending against MacDougall. Upon Jeter's arrival to MacDougall his legal files were withheld for approximately four days.

Mr. Jeter has several complex cases in which he is in mid-litigation. As a consequence, he has a large case file. Albeit he did transfer with some of his legal files, others had to be shipped to him at a later date. Mr. Jeter was informed on Tuesday, September the 23rd, 2025, that the remainder of his legal files had arrived to the institution, however, he has not been provided an opportunity nor date for certain of when he will be allowed to acquire, sort and condensed his files.

Mr. Jeter is unable to meet deadlines at this time for a number of reasons to include not having access to his legal files, mail and Court orders which inform of the deadline dates.

Other reasons are Mr. Jeter is an indigent prisoner and the institution in which he has been transferred to has recently implemented a policy which limits indigent prisoner to the receipt of only 2 envelopes and eight sheets of paper monthly; to include no photocopies of any handwritten pleadings which are drafted by the prisoner.

Further reasons, Mr jeter has experienced multiple days of institutional lockdowns due to such matters as (1) two days of Institutional searches (2) Two days of institutional inventories (9) multiple days of inaccessibility to the institution mailroom and law library.
