THIS MATTER comes before the Court on Defendant Coastal Anesthesia Associates, LLC's (hereinafter "Coastal Anesthesia") Motion to Dismiss for Lack of Subject Matter Jurisdiction or, in the Alternative, to Set Aside the Entry of Default. Based upon the motions and briefs submitted, accompanying exhibits and affidavits, arguments of counsel, and after carefully considering all of the same, the Court hereby denies Coastal Anesthesia's Motion to Dismiss for Lack of Subject Matter Jurisdiction and grants Coastal Anesthesia's Motion to Set Aside Entry of Default.

FACTS

This is a medical malpractice action filed against the above-named defendants, wherein Plaintiff alleges that Defendants were negligent in performing his wife's knee surgery and her subsequent treatment in April of 2012. On November 13, 2012, Plaintiff filed a Notice of Intent naming as defendants Surgical Affiliates, LLC, Charleston Surgery Center, L.P., Nurse Doe, Christine Thompson, M.D. (hereinafter "Dr. Thompson") and ABC Anesthesia Group. (See **Defendant's Exhibit 1**, Plaintiff's Notice of Intent to File Suit, 2012-CP-10-7413, hereinafter

“Notice of Intent”). Notably, Plaintiff did not name Coastal Anesthesia as a party to the Notice of Intent.

Current counsel for Coastal Anesthesia filed a Notice of Appearance on behalf of Dr. Thompson, but not on behalf of Coastal Anesthesia and not on behalf of ABC Anesthesia Group. (See **Defendant’s Exhibit 2**). On December 10, 2012, Plaintiff filed certificates of service evidencing service on Surgical Care Affiliates, LLC, Charleston Surgery Center, L.P., and Dr. Thompson. (See Exhibit 3, Certificates of Service). The Plaintiff did not serve Coastal Anesthesia with the Notice of Intent. (See **Defendant’s Exhibits 4 and 5**, Affidavits of Randall Kerns, M.D. (“Dr. Kerns”) and Wendy B. Sanders, MBA CMPE CANPC (“Sanders”)), as Plaintiff did not know its identity.

A pre-suit mediation occurred on April 1, 2013, and James Hood of Hood Law Firm, LLC attended on behalf of Dr. Thompson; Chad McGowan of McGowan, Hood, & Felder attended for Plaintiff, and Jack Gresh of Hall, Booth, Smith P.C. attended on behalf of the Defendant nurse and surgery center. The mediation ended with the parties at an impasse. (See **Exhibit 6**, Mediation Results Form). Neither “ABC Surgical Group” nor Coastal Anesthesia participated in pre-suit mediation. After mediation Mr. Hood identified the Anesthesia Group as Coastal Anesthesia.

On May 24, 2013, Plaintiff restyled his caption and filed his Complaint, naming, for the first time, Coastal Anesthesia. On July 8, 2013, Plaintiff attempted service of the Complaint on Coastal Anesthesia via certified mail return receipt requested to Coastal’s registered agent Randall Kerns, M.D. Jody Hawkins signed for the Complaint. (See **Defendant’s Exhibit 7**). However, I find that Jody Hawkins is not, has never been, and was not on July 8, 2013 an employee, agent or representative of Coastal Anesthesia. (See **Defendant’s Exhibit 4**, Aff. of Sanders). Ms. Hawkins is, and was on July 8, 2013, an employee, agent or representative of Charleston Surgery Center, L.P., one of the Defendants who has settled this case with the Plaintiff. Id.

On September 23, 2013, Coastal Anesthesia filed an Answer to Plaintiff's Complaint. Plaintiff filed his Application for Default Judgment and Request for a Damages Hearing on September 26, 2013. This Court entered an Order of Default on November 25, 2013. On December 5, 2013, Coastal Anesthesia filed this Motion to Dismiss for lack of subject matter jurisdiction, or in the alternative, to Set Aside the Entry of Default. At the hearing, the court sua sponte amended the Order of Default filed on November 25, 2013, with the consent of the parties at the hearing, and subsequently issued an amended order to reflect an entry of default rather than a default judgment.

LAW AND ANALYSIS

A. Failure to Comply with South Carolina Code § 15-79-125 Does Not Affect This Court's Subject Matter Jurisdiction

Coastal Anesthesia contends that this court lacks subject matter jurisdiction over the Complaint, as the Plaintiff failed to comply with the Notice of Intent process set forth in S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125. Subject matter jurisdiction "refers to a court's constitutional or statutory power to adjudicate a case." Johnson v. S. Carolina Dep't of Prob., Parole, & Pardon Servs., 379 S.C. 279, 284 (2007).

S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125 limits the circuit court's ability to hear a medical malpractice suit until the substantive pre-litigation requirements set forth in the statute have been fully fulfilled. Prior to filing a summons and complaint, a plaintiff must "contemporaneously file a Notice of Intent to File Suit and an affidavit of an expert witness." S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125(A). The Notice of Intent "must name all adverse parties as defendants" and is required to "be served upon all named defendants." Id. Following Service of the Notice of Intent, "[w]ithin ninety days and no later than one hundred twenty days from the service of the Notice of Intent to File Suit, the parties shall participate in a mediation conference" § 15-79-125(C). A plaintiff may only file a summons and complaint after the parties are unable to reach a resolution at pre-suit mediation. § 15-79-125(E).

This court finds that while failure to comply with the Notice of Intent procedures under § 15-79-125 may lead to dismissal of a complaint, it was not the legislative intent to completely deprive the circuit court of subject matter jurisdiction over the action.

THEREFORE, this court denies Coastal Anesthesia's Motion to Dismiss for Lack of Subject Matter Jurisdiction.

B. Coastal Anesthesia Demonstrated Good Cause Warranting Relief from Entry of Default

Rule 55(c) of the South Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure provides that a court may set aside an entry of default where "good cause exists." Wham v. Shearson Lehman Bros., Inc., 298 S.C. 462, 465, 381 S.E.2d 499, 501 (Ct. App. 1989). The decision whether to grant relief from an entry of default is solely within the sound discretion of the trial court. Id. The trial court should consider the following factors in deciding whether good cause exists: 1) the timing of the motion for relief; 2) whether the defendant has a meritorious defense; and 3) the degree of prejudice to the Plaintiff if relief is granted. Id. at 465, 381 S.E.2d 499, 501-02.


Good cause is a relatively low standard compared to the more rigorous standard applied to setting aside default judgments pursuant to Rule 60(b), SCRPC. See Richardson v. P.V., Inc., 383 S.C. 610, 682 S.E.2d 263, 266 (2009) ("The standard for granting relief from an entry of default is good cause under Rule 55(c), SCRPC, while the standard is more rigorous for granting relief from a default judgment under Rule 60(b), SCRPC"). The defaulting party should also "provide an explanation for the default and give reasons why vacation of the default entry would serve the interests of justice." Sundown Operating Co., Inc. v. Intedge Indus., Inc., 383 S.C. 601, 607, 681 S.E.2d 885, 888 (2009).

This court finds that Coastal Anesthesia has shown good cause and should be granted relief from the entry of default. A review of the Wham factors supports a finding that the Entry of Default should be set aside. As to the first factor, the timing of the motion for relief, the Order Entering Judgment against Coastal Anesthesia was filed on November 25, 2013. As the Clerk's

office was closed for the Thanksgiving holiday, Coastal Anesthesia filed a Motion to Set Aside Default Judgment on December 5, 2013. No significant events have taken place in this case since the court entered default judgment, and therefore, Coastal Anesthesia meets the timing element of good cause.

As to the second factor, a meritorious defense, the claim against Coastal Anesthesia is premised upon the alleged vicarious liability of Dr. Thompson. Therefore, the defenses raised in her Answer (Defendant's Exhibit 9) and affidavit are sufficient to satisfy the meritorious defense requirement. (See Defendant's Exhibit 14, Affidavit of Dr. Thompson).

As to the third factor, the degree of prejudice to Plaintiff, this lawsuit was very recently filed and thus far only written discovery has been exchanged. Therefore, the delay in time does not prejudice the Plaintiff, and allowing this case to proceed will not prejudice the Plaintiff.

 As Coastal Anesthesia explained in its Motion to Set Aside Entry of Default, at no point in time did Dr. Kerns, Ms. Sanders, or anyone else authorized to receive process on behalf of Coastal Anesthesia, ever receive service of a Notice of Intent to File Suit naming Coastal Anesthesia as a party to the Notice of Intent. At no point in time did Plaintiff or Plaintiff's counsel contact Dr. Kerns, Ms. Sanders, or anyone else authorized to receive service on behalf of Coastal Anesthesia, to make Coastal Anesthesia aware that Plaintiff intended to include it as a party to the Notice of Intent.

Additionally, service of Summons and the Complaint on Coastal Anesthesia was insufficient under Rule 4, SCRCP. The Plaintiff argued in its Memorandum in Opposition to this motion that Coastal Anesthesia waived any objections to improper service by failing to raise these objections in its Answer to Plaintiff's Complaint, or in a timely motion made pursuant to Rule 12, SCRCP. Plaintiff points to Rule 12(h)(1), SCRCP, which states that an insufficiency of service of process defense is waived if a party fails to raise the defense in a pre-answer motion or in the answer. However, as this court entered default against Coastal Anesthesia, and Coastal Anesthesia did not have the permission of the Plaintiff or the leave of court to answer the

Plaintiff's Complaint, the answer submitted by Coastal Anesthesia was null and cannot act to waive a defense of insufficiency of service of process. The court further concludes that it would not serve the interests of justice to permit a plaintiff to hold a defendant in default based upon the date an answer was filed, when no entry of default was entered, and simultaneously conclude that certain defenses were waived because not asserted in the untimely answer. Therefore, Coastal Anesthesia may properly object to the sufficiency of service as a basis to set aside the entry of default.

Corporations, such as Coastal Anesthesia, may be served by delivering the summons and complaint to "an officer, a managing or general agent, or to any other agent authorized by appointment or by law to receive service of process." Rule 4(d)(3), SCRCPP. Service was improper in this case as Jody Hawkins signed for the Complaint, which Plaintiff had sent via regular mail to Coastal's registered agent Dr. Kerns, who is not, never has been, and was not on July 8, 2013 an employee, agent or representative of Coastal Anesthesia. Ms. Hawkins is an employee of Charleston Surgery Center, L.P., one of the Defendants who has settled this case with the Plaintiff. Plaintiff contends that Ms. Hawkins delivered the summons and complaint to Dr. Kerns and therefore effected personal service on him under Rule 4(d), SCRCPP. However, under Rule 4(c), SCRCPP, service may not be made by "a party to the action" upon another party. As an employee and agent of Charleston Surgery Center, L.P., another Defendant in this case as of July 8, 2013, Ms. Hawkins was unable to serve Coastal Anesthesia. Therefore, service on Coastal Anesthesia was improper under Rule 4, SCRCPP.

In light of the fact that Coastal Anesthesia had not been named in the Notice of Intent and was not properly served with the Complaint, Dr. Kerns, with knowledge of the lawsuit against Dr. Thompson, could reasonably conclude that no further actions were needed on the part of Coastal Anesthesia. Because Dr. Thompson was in the process of defending the lawsuit, and given the fact that the only avenue of recovery against Coastal Anesthesia is premised upon the alleged vicarious liability (or non-delegable duty of care) of its independent contractor Dr.


Thompson, it was reasonable for Dr. Kerns to conclude that her defenses applied equally to Coastal Anesthesia. Further, Coastal Anesthesia was not given the opportunity to participate in the mandatory pre-suit mediation process.

The interests of justice would be best served by setting aside default, as they require compliance with SCRCP Rule 4 in order to apprise a party of a pending action. Furthermore, Plaintiff failed to follow the requirements set forth under § 15-79-125 with respect to Coastal Anesthesia, and as such, Coastal Anesthesia never received proper notice of Plaintiff's potential suit against it or an opportunity to participate in pre-suit mediation, as is required by South Carolina statutes. Therefore, the interests of justice will be served by setting aside default and allowing the case to be resolved on the merits. Finally, the policy of the law favors bringing trials on the merits whenever possible.

This court finds that Coastal Anesthesia has adequately provided an explanation for the default and provided reasons why vacating the entry of default serves the interests of justice.

THEREFORE, Coastal Anesthesia has met all of the elements of good cause and this Court grants Defendant's motion to set aside the Entry of Default. Coastal Anesthesia will have 30 days upon proper service of the Summons and Complaint to Answer or otherwise responsively plead to the Complaint.



This matter comes before the Court on the Petition of Willie Preston, Personal Representative of the Estate of Martha Preston, deceased ("Petitioner"). Willie Preston, both individually and as Personal Representative, caused a wrongful death action (negligence) and survival action to be filed against the above-named Defendants in the Charleston County Court of Common Pleas, under Civil Action No. 2013-CP-10-3054, as a result of injuries Martha Preston sustained while being treated by the Defendants. Petitioner seeks to have this Court approve the settlement he has reached with Defendants Surgical Care Affiliates, LLC, Charleston Surgery Center, LP, and Laura Bilancione, RN ("Settling Defendants"). Settling Defendants deny liability of any kind or nature. Petitioner represents that he is Martha Preston's husband.

Settling Defendants have offered to pay the sum of One Million and no/100 Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) to the Petitioner to resolve any and all claims.

Of the total One Million and no/100 Dollars (\$1,000,000.00), the Petitioner has agreed to pay an attorney's fee in the amount of Four Hundred Thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$400,000.00), representing forty percent (40%) of the total sum, plus costs of litigation in the

amount of Eleven Thousand Four Hundred Twenty-Eight and 52/100 Dollars (\$11,428.52). All sums set forth herein constitute damages on account of personal injuries arising from an occurrence within the meaning of § 104(a)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended. Petitioner seeks to allocate the proceeds as follows: thirty-five percent (35%) to the loss of consortium claim, fifty-five percent (55%) to the wrongful death claim, and ten percent (10%) to the survival claim.

This settlement is only as to the Settling Defendants, and is not a settlement or release applicable to any other potentially liable party.





The Plaintiff, by and through his undersigned counsel, for a Complaint against the Defendants, does hereby allege as follows:

PARTIES

Plaintiff

1. The Plaintiff, Willie Preston, is the duly appointed Personal Representative of the estate of Martha Preston. At all times relevant hereto, Willie Preston was the husband of Martha Preston. He brings these claims as PR for wrongful death and survival, and on behalf of himself for loss of consortium. Plaintiff is a citizen and resident of Charleston County, South Carolina.

Defendants

2. Defendant Surgical Care Affiliates, LLC is a corporation organized and existing under a state's laws other than South Carolina and maintains an agent and/or joint venture in Charleston County, SC known as the Charleston Surgical Center, LP in Charleston County,

South Carolina. At all times relevant hereto, Surgical Care Affiliates, LLC was a joint venture, principal or agent, with the entity employing certain nurses and other medical staff at the Charleston Surgical Center who at all times relevant hereto, were employees acting within the scope of their employment.

3. Defendant Charleston Surgery Center LP, is a South Carolina limited partnership and is an agent, principal or joint venturer with Surgical Affiliates, LLC. Charleston Surgery Center maintains its principal place of business in Charleston County, SC and was the employer of certain nurses and other medical providers that treated Mrs. Preston on April 18, 2012.

4. Defendant Laura Bilancione, RN was the registered nurse who was in charge of Mrs. Preston's post operative care, and is the same person who signed Pages CSC-024 and CSC-025 of the medical records. This defendant is also believed to be the same person who administered the dilaudid and other drugs to Mrs. Preston. Nurse Bilancione is believed to be a citizen and resident of Charleston County, SC and was at all times working within the course and scope of her employment.

5. Defendant Christine Thompson, MD is a physician licensed by the state of South Carolina and holds herself out to the public as a specialist in the field of anesthesiology. At all times relevant hereto, Defendant Thompson was acting within the scope of her employment and/or contract with Coastal Anesthesia Associates, Charleston Surgical Center, LP, or Surgical Affiliates, LLC. Defendant Thompson is a citizen and resident of Charleston County, SC.

FACTUAL ALLEGATIONS

6. On April 18, 2012, Mrs. Preston went to the Charleston Surgery Center for an out patient knee surgery. The procedure was supposed to take well less than a day, and Mrs. Preston was to be returned home without staying in any medical facility overnight.

7. After this procedure, Mrs. Preston was sent from the Operating Room to the Post Anesthesia Care Unit ("PACU"). Dr. Thompson ordered, among other things, "Dilaudid 0.2 mg IV prn pain, may repeat every 5 minutes up to 2 mg IV or 4 mg IV." CSC 024. Both Dr. Thompson and Nurse Doe signed this order.

8. Nurse Bilancione administered the following medications to Mrs. Preston:

Dilaudid 1 mg IV at 9:02

Dilaudid 1 mg IV at 9:06

Dilaudid 1 mg IV at 9:21

Dilaudid 1 mg IV at 9:28

Phenergan 6.25 mg IV at 9:42

Percocet 1 by mouth at 9:42

9. The dilaudid administered by the nurse was in excess of the physician's order and the nurse therefore was below the prevailing and accepted medical standard of care.

10. Nurses have an obligation to follow doctor's orders unless in their professional judgment doing so would put the patient at risk. In that case, Nurses are expected to follow-up on their concerns either with the physician or through their chain of command. It is never appropriate for a nurse to give 4 doses of dilaudid, 1 mg EACH, when an order reads that the maximum per dose is 0.2 mg.

11. Further, Charleston Surgery Center and Surgery Center Affiliates had policies and procedures in place dictating when a patient could safely be discharged. The Defendants used a scoring system, that provided that a patient must score at least a 16 on a scale from 16-18. Mrs. Preston scored only a 13, and was discharged anyway.

12. As a back-up to this system, the physician, in this case Defendant Thompson, was

supposed to evaluate the patient and the patient's chart to sign off on the patient being fit for discharge. Dr. Thompson signed a statement that she had assessed Mrs. Preston and found her fit for discharge. See, Anesthesia Record, CSC-021. This is shocking as Mrs. Preston at that time was under the influence of 4 mg of dilaudid, Phenergan, and Percocet, and the effects of those drugs was profound. Mrs. Preston could not walk or stay awake from the heavy medications. Dr. Thompson never reviewed the patient's chart to determine if her order was followed or to determine if Mrs. Preston could safely be discharged. If she had, she would not have discharged Mrs. Preston.

13. Dr. Thompson had a duty and obligation to assess Mrs. Preston prior to her discharge as well as to review her medical chart from the PACU. Dr. Thompson further had a duty and obligation to perform this assessment in a competent manner. Dr. Thompson failed on both accounts.

14. Mrs. Preston was sent home in the care of her husband who did his level best to care for her. Mrs. Preston was falling asleep while walking to her bedroom from her car. Mr. Preston regularly checked on her, and the last time he checked on her, before lunch time, Mrs. Preston was found to be not breathing.

15. Mr. Preston called 911 and started to do CPR on his wife. EMS arrived and took over care of Mrs. Preston, ultimately taking her to MUSC in Charleston.

16. Mrs. Preston was determined to be brain dead at MUSC from the lack of oxygen to her brain and she passed on April 23, 2012.

17. The cause of death was determined to be "probable mixed drug toxicity with fentanyl, promethazine, hydromorphone, oxycodone, and midazolam." In other words, Mrs. Preston died from the drugs she was given at the Charleston Surgery Center.

18. As a direct and proximate result of the acts and/or omissions of Defendants, Mrs. Preston did not receive proper treatment in a timely fashion. With proper, standard of care medicine, Mrs. Preston would not have suffered and would have not have died when she did and would have had a normal life expectancy.

19. The injuries to and death of Mrs. Preston were the direct and proximate result of and was caused and occasioned by the negligence, carelessness, recklessness, willfulness, and wantonness on the part of Defendants, in failing to possess and exercise that degree of medical training, competency, and skill ordinarily and customarily possessed and exercised by physicians and medical staff under similar circumstances and thereby rendered inappropriate medical care to Mrs. Preston by deviating from and falling below the prevailing and acceptable standards of care in one or more of the following particulars, as follows:

AS TO DEFENDANT Nurse Doe, Charleston Surgery Center LP, and Surgery Center Affiliates, LLC:

- a. In failing to properly follow the physician's orders;
- b. In giving too much medication;
- c. In failing to properly assess Mrs. Preston;
- d. In discharging Mrs. Preston under the circumstances;
- e. In failing to properly follow the policies and procedures in place for discharge assessment; and
- f. In such other ways as may be shown at trial

AS TO DEFENDANTS Thompson and Coastal Anesthesia Associates

- g. In failing to review the medical chart of the patient at the time Defendant Thompson certified that Mrs. Preston was fit for discharge;
- h. In failing to properly assess Mrs. Preston at the time of her discharge;
- i. In allowing Mrs. Preston to be discharged;
- j. In failing to realize that the nurse grossly violated her order by giving 1 mg doses of dilaudid when the order called for no more than 0.2 mg at a time; and
- k. In such other ways as may be shown at trial.

ATTACHED to the Notice of Intent, all of which is incorporated herein by reference, and attached to this Complaint are affidavits of qualified experts who will testify to at least one breach of the standard of care by the Defendants in this matter.

FOR A FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION

(SURVIVAL ACTION)

20. Plaintiff reiterates paragraphs 1-19 above as if set forth verbatim herein.

21. As a direct and proximate result of the negligence, carelessness, gross negligence, ~~recklessness and departure from the professional standards of care by Defendants, Mrs. Preston~~ suffered from severe debilitating injuries which resulted in her permanent injury and disability, and conscious pain and suffering, as a result of which Mrs. Preston is entitled to recover a sum to compensate her estate for her conscious pain and suffering, medical expenses, mental anguish, loss of earnings capacity, loss of enjoyment of life, and other damages. Plaintiff is also entitled to recover a sum of punitive damages to punish and deter these defendants and others like them from similar conduct in the future. All damages should be in an amount determined by a jury in this action.

FOR A SECOND CAUSE OF ACTION

(Wrongful Death)

22. Plaintiff reiterates paragraphs 1-21 as if set forth verbatim herein.

23. As a direct and proximate result of the negligence, carelessness, gross negligence, recklessness and departure from the professional standards of care by Defendants, Mrs. Preston suffered from severe debilitating injuries which resulted in her death, and thus the negligence was the cause of the loss of the support, aid, society, comfort, and companionship of her heirs at law. The estate is therefore entitled to recover from defendants a sum of money to compensate the heirs at law for the medical expenses, funeral expenses, mental anguish, loss of earnings capacity, and loss for the aid, society, comfort, and companionship of the decedent. Plaintiff is also entitled to recover a sum of punitive damages to punish and deter these defendants and others like them from similar conduct in the future. All damages should be in an amount determined by a jury in this action.

FOR A THIRD CAUSE OF ACTION


(Loss of Consortium)

24. Plaintiff reiterates paragraphs 1-23 as if set forth verbatim herein.

25. Plaintiff Willie Preston, as the husband of Mrs. Mrs. Davis, has suffered a loss of consortium as a result of the actions and inactions of defendants. He is therefore entitled to an award of damages to compensate her for her loss of the society, comfort, companionship, support, and good offices of his wife. Further, the Defendants' actions in this case have been reckless and/or grossly negligent and thus Plaintiff Andrew Strong is additionally entitled to an award of punitive damages to punish and deter these defendants and others like them.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiffs, respectfully pray for judgment against the Defendants for actual damages, special damages, consequential damages, and punitive damages in an amount to

24. That the injury or damage allegedly suffered by the Plaintiff, if any, was due to, and caused by, and was the proximate result of, the intervening and superseding negligence, willfulness, wantonness, and reckless of the Plaintiff and/or others, and as such constitutes a complete defense to Plaintiff's claims.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE
(Lack of Proximate Cause)

25. These Defendants allege that any acts or omissions on their part, which acts and omissions are denied, were not the proximate cause of the Plaintiff's injuries and/or death.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE
(Compliance with Standard of Care)

26. These Defendants allege that at all times, any act or omission attributed to them was in compliance with the applicable standard of care.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE
(Punitive Damages)

27. An award or assessment of punitive or exemplary damages against these Defendants as prayed for by the Plaintiff in his Complaint would violate these Defendants' constitutional rights under the Due Process clause of the Fifth and Fourteenth Amendments to the United States Constitution, the Excessive Fines clause of the Eighth Amendment to the United States Constitution, the Double Jeopardy clause of the Fifth Amendment to the United States Constitution, and similar provisions in the South Carolina Constitution, applicable statutes and court rules, and these Defendants plead such constitutional provisions as a complete defense to any claim for punitive damages.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE
(Punitive Damages)

28. An award of punitive damages under South Carolina law against these Defendants would violate the 5th, 6th, and 14th Amendments of the United States Constitution and Article 1, Section 3 of the South Carolina Constitution in that:

- e) Even if it could be argued that the standard governing the imposition of punitive damages exists, the standard is void for vagueness; and
- f) The Plaintiff's claim for punitive damages violates the Equal Protection Clause of the 14th Amendment of the United States Constitution and Article 1, Section 3 of the South Carolina Constitution in that the amount of punitive damages is based on the wealth of these Defendants.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE
(Non-Economic Damages Award)

29. No award for non-economic damages shall exceed the statutory limits contained in a Non-Economic Damages Award Act of 2005, S.C. Code Ann. § 15-32-200, et. seq. These Defendants are health care providers defined by S.C. Code Ann. § 15-32-210 and pursuant to 15-32-220 of the Non-Economic Damages Award Act of 2005, any potential recovery of non-economic damages is limited to the amount stated therein.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE
(Limitation of Punitive Damages)

30. Any punitive damages awarded in this case would be subject to the limitations described in S.C. Code § 15-32-530.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE
(Set-Off)

31. These Defendants would assert that to the extent the Plaintiff receives compensation for injuries complained of in Plaintiff's Complaint from any other party to this action and/or any other source, these Defendants are entitled to a set-off of that amount for any damages that may or may not be assessed to these Defendants.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE
(Incorporation)

32. These Defendants hereby incorporate and assert all defenses, counterclaims, set-offs, and credits pled by other parties to this action, to include any pleadings filed after this Answer, and specifically, without limitation, all defenses, counterclaims, set-offs, and credits pled to Plaintiff's claims, to the extent not inconsistent with its Answer herein and its denial of liability of any kind.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE
(Reservation and Non-Waiver)







2. This Defendant is without sufficient information to either admit or deny the allegations contained in Paragraph 1, 2, 3 and 4 of Plaintiff's Complaint, and therefore denies the same.
3. In response to the allegations contained in Paragraph 5 of Plaintiff's Complaint, this Defendant admits only that Defendant Christine Thompson, M.D. is a physician licensed in the state of South Carolina and that Dr. Thompson is a resident of Charleston County, SC. This Defendant denies all remaining and inconsistent allegations.

To the extent a response is required, this Defendant craves reference to the cited policies and procedures as well as Martha Preston's medical records and denies all inconsistent allegations contained in Paragraphs 9, 10, and 11 of Plaintiff's Complaint.

6. This Defendant denies the allegations contained in Paragraphs 12 and 13 of Plaintiff's Complaint.

7. This Defendant is without sufficient information to either admit or deny the allegations contained in Paragraph 14, 15 and 16 of Plaintiff's Complaint, and therefore denies the same.

8. This Defendant denies the allegations contained in Paragraphs 17 and 18 of Plaintiff's Complaint.

9. This Defendant denies the allegations contained in Paragraph 19 of Plaintiff's Complaint. Subparagraphs a - f of Paragraph 19 of Plaintiff's Complaint are not directed at this Defendant and contain conclusions of law and, therefore, no response is required from this Defendant. To the extent a response is required, this Defendant denies the allegations contained in subparagraphs a - f of Paragraph 19 of Plaintiff's Complaint. Subparagraphs g - k of Paragraph 19 of Plaintiff's Complaint and the unnumbered sentence appearing after subparagraph k of

Paragraph 19 of Plaintiff's Complaint contain conclusions of law to which no response is required. To the extent a response is required, this Defendant denies the allegations contained in subparagraphs g – k of Paragraph 19 of Plaintiff's Complaint and the unnumbered sentence appearing after subparagraph k of Paragraph 19 of Plaintiff's Complaint.

AS TO THE FIRST CASE OF ACTION
(Survival Action)

10. In response to Paragraph 20 of Plaintiff's Complaint, this Defendant re-asserts and re-alleges its responses to Paragraphs 1 – 19 of Plaintiff's Complaint as if fully restated herein.

11. Paragraph 21 of Plaintiff's Complaint states conclusions of law to which this Defendant is not required to respond. To the extent a response is required, this Defendant denies the allegations contained in Paragraph 21 of Plaintiff's Complaint.

AS TO THE SECOND CASE OF ACTION
(Wrongful Death)

12. In response to Paragraph 22 of Plaintiff's Complaint, this Defendant re-asserts and re-alleges its responses to Paragraphs 1 – 21 of Plaintiff's Complaint as if fully restated herein.

13. Paragraph 23 of Plaintiff's Complaint states conclusions of law to which this Defendant is not required to respond. To the extent a response is required, this Defendant denies the allegations contained in Paragraph 23 of Plaintiff's Complaint.

AS TO THE THIRD CASE OF ACTION
(Loss of Consortium)

14. In response to Paragraph 24 of Plaintiff's Complaint, this Defendant re-asserts and re-alleges its responses to Paragraphs 1 – 23 of Plaintiff's Complaint as if fully restated herein.

15. Paragraph 25 of Plaintiff's Complaint states conclusions of law to which this Defendant is not required to respond. To the extent a response is required, this Defendant denies the allegations contained in Paragraph 25 of Plaintiff's Complaint.

16. This Defendant denies the WHEREFORE clause of Plaintiff's Complaint such being the remaining allegations contained in Plaintiff's Complaint.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE,
THIS DEFENDANT ALLEGES:
(No Deviation from the Standard of Care)

17. That the care and treatment administered by this Defendant conformed to and was in full compliance with the standard of care. All care and treatment administered by this Defendant was within acceptable medical standards and methods, and, at no time pertinent hereto, did this Defendant deviate from any medical standard while caring for or tending to Martha Preston. Consequently, Plaintiff is barred from recovery against this Defendant.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE,
THIS DEFENDANT ALLEGES:
(No Proximate Cause)

18. That, even if this Defendant was negligent, as alleged in Plaintiff's Complaint, which is specifically denied, the negligence of this Defendant is not the direct and proximate cause of any injury alleged by Plaintiff and therefore this Defendant is not liable for any damages allegedly sustained by Plaintiff.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE,
THIS DEFENDANT ALLEGES:
(Punitive Damages Unconstitutional)

19. That any award or assessment of punitive damages as prayed for by the Plaintiff would violate this Defendant's Constitutional rights under the Fifth, Sixth and Fourteenth Amendments of the United States Constitution and comparable provisions of the South Carolina Constitution.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE,
THIS DEFENDANT ALLEGES:
(Punitive Damages Unconstitutional)

20. This Defendant would plead the requirements for an award of punitive damages as set forth by the Supreme Court of the United States in the case of State Farm Mut. Auto Ins. Co. v. (Limitation of alleged Punitive Damages)

22. Any punitive damages awarded in this case would be subject to the limitations described in S.C. Code §15-32-530.



MOTION TO DISMISS FOR LACK
OF SUBJECT MATTER
JURISDICTION, OR IN THE
ALTERNATIVE, TO SET ASIDE
ENTRY OF DEFAULT**

TO: CHAD A. MCGOWAN, ATTORNEY FOR THE PLAINTIFF:

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that pursuant to S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125 and Rules 4, 5, 6(b), 55, 60 of the South Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure ("SCRCP"), Defendant Coastal Anesthesia Associates, LLC (hereinafter "this Defendant"), hereby moves this Honorable Court at a time and place to be set for an Order dismissing Plaintiff's Complaint against this Defendant for lack of subject matter jurisdiction or, in the alternative, to set aside the Entry of Default and retroactively enlarge the time for this Defendant to Answer Plaintiff's Summons and Complaint. In support of this Motion, this Defendant incorporates the affidavits of Randall Kerns, M.D. ("Dr. Kerns"), Defendant Christine Thompson, M.D. ("Dr. Thompson") and Wendy B. Sanders, MBA CMPE CANPC ("Sanders") (See Exhibits 1, 2 and 3) and further state as follows:

1. Plaintiff never named or served this Defendant with the Notice of Intent entitled Willie Preston, individually and as PR of the Estate of Martha Preston, Deceased – Versus – Surgical Center Affiliates, LLC, Charleston Surgery

Center, LP, Nurse Doe, Christine Thompson, MD, and ABC Anesthesia Group with a Civil Action No. 2012-CP-10-7413 in the Court of Common Pleas for the County of Charleston, South Carolina (hereinafter "Notice of Intent") filed on November 13, 2012.

2. For this reason alone, this Court should dismiss the above-captioned Complaint against this Defendant because this Court lacks subject matter jurisdiction over this Defendant.

3. Furthermore, Plaintiff never properly served this Defendant with the above-captioned Complaint. (See Exhibits 1 and 3, Affs. of Kerns and Sanders).

4. For this reason alone, this Court should deny Plaintiff's Motion for Entry of Default and set aside the Entry of Default filed by this Court on November 25, 2013.

5. This matter is a medical malpractice lawsuit filed pursuant to S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125 ("§ 15-79-125").

6. § 15-79-125 limits the circuit court's ability to hear a medical malpractice suit and deprives it of subject matter jurisdiction until the substantive pre-litigation requirements set forth in the statute have been fully fulfilled by Plaintiff.

7. In contravention of the requirements of § 15-79-125, Plaintiff failed to name this Defendant as a party to the Notice of Intent filed on November 13, 2012, as demonstrated by a review of the caption of the Notice of Intent.

8. Plaintiff never moved to amend the Notice of Intent to name this Defendant as a party.

9. In contravention of the requirements of S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125, Plaintiff failed to properly serve this Defendant with the Notice of Intent. (See Exhibits 1 and 3, Affs. of Kerns and Sanders).

10. In contravention of the requirements of § 15-79-125, this Defendant was not involved in the pre-suit mediation held with all other parties on April 1, 2013, and Plaintiff failed to give this Defendant the opportunity to participate in any other pre-suit mediation with Plaintiff. Id.

11. Without (a) properly naming this Defendant as a party to the Notice of Intent, (b) properly serving the Notice of Intent on this Defendant and (c) actually including this Defendant in pre-suit mediation, Plaintiff attempted to serve this Defendant with the Complaint on July 8, 2013.

12. Plaintiff attempted to serve the Complaint on July 8, 2013 upon Jody Hawkins. (See Exhibit 4).

13. Jody Hawkins is not, has never been and was not on July 8, 2013 an employee, agent or representative of this Defendant. (See Exhibit 3, Aff. of Sanders).

14. Upon information and belief, Jody Hawkins is and was on July 8, 2013 an employee, agent or representative of Charleston Surgery Center, L.P, one of the Defendants named in the Notice of Intent and Complaint who has settled this case with Plaintiff.

15. The Complaint was the first time Plaintiff actually named this Defendant as a party to any action, and, as demonstrated above and in the accompanying affidavits, Plaintiff failed to properly serve upon this Defendant both the Notice of Intent and the Complaint.

16. As such, the Complaint against this Defendant was filed in complete violation of the requirements set forth in S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125 for all medical malpractice actions, and this Court is without subject matter jurisdiction to hear the allegations against this Defendant, and this Defendant respectfully requests that the case be dismissed against it for lack of subject matter jurisdiction.

17. Despite Plaintiff's failure to properly serve this Defendant with either the Notice of Intent or the Complaint (or name this Defendant at all in the Notice of Intent), or otherwise comply with the most basic requirements under South Carolina law, in an abundance of caution, this Defendant filed an Answer to Plaintiff's Complaint on September 23, 2013.

18. Subsequently, Plaintiff improperly sought a Default Judgment against this Defendant and an Entry of Default was entered by this Court on November 25, 2013.

19. In the event this Court refrains from dismissing the case against this Defendant for lack of subject matter jurisdiction, good cause exists for this Court to set aside this default pursuant to Rule 55(c) of the SCRCF.

20. This case is still in its initial stages, as the Order Entering Judgment against this Defendant was just filed on November 25, 2013, and this motion has been filed as soon as possible.

21. This Defendant has raised several meritorious defenses to Plaintiff's claims, including the fact that Plaintiff's only avenue for recovery against this Defendant is under a theory of alleged vicarious liability (or non-delegable duty of care) of its independent contractor Dr. Thompson, and both this Defendant and Dr. Thompson assert that at all times relevant to this case, Dr. Thompson acted

according to the relevant standards of care in her care and treatment of Martha Preston. (See Exhibits 1 and 2, Affs. of Kerns and Thompson).

22. Plaintiff will not be prejudiced by the Court setting aside the Entry of Default because the case only recently began, and because the only way to recover from this Defendant is through the alleged vicarious liability (or non-delegable duty of care) of its independent contractor Dr. Thompson and, as Dr. Thompson is still in the case, Plaintiff will have to wait for a final determination of any alleged liability on the part of Dr. Thompson before attempting to recover from this Defendant.

23. In the event this Court refrains from dismissing the case against this Defendant for lack of subject matter jurisdiction and does not set aside the Entry of Default pursuant to Rule 55(c) of the SCRCP, this Defendant also meets the more stringent requirements under Rule 60(b) of the SCRCP for this Court to set aside the Entry of Default, as there is mistake and/or excusable neglect, and any judgment against this Defendant in this case is void for lack of subject matter jurisdiction.


24. Should the Court not dismiss the allegations against this Defendant for the above-stated reasons, good cause exists pursuant to Rule 6(b) of the SCRCP for this Court to retroactively enlarge the time for this Defendant to Answer Plaintiff's Summons and Complaint through September 23, 2013 and allow this Defendant's Answer filed that day to stand.

This Motion is supported by the affidavits of Sanders and Drs. Kerns and Thompson, a memorandum of law being contemporaneously filed, as well as the applicable laws, statutes and SCRCP. The undersigned hereby certifies and affirms, in accordance with Rule 11 of the SCRCP, that consultation with opposing

counsel was attempted in good faith in order to resolve the subject Motion, and no agreement has been reached.

WHEREFORE, Defendant Coastal Anesthesia Associates, LLC moves that the Court grant an Order Dismissing Plaintiff's Complaint against this Defendant for lack of subject matter jurisdiction, or, in the alternative, Setting Aside the Entry of Default and retroactively enlarging the time for this Defendant to Answer Plaintiff's Summons and Complaint.



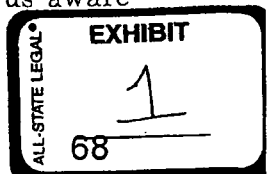


18. At all times during her care and treatment of Martha E. Preston, Dr. Thompson acted in full compliance with the prevailing and accepted standards of care.

COMES NOW Defendant Coastal Anesthesia Associates, LLC (hereinafter "this Defendant"), by and through its undersigned counsel, pursuant to S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125 and Rules 4, 5, 6(b), 55, and 60 of the South Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure ("SCRPC"), and submits this Memorandum in Support of its Motion to Dismiss Plaintiff's Complaint against this Defendant for lack of subject matter jurisdiction, or in the alternative, to Set Aside the Entry of Default and retroactively enlarge the time for this Defendant to Answer Plaintiff's Summons and Complaint. In support of its Motion, this Defendant would state as follows:

FACTS

This is a medical malpractice action filed against the above-named Defendants wherein Plaintiff alleges that Defendants were negligent in performing his wife's knee surgery and her subsequent treatment in April of 2012. On November 13, 2012, Plaintiff filed a Notice of Intent naming as defendants Surgical Affiliates, LLC, Charleston Surgery Center, LP, Nurse Doe, Christine Thompson M.D. (hereinafter "Dr. Thompson") and ABC Anesthesia Group. (See Exhibit 1,

Plaintiff's Notice of Intent to File Suit, 2012-CP-10-7413, hereinafter "Notice of Intent"). Notably, Plaintiff failed to name this Defendant as a party to the Notice of Intent.

Counsel for this Defendant filed a Notice of Appearance on behalf of Dr. Thompson, but not on behalf of this Defendant, as this Defendant was not named in the Notice of Intent. (See Exhibit 2). On December 10, 2012, Plaintiff filed Certificates of Service evidencing service on Surgical Care Affiliates, LLC, Charleston Surgery Center, LP and Dr. Thompson. (See Exhibit 3, Certificates of Service). In addition to failing to name this Defendant as a party to his Notice of Intent, Plaintiff failed to properly serve this Defendant with the Notice of Intent. (See Exhibits 4 and 5, Affidavits of Randall Kerns, M.D. ("Dr. Kerns") and Wendy B. Sanders, MBA CMPE CANPC ("Sanders").

A pre-suit mediation occurred on April 1, 2013 and James B. Hood of Hood Law Firm, LLC attended via telephone on behalf of Dr. Thompson; Chad McGowan of McGowan, Hood, & Felder attended for Plaintiff and Jack Gresh of Hall, Booth, Smith P.C. attended on behalf of the Defendant nurse and surgery center. The mediation ended with the parties at an impasse. (See Exhibit 6, Mediation Results Form). Notably, because it was not named or properly served with the Notice of Intent, neither "ABC Surgical group" nor this Defendant participated in pre-suit mediation.

On May 24, 2013, Plaintiff restyled his caption and filed his Complaint, naming – for the first time – this Defendant. Because Plaintiff failed to (a) name this Defendant in his Notice of Intent, (b) properly serve this Defendant with the Notice of Intent, (c) allow this Defendant to participate in the mandatory pre-suit

mediation conducted on April 1, 2013 or (d) properly serve this Defendant with the Complaint, this Court lacks subject matter jurisdiction over this Defendant and Plaintiff's Complaint should be dismissed against this Defendant.

On July 8, 2013, Plaintiff attempted service of the Complaint on this Defendant via Certified Mail. However, Plaintiff's attempted service of the Complaint upon this Defendant was clearly deficient for two reasons. First, as stated above and throughout this Defendant's Motion and Memorandum, this Defendant was never named nor properly served with the Notice of Intent, nor did this Defendant participate in the mandatory pre-suit mediation process. Second, Plaintiff failed to properly serve this Defendant with the Complaint. Plaintiff attempted to serve this Defendant with the Complaint by serving Jody Hawkins. (See Exhibit 7). However, Jody Hawkins is not, has never been and was not on July 8, 2013 an employee, agent or representative of this Defendant. (See Exhibit 5, Aff. of Sanders). Upon information and belief, Jody Hawkins is and was on July 8, 2013 an employee, agent or representative of Charleston Surgery Center, L.P, one of the Defendants who has settled this case with Plaintiff. Id.

In his Complaint, the only theory of recovery against this Defendant is premised upon the alleged vicarious liability (or non-delegable duty of care) of its independent contractor Dr. Thompson (See Exhibit 8, Plaintiff's Complaint).

Dr. Thompson filed her Answer on June 3, 2013. (See Exhibit 9). Plaintiff has never asserted that Dr. Thompson's Answer was untimely filed. In spite of Plaintiff's failure to (a) name this Defendant in his Notice of Intent, (b) properly serve this Defendant with the Notice of Intent, (c) allow this Defendant to participate in the mandatory pre-suit mediation or (d) properly serve this

Defendant with the Complaint, in an abundance of caution, this Defendant filed an Answer to Plaintiff's Complaint on September 23, 2013. (See Exhibit 10, this Defendant's Answer). Both Answers of Dr. Thompson and this Defendant contain several meritorious defenses and affirmative defenses.

Plaintiff conducted an additional mediation on September 23, 2013 with all Defendants in this case other than this Defendant and Dr. Thompson. All Defendants except for this Defendant and Dr. Thompson settled with Plaintiff, and this Court approved the same on November 4, 2013. (See Exhibit 11).

After this Defendant had filed an Answer to Plaintiff's Complaint, Plaintiff filed his Application for Default Judgment and Request for a Damages Hearing on September 26, 2013. (See Exhibit 12). This Court entered an Order of Default on November 25, 2013. (See Exhibit 13). This Defendant files the accompanying affidavits and Memorandum in Support of its Motion to Dismiss Plaintiff's Complaint against this Defendant for lack of subject matter jurisdiction, or in the alternative, to Set Aside the Entry of Default and retroactively enlarge the time for this Defendant to Answer Plaintiff's Summons and Complaint.

ARGUMENT

Plaintiff's Application for Default Judgment and Request for a Damages Hearing should be denied, and Plaintiff's Complaint against this Defendant should be dismissed for lack of subject matter jurisdiction due to Plaintiff's failure to comply with S.C. Code § 15-79-125. In the alternative, this Court should Set Aside Plaintiff's Entry of Default because good cause exists. In the event this Court does not dismiss Plaintiff's Complaint against this Defendant, this Defendant requests

that this Court retroactively enlarge the amount of time for this Defendant to Answer Plaintiff's Complaint.

A. This Court Lacks Subject Matter Jurisdiction Because of Plaintiff's Failure to Comply with the Requirements of S.C. Code § 15-79-125.

Because Plaintiff failed to fulfill the pre-litigation requirements set forth under S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125, Plaintiff's Complaint against this Defendant should be dismissed.

Subject matter jurisdiction "refers to a court's constitutional or statutory power to adjudicate a case." Johnson v. S. Carolina Dep't of Prob., Parole, & Pardon Servs., 372 S.C. 279, 284 (2007). "The Legislature has the authority to limit the subject matter jurisdiction of a court that it has created." Howard v. S. Carolina Dep't of Corr., 399 S.C. 618, 627 (2012). Moreover, "[a] court lacking subject matter jurisdiction . . . has no authority to act regardless of the geographical location or consent of the litigants." Dove v. Gold Kist, Inc., 314 S.C. 235, 238 (1994).

S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125 limits the circuit court's ability to hear a medical malpractice suit and deprives it of subject matter jurisdiction until the substantive pre-litigation requirements set forth in the statute have been fully fulfilled. Prior to filing a summons and complaint, a plaintiff must "contemporaneously file a Notice of Intent to File Suit and an affidavit of an expert witness." S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125(A). The Notice of Intent "must name all adverse parties as defendants" and is required to "be served upon all named defendants." Id. (emphasis added). Following Service of the Notice of Intent, "[w]ithin ninety days and no later than one hundred twenty days from the service of the Notice of Intent to File Suit, the parties shall participate in a mediation conference" Id. § 15-79-125(C).

(emphasis added). A plaintiff may only file a summons and complaint after the parties are unable to reach a resolution at pre-suit mediation. Id. § 15-79-125(E).

The Supreme Court recently interpreted the intent of the legislature when passing S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125 as serving “to provide an informal and expedient method of culling prospective medical malpractice cases by fostering the settlement of potentially meritorious claims and discouraging the filing of frivolous claims.” Ross v. Waccamaw Cmty. Hosp., 404 S.C. 56, 63, 744 S.E.2d 547, 550 (2013). When a plaintiff correctly follows the requirements for service a Notice of Intent and affidavit, this provides “notice to potential defendants of the claim and qualifies potential plaintiffs and defendants to engage in prelitigation discovery.” Ranucci v. Crain, 397 S.C. 168, 178, 723 S.E.2d 242, 247 (Ct. App. 2012).

In this case, Plaintiff completely failed to follow the requirements set forth under § 15-79-125 with respect to this Defendant, and as such, this Defendant never received proper notice of Plaintiff’s potential suit against it or an opportunity to participate in pre-suit mediation, as is required by South Carolina statutes. The language of the statute plainly requires that a plaintiff “name all adverse parties as defendants” in the Notice of Intent. S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125 (emphasis added). Plaintiff failed to name this Defendant in the Notice of Intent.

Naming a generic “ABC Anesthesia Group” is no substitute for actually naming this Defendant, as it does not provide clear notice of an impending claim. Moreover, at no point did Plaintiff ever seek to amend his Notice of Intent to actually include this Defendant. In fact, the first time that this Defendant was actually named as a defendant was in Plaintiff’s Complaint on May 23, 2013, in complete disregard of the requirements of § 15-79-125.

Furthermore, Plaintiff never served this Defendant with a copy of the Notice of Intent naming this Defendant as a party, as is required by the statute. (See Exhibits 4 and 5, Affs. of Kerns and Sanders). The statute unequivocally states that the Notice of Intent "must be served upon all named defendants in accordance with the service rules for a summons and complaint outlined in the South Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure." S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125(A) (emphasis added). Yet, at no point did Plaintiff ever deliver a copy of the Notice of Intent to an officer, a managing or general agent, or any other agent authorized to receive service of process of this Defendant, naming this Defendant as a party to the Notice of Intent. See Rule 4(d)(3), SCRPC.

Moreover, this Defendant was not given the opportunity to participate in pre-suit mediation with Plaintiff. (See Exhibits 4 and 5, Affs. of Kerns and Sanders). Pre-suit mediation was held on April 1, 2013, with all other parties in attendance except for this Defendant. By not giving this Defendant a chance to mediate these claims prior to filing suit, Plaintiff contradicted the intent of the legislature in passing § 15-79-125. In fact, the statute itself only allows a suit *after* "the matter cannot be resolved through mediation." S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125(E). There was no mediation between this Defendant and Plaintiff, and accordingly, any suit filed by Plaintiff against this Defendant was improperly filed in violation of the pre-litigation requirements of § 15-79-125.

Therefore, because Plaintiff failed to follow the requirements set forth in S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125, the suit against this Defendant should be dismissed for lack of subject matter jurisdiction. Furthermore, as previously stated, this Defendant was never properly served with the Complaint. (See Exhibit 5, Aff. of Sanders).

Therefore, Plaintiff's Application for Default Judgment and Request for a Damages Hearing were improperly filed, and this Court's Entry of Default should be set aside.

B. Good Cause Exists to Set Aside the Entry of Default.

In the instant case, Plaintiff is applying for Default Judgment pursuant to Rule 55(b)(2) of the SCRCF and concurrently requesting a damages hearing. Plaintiff also sought an Order of Default pursuant to Rule 55 of the SCRCF, which the Court has entered.

Rule 55(c) of the SCRCF gives the trial court discretion to set aside an entry of default. Roberson v. S. Fin. of South Carolina, Inc., 365 S.C. 6, 9, 615 S.E.2d 112, 114 (2005). Rule 55(c) provides that a court may set aside an entry of default where "good cause" exists. "In deciding whether good cause exists, the trial court should consider the following factors: (1) the timing of the defendant's motion for relief, (2) whether the defendant has a meritorious defense, and (3) the degree of prejudice to the plaintiff if relief is granted." Richardson v. P.V., Inc., 383 S.C. 610, 682 S.E.2d 263, 266 (2009) (citing the Wham factors discussed in Wham v. Shearson Lehman Bros., Inc., 298 S.C. 462, 465, 381 S.E.2d 499, 501-02 (Ct. App. 1989)).

Good cause is a relatively low standard compared to the much more rigorous standard applied to setting aside default judgments pursuant to Rule 60(b), SCRCF. See id. ("The standard for granting relief from an entry of default is good cause under Rule 55(c), SCRCF, while the standard is more rigorous for granting relief from a default judgment under Rule 60(b), SCRCF").

The defaulting party should also "provide an explanation for the default and give reasons why vacation of the default entry would serve the interests of justice."

Sundown Operating Co., Inc. v. Intedge Indus., Inc., 383 S.C. 601, 607, 681 S.E.2d 885, 888 (2009).

As explained in the affidavits of Dr. Kerns and Wendy Sanders (Exhibits 4 and 5), Dr. Kerns is the managing partner of this Defendant and Ms. Sanders serves as this Defendant's administrator/office manager. At no point in time did Dr. Kerns, Ms. Sanders, or anyone else authorized to receive service of process on behalf of this Defendant, ever receive service of a Notice of Intent to File Suit naming this Defendant as a party to the Notice of Intent. At no point in time did Plaintiff or Plaintiff's counsel contact Dr. Kerns, Ms. Sanders, or anyone else authorized to receive service on behalf of this Defendant, to make this Defendant aware that Plaintiff intended to include this Defendant as a party to the Notice of Intent.

At no point in time did Dr. Kerns, Ms. Sanders, or anyone else authorized to receive service of process on behalf of this Defendant, receive notification of a scheduled pre-suit mediation conference with Plaintiff and the other Defendants in this case.

On July 8, 2013, Plaintiff attempted to serve upon a person named Jody Hawkins the Complaint in this matter. Ms. Hawkins is not, has never been and was not on July 8, 2013 an employee, agent or representative of this Defendant. Upon information and belief, Ms. Hawkins is and was on July 8, 2013 an employee, agent or representative of Charleston Surgical Center, L.P, one of the Defendants who has settled this case with Plaintiff.

In light of the fact that this Defendant had not been named in the Notice of Intent and this Defendant was not properly served with the Complaint, Dr. Kerns, with knowledge of the lawsuit against Dr. Thompson, believed that no further

actions were needed on the part of this Defendant. Dr. Kerns believed that because Dr. Thompson was in the process of defending herself in the lawsuit, her defense applied equally to this Defendant. Dr. Kerns reasonably believed that this Defendant was not even involved in any lawsuit.

In the event this Court refrains from dismissing the case against this Defendant for lack of subject matter jurisdiction, good cause exists for this Court to set aside this default pursuant to Rule 55(c) of the SCRPC. The interests of justice will be served because it will allow this lawsuit to be determined based on its merits. In addition, and as shown above, Plaintiff has failed to comply with South Carolina's medical malpractice statutes.

1) Timing

The Order Entering Judgment against Coastal Anesthesia Associates was filed on November 25, 2013. As the Clerk's office was closed for the Thanksgiving holiday, this Defendant is filing the instant Motion to Set Aside as quickly as reasonably possible. Additionally, no significant events have taken place in this case since Plaintiff filed his Application for Default Judgment. Furthermore, despite Plaintiff's improper attempts to serve this Defendant with the Complaint, this Defendant filed an Answer to the Complaint before Plaintiff even filed his Application for Default Judgment and Request for a Damages Hearing. Therefore, this Defendant meets the timing element of good cause.

2) Meritorious Defense

"To establish that he has a meritorious defense, a complainant need not show that he would prevail on the merits, but only that his defense is meritorious."

McClurg v. Deaton, 380 S.C. 563, 575, 671 S.E.2d 87, 93-94 (Ct. App. 2008) affd., 395 S.C. 85, 716 S.E.2d 887 (2011).

A meritorious defense need not be perfect nor one which can be guaranteed to prevail at a trial. It need be only one which is worthy of a hearing or judicial inquiry because it raises a question of law deserving of some investigation and discussion or a real controversy as to real facts arising from conflicting or doubtful evidence.

Micronics, Inc. v. S. Carolina Dep't of Revenue, 345 S.C. 506, 511, 548 S.E.2d 223, 226 (Ct. App. 2001).

In the instant case, this Defendant has raised several meritorious defenses in its Answer and affirmative defenses. In addition, as the only real avenue of recovery against this Defendant is premised upon the alleged vicarious liability (or non-delegable duty of care) of its independent contractor Dr. Thompson, the defenses raised in her Answer (Exhibit 9) and affidavit should be considered as well. (See Exhibit 14, Affidavit of Dr. Thompson).

As this is a medical malpractice lawsuit, the single most important issue is whether any defendant deviated from the standard of care. This Defendant and Dr. Thompson have both raised the affirmative defense that they did not deviate from the standard of care. (See Exhibits 4, 9, 10 and 14). They have also asserted the defense that their actions were not the proximate cause of harm. Id. Therefore, this Defendant has showed it has a meritorious defense.

3) Degree of Prejudice

Courts favor settling disputes on their merits unless the degree of prejudice against a party is so great as to hold otherwise. Williams v. Watkins, 384 S.C. 319, 327, 681 S.E.2d 914, 918 (Ct. App. 2009). When analyzing the degree of prejudice, South Carolina courts take a practical approach and look at what actions have been

done in the case. Id. Where little discovery and investigation has occurred, courts are less likely to find that the degree of prejudice is high. Id.

The instant lawsuit was very recently filed. The Complaint was filed in July of this year, and only written discovery has been exchanged. No depositions have been taken, nor have expert witnesses been identified. On July 3, 2013, Dr. Thompson served on Plaintiff four sets of discovery requests. On August 14, 2013, Dr. Thompson served on Plaintiff an additional discovery request. To date, Dr. Thompson has not received Plaintiff's responses to any of these discovery requests, and no extension was asked for or granted. Plaintiff's responses to the discovery requests served on July 3 were due on August 4, 2013. Plaintiff's responses to the discovery requests served on August 14 were due on September 15, 2013. Plaintiff has given no explanation as to why he has failed to respond to Dr. Thompson's discovery requests. Plaintiff should therefore not be allowed to claim any prejudice from allowing this Defendant to respond to the substantive allegations of the Complaint, while at the same time failing to respond to basic discovery requests served by Dr. Thompson, a party Plaintiff does not even argue is in default.

Allowing this Defendant's Answer to stand will cause no delay, nor will it cause any prejudice to Plaintiff. Moreover, as the alleged vicarious liability (or non-delegable duty of care) of this Defendant's independent contractor Dr. Thompson is Plaintiff's only theory of recovery against this Defendant, Plaintiff's recovery against this Defendant is completely contingent upon a finding of liability on the part of Dr. Thompson. Dr. Thompson is still a party to this suit and has denied that she deviated from the standard of care in her care and treatment of Martha Preston. Thus, Plaintiff will have to wait for a final determination of any alleged

liability on the part of Dr. Thompson before attempting to recover from this Defendant. As such, Plaintiff is unable to show that any prejudice will result from setting aside the Entry of Default.

This Defendant has met all of the elements of good cause; therefore, this Court should set aside the Entry of Default and deny Plaintiff's Application for Default Judgment.

C. This Defendant is Also Entitled to Relief Under Rule 60.

In the event this Court refrains from dismissing the case against this Defendant for lack of subject matter jurisdiction and does not set aside the Entry of Default pursuant to Rule 55(c) of the SCRPC, this Defendant also meets the more stringent requirements under Rule 60(b) for SCRPC for this Court to set aside the Entry of Default. Rule 60 provides that "the court may relieve a party or his legal representative from a final judgment, order, or proceeding for the following reasons: (1) mistake, inadvertence, surprise, or excusable neglect; . . . [or] (4) the judgment is void . . . Rule 60(b), S.C.R.C.P. A defaulting party must also meet the above factors for good cause as well.

1) Mistake and Excusable Neglect

"In determining whether to grant relief under Rule 60(b)(1), the court must consider the following factors: (1) the promptness with which relief is sought; (2) the reasons for the failure to act promptly; (3) the existence of a meritorious defense; and (4) the prejudice to the other party." Rouvet v. Rouvet, 388 S.C. 301, 309, 696 S.E.2d 204, 208 (Ct. App. 2010).

As the majority of these factors were explored above, this section will simply highlight some of the key facts. In the instant case, a Notice of Intent was

filed naming Dr. Thompson as a Defendant. This Defendant was not named or served with the Notice of Intent and was not properly served with the Complaint. This Defendant's managing partner and office manager/administrator reasonably believed that this Defendant was not involved in the lawsuit other than tangentially through its independent contractor Dr. Thompson.

2) Judgment is Void

"The definition of 'void' under the rule only encompasses judgments from courts which failed to provide proper due process, or judgments from courts which lacked subject matter jurisdiction or personal jurisdiction." Linda Mc Co., Inc. v. Shore, 375 S.C. 432, 438, 653 S.E.2d 279, 282 (Ct. App. 2007) aff'd as modified, 390 S.C. 543, 703 S.E.2d 499 (2010).

Here, Plaintiff failed to follow the substantive requirements of S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125 as to this Defendant. These requirements grant this Court subject matter jurisdiction over the dispute. Therefore, any order filed against this Defendant in this case is void for lack of subject matter jurisdiction. Moreover, by failing to follow the substantive rules of the statute, Plaintiff has also failed to provide this Defendant with proper notice and due process, thereby making any judgment against this Defendant similarly void. Therefore, this Defendant is entitled to relief under Rule 60 of the SCRCPP.

D. Good Cause Exists to Enlarge the Time for this Defendant to File an Answer.

Should the Complaint not be dismissed as to this Defendant for lack of subject matter jurisdiction, good cause exists for the Court to retroactively enlarge the time for this Defendant to file an Answer. Rule 6(b) of the South Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure allows courts to extend the time period for a party to file an


Answer "for good cause shown." Rule 6(b), SCRPC. Plaintiff failed to follow the pre-litigation requirements of S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125 and did not give this Defendant an opportunity to participate in pre-suit mediation. One requirement under § 15-79-125 is that all adverse parties be served in accordance with the South Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure. S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125. The SCRPC require that papers, such as a Notice of Intent, be served on organizations like this Defendant by serving "an officer, a managing or general agent, or . . . any other agent authorized by appointment or by law to receive service of process" Rule 4(d)(3), SCRPC. Nonetheless, Plaintiff failed to ever serve a copy of the Notice of Intent on this Defendant naming this Defendant as a party to the suit, as is required by S.C. Code Ann. § 15-79-125. (See Exhibits 4 and 5).

Furthermore, Plaintiff never properly served this Defendant with the Complaint, rather serving the Complaint on a person who has never been an employee, agent or representative of this Defendant. As such, because of Plaintiff's improper attempted service, no subject matter jurisdiction ever existed over this Defendant, and good cause exists for this Court to retroactively extend the time for this Defendant to file an Answer to Plaintiff's Complaint through September 23, 2013.

CONCLUSION

For the foregoing reasons, this Defendant respectfully requests that the Court grant this Defendant's its Motion to Dismiss Plaintiff's Complaint against this Defendant for lack of subject matter jurisdiction, or in the alternative, to Set Aside the Entry of Default and retroactively enlarge the time for this Defendant to Answer Plaintiff's Summons and Complaint.



1. The parties shall select a neutral and file a "Proof of ADR" form on or by the 210th day of the filing of this action. If the parties have not selected a neutral within 210 days, the Clerk of Court shall then appoint a primary and secondary mediator from the current roster on a rotating basis from among those mediators agreeing to accept cases in the county in which the action has been filed.
2. The initial ADR conference must be held within 300 days after the filing of the action.
3. Pre-suit medical malpractice mediations required by S.C. Code §15-79-125 shall be held not later than 120 days after all defendants are served with the "Notice of Intent to File Suit" or as the court directs. (Medical malpractice mediation is mandatory statewide.)
4. Cases are exempt from ADR only upon the following grounds:
 - a. Special proceeding, or actions seeking extraordinary relief such as mandamus, habeas corpus, or prohibition;
 - b. Requests for temporary relief;
 - c. Appeals
 - d. Post Conviction relief matters;
 - e. Contempt of Court proceedings;
 - f. Forfeiture proceedings brought by governmental entities;
 - g. Mortgage foreclosures; and
 - h. Cases that have been previously subjected to an ADR conference, unless otherwise required by Rule 3 or by statute.
5. In cases not subject to ADR, the Chief Judge for Administrative Purposes, upon the motion of the court or of any party, may order a case to mediation.
6. Motion of a party to be exempt from payment of neutral fees due to indigency should be filed with the Court within ten (10) days after the ADR conference has been concluded.

Please Note: You must comply with the Supreme Court Rules regarding ADR. Failure to do so may affect your case or may result in sanctions.



The Plaintiff, by and through his undersigned counsel, for a Complaint against the Defendants, does hereby allege as follows:

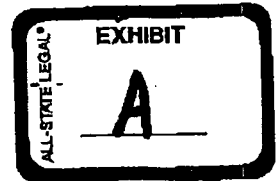
PARTIES

Plaintiff

1. The Plaintiff, Willie Preston, is the duly appointed Personal Representative of the estate of Martha Preston. At all times relevant hereto, Willie Preston was the husband of Martha Preston. He brings these claims as PR for wrongful death and survival, and on behalf of himself for loss of consortium. Plaintiff is a citizen and resident of Charleston County, South Carolina.

Defendants

2. Defendant Surgical Care Affiliates, LLC is a corporation organized and existing under a state's laws other than South Carolina and maintains an agent and/or joint venture in Charleston County, SC known as the Charleston Surgical Center, LP in Charleston County, South Carolina. At all times relevant hereto, Surgical Care Affiliates, LLC was a joint venture,



principal or agent, with the entity employing certain nurses and other medical staff at the Charleston Surgical Center who at all times relevant hereto, were employees acting within the scope of their employment.

3. Defendant Charleston Surgery Center LP, is a South Carolina limited partnership and is an agent, principal or joint venturer with Surgical Affiliates, LLC. Charleston Surgery Center maintains its principal place of business in Charleston County, SC and was the employer of certain nurses and other medical providers that treated Mrs. Preston on April 18, 2012.

4. Defendant Nurse Jane Done, RN was the registered nurse who was in charge of Mrs. Preston's post operative care, and is the same person who signed Pages CSC-024 and CSC-025 of the medical records. This defendant is also believed to be the same person who administered the dilaudid and other drugs to Mrs. Preston. Nurse Doe is believed to be a citizen and resident of Charleston County, SC and was at all times working within the course and scope of her employment.

5. Defendant Christine Thompson, MD is a physician licensed by the state of South Carolina and holds herself out to the public as a specialist in the field of anesthesiology. At all times relevant hereto, Defendant Thompson was acting within the scope of her employment with Charleston Surgical Center, LP or Surgical Affiliates, LLC, and/or her practice that plaintiff calls ABC Anesthesia Group at this time. Defendant Thompson is a citizen and resident of Charleston County, SC.

FACTUAL ALLEGATIONS

6. On April 18, 2012, Mrs. Preston went to the Charleston Surgery Center for an out patient knee surgery. The procedure was supposed to take well less than a day, and Mrs. Preston was to be returned home without staying in any medical facility overnight.

7. After this procedure, Mrs. Preston was sent from the Operating Room to the Post Anesthesia Care Unit ("PACU"). Dr. Thompson ordered, among other things, "Dilaudid 0.2 mg IV prn pain, may repeat every 5 minutes up to 2 mg IV or 4 mg IV." CSC 024. Both Dr. Thompson and Nurse Doe signed this order.

8. Nurse Doe administered the following medications to Mrs. Preston:

Dilaudid 1 mg IV at 9:02

Dilaudid 1 mg IV at 9:06

Dilaudid 1 mg IV at 9:21

Dilaudid 1 mg IV at 9:28

Phenergan 6.25 mg IV at 9:42

Percocet 1 by mouth at 9:42

9. The dilaudid administered by the nurse was in excess of the physician's order and the nurse therefore was below the prevailing and accepted medical standard of care.

10. Nurses have an obligation to follow doctor's orders unless in their professional judgment doing so would put the patient at risk. In that case, Nurses are expected to follow-up on their concerns either with the physician or through their chain of command. It is never appropriate for a nurse to give 4 doses of dilaudid, 1 mg EACH, when an order reads that the maximum per dose is 0.2 mg.

11. Further, Charleston Surgery Center and Surgery Center Affiliates had policies and procedures in place dictating when a patient could safely be discharged. The Defendants used a scoring system, that provided that a patient must score at least a 16 on a scale from 16-18. Mrs. Preston scored only a 13, and was discharged anyway.

12. As a back-up to this system, the physician, in this case Defendant Thompson, was

supposed to evaluate the patient and the patient's chart to sign off on the patient being fit for discharge. Dr. Thompson signed a statement that she had assessed Mrs. Preston and found her fit for discharge. See, Anesthesia Record, CSC-021. This is shocking as Mrs. Preston at that time was under the influence of 4 mg of dilaudid, Phenergan, and Percocet, and the effects of those drugs was profound. Mrs. Preston could not walk or stay awake from the heavy medications. Dr. Thompson never reviewed the patient's chart to determine if her order was followed or to determine if Mrs. Preston could safely be discharged. If she had, she would not have discharged Mrs. Preston.

13. Dr. Thompson had a duty and obligation to assess Mrs. Preston prior to her discharge as well as to review her medical chart from the PACU. Dr. Thompson further had a duty and obligation to perform this assessment in a competent manner. Dr. Thompson failed on both accounts.

14. Mrs. Preston was sent home in the care of her husband who did his level best to care for her. Mrs. Preston was falling asleep while walking to her bedroom from her car. Mr. Preston regularly checked on her, and the last time he checked on her, before lunch time, Mrs. Preston was found to be not breathing.

15. Mr. Preston called 911 and started to do CPR on his wife. EMS arrived and took over care of Mrs. Preston, ultimately taking her to MUSC in Charleston.

16. Mrs. Preston was determined to be brain dead at MUSC from the lack of oxygen to her brain and she passed on April 23, 2012.

17. The cause of death was determined to be "probable mixed drug toxicity with fentanyl, promethazine, hydromorphone, oxycodone, and midazolam." In other words, Mrs. Preston died from the drugs she was given at the Charleston Surgery Center.

18. As a direct and proximate result of the acts and/or omissions of Defendants, Mrs. Preston did not receive proper treatment in a timely fashion. With proper, standard of care medicine, Mrs. Preston would not have suffered and would have not have died when she did and would have had a normal life expectancy.

19. The injuries to and death of Mrs. Preston were the direct and proximate result of and was caused and occasioned by the negligence, carelessness, recklessness, willfulness, and wantonness on the part of Defendants, in failing to possess and exercise that degree of medical training, competency, and skill ordinarily and customarily possessed and exercised by physicians and medical staff under similar circumstances and thereby rendered inappropriate medical care to Mrs. Preston by deviating from and falling below the prevailing and acceptable standards of care in one or more of the following particulars, as follows:

AS TO DEFENDANT Nurse Doe, Charleston Surgery Center LP, and Surgery Center Affiliates, LLC:

- a. In failing to properly follow the physician's orders;
- b. In giving too much medication;
- c. In failing to properly assess Mrs. Preston;
- d. In discharging Mrs. Preston under the circumstances;
- e. In failing to properly follow the policies and procedures in place for discharge assessment; and
- f. In such other ways as may be shown at trial

AS TO DEFENDANTS Thompson and ABC Anesthesia Group

- g. In failing to review the medical chart of the patient at the time Defendant Thompson certified that Mrs. Preston was fit for discharge;
- h. In failing to properly assess Mrs. Preston at the time of her discharge;
- i. In allowing Mrs. Preston to be discharged;
- j. In failing to realize that the nurse grossly violated her order by giving 1 mg doses of dilaudid when the order called for no more than 0.2 mg at a time; and
- k. In such other ways as may be shown at trial.

ATTACHED to the Notice of Intent, all of which is incorporated herein by reference, and attached to this Complaint are affidavits of qualified experts who will testify to at least one breach of the standard of care by the Defendants in this matter.

FOR A FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION

(SURVIVAL ACTION)

20. Plaintiff reiterates paragraphs 1-19 above as if set forth verbatim herein.

21. As a direct and proximate result of the negligence, carelessness, gross negligence, recklessness and departure from the professional standards of care by Defendants, Mrs. Preston suffered from severe debilitating injuries which resulted in her permanent injury and disability, and conscious pain and suffering, as a result of which Mrs. Preston is entitled to recover a sum to compensate her estate for her conscious pain and suffering, medical expenses, mental anguish, loss of earnings capacity, loss of enjoyment of life, and other damages. Plaintiff is also entitled to recover a sum of punitive damages to punish and deter these defendants and others like them from similar conduct in the future. All damages should be in an amount determined by a jury in this action.

FOR A SECOND CAUSE OF ACTION

(Wrongful Death)

22. Plaintiff reiterates paragraphs 1-21 as if set forth verbatim herein.

23. As a direct and proximate result of the negligence, carelessness, gross negligence, recklessness and departure from the professional standards of care by Defendants, Mrs. Preston suffered from severe debilitating injuries which resulted in her death, and thus the negligence was the cause of the loss of the support, aid, society, comfort, and companionship of her heirs at law. The estate is therefore entitled to recover from defendants a sum of money to compensate the heirs at law for the medical expenses, funeral expenses, mental anguish, loss of earnings capacity, and loss for the aid, society, comfort, and companionship of the decedent. Plaintiff is also entitled to recover a sum of punitive damages to punish and deter these defendants and others like them from similar conduct in the future. All damages should be in an amount determined by a jury in this action.

FOR A THIRD CAUSE OF ACTION

(Loss of Consortium)

24. Plaintiff reiterates paragraphs 1-23 as if set forth verbatim herein.

25. Plaintiff Willie Preston, as the husband of Mrs. Mrs. Davis, has suffered a loss of consortium as a result of the actions and inactions of defendants. He is therefore entitled to an award of damages to compensate her for her loss of the society, comfort, companionship, support, and good offices of his wife. Further, the Defendants' actions in this case have been reckless and/or grossly negligent and thus Plaintiff Andrew Strong is additionally entitled to an award of punitive damages to punish and deter these defendants and others like them.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiffs, respectfully pray for judgment against the Defendants for actual damages, special damages, consequential damages, and punitive damages in an amount to

be determined by the jury at the trial of this action, for the costs and disbursements of this action and for such other and further relief as this court deems just and proper. Plaintiff specifically avers that the damages at issue in this case are more than \$100,000, such averment made to allow all manner of discovery under South Carolina Law.

Part II: Research, Teaching, and Clinical Contributions

A. Narrative

My most important contributions lie in four main areas: clinical care, teaching, the research environment, and administration.

Clinical Leadership and Innovation

Both Israel Deaconess Medical Center has been home to me for almost 30 years, first as a surgical intern and then as an anesthesia resident. As a clinician, I have focused on providing cutting-edge care of critically ill patients, and anesthetics for large, complicated cases. I have guided, taught, learned from, and collaborated with medical staff members who daily manage very delicate and critical interactions with patients and their families.

For the first 25 years of my career, I worked in the operating rooms as a cardiac anesthesiologist and also in the general ORs administering anesthetic care for complex cases. Staff requests for my services have factored strongly in my clinical caseload, bringing professional challenges across a wide spectrum of illness and disease. I am experienced in the safe and efficient management of the operating rooms of a tertiary/quaternary medical center.

As Co-Director of the Surgical ICUs for the past 20 years, I have been responsible for general administration, policy development, and quality of care within those units on both BIDMC campuses. During this time, the anesthesia critical care program at BIDMC has developed into one of the leading programs in the country. Recent initiatives include the introduction of widespread use of echo and ultrasound technology in the ICU. We have developed and instituted clinical guidelines for the ICUs over the past two years that have greatly lessened the incidence of iatrogenic infections, including reduction of central line infections and reduction of ventilator-associated pneumonia by 50 percent. I have personally championed the development of a robust program in clinical research.

I served as Chair of the FDA panel on Anesthesia and Respiratory devices. In addition, I have served as President of the New England Society of Critical Care and as a member of multiple national committees for the specialty. My committee memberships include the Health, Science and Policy Committee for the ACCP, which is responsible for writing national guidelines on clinical care.

Teaching

I have lectured extensively throughout the United States and abroad on a wide range of topics related to critical care and anesthesia. It has been particularly satisfying for me to write many chapters on the care of critically ill and cardiac surgical patients, and I have recently co-edited a book on procedures and techniques for critically ill patients.

For the past 12 years, I have served as an oral board examiner for the American Board of Anesthesia.

For the past 10 years, it has been my responsibility to convene weekly Anesthesia Grand Rounds, the major CME program for our department. The speakers are well-known experts from throughout the US and abroad. As Chair of the Anesthesia Complications meetings (M&M), I have the opportunity each week to teach and learn about the unexpected challenges of difficult cases. These events provide a forum for penetrating analysis and constructive feedback, and for building (and modeling) confidence and humility among staff and residents.

Medical education is at the forefront of everything we do at BIDMC, and I relish this shared work and its proud tradition. I teach critical care fellows, residents, and medical students both the fundamentals and the intricacies of critical care and clinical anesthesia.

Throughout the year, I mentor and supervise 24 medical students, 18 anesthesia residents, 10 emergency medicine residents, and 12 surgery residents who rotate through the Surgical ICUs. Our Critical Care Fellowship is nationally renowned and highly competitive. I have trained 31 critical care fellows over the past 16 years. Each year, I am proud to see our Fellows secure outstanding positions at prominent institutions, and by so doing, validate their exceptional training. I am particularly proud that the BIDMC Anesthesia Critical Care Program is considered among the most prestigious in the country. I train our 56 anesthesia residents in the provision of anesthetics for a wide spectrum of surgical disease, and am active as a mentor and counselor for these residents.

Research

BIDMC has the fourth largest hospital-based research program in the United States, with some 1,300 protocols under consideration each year. My own clinical trials have focused on ICU therapies, critical care practices, diagnostic testing, and monitoring devices. Being an investigator has taught me about the unique challenges of conducting research in an academic setting and also has led me to promote research at BIDMC. For the past 10 years, I have managed the Committee on Clinical Investigation (the IRB) and its 50 board members (three boards), and have chaired two meetings of the full Board as well as two Continuing Review meetings each month.

During my tenure, the IRBs at Beth Israel Hospital and the New England Deaconess Hospital merged in 1996, creating a single BIDMC IRB. This merger necessitated a systemic revamping of all policies and standard operating procedures, which resulted in our becoming a model of efficient and assiduous ethical and scientific review. Research revenues have grown, and submissions of new protocols have increased steadily.

Today, we have a staff of 14 dedicated IRB professionals processing submissions and offering internal quality improvement audits.

Our IRB currently boasts the fastest turnaround time (from protocol submission to approval) in Boston. I have become solidly versed in regulatory matters and developed an understanding and respect for the complicated path a clinical trial must take to reach approval.

As Chair of the CCI, I have worked closely with every division of every department at BIDMC over the years, developing considerable goodwill in the process. In my role, I have strived to develop and support a culture befitting a great research institution, and feel privileged to have done so for BIDMC.

Administration

Anesthesia is by definition a collaborative service in support of other departments. We have met or exceeded the demands of the surgical and other procedural services for creative and dynamic partnerships across disciplines. For example, 2006/2007 witnessed clinical innovations in expanding overnight coverage on the East Campus, coverage in the GI suite, inception of regional block scheduling (with a resulting increase in use), and increased use of ultrasound for regional anesthesia. Recently, we have supported growth in cardiovascular surgery by assuming management of these extremely complicated patients in the new Cardiovascular ICU.

Anesthesia has seen solid financial growth and expansion during the past year that I served as acting Chair of the department. Our Anesthesia Residency recently received the ACGME five-year accreditation, the highest level attainable. We are currently in the process of reorganizing and relocating the Arnold Pain Center to an off-campus site, which entails major logistical challenges. New programs, such as the development of echocardiography training and education services, and expansion to the GI suite, have offered the Anesthesia service new ways to connect with other departments within and outside the institution and have fostered overall growth in surgical specialties.

I have encouraged opportunities for interdepartmental integration as Acting Chair. Our patients are the direct beneficiaries but the anesthesia and critical care staff also reaps the benefits from a strong, positive relationship with the other specialties. Our departmental productivity has improved, with increases in surgical volume and increases in academic, educational, and administrative responsibilities.

1. My name is Randall Kerns, M.D.
2. I am over the age of eighteen (18) and am competent to make the following statements.
3. I am a physician licensed to practice in the state of South Carolina.
4. I am the managing physician for Coastal Anesthesia Associates, LLC ("Coastal") with offices located in North Charleston, South Carolina.
5. I am the registered agent to receive service of process for Coastal.
6. At no point in time did I, nor anyone else authorized to receive service of process on behalf of Coastal, receive service of a Notice of Intent to File Suit naming Coastal as a defendant.
7. At no point in time did Plaintiff or Plaintiff's counsel contact me, or anyone else authorized to receive service on behalf of Coastal, to make us aware



that Plaintiff intended to include Coastal as a defendant in the case titled Willie Preston, individually and as PR of the Estate of Martha Preston, Deceased – Versus – Surgical Center Affiliates, LLC, Charleston Surgery Center, LP, Nurse Doe, Christine Thompson, MD, and ABC Anesthesia Group with a Civil Action No. 2012-CP-10-7413 in the Court of Common Pleas for the County of Charleston, South Carolina (hereinafter “Notice of Intent”).

8. At no point in time did I, nor anyone else authorized to receive service of process on behalf of Coastal, receive notification of a scheduled pre-suit mediation conference with Plaintiff and the other Defendants in this case.



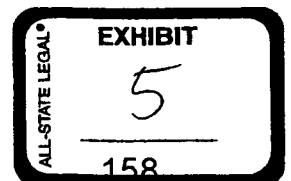



The Plaintiff, by and through his undersigned counsel, for a Complaint against the Defendants, does hereby allege as follows:

PARTIES

Plaintiff

1. The Plaintiff, Willie Preston, is the duly appointed Personal Representative of the estate of Martha Preston. At all times relevant hereto, Willie Preston was the husband of Martha Preston. He brings these claims as PR for wrongful death and survival, and on behalf of himself for loss of consortium. Plaintiff is a citizen and resident of Charleston County, South Carolina.

Defendants

2. Defendant Surgical Care Affiliates, LLC is a corporation organized and existing under a state's laws other than South Carolina and maintains an agent and/or joint venture in Charleston County, SC known as the Charleston Surgical Center, LP in Charleston County,

South Carolina. At all times relevant hereto, Surgical Care Affiliates, LLC was a joint venture, principal or agent, with the entity employing certain nurses and other medical staff at the Charleston Surgical Center who at all times relevant hereto, were employees acting within the scope of their employment.

3. Defendant Charleston Surgery Center LP, is a South Carolina limited partnership and is an agent, principal or joint venturer with Surgical Affiliates, LLC. Charleston Surgery Center maintains its principal place of business in Charleston County, SC and was the employer of certain nurses and other medical providers that treated Mrs. Preston on April 18, 2012.

4. Defendant Laura Bilancione, RN was the registered nurse who was in charge of Mrs. Preston's post operative care, and is the same person who signed Pages CSC-024 and CSC-025 of the medical records. This defendant is also believed to be the same person who administered the dilaudid and other drugs to Mrs. Preston. Nurse Bilancione is believed to be a citizen and resident of Charleston County, SC and was at all times working within the course and scope of her employment.

5. Defendant Christine Thompson, MD is a physician licensed by the state of South Carolina and holds herself out to the public as a specialist in the field of anesthesiology. At all times relevant hereto, Defendant Thompson was acting within the scope of her employment and/or contract with Coastal Anesthesia Associates, Charleston Surgical Center, LP, or Surgical Affiliates, LLC. Defendant Thompson is a citizen and resident of Charleston County, SC.

FACTUAL ALLEGATIONS

6. On April 18, 2012, Mrs. Preston went to the Charleston Surgery Center for an out patient knee surgery. The procedure was supposed to take well less than a day, and Mrs. Preston was to be returned home without staying in any medical facility overnight.

7. After this procedure, Mrs. Preston was sent from the Operating Room to the Post Anesthesia Care Unit ("PACU"). Dr. Thompson ordered, among other things, "Dilaudid 0.2 mg IV prn pain, may repeat every 5 minutes up to 2 mg IV or 4 mg IV." CSC 024. Both Dr. Thompson and Nurse Doe signed this order.

8. Nurse Bilancione administered the following medications to Mrs. Preston:

Dilaudid 1 mg IV at 9:02

Dilaudid 1 mg IV at 9:06

Dilaudid 1 mg IV at 9:21

Dilaudid 1 mg IV at 9:28

Phenergan 6.25 mg IV at 9:42

Percocet 1 by mouth at 9:42

9. The dilaudid administered by the nurse was in excess of the physician's order and the nurse therefore was below the prevailing and accepted medical standard of care.

10. Nurses have an obligation to follow doctor's orders unless in their professional judgment doing so would put the patient at risk. In that case, Nurses are expected to follow-up on their concerns either with the physician or through their chain of command. It is never appropriate for a nurse to give 4 doses of dilaudid, 1 mg EACH, when an order reads that the maximum per dose is 0.2 mg.

11. Further, Charleston Surgery Center and Surgery Center Affiliates had policies and procedures in place dictating when a patient could safely be discharged. The Defendants used a scoring system, that provided that a patient must score at least a 16 on a scale from 16-18. Mrs. Preston scored only a 13, and was discharged anyway.

12. As a back-up to this system, the physician, in this case Defendant Thompson, was

supposed to evaluate the patient and the patient's chart to sign off on the patient being fit for discharge. Dr. Thompson signed a statement that she had assessed Mrs. Preston and found her fit for discharge. See, Anesthesia Record, CSC-021. This is shocking as Mrs. Preston at that time was under the influence of 4 mg of dilaudid, Phenergan, and Percocet, and the effects of those drugs was profound. Mrs. Preston could not walk or stay awake from the heavy medications. Dr. Thompson never reviewed the patient's chart to determine if her order was followed or to determine if Mrs. Preston could safely be discharged. If she had, she would not have discharged Mrs. Preston.

13. Dr. Thompson had a duty and obligation to assess Mrs. Preston prior to her discharge as well as to review her medical chart from the PACU. Dr. Thompson further had a duty and obligation to perform this assessment in a competent manner. Dr. Thompson failed on both accounts.

14. Mrs. Preston was sent home in the care of her husband who did his level best to care for her. Mrs. Preston was falling asleep while walking to her bedroom from her car. Mr. Preston regularly checked on her, and the last time he checked on her, before lunch time, Mrs. Preston was found to be not breathing.

15. Mr. Preston called 911 and started to do CPR on his wife. EMS arrived and took over care of Mrs. Preston, ultimately taking her to MUSC in Charleston.

16. Mrs. Preston was determined to be brain dead at MUSC from the lack of oxygen to her brain and she passed on April 23, 2012.

17. The cause of death was determined to be "probable mixed drug toxicity with fentanyl, promethazine, hydromorphone, oxycodone, and midazolam." In other words, Mrs. Preston died from the drugs she was given at the Charleston Surgery Center.

18. As a direct and proximate result of the acts and/or omissions of Defendants, Mrs. Preston did not receive proper treatment in a timely fashion. With proper, standard of care medicine, Mrs. Preston would not have suffered and would have not have died when she did and would have had a normal life expectancy.

19. The injuries to and death of Mrs. Preston were the direct and proximate result of and was caused and occasioned by the negligence, carelessness, recklessness, willfulness, and wantonness on the part of Defendants, in failing to possess and exercise that degree of medical training, competency, and skill ordinarily and customarily possessed and exercised by physicians and medical staff under similar circumstances and thereby rendered inappropriate medical care to Mrs. Preston by deviating from and falling below the prevailing and acceptable standards of care in one or more of the following particulars, as follows:

AS TO DEFENDANT Nurse Doe, Charleston Surgery Center LP, and Surgery Center Affiliates, LLC:

- a. In failing to properly follow the physician's orders;
- b. In giving too much medication;
- c. In failing to properly assess Mrs. Preston;
- d. In discharging Mrs. Preston under the circumstances;
- e. In failing to properly follow the policies and procedures in place for discharge assessment; and
- f. In such other ways as may be shown at trial

AS TO DEFENDANTS Thompson and Coastal Anesthesia Associates

- g. In failing to review the medical chart of the patient at the time Defendant Thompson certified that Mrs. Preston was fit for discharge;
- h. In failing to properly assess Mrs. Preston at the time of her discharge;
- i. In allowing Mrs. Preston to be discharged;
- j. In failing to realize that the nurse grossly violated her order by giving 1 mg doses of dilaudid when the order called for no more than 0.2 mg at a time; and
- k. In such other ways as may be shown at trial.

ATTACHED to the Notice of Intent, all of which is incorporated herein by reference, and attached to this Complaint are affidavits of qualified experts who will testify to at least one breach of the standard of care by the Defendants in this matter.

FOR A FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION

(SURVIVAL ACTION)

20. Plaintiff reiterates paragraphs 1-19 above as if set forth verbatim herein.

21. As a direct and proximate result of the negligence, carelessness, gross negligence, recklessness and departure from the professional standards of care by Defendants, Mrs. Preston suffered from severe debilitating injuries which resulted in her permanent injury and disability, and conscious pain and suffering, as a result of which Mrs. Preston is entitled to recover a sum to compensate her estate for her conscious pain and suffering, medical expenses, mental anguish, loss of earnings capacity, loss of enjoyment of life, and other damages. Plaintiff is also entitled to recover a sum of punitive damages to punish and deter these defendants and others like them from similar conduct in the future. All damages should be in an amount determined by a jury in this action.

FOR A SECOND CAUSE OF ACTION

(Wrongful Death)

22. Plaintiff reiterates paragraphs 1-21 as if set forth verbatim herein.

23. As a direct and proximate result of the negligence, carelessness, gross negligence, recklessness and departure from the professional standards of care by Defendants, Mrs. Preston suffered from severe debilitating injuries which resulted in her death, and thus the negligence was the cause of the loss of the support, aid, society, comfort, and companionship of her heirs at law. The estate is therefore entitled to recover from defendants a sum of money to compensate the heirs at law for the medical expenses, funeral expenses, mental anguish, loss of earnings capacity, and loss for the aid, society, comfort, and companionship of the decedent. Plaintiff is also entitled to recover a sum of punitive damages to punish and deter these defendants and others like them from similar conduct in the future. All damages should be in an amount determined by a jury in this action.

FOR A THIRD CAUSE OF ACTION


(Loss of Consortium)

24. Plaintiff reiterates paragraphs 1-23 as if set forth verbatim herein.

25. Plaintiff Willie Preston, as the husband of Mrs. Mrs. Davis, has suffered a loss of consortium as a result of the actions and inactions of defendants. He is therefore entitled to an award of damages to compensate her for her loss of the society, comfort, companionship, support, and good offices of his wife. Further, the Defendants' actions in this case have been reckless and/or grossly negligent and thus Plaintiff Andrew Strong is additionally entitled to an award of punitive damages to punish and deter these defendants and others like them.

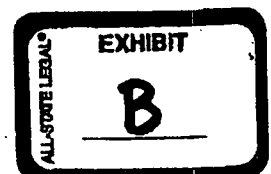

- Discharging Mrs. Preston home in the face of not meeting discharge criteria.



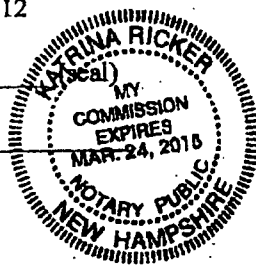



Part II: Research, Teaching, and Clinical Contributions

A. Narrative

My most important contributions lie in four main areas: clinical care, teaching, the research environment, and administration.

Clinical Leadership and Innovation

Both Israel Deaconess Medical Center has been home to me for almost 30 years, first as a surgical intern and then as an anesthesia resident. As a clinician, I have focused on providing cutting-edge care of critically ill patients, and anesthetics for large, complicated cases. I have guided, taught, learned from, and collaborated with medical staff members who daily manage very delicate and critical interactions with patients and their families.

For the first 25 years of my career, I worked in the operating rooms as a cardiac anesthesiologist and also in the general ORs administering anesthetic care for complex cases. Staff requests for my services have factored strongly in my clinical caseload, bringing professional challenges across a wide spectrum of illness and disease. I am experienced in the safe and efficient management of the operating rooms of a tertiary/quaternary medical center.

As Co-Director of the Surgical ICUs for the past 20 years, I have been responsible for general administration, policy development, and quality of care within those units on both BIDMC campuses. During this time, the anesthesia critical care program at BIDMC has developed into one of the leading programs in the country. Recent initiatives include the introduction of widespread use of echo and ultrasound technology in the ICU. We have developed and instituted clinical guidelines for the ICUs over the past two years that have greatly lessened the incidence of iatrogenic infections, including reduction of central line infections and reduction of ventilator-associated pneumonia by 50 percent. I have personally championed the development of a robust program in clinical research.

I served as Chair of the FDA panel on Anesthesia and Respiratory devices. In addition, I have served as President of the New England Society of Critical Care and as a member of multiple national committees for the specialty. My committee memberships include the Health, Science and Policy Committee for the ACCP, which is responsible for writing national guidelines on clinical care.

Teaching

I have lectured extensively throughout the United States and abroad on a wide range of topics related to critical care and anesthesia. It has been particularly satisfying for me to write many chapters on the care of critically ill and cardiac surgical patients, and I have recently co-edited a book on procedures and techniques for critically ill patients.

For the past 12 years, I have served as an oral board examiner for the American Board of Anesthesia.

For the past 10 years, it has been my responsibility to convene weekly Anesthesia Grand Rounds, the major CME program for our department. The speakers are well-known experts from throughout the US and abroad. As Chair of the Anesthesia Complications meetings (M&M), I have the opportunity each week to teach and learn about the unexpected challenges of difficult cases. These events provide a forum for penetrating analysis and constructive feedback, and for building (and modeling) confidence and humility among staff and residents.

Medical education is at the forefront of everything we do at BIDMC, and I relish this shared work and its proud tradition. I teach critical care fellows, residents, and medical students both the fundamentals and the intricacies of critical care and clinical anesthesia.

Throughout the year, I mentor and supervise 24 medical students, 18 anesthesia residents, 10 emergency medicine residents, and 12 surgery residents who rotate through the Surgical ICUs. Our Critical Care Fellowship is nationally renowned and highly competitive. I have trained 31 critical care fellows over the past 16 years. Each year, I am proud to see our Fellows secure outstanding positions at prominent institutions, and by so doing, validate their exceptional training. I am particularly proud that the BIDMC Anesthesia Critical Care Program is considered among the most prestigious in the country. I train our 56 anesthesia residents in the provision of anesthetics for a wide spectrum of surgical disease, and am active as a mentor and counselor for these residents.

Research

BIDMC has the fourth largest hospital-based research program in the United States, with some 1,300 protocols under consideration each year. My own clinical trials have focused on ICU therapies, critical care practices, diagnostic testing, and monitoring devices. Being an investigator has taught me about the unique challenges of conducting research in an academic setting and also has led me to promote research at BIDMC. For the past 10 years, I have managed the Committee on Clinical Investigation (the IRB) and its 50 board members (three boards), and have chaired two meetings of the full Board as well as two Continuing Review meetings each month.

During my tenure, the IRBs at Beth Israel Hospital and the New England Deaconess Hospital merged in 1996, creating a single BIDMC IRB. This merger necessitated a systemic revamping of all policies and standard operating procedures, which resulted in our becoming a model of efficient and assiduous ethical and scientific review. Research revenues have grown, and submissions of new protocols have increased steadily.

Today, we have a staff of 14 dedicated IRB professionals processing submissions and offering internal quality improvement audits.

Our IRB currently boasts the fastest turnaround time (from protocol submission to approval) in Boston. I have become solidly versed in regulatory matters and developed an understanding and respect for the complicated path a clinical trial must take to reach approval.

As Chair of the CCI, I have worked closely with every division of every department at BIDMC over the years, developing considerable goodwill in the process. In my role, I have strived to develop and support a culture befitting a great research institution, and feel privileged to have done so for BIDMC.

Administration

Anesthesia is by definition a collaborative service in support of other departments. We have met or exceeded the demands of the surgical and other procedural services for creative and dynamic partnerships across disciplines. For example, 2006/2007 witnessed clinical innovations in expanding overnight coverage on the East Campus, coverage in the GI suite, inception of regional block scheduling (with a resulting increase in use), and increased use of ultrasound for regional anesthesia. Recently, we have supported growth in cardiovascular surgery by assuming management of these extremely complicated patients in the new Cardiovascular ICU.

Anesthesia has seen solid financial growth and expansion during the past year that I served as acting Chair of the department. Our Anesthesia Residency recently received the ACGME five-year accreditation, the highest level attainable. We are currently in the process of reorganizing and relocating the Arnold Pain Center to an off-campus site, which entails major logistical challenges. New programs, such as the development of echocardiography training and education services, and expansion to the GI suite, have offered the Anesthesia service new ways to connect with other departments within and outside the institution and have fostered overall growth in surgical specialties.

I have encouraged opportunities for interdepartmental integration as Acting Chair. Our patients are the direct beneficiaries but the anesthesia and critical care staff also reap the benefits from a strong, positive relationship with the other specialties. Our departmental productivity has improved, with increases in surgical volume and increases in academic, educational, and administrative responsibilities.

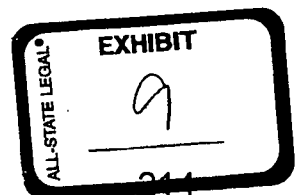





11. Paragraph 21 of Plaintiff's Complaint states conclusions of law to which this Defendant is not required to respond. To the extent a response is required, this Defendant denies the allegations contained in Paragraph 21 of Plaintiff's Complaint.

AS TO THE SECOND CASE OF ACTION
(Wrongful Death)

12. In response to Paragraph 22 of Plaintiff's Complaint, this Defendant re-asserts and re-alleges its responses to Paragraphs 1 - 21 of Plaintiff's Complaint as if fully restated herein.

13. Paragraph 23 of Plaintiff's Complaint states conclusions of law to which this Defendant is not required to respond. To the extent a response is required, this Defendant denies the allegations contained in Paragraph 23 of Plaintiff's Complaint.

AS TO THE THIRD CASE OF ACTION
(Loss of Consortium)

14. In response to Paragraph 24 of Plaintiff's Complaint, this Defendant re-asserts and re-alleges its responses to Paragraphs 1 – 23 of Plaintiff's Complaint as if fully restated herein.

15. Paragraph 25 of Plaintiff's Complaint states conclusions of law to which this Defendant is not required to respond. To the extent a response is required, this Defendant denies the allegations contained in Paragraph 25 of Plaintiff's Complaint.

16. This Defendant denies the WHEREFORE clause of Plaintiff's Complaint such being the remaining allegations contained in Plaintiff's Complaint.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE.
THIS DEFENDANT ALLEGES:
(No Deviation from the Standard of Care)

17. That the care and treatment administered by this Defendant conformed to and was in full compliance with the standard of care. All care and treatment administered by this Defendant was within acceptable medical standards and methods, and, at no time pertinent hereto, did this Defendant deviate from any medical standard while caring for or tending to Martha Preston. Consequently, Plaintiff is barred from recovery against this Defendant.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE.
THIS DEFENDANT ALLEGES:
(No Proximate Cause)

18. That, even if this Defendant was negligent, as alleged in Plaintiff's Complaint, which is specifically denied, the negligence of this Defendant is not the direct and proximate cause of any injury alleged by Plaintiff and therefore this Defendant is not liable for any damages allegedly sustained by Plaintiff.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE.
THIS DEFENDANT ALLEGES:
(Punitive Damages Unconstitutional)

19. That any award or assessment of punitive damages as prayed for by the Plaintiff would violate this Defendant's Constitutional rights under the Fifth, Sixth and Fourteenth Amendments of the United States Constitution and comparable provisions of the South Carolina Constitution.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE.
THIS DEFENDANT ALLEGES:
(Punitive Damages Unconstitutional)

20. This Defendant would plead the requirements for an award of punitive damages as set forth by the Supreme Court of the United States in the case of State Farm Mut. Auto Ins. Co. v. Campbell, 538 U.S. 408 (2003) as defenses to this claim and would specifically assert that they are entitled to summary judgment on punitive damages and if denied to bifurcated trial.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE.
THIS DEFENDANT ALLEGES:
(Noneconomic Damage Awards)

21. No award for noneconomic damages shall exceed the statutory limits contained in the Noneconomic Damages Awards Act of 2005, South Carolina Code Ann. §15-32-200, et. seq. This Defendant is a health care provider as defined by S.C. Code Ann. § 15-32-210 and pursuant to § 15-32-220 of the Noneconomic Damage Awards Act of 2005, any potential recovery of noneconomic damages is limited to the amounts stated therein.

FURTHER ANSWERING AND AS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE,
THIS DEFENDANT ALLEGES:
(Limitation of alleged Punitive Damages)

22. Any punitive damages awarded in this case would be subject to the limitations described in S.C. Code §15-32-530.





This matter comes before the Court on the Petition of Willie Preston, Personal Representative of the Estate of Martha Preston, deceased ("Petitioner"). Willie Preston, both individually and as Personal Representative, caused a wrongful death action (negligence) and survival action to be filed against the above-named Defendants in the Charleston County Court of Common Pleas, under Civil Action No. 2013-CP-10-3054, as a result of injuries Martha Preston sustained while being treated by the Defendants. Petitioner seeks to have this Court approve the settlement he has reached with Defendants Surgical Care Affiliates, LLC, Charleston Surgery Center, LP, and Laura Bilancione, RN ("Settling Defendants"). Settling Defendants deny liability of any kind or nature. Petitioner represents that he is Martha Preston's husband.

Settling Defendants have offered to pay the sum of One Million and no/100 Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) to the Petitioner to resolve any and all claims.

Of the total One Million and no/100 Dollars (\$1,000,000.00), the Petitioner has agreed to pay an attorney's fee in the amount of Four Hundred Thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$400,000.00), representing forty percent (40%) of the total sum, plus costs of litigation in the



amount of Eleven Thousand Four Hundred Twenty-Eight and 52/100 Dollars (\$11,428.52). All sums set forth herein constitute damages on account of personal injuries arising from an occurrence within the meaning of § 104(a)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended. Petitioner seeks to allocate the proceeds as follows: thirty-five percent (35%) to the loss of consortium claim, fifty-five percent (55%) to the wrongful death claim, and ten percent (10%) to the survival claim.

This settlement is only as to the Settling Defendants, and is not a settlement or release applicable to any other potentially liable party.



Plaintiff Willie Preston, individually and as the Personal Representative of the Estate of Martha Preston, through his attorney, respectfully submits Plaintiff's Memorandum of Law in Opposition to Defendant Coastal Anesthesia Associates, LLC's ("Coastal") Motion to Dismiss for Lack of Subject Matter Jurisdiction, or in the Alternative, to Set Aside Entry of Default.

INTRODUCTION

Plaintiff pursuant to Rule 4 of the South Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure (SCRPC) served his Summons and Complaint on Defendant Coastal. Coastal failed to answer in a timely fashion and in its late Answer did not allege insufficiency of service of process. In an effort to remedy its failure to contest sufficiency of process, thereby waiving such an objection, Coastal alleges for the first time in its Motion to Dismiss for Lack of Subject Matter Jurisdiction there was improper service of Plaintiff's Notice of Intent to File Suit and Summons and moved in the Alternative to Set aside Entry of Default.

Neither improper service nor compliance with South Carolina's Notice of Intent statute affects this Court's subject matter jurisdiction. Further, any alleged non-compliance with South Carolina's Notice of Intent Statute has no bearing on Coastal's failure to respond timely to Plaintiff's Summons and Complaint. Because Coastal waived its Rule 12 defenses based on lack of improper service, it is prohibited from using this defense as grounds for dismissal or to set aside entry of default. Accordingly, this Court should deny Defendant's Motion and Enter Default Judgment against Coastal and in enter judgment favor of Plaintiff.

FACTS

Plaintiff Willie Preston filed a Notice of Intent to File suit against Surgical Care Affiliates, LLC; Charleston Surgery Center, L.P.; Nurse Doe; ABC Anesthesia Group; and Christine Thompson, MD on November 9, 2012. *See* Notice of Intent to File Suit, attached as **Ex. A**. On April 1, 2013, the parties held a pre-suit mediation. In that mediation, Attorney Jamie Hood appeared on behalf of Christine Thompson, MD. Plaintiff believed Mr. Hood also appeared on behalf of Coastal Anesthesia Associates, as he later identified ABC Anesthesia Group as Coastal, and no one at mediation indicated that Coastal was not present. *See* Affidavit of Chad McGowan, attached as **Ex. B**.

After an unsuccessful pre-suit mediation, Mr. Hood declined to accept service on behalf of Coastal. **Ex. B**. Accordingly, on May 24, 2013, Plaintiff filed a Summons and Complaint against all Defendants, and served Coastal's Registered Agent, Randall Kerns at the address stated on the South Carolina Secretary of State's website. *See* Summons and Complaint attached as **Exhibit C**; Registered Agent Information attached as **Exhibit D**; and Proof of Service, attached as **Exhibit E**. Thirty-days passed without Coastal answering or otherwise appearing in the case. The Parties participated in mediation on September 23, 2014. During mediation, Joe Costi, an

insurance adjuster for the malpractice carrier for Defendant Charleston Surgical Center called Chad McGowan, Plaintiff's counsel, and stated that Coastal was in default. **Ex. B.** Plaintiff subsequently filed an Application for Default, which was sent on September 24, 2013, and filed by the Clerk of Court on September 26, 2013. See Public Records Index attached as **Exhibit F.** Mr. Hood apparently filed an Answer on Coastal's behalf on September 23, 2013, but Plaintiff did not receive the Answer and was not aware it had been sent until September 27, 2013. See **Ex. B** and Coastal's Answer attached as **Exhibit G.** In its Answer, Coastal did not allege that it had not been properly served with Plaintiff's Complaint.

ARGUMENT

1. Any Alleged Failure to Comply with South Carolina Code § 15-79-125 Does Not Affect This Court's Subject Matter Jurisdiction and Is Not Properly Before This Court on a Motion to Set Aside Entry of Default

Coastal argues this Court lacks subject matter jurisdiction over the Complaint because Plaintiff failed to serve Coastal with a Notice of Intent to File Suit and because Coastal did not participate in the Notice of Intent Process. Subject matter jurisdiction is "the power of a court to hear and determine cases of the general class to which the proceedings in question belong. *Dove v. GoldKist, Inc.*, 314 S.C. 234, 442 S.E.2d 598 (1994) (internal citation omitted). Tort suits are within the circuit court's jurisdiction. See *Sabb v. South Carolina State Univ.*, 350 S.C. 416, 567 S.E.2d 231 (2002). Because Plaintiff's Complaint, on its face, alleges a tort, as required under the statute, it is not subject to dismissal for lack of subject matter jurisdiction. *Id.*

In *Ross v. Waccamaw Community Hospital*, 404 S.C. 56, 744 S.E.2d 547 (2013), the South Carolina Supreme Court, noted that the pre-suit notice of intent requirements of S.C. Code § 15-79-125 were "not intended to place limitations on the circuit court's subject matter jurisdiction. Indeed, the plain language subsection (D) refutes such an interpretation, as it

unambiguously acknowledges the circuit court's jurisdiction to enforce that section's provisions without limitation. . .” The *Ross* court also noted that “statutes in derogation of the common law are to be strictly construed. Under this rule, a statute restricting the common law will not be extended beyond the clear intent of the legislature. Statutes subject to this rule include those which limit a claimant’s right to bring suit.” *Id.* (internal citations and quotations omitted) (emphasis added). Had the legislature intended dismissal for lack of subject matter jurisdiction to be the remedy for failure to comply with the requirements of S.C. Code § 15-79-125, it could have expressly provided this remedy, but failed to do so. Accordingly, Coastal’s argument that Plaintiff failed to comply with the Notice of Intent Process is not properly before the Court. Rather, it is an improper attempt to argue the merits of the underlying lawsuit after the entry of default.

However, any alleged deficiencies in compliance with the Notice of Intent statute are harmless error as Coastal had an opportunity to meaningfully participate in pre-suit mediation. Plaintiff filed its Notice of Intent on November 9, 2012, which named all Defendants, including “ABC Anesthesia Group.” **Ex. A.** On April 1, 2013, the parties participated in a pre-suit mediation with Tom Wills serving as mediator. Both Coastal and Dr. Thompson’s attorney from the Hood Law Firm participated by telephone. **Ex. B.** At no point in the mediation did anyone state that Coastal was not present or represented. **Ex. B.** Subsequent to the unsuccessful mediation, Jamie Hood, from the Hood Law Firm identified ABC Anesthesia Group as Coastal, but declined to accept service of the Summons and Complaint on Coastal’s behalf. **Ex. B.** Mr. Hood, however, did prepare and file the Answer filed by Coastal.

2. Coastal Has Waived Any Arguments that It was Not Properly Served

Coastal also argues that this Court lacks Subject Matter Jurisdiction to hear Plaintiff's claims because it was not served properly with Plaintiff's Summons and Complaint. Def.'s Mot. to Dismiss ¶ 1, ¶ 3. Coastal is erroneously melding an argument of service into one of subject matter jurisdiction. Coastal waived any objections to improper service by failing to raise these objections in its Answer to Plaintiff's Complaint or in a timely motion made pursuant to Rule 12, SCRPC. Furthermore, Plaintiff appropriately served the Summons and Complaint on Coastal.

Coastal's objections to service are untimely and procedurally improper. Coastal filed an Answer to Plaintiff's Complaint on September 23, 2013. Coastal responded to every paragraph of the Complaint and asserted several affirmative defenses but did not assert a defense or objection based on alleged improper service. Ex. G. Additionally, Coastal did not file a motion to dismiss based on improper service prior to answering the Complaint. See Rule 12(b), SCRPC (permitting pre-answer motion asserting various defenses). For an improper service defense and several other defenses that may be raised in a pre-answer motion, failure to raise the defense in a pre-answer motion or in the answer results in waiver. Rule 12(h)(1), SCRPC. As a result, Coastal has waived any objection to the service it has received in this case. See *Garner v. Houck*, 312 S.C. 481, 435 S.E.2d 847 (1993) (concluding defendants "waived improper service as a defense to this action by their failure to raise the issue in their answers"); *Unisun Insurance v. Hawkins*, 342 S.C. 537, 541 S.E.2d 559, 561 (Ct. App. 2000).

The fact that Coastal has waived its ability to make a motion to dismiss pursuant to Rule 12(b), SCRPC, is perhaps why it frames its motion as one to Dismiss for Lack of Subject Matter Jurisdiction, which can be contested at any point in litigation. However, even if the Court finds that Plaintiff failed to properly serve Coastal with the Notice of Intent or Summons and

Complaint, improper service does not affect this Court's Subject Matter Jurisdiction. See *Mims ex rel. Mims v. Babcock Center, Inc.*, 399 S.C. 341, 347, 732 S.E.2d 395, 398 (2012) ("Moreover we note that the failure of proper service does not affect the court's subject matter jurisdiction in any event."); *Skinner v. Westinghouse Elec. Corp.*, 380 S.C. 91, 93, 668 S.E.2d 795, 796 (2008) (holding the circuit court erred in ruling it lacked subject matter jurisdiction where the alleged error concerned improper service.).

Nonetheless, Plaintiff's service on Coastal was proper. Rule 4, SCRPC, "confers personal jurisdiction on the court and assures the defendant of reasonable notice of the action." *Mull v. Ridgeland Realty, LLC*, 387 S.C. 479, 485, 693 S.E.2d 27, 30 (Ct. App. 2010) (quoting *Roche v. Young Bros., Inc. of Florence*, 318 S.C. 207, 209, 456 S.E.2d 897, 899 (1995)). Fundamentally, the objective of service is "to give notice to the defendant corporation of the proceedings against it." *Mull*, 387 S.C. at 485, 693 S.E.2d at 30 (quoting *Burris Chem., Inc. v. Daniel Constr. Co.*, 251 S.C. 483, 487, 163 S.E.2d 618, 620 (1968)). Accordingly, South Carolina courts have "never required exacting compliance with the rules to effect service of process" so long as the defending party was on notice of the plaintiff's claims. *Colleton Preparatory Acad., Inc. v. Beazer East, Inc.*, 223 F.R.D. 401, 404 (D.S.C. 2004) (quoting *Roche*, 318 S.C. at 209-10, 456 S.E.2d at 899).

Corporations, like Coastal, may be served by delivering the summons and complaint to "an officer, a managing or general agent, or to any other agent authorized by appointment or by law to receive service of process." Rule 4(d)(3), SCRPC. Corporations, like individuals, may be served by certified mail. Rule 4(d)(8), SCRPC. Plaintiff met all of Rule 4's requirements for serving a corporation by certified mail. Plaintiff's mailing was addressed to Randall Kerns, whom Coastal has identified as its registered agent for service. Plaintiff's mailing included a

request for return receipt as required by Rule 4(d)(8). By complying with all rules for certified mail service, Plaintiff is entitled to a presumption that service was proper. *Graham Law Firm, P.A. v. Makawi*, 396 S.C. 290, 295, 721 S.E.2d 430, 433 (2012) (quoting *Roche*, 318 S.C. at 211, 456 S.E.2d at 900). If permitted to attack service for the purpose of avoiding default or dismissing Plaintiff's suit, Coastal bears the burden of presenting evidence sufficient to overcome this presumption.

Coastal argues that service was improper because Plaintiff "attempted to serve . . . Jody Hawkins." Def.'s Mot. to Dismiss ¶ 12. However, it is clear from the certified mail receipt and accompanying cover letter that service was addressed to Randall Kerns, Coastal's registered agent for service. Jody Hawkins signed the certified mail document, expressly representing herself as Randall Kerns's agent. Coastal bears the burden of establishing that Jody Hawkins was an "unauthorized person." *Makawi*, 396 S.C. at 295, 721 S.E.2d at 433 (quoting Rule 4(d)(8), SCRPC).

While Coastal attempts to meet its burden of showing improper service with the affidavits of Dr. Kerns and Wendy Sanders¹, Coastal makes no effort to explain why Ms. Hawkins expressly represented herself as Dr. Kerns's agent when accepting Plaintiff's certified mailing. This is perhaps because Ms. Hawkins is an agent of Dr. Kerns. It appears Ms. Hawkins has worked at Charleston Surgery Center for over 14 years: *See Linked In Profile for Jennifer Hawkins*, attached as **Exhibit H**. The address provided on the Secretary of State's website for Mr. Kerns also is the same as that of Charleston Surgery Center. **Ex. D**; Charleston Surgery Center-Directions & More, <http://www.charlestonsurgerycenter.com/Directionsandmore>

¹ Plaintiff has not had an opportunity to explore the claims made in the affidavits Coastal submitted in support of its motion and should be given an opportunity to conduct discovery on this matter to the extent the court considers the affidavits in ruling on the motion. *Makawi*, 396 S.C. at 299, 721 S.E.2d at 435.

(accessed Dec. 16, 2013). Nowhere in Mr. Kerns's affidavit, or in any affidavit presented by the Defendants does Mr. Kerns state that he did not receive actual notice of the Summons and Complaint. Further, the insurance adjuster for Coastal called counsel for Plaintiff and stated that he was in default, implying that he had actual notice and time to reply within the time frames provided by the South Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure. **Ex. B.**

Coastal's current efforts to elevate the form of Rule 4 above the Rule's substantive intent of providing notice is inconsistent with South Carolina's established precedents, which refuse to demand exacting compliance with service rules where the party served clearly had notice of the claims against it.

3. Coastal Cannot Show Good Cause Warranting Relief from Entry of Default

Rule 12(a) of the South Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure provides, "A defendant shall serve his answer within 30 days after the service of the complaint upon him . . ." Coastal failed to answer within 30 days of service, and default was entered. Rule 55(c) of the South Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure provides, "For good cause shown the court may set aside an entry of default. . ." In deciding whether "good cause" exists, the offering of a valid reason for the default is necessary before the court may consider the application of Rule 55(c)'s, SCRP, three factors to set aside the default. Rule 55(c), SCRPC, requires the party seeking relief to provide an explanation for default.² Upon such explanation, the Court should consider the following factors: 1) the timing of the defendant's motion for relief; 2) whether the defendant has a meritorious defense; and 3) the degree of prejudice to the plaintiff if the relief is granted.

² Although the Court has entered default judgment against Coastal, Plaintiff argues the less stringent "good cause" analysis under Rule 55 as Plaintiff did not provide Defendant with notice of its application for default because when Plaintiff mailed its Application, it had not yet received Coastal's answer. See Nov. 26, 2013 Correspondence from Chad McGowan, attached as **Exhibit I**.

Sundown Operating Co., Inc. v. Intedger Indus., Inc., 383 S.C. 602, 608, 682 S.E.2d 885, 888 (2009) (citing *Wham v. Shearson Lehman Bros., Inc.*, 298 S.C. 462, 465, 381 S.E.2d 499, 501-02 (Ct. App. 1989)).

Coastal cannot set forth any valid reason for failing to respond to Plaintiff's Summons and Complaint, because Coastal failed to argue improper service in its Answer and has waived that defense. See Rule 12(h) SCRCP; 5A Charles Alan Wright & Arthur R. Miller, Federal Practice and Procedure § 1391 (1990) (Rule 12(h)(1) "advises a litigant to exercise great diligence in challenging personal jurisdiction, venue or service of process. If he wishes to raise [any] of these defenses he must do so at the time he makes his first significant defensive move"). Coastal is estopped from arguing that it was not properly served in the present motion because it failed to raise that defense in its first appearance, its Answer. See, e.g., *Strickland v. Consolidated Energy Products Company*, 274 S.C. 554, 265 S.E.2d 682 (1980) (upholding trial court's finding that any defect in service of process was waived by defendant's appearance requesting to be allowed to file a later answer after the entry of default); *Myers v. Brown*, 143 Vt. 159, 460 A.2d 254 (Vt. 1983) (Where defendant maintained silence regarding defective service until after entry of default, trial court properly denied motion to set aside default because defective service was a procedural shortcoming waived by defendant's failure to timely raise his objections.); *In re Worldwide Web. Sys., Inc. v. Feltman*, 328 F.3d 1291, 1300 (11th Cir.2003) ("[W]hen a party asserts a Rule 60(b) challenge to a default judgment, absent a compelling showing that we should make an exception to his rule, challenges under rule 60(b)(4) on insufficient service of process grounds are waived if not squarely raised.") (internal citation omitted). Because Coastal has waived any defenses of improper service of process, it has no legitimate reason for failing to respond to Plaintiff's Complaint.

Coastal additionally alleges that good cause exists to set aside default because Plaintiff failed to comply with the pre-suit mediation requirements of South Carolina Code s 15-79-125. However, whether or not Coastal participated in the pre-suit mediation process has no bearing on the fact that Coastal was properly served with a Summons and Complaint and failed to answer it in a timely fashion. This Court should closely examine a defendant's reason for the default to ascertain whether a defendant was "diligent in pursuit of [the] matter" before the entry of default. *Auto Equipment Distributors, Inc. v. Petroleum Equipment and Service, Inc.*, 361 S.E. 2d 895, 896-897 (N.C. Ct. App. 1987). The Court's analysis should be on the Coastal's action before the default. *See Ricks vs. Weinrauch*, 293 S.C. 372, 374, 360 S.E. 2d 535, 536 (Ct. App. 1987). Where the default is a defendant's fault, the court should not reopen the case. *See Brown v. Lifford*, 524 S.E.2d 587, 590 (N.C. Ct. App. 2000) (noting that the "degree of attention or inattention shown by the [d]efendant is 'particularly compelling' as to whether the Defendant was diligent"). In the present case, the fact that Coastal has presented a potential defense to Plaintiff's claims has no bearing on its failure to file a timely answer to Plaintiff's Complaint.


Because Coastal has not met its initial burden of providing a valid reason to justify "good cause," the Court should deny Coastal's motion and need not reach the remaining Rule (55)(c) factors. *See Sundown*, 383 S.C. at 608, 681, S.E.2d at 88 ("The trial court need not make specific findings of fact for each factor if there is sufficient evidentiary support on the record for the finding of the lack of good cause."); *Regions Bank v. Owens*, 402 S.C. 642, 649, 741 S.E.2d 51, 55 (Ct. App. 2004) ("[b]ecause we find the master did not err in findings Owens failed to show good cause for failing to answer the complaint, we need not consider the Wham factors.")

4. Coastal Is Not Entitled to Relief from Default Judgment

A party seeking relief from default judgment must meet the standard provided by Rule 60(b), SCRC. In the absence of fraud, a void judgment, or newly discovered evidence, relief from a final judgment may be granted only with a showing of "mistake, inadvertence, surprise, or excusable neglect." Rule 60(b)(1), SCRC. "The movant in a Rule 60(b) motion has the burden of presenting evidence proving the facts essential to entitle him to relief." *Rodriguez v. Gutierrez*, 391 S.C. 323, 331, 705 S.E.2d 94, 99 (Ct. App. 2011) (quoting *Bowers v. Bowers*, 304 S.C. 65, 67, 403 S.E.2d 127, 129 (Ct.App.1991)). In the present case, Coastal has not and cannot meet this burden. Coastal again alleges only that it was not properly served with the Complaint, a defense that it has clearly waived, and that Plaintiff failed to comply with the requirements of S.C. Code 15-79-125, which, at best, is an affirmative defense to the underlying claim and not properly before the Court when Coastal has no valid reason for filing a late answer.

CONCLUSION

Because Coastal has not presented any good cause to warrant the set aside the entry of default and because Coastal has waived any and all defenses, Plaintiff respectfully requests that the Court deny Coastal's Motion, enter default judgment, and set a damage hearing to determine the amount of Mr. Preston's damages.

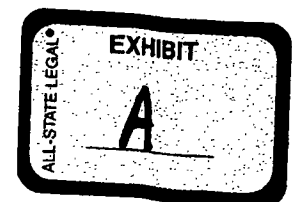

AFFIDAVIT OF CHAD MCGOWAN

I, Chad A. McGowan, being duly sworn, depose and state as follows:

- 1) I am counsel for Plaintiff, over 18, and make this affidavit on personal knowledge.
- 2) This case involves an overdose of Dilaudid given to one Martha Preston that resulted in her death. Christine Thompson, MD was the anesthesiologist for the procedure that led to this death.
- 3) On August 22, 2012, I wrote to Dr. Thompson regarding the death of Mrs. Preston. EXHIBIT 1. In that letter, I asked a few questions and advised that many doctors receiving such a letter contact their malpractice carrier who would then assign an attorney.
- 4) Shortly thereafter, I received word from Jamie Hood, Esq., that he had been assigned to handle the claim by MedPro, the malpractice insurance carrier for Dr. Thompson and her



practice group. I later learned that the adjuster for the insurance carrier was Joe Costy, who is based out of North Carolina.


- 5) Around November 9, 2012, I filed a Notice of Intent to File Suit, 12-CP-10-7413, which named all Defendants and "ABC Anesthesia Group." The true name of the anesthesia group was not knowable based on all of the information then available. Also listed in the NOI was "Nurse Doe" as the true identity of Nurse Doe was also unknowable at that time. See, EXHIBIT 2- First Page of NOI.
- 6) The NOI led to the attorney appearances of Jack Gresh, Esq and James Hood, Esq.
- 7) On April, 2013 the parties participated in a pre-suit mediation with Tom Wills serving as mediator. Dr. Thompson's attorney from the Hood Law Firm participated by telephone.
- 8) It was Plaintiff's impression that Dr. Thompson's attorney was also appearing on behalf of "ABC Anesthesia Practice," and no one expressed that the practice was not present or represented. See, EXHIBIT 3.
- 9) After the failed initial mediation, I asked of both Messrs. Gresh and Hood for the proper name of the Defendants ABC Anesthesia Group and Nurse Doe. Mr. Hood identified "Coastal Anesthesia Associates" ("Coastal") as the name of the Anesthesia Group. See, EXHIBIT 4 (email exchange). Additionally, Mr. Gresh identified Nurse Doe. At no time did anyone claim that Coastal Anesthesia Associates did not participate in the NOI process.
- 10) On May 24, 2013, I filed the Summons and Complaint, 13-CP-10-3054, EXHIBIT 5 (Summons only), substituting in the appropriate names of the Defendants. I then sent Acknowledgements of Service on Messrs. Gresh and Hood. Mr. Hood acknowledged service only for Dr. Thompson. As a result, we served by registered mail, return receipt

requested, Coastal's Registered Agent, Randall Kern. EXHIBIT 6. One Jody Hawkins evidently signed for Mr. Kerns on July 8, 2013.

- 11) Some discovery happened thereafter, which then led to mediation on September 23, 2013, again with Tom Wills. While the Hood Law Firm was aware of the mediation and welcome to participate, neither Dr. Thompson, nor Coastal chose to participate.
- 12) During that mediation, while I was sitting in Tom Will's office, Joe Costy of MedPro called my cell phone. That conversation started with Joe Costy telling me he was the adjuster for Coastal and Dr. Thompson. Joe Costy specifically stated "I am in default." Never did Mr. Costy state that Coastal did not go through the NOI process, that service was improper, or that this was anything other than his mistake. In fact, Mr. Costy said he hoped that we got fully paid by other defendants in the case.
- 13) On September 24, we mailed for filing the Application for Default Judgment. That was filed by the Clerk on September 26.
- 14) The day after my phone conversation with Mr. Costy, (September 23, 2013), Mr. Hood mailed his belated Answer, which I assume was filed shortly thereafter. In that Answer, never did Coastal allege:
 - a. Insufficiency of Service of Process
 - b. Failure to Comply with the Notice of Intent Statute
 - c. A lack of subject matter jurisdiction.
- 15) It is notable that:
 - a. Never did Mr. Costy claim that service was improper or that the Notice of Intent process was not properly complied with;

- b. Never did Mr. Costy state that the failure to answer timely was anything other than his mistake;
- c. Mr. Hood and his firm were the attorneys who attended the pre-suit mediation by phone on behalf of the anesthesiologist;
- d. Mr. Hood and his firm refused to acknowledge service on behalf of Coastal (which was of course, their right);
- e. Mr. Hood and his firm ultimately appeared and filed an Answer on behalf of Coastal;
- f. Never did Coastal's Answer allege insufficient service or a failure to participate in the pre-suit process, or a lack of subject matter jurisdiction in the Circuit Court;
- g. Mostly likely, Mr. Costy's file will include all of the pleadings and when they were received starting from the August, 22, 2012 initial letter to Dr. Thompson.

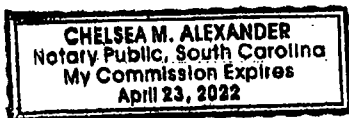

Dear Dr. Thompson:

I am investigating the death of Mrs. Preston from a drug overdose after a surgery occurring at the Charleston Surgery Center on April 18, 2012.

I write to you because the anesthesiologist is listed as "C. Thompson" (page CSC-22), and you are the only C. Thompson, with a specialty in anesthesiology anywhere close to Charleston. I enclose a copy of the medical records.

The focus of my inquiry is not on the anesthesiology, but rather the PACU orders and care. I would like to speak with you about a particular order and whether a certain order was made by you or someone else. Not to beat around the bush, I need to know:

- 1) Who wrote the Post-Op Anesthesia Orders (CSC-024)
- 2) Who wrote the "or 4 mg IV" after the Dilaudid order.

I generally find it best to make direct inquiries of individuals or their attorneys to get to the bottom of things sooner rather than later. I would hope that you would take this letter in the spirit in which it is intended—a method to simply figure out the facts.

Generally speaking, physicians who receive a letter such as this contact their malpractice carrier and an attorney is assigned to help them even when no one is alleging a physician did anything wrong. I would welcome a call from you or your chosen counsel at your earliest convenience.

22. Any punitive damages awarded in this case would be subject to the limitations described in S.C. Code §15-32-530.



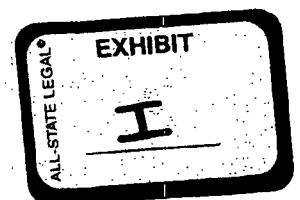
Dear Judge Nicholson:

12 or 60?

13 MR. MCGOWAN: We don't think it matters. It's
14 probably legitimately 55 --

15 THE COURT: I think it's probably legitimate
16 because I really think -- I've heard several of these
17 things and the issue has really come up -- you know, the
18 statute was passed years ago where you had the judgment
19 roll and you go in and write it in. But we don't have
20 that anymore. It's all electronically. But to my
21 knowledge, some lawyers have what they refer to as an
22 entry of -- of default and the clerk signs it. But
23 there's no approved court administration form that I
24 know of.

25 I'm of the opinion that this should not say

3 Now, you've got a subject matter jurisdiction,

8 THE COURT: Let me just ask you a simple
9 question. I've heard a lot of cases where they come in
10 and the plaintiff hadn't done that so the court's -- the

12 don't understand why you say -- I just don't see where
13 the subject matter jurisdiction has anything to do with
14 that statute. If they don't comply -- and under your
15 argument, the court could never dismiss the case because

20 I just -- I'll hear you on that argument, but
21 it just doesn't make good sense to me.

22 MR. HOOD: I understand. It -- and, your
23 Honor, it is a little bit confusing, partially because
24 of the drafting of the statute.

25 But as to that specific issue, I think that the

7 the statutory scheme, once you file your next suit that
8 gets a new cause of action number, at that point, I
9 don't believe that there is subject matter jurisdiction.
10 And the only way to raise it is to bring it to the
11 court's attention to allow the court to make that
12 determination, because I do think --

13 THE COURT: If the court doesn't have subject
14 matter jurisdiction, they can't even hear it. That's
15 your problem. I think the legislature is telling the
16 parties that if you don't do it, you're subject to have
17 your case dismissed. That's the intent of the statute.
18 It's not the subject matter to -- for taking away
19 circuit court's subject matter jurisdiction on the case.

20 MR. HOOD: Interestingly, in one of the cases
21 cited by the Plaintiff though, the Ross versus Waccamaw
22 Community Hospital case, which is the Supreme Court case
23 from 2013, the Court does talk about the issue of
24 subject matter jurisdiction related to this notice of
25 intent provision. And the reason I think it's

8 So I thought it was interesting that when
9 they -- they held in Judge Kittredge's Opinion --

12 Section 15-79-125 was not intended to place limitations
13 on the court's subject matter jurisdiction.

14 Goes on to say: Thus, we hold that failing to
15 comply with the 120-day statutory time period is a
16 nonjurisdictional procedural defect.

17 I interpret that to mean that there can exist
18 jurisdictional procedural defects in -- where a party
19 fails to comply with the procedural requirements and
20 pursues a summons and complaint --

21 THE COURT: Well, that might go to some type of
22 *in personam* jurisdiction over the parties but not the
23 court. I mean, if I don't have subject matter
24 jurisdiction, I can't even hear your motion today.
25 Period: Subject matter jurisdiction means the court

16 default. So there's no -- no prejudice because of the
17 timing component.

16 liability component.

17 Separately on the prejudice issue, from a
18 timing standpoint, there's been no issue with regards to
19 availability, evidence, destruction of evidence,
20 anything of that nature because of the vicarious nature
21 of the claim. The parties who are involved have been
22 involved, and the case has been proceeding since May of
23 2013.

24 Also, from a -- sort of an ends-of-justice
25 approach in this case, if a plaintiff -- if a plaintiff

8 because then she would be stuck waiting around for

11 It would also potentially give rise to a
12 default judgment for a plaintiff against a defendant
13 whose only theory is vicarious liability. So there
14 would be a presumption -- there have to be presumed
15 negligence on the part of the agent in -- through the
16 mechanism of default for which that entity would
17 ultimately bear responsibility and potentially have to
18 ultimately pay. The problem with that is, then, if that
19 entity is paying as a result of the alleged negligence
20 of the doctor, then there's potential ramifications for
21 the doctor being reported to the --

22 THE COURT: That's a prejudice to you, not the
23 Plaintiff.

24 MR. HOOD: Excuse me?

25 THE COURT: That's a prejudice to you, not

2 MR. HOOD: Well, it is --

3 THE COURT: That addresses the ends of justice
4 part..

7 MR. HOOD: By way of prejudice, your Honor, we
8 don't believe that there is any demonstrable prejudice
9 to the Plaintiff, and we would respectfully ask the
10 Court to set aside the default, allow us to file an
11 answer, and, you know, let the case be resolved on its
12 merits.

13 THE COURT: Okay. Thank you very much,
14 Mr. Hood. Let me ask you one last question.

15 MR. HOOD: Yes, sir.

16 THE COURT: What does Coastal Anesthesia say
17 about the summons and complaint? You got any
18 affidavits -- you may have filed them. I haven't
19 looked. Do they say they got it? They didn't get it?
20 Did it go in the trash can? What happened to it?

21 MR. HOOD: It was received but the presumption
22 was that Dr. Thompson is defending the case and she's
23 handling it, taking care of it, because the case dealt
24 with her.

25 We do have the affidavit of Dr. Kerns, I

1 believe is his name, is in there. And we don't dispute
2 that this arrived at the location on September -- or,
3 excuse me, on July 8th. It eventually would have made
4 it's way back to -- back to the doctor. The point
5 being, that sort of the official nature of being served
6 with the summons and complaint was -- was lost --

7 THE COURT: -- was defective to begin with?

8 MR. HOOD: Yes, sir.

9 THE COURT: Okay. Thank you very much.

10 Yes, sir?

11 MR. MCGOWAN: Couple of things, your Honor.

12 Chad McGowan with the Plaintiff.

13 Rule 12(h) says if you don't say "insufficient
14 service of process" in your answer, it's waived. They
15 didn't mention it. They didn't amend to mention it.
16 Under operation of law, any claim of service was
17 insufficient is waived. Rule 12(h)(1) is very clear in
18 that regard. And the reason they didn't assert that to
19 begin with is because it's not true. Service was good.
20 Ms. Hawkins will tell you that she has been working at
21 the surgery center for 14 years or so, and her standard
22 routine practice is to sign for all the certified mail
23 and deliver to whom it is addressed. She can't
24 necessarily remember this instant, but will say that her
25 normal practice is to give it to the -- in the chair or

7 Dr. Thompson. So Dr. Thompson got involved with Med
8 Pro, her carrier, and, in fact, had been noticed of this
9 since September of 2012. Med Pro, Mr. Kosty (phonetic),
10 hired Mr. Hood to defend it, and Mr. Kosty actually
11 called me the very day of the mediation and said, I'm in
12 default. I never assigned it to counsel.

13 Without a good cause, there is no need to talk
14 about prejudice, there's no need to talk about
15 meritorious defenses, or anything else. We think the
16 law is very clear on that. Their only alleged good
17 cause was insufficient service of process of which,
18 first of all, is waived under Rule 12(h); and second of
19 all, as a matter of fact, they did get --

20 THE COURT: Why do you think it's waived?

21 MR. MCGOWAN: Because Rule 12(h) says it. It
22 says: The defense of lack of jurisdiction over the
23 person, improper venue, insufficiency of process,
24 insufficiency of service of process, or that another
25 action is pending between the same parties for the same

7 situation, and waive it. Now, if he had answered,
8 et cetera, et cetera, et cetera, and didn't raise it, I
9 would agree with you.

10 MR. MCGOWAN: He did answer.

11 THE COURT: Pardon?

12 MR. MCGOWAN: He did answer.

13 THE COURT: Well, you can't -- it's not a
14 legitimate answer. I mean, normally when you file a
15 motion to be relieved of the judgment or separate entry
16 of default, you normally do file an answer. And I don't
17 know if that's by a rule or that's just common practice.
18 But the answer right now is a nullity because he doesn't
19 have the right to answer without leave of court and
20 getting it set aside. So I'm not sure I follow your
21 waiver argument.

22 MR. MCGOWAN: There's the Strickland versus
23 Consolidated Energy case which says that if you answer
24 at any point, late or otherwise --

25 THE COURT: I agree. But his answer is not

1 valid. He didn't have the right to answer without leave
2 of court or your consent --

3 MR. MCGOWAN: Okay.

4 THE COURT: -- is my point to you.

5 MR. MCGOWAN: All right. So then --

6 THE COURT: Is that right, or is that wrong?

7 MR. MCGOWAN: Respectfully, I disagree.

8 THE COURT: I know he filed one. I know he

20 want to hear it. I'm just debating the issue with you.

25 may, as a factual matter, this was good service, and

1 you'll notice nobody ever said -- in fact, Mr. Hood said

3 THE COURT: What's your affidavit say as far as
4 the information you're giving me?

5 MR. MCGOWAN: What do you mean, your Honor?

6 THE COURT: I mean, you're saying -- I assume
7 you're saying she acted as the receptionist for all pf
8 them, took the mail, and distributed it --

9 MR. MCGOWAN: We address the green card to the
10 agent of service, Randall Kern, at that address, which
11 is on the Secretary of State's website.

12 THE COURT: Right.

13 MR. MCGOWAN: She signed for it. She then gave
14 it to Dr. Kern.

15 THE COURT: So you think she had the apparent
16 authority to do it?

17 MR. MCGOWAN: That and actual authority
18 because, according to her, she'd been there for 14
19 years, and that's the way she'd done it every time.

20 THE COURT: But what are you presenting to the
21 Court for this hearing to say that?

22 MR. MCGOWAN: The witness, Ms. Hawkins.

23 THE COURT: Okay. You got an affidavit from
24 her?

25 MR. MCGOWAN: No, but I have the witness right

1 here, your Honor.

2 THE COURT: Well, I mean --

3 MR. MCGOWAN: She's not my witness. I had to
4 subpoena her to be here because they produced an
5 affidavit, and I subpoenaed her to be here in front of
6 you.

7 THE COURT: Well, I mean, so you're going to
8 need to take testimony on that issue?

8 THE COURT: -- (h)(1)?

9 MR. MCGOWAN: Yes, sir.

10 THE COURT: All right. Let me find it and
11 I'll -- I want to see what you're saying, (h)(1). So
12 your waiver arguments they have answered. So they
13 waived it.

14 MR. MCGOWAN: Any general appearance of any
15 kind is a waiver according to the Supreme Court. And
16 there's a case directly on point on that.

17 THE COURT: Well, isn't that -- aren't most of
18 those cases about *in personam* jurisdiction where you --
19 somebody from out of state can come in and make a
20 special -- you're talking about special appearances, I
21 presume; right?

22 MR. MCGOWAN: No -- no. This is the Strickland
23 versus Consolidated Energy case, 274 South Carolina 554.

24 THE COURT: You got a copy of it?

25 MR. MCGOWAN: I do, sir.

6 THE COURT: So your position is that filing a
7 motion to satisfy the default is a general appearance?

8 MR. MCGOWAN: Well, my position is, when you
9 file an answer before --

10 THE COURT: I've already covered that argument
11 with you. I just don't buy that because I don't think
12 the answer is even effective. It's not valid, and it's
13 an improper answer --

14 MR. MCGOWAN: Fair enough.

15 THE COURT: -- because he didn't have a right
16 to do that --

17 MR. MCGOWAN: Fair enough.

18 THE COURT: -- without your consent or without
19 leave of court. Okay?

20 So my next question is: What is a general
21 appearance on your case?

22 MR. MCGOWAN: It is that if a defendant by his
23 appearance asks any relief which can only be granted by
24 the hypothesis that the Court has jurisdiction of his
25 person, then he has made a general appearance.

1 And in this case that I just handed up,
2 Strickland, it was about setting aside a default for
3 meritorious reasons, good cause, et cetera.

4 THE COURT: Right.

5 MR. MCGOWAN: So that is by definition a
6 general -- a general appearance to waive under 12(h).
7 We still respect it, and we think the answer is as well.

8 But even if you don't think there's a waiver,
9 Ms. Hawkins did, in fact, effect good service on the
10 corporation.

11 THE COURT: Well, but the -- the other case
12 says it's got to be in writing, whether she's
13 authorized. She's not even an employee; she's not an
14 agent; she's not connected to corporations. And
15 the -- the case says it's got to be in writing she's
16 authorized to accept mail.

17 MR. MCGOWAN: Judge, they have to show that
18 they didn't actually get it. And because -- here's --
19 here's -- let's assume that we just handed it to
20 Ms. Hawkins and said, Would you please give this to
21 Dr. Kern? She has now become our agent of service
22 because she is the one that served Dr. Kern. And that
23 is totally legitimate because, as a matter of truth and
24 fact in this case, she did give it to Dr. Kern. And
25 she, therefore, was -- personally served Dr. Kern with

1 our summons and complaint because she gave it to him.
2 That's good service. And nobody here has said that
3 Dr. Kern didn't get it, that he didn't know what -- that
4 it was thrown in the garbage. He had it and he did
5 whatever he did with it. So we've got good personal
6 service, precommitting certified mail service.

7 (Respite.)

8 (The judge speaks with the law clerk off the
9 record.)

10 THE COURT: She was an employee of Charleston
11 Surgery Center; right?

12 MR. MCGOWAN: That is a true statement.

13 THE COURT: All right.

14 MR. MCGOWAN: But it's really not the point of
15 the matter because --

16 THE COURT: I'm sorry, what?

17 MR. MCGOWAN: It's really not the point because
18 if she handed it to Dr. Kern, she served it.

19 THE COURT: I understand what you are saying.
20 Okay? Let me just ask you this about your argument that
21 she served him.

22 MR. MCGOWAN: Yes, sir.

23 THE COURT: Okay?

24 Rule 4(c) very specifically says: A party to a
25 lawsuit cannot serve summons and complaints.

1 Now, your argument is saying this lady, who's
2 an employee of Charleston Surgery Center, who is a party
3 to a lawsuit, served another party. The rule very
4 clearly says that can't happen.

5 MR. MCGOWAN: She's not -- she is not
6 Charleston Surgery Center.

7 THE COURT: But she's an employee of Charleston
8 Surgery Center.

9 MR. MCGOWAN: I don't think that matters,
10 Judge. Let's look at the bigger picture. This default
11 rule is designed to encourage defendants to not sit on
12 their rights and do nothing.

13 THE COURT: I understand that.

14 MR. MCGOWAN: But that's exactly what they did
15 here.

16 THE COURT: Okay.

17 MR. MCGOWAN: That's exactly what they did.
18 And then it's incredibly unfair to hold plaintiffs to
19 things, I don't know, like statutes of limitations in
20 saying when the doctor actually got it. He did get it
21 that day. And I assume Mr. Hood will represent to the
22 Court that as a matter of truth and fact, Dr. Kern --

23 THE COURT: I think he said he got it.

24 MR. MCGOWAN: Right.

25 THE COURT: That wasn't the issue.

1 MR. MCGOWAN: So what happened was they screwed
2 this up, and they waited more than six weeks longer than
3 they should have. And that is not good cause under the
4 law. So what you'd be doing is rewarding a doctor or
5 his insurance company -- we don't even know when he sent
6 it to Joe Kosty at Medical Protective. If they got it,
7 then there's clearly no good cause.

8 THE COURT: Well, okay. All right. Anything
9 else?

10 MR. MCGOWAN: No, sir.

11 THE COURT: Appreciate it.

12 Mr. Hood?

13 MR. HOOD: Well, your Honor, I think on
14 the issue of the service through the agent of the

22 forget the doctor's name, the anesthesia you say
23 received it, he just ignored it.

1 clear when someone is negligent and ignoring it, that
2 courts generally don't let them out -- the courts say
3 that's not good cause.

4 MR. HOOD: Right. And in a situation where the
5 conduct is based on the alleged actions of the
6 independent contractor, Dr. Thompson, who is involved,
7 who is defending the case, and who is represented, to
8 him, this issue is her issue and it's being dealt with
9 by her by me.

10 THE COURT: But that's not what the summons and
11 complaint say. I mean, he can read, and I'm sure the
12 Complaint didn't say that.

13 MR. HOOD: Well, I mean, the Complaint -- it
14 does clearly specify it's a claim of vicarious
15 liability.

16 THE COURT: Right.

17 MR. HOOD: And so, when you're not having the
18 formality of being served, you reduce the -- the
19 heightened sensitivity to the delivery of the document.
20 That's why sending it via U.S. mail is not adequate.
21 That's why we require process servers to say, Tag,
22 you're it, or here's a certified letter. You have to
23 sign it meaning that there's an affirmative act
24 acknowledging this very important legal document which
25 we don't have here. Yes, it is a technicality. But so

1 is trying to hold a party in default when their only
2 theory against it is vicarious liability and we still
3 have to litigate the underlying allegations of
4 negligence against the purported agent.

5 So, you -- you know, from his position, the
6 Rules say what the Rules say, and if the Plaintiff wants
7 to declare that there has been some action of -- or some
8 inaction resulting in default because of that -- some
9 technicality, the technicality of the timing
10 requirements, then it's fair for him to rely on a
11 service being effected in accordance with the Rules
12 other than holding someone in default without satisfying
13 Rule 4.

14 And, incidentally, this whole thing came up
15 because the case was being re-meditated and ultimately
16 settled on September 23rd that your Honor approved the
17 settlement of Surgery Center. I didn't attend because
18 my client, the doctor, believes that she did nothing
19 wrong. My client --

20 THE COURT: So the case is still pending
21 against Dr. --

22 MR. HOOD: -- Thompson.

23 THE COURT: -- Thompson.

24 MR. HOOD: Yes, sir. And so we didn't
25 participate --

1 THE COURT: Is it settled against Surgical
2 Care?

3 MR. HOOD: It has.

4 THE COURT: And Charleston Surgery Center?

5 MR. HOOD: It has.

6 THE COURT: Okay.

7 MR. HOOD: And I was informed by one of the
8 other attorneys that the case in its entirety had
9 resolved and the only reason that this case is still
10 ongoing is because of this looming default issue. And I
11 don't think that's just.

12 And so if they have a claim and it's a
13 legitimate one, the evidence will bear it out and the
14 juries will do what they're going to do. But let's at
15 least let it be resolved on the merits for --

16 THE COURT: What about his arguments that she'd
17 waived it by making a general appearance?

20 because I can't do anything or contest anything without
21 leaving something under that theory. The only way for

7 crossed in the mail and I get his paper thereafter. Had
8 I known they were seeking entry of default, I would not
9 have filed an answer. I would have set -- done a motion
10 to set aside entry of default and identified the same
11 bases that I've identified here. I don't entertain
12 making plaintiffs jump through the hoop of personal
13 service if it's not necessary. What you'll see from the
14 papers is that I contacted the Plaintiff and said, Hey,
15 I'm representing Dr. Thompson. Go ahead and send me
16 anything, and I'll accept service of it.

17 And I did. So he doesn't have to pay someone
18 250 bucks to do it. And so I wouldn't -- and I would
19 not simply raise a defense of insufficiency of process
20 if there's no benefit to it, if all it means is the
21 Plaintiff's lawyers got to go out and hire a process
22 server.

23 So, you know, in this case, there's -- there's
24 a whole host --

25 THE COURT: Hold on just a second.

7 applies, not Rule 60. And I'm going to modify that
8 Order that I signed on your behalf, placing them in
9 default, but I think that's an entry of default. And
10 I'm -- I'll make that part of the record as soon as she
11 copies it.

12 Let me say this: I think, number one --
13 Mr. Hood, if you want to take some notes -- I think

13 let me know, and I'll try to modify it if I think it's
14 an appropriate objection. Okay?

15 Thank y'all very much.
