I'm writing on behalf of my son, Justin Whaley Boyd, who was intentionally hit with a car driven by Daydrian Rouse. Justin suffered a traumatic brain injury along with other permanent injuries. I'm opposing his request for bond release and I hope that the court will deny this and any future requests.

After all of this is said and done Daydrian will be free to live out the rest of his life anyway he chooses in a few years, but my son's life has been permanently altered and will never be the same. Justin was a senior in college getting ready to graduate with a computer science degree. He had hopes and dreams of working for Harris Teeter, a company he worked for since his sophomore year in high school.

Daydrian Rouse and his family were ordered by the courts to pay Justin \$20,000.00 to help with his medical bills by January of 2011. To this date Justin has not received the entire amount awarded to him by the court.
