Upon a showing of good cause, a party (or multiple parties if represented by the same counsel) may be granted extensions totaling no more than twenty (20) days during the proceedings before this Court. If multiple extensions are taken within the twenty (20) day cumulative limit, the minimum period that can be requested is five (5) days. . . . Any extension beyond the twenty (20) days . . . will be granted only if extraordinary circumstances such as illness or other circumstances beyond the control of the movant warrant the granting of the extension. The parties are warned that the press of other business is not an extraordinary circumstance which will warrant the granting of an extension. These extensions will generally be granted for no more than ten (10) days.
