Dear Ms. Reeves:

Upon reviewing your initial brief, the following deficiencies have been noted under the South Carolina Appellate Court Rules (SCACR), and any deficiency must be corrected within fifteen (15) days of the date of this letter. Failure to serve and file an initial brief and designation of matter addressing these deficiencies may result in the dismissal of your appeal.

- The document is improperly paginated. Specifically, the pages have not been numbered.
- According to Rule 208(b)(1)(A), (B), (C), (D), and (E), SCACR the Appellant's initial brief shall contain a statement of issues on appeal, a table of contents and cases, a statement of the case, an argument, and a conclusion. The document you filed does not include these items. While your filing does indicate there is a table of contents on the second page, it is not an accurate representation of the contents of your filing.
- Rule 208(b)(4) states that the brief shall also contain references to the transcript, pleadings, orders, exhibits, or other materials which may be included in the record on appeal. Your brief includes no references to any material.

- A proof of service has not been provided. You must serve and file a proof of service for the initial brief and designation of matter substantially in the format shown by Form 7 in Appendix C to part II of the SCACR.
- The document has not been signed as required by Rule 267(b), SCACR.
- Rule 209 requires the designation of matter to set forth specifically what portions of the transcript(s), pleadings, orders, exhibits, or other materials you wish to be included in the record on appeal. This Rule also requires that the designation of matter include a certification signed by the party that the designation contains no matter which is irrelevant to the appeal. The list you include on the second page of your filing labeled as designation is not specific, nor does it include your certification.
