MOTION FOR AN EXTENSION OF TIME
IN WHICH TO FILE THE PETITION FOR WRIT OF
CERTIORARI AND APPENDIX

Counsel for Derrick J. George respectfully requests a **final thirty (30) day extension, until November 11, 2015**, in which to file the petition for writ of certiorari and appendix in this case. This motion is made pursuant to the Order of the South Carolina Supreme Court dated March 18, 2009. This is a third request for an extension. In support of this request, counsel shows:

1. The petition for writ of certiorari and appendix are due to be filed with the Court today. The Court has granted counsel two previous extensions.


2. Counsel for Mr. Derrick J. George respectfully submits that extraordinary circumstances exist which warrant the granting of an additional extension of time. Given the number of extensions previously granted and the order in which counsel attempts to manage her caseload, counsel hopes that no further extension requests will be required.

Counsel filed the brief of respondent on rehearing in the case of The State v. Christopher Broadnax in the Supreme Court on September 17, 2015. Counsel filed the Johnson petition for writ of certiorari and accompanying appendix in the case of Nathaniel Dickson v. State with the Supreme Court on September 16, 2015. Counsel filed the petition for writ of certiorari to the Court of Appeals in the case of The State v. David Rosier in the Supreme Court on September 10, 2015. Counsel filed the petition for writ of certiorari to the Court of Appeals in the case of The State v. Shawn Burris in the Supreme Court on September 4, 2015. Counsel filed the initial brief of appellant and designation of matter in the case of The State v. Johnny Jerome Boyd with the Court of Appeals on September 1, 2015. Counsel filed the petition for writ of certiorari to the Court of Appeals in the case of The State v. Steve Young in the Supreme Court on August 31, 2015. Counsel filed the petition for writ of certiorari to the Court of Appeals in the case of The State v. Daniel Griffin in the Supreme Court on August 31, 2015. Counsel filed the initial brief of appellant and designation of matter in the case of The State v. Corey William Brown with the Court of Appeals on August 26, 2015. Counsel filed the Johnson petition for writ of certiorari and accompanying appendix in the case of Willie James Poole v. State of South Carolina with the Supreme Court on August 17, 2015. Counsel filed the initial brief of appellant and designation of matter in the case of The State v. Michael Antonio Williams with the Court of Appeals on August 11, 2015.

4. Counsel makes this request in good faith and not for purpose of delay.
5. Counsel for the Attorney General's office consents to this request as shown by signature below.


