MOTION FOR AN EXTENSION OF TIME


1. The initial brief of appellant and designation of matter are due to be filed with the Court today. The Court has granted counsel two previous extensions.

Counsel filed petition for writ of certiorari and the accompanying appendix in the case of Ronnie Harris v. The State in the Supreme Court on December 21, 2015. Counsel filed the brief of appellant and designation of matter in the case of The State v. Timothy Crosby in this Court on December 16, 2015. Counsel filed a petition for writ of certiorari to the Court of Appeals in the case of The State v. Alfonzo Alexander in the Supreme Court on December 15, 2015. Counsel filed petition for writ of certiorari and accompanying appendix in the case of Louie Chapman v. The State in the Supreme Court on December 7, 2015. Counsel filed petition for writ of certiorari and the accompanying appendix in the case of Emilio Craig v. The State in the Supreme Court on November 30, 2015. Counsel filed the petition for rehearing in the case of The State v. Wayne Scott in this Court on November 23, 2015. Counsel filed petition for writ of certiorari and the accompanying appendix in the case of Kendall Baccus v. The State in the Supreme Court on November 19, 2015. Counsel filed a petition for writ of certiorari in the case of Shawn Reaves v. The State with the United States Supreme Court on November 18, 2015.

5. Counsel for the Attorney General's office consents to this request shown by signature below.




