9 Ladies and gentlemen, we thank you for your time
10 and your attention to this case. I know that jury
11 service is thankless, but I hope that it has been an
12 educational experience for you. I hope that you've
13 learned that it is nothing like television.
14 Television is far more dramatic, far more bells and
15 whistles and technology. But I hope that y'all have
16 learned firsthand how the system works, how very
17 essential you are to its operation.

18 Orangeburg County is a little smaller than
19 Charleston County, which is my resident circuit, which
20 is Charleston and Berkeley. Berkeley is probably a
21 little more like Orangeburg than Charleston. But in
22 Charleston, we hold four trial courts every week in
23 the circuit court, two civil and two criminal. And so
24 as you can well imagine, just as in Orangeburg during
25 a jury trial term, while there are many things that a

1 circuit judge hears where I am the fact-finder, which
2 means I find the facts and render verdicts in cases,
3 it is more -- the majority of the time it -- I require
4 a jury to hear the facts of the case and apply the law
5 to those facts and render verdicts. So I hope you
6 know how very essential you are to the operation of
7 the process and that we could not have jury trials
8 without your willingness really to donate your time to
9 us.

10 South Carolina is one of the busiest states in
11 the nation. We only rank second to one other state in
12 terms of case filings per capita per judge, at 5,000
13 per judge. We have -- and with that, we still dispose
14 of cases faster than most states. We have forty-nine
15 circuit judges. We travel throughout the state and
16 hear cases.

17 Pursuant to our constitution, we're actually
18 supposed to live in another county for six months of
19 the year and then come home for six months of the
20 year. But because -- and that's another unique
21 feature of our system. It is really the envy of the
22 nation when I meet other judges. They think that it
23 really keeps the system healthy rotating judges
24 throughout your state. But because of significant
25 budget cuts, for a while we didn't have any travel at

1 all. But we've resumed some limited travel where each
2 of us travel about a week a month which really,
3 frankly, is kind of a really good balance in terms of
4 being home and being away.

5 Just to give you some point of reference, I have
6 several friends who are judges in the city of
7 Philadelphia. In the city of Philadelphia, they have
8 nine judges who only hear homicide and murder cases.
9 That's all they do all year long. Nine for one city.
10 We have forty-nine for our entire state. So that
11 should give you some idea really just of the sheer
12 caseloads that are handled throughout our country.

13 But, again, even with that, we still dispose of
14 most cases civically in eighteen months and most
15 criminal cases in less than a year, where other states
16 who have far greater resources than we do often take
17 four to five years to dispose of cases.

18 So, again, I just give you these statistics
19 antidotally so you'll know how very important you are
20 to us and to our ability to dispose of caseloads
21 throughout the state.

22 If you need a work excuse, we will provide that
23 for you in the clerk's office. Otherwise, we will
24 mail those to you along with your checks.

25 You are welcome to discuss this case if you

1 would like, now that I'm going to dismiss you.
2 Lawyers will often contact you because they want to
3 get your feedback. We call it the practice of law
4 because it is never perfected. And so oftentimes
5 lawyers will contact you because they want to know how
6 they could have done something better. And as I was
7 talking with the lawyers earlier, I was telling them
8 that as lawyers, when we go to law school they kind of
9 erase all of our common sense. We tend to look at
10 things in a real sterile kind of a way in what we call
11 a -- there's a method that they teach us how to think.
12 And so we tend to ignore lots of things that the
13 average layperson pays attention to.

14 And so oftentimes lawyers will contact you so
15 that they can get your feedback so that they can
16 perfect their craft and do it a little bit better. So
17 if someone should contact you and you wish to discuss
18 the case, you are welcome to. If you don't want to,
19 you don't have to. And if someone should intrude into
20 your privacy and it makes you uncomfortable, please
21 contact the clerk's office so that we can take the
22 appropriate action to protect your privacy.

23 We're going to move into sentencing of Mr. May.
24 If you would like to remain for that process, you are
25 welcome to. Please just let the bailiffs know. We'll

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allow you to remain in the jury box for that process.

However, if you do not wish to remain, you are
excused with the Court's profound thanks.

We'll hear post-trial motions and sentencing in
a moment.

SENTENCING

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THE COURT: And as I understand it, on the armed robbery it's a minimum of ten years, a maximum of thirty years, classified as most serious and violent, no probation, no suspension of sentence. Correct?

MR. BELL: That's correct, Your Honor.

THE COURT: On possession of a weapon, zero to five, which is mandatory, however it is not mandatory that it be run consecutively. Correct?

MR. BELL: I believe so. That's correct.

MR. STEVENS: That's my understanding, as well, Judge.

MR. BELL: Here are the sentencing sheets.

THE COURT: Do you know what? And we also -- Madam Forelady, before you leave today, we will need you to sign the indictments. So if you would -- even once the jury is excused, if you would remain so that we could complete that process.

Okay. As I understand it, the defendant does not have any record; correct?

MR. BELL: I'm reviewing --

THE COURT: Doesn't have any criminal record. At least as an adult.

MR. BELL: Your Honor, I think our response is the same as before. I think there was sufficient evidence for the jury to find -- reach a verdict.

THE COURT: The Court would rely on its previous ruling, and incorporate those in the record for purposes of the motion, and deny the motion.

3 regarding sentencing --

9 there are a couple of misdemeanor convictions out of

7 argument regarding sentencing?

8 MR. BELL: Your Honor, the only thing the State
9 would say is this is a serious crime and our
10 legislatures made it a serious crime and he used a
11 serious weapon to commit this crime, force and
12 intimidation. We think that the punishment ought to
13 be severe. We understand he has no serious criminal
14 record but, you know, armed robbery is serious. And,
15 you know, it's -- there's always the potential it
16 could have gotten worse. And that's the State's
17 position. We think that it ought to be a fairly stiff
18 sentence, just to send a message, as well, to the
19 community, that Orangeburg County won't tolerate this.

20 THE COURT: When you say stiff, I need you to
21 quantify that for me, please.

22 MR. BELL: The State would ask somewhere in the
23 range of twenty to thirty years.

24 THE COURT: Anything further from the State?

25 MR. BELL: No, Your Honor.

2 you, Mr. Stevens.

6 about my client's past and his family, as well. I'll
7 be brief, but I still would like to talk about it.

8 First of all, Tykeem is twenty-four years of
9 age, Judge. He's single, although he does have a
10 long-term girlfriend. He also has no children. He
11 was born in the Norfolk area of Virginia, where he
12 does have his parents over in the Tidewater area
13 there, Judge. His mother lives there. She's a
14 caretaker. His father lives in Norfolk. He's a
15 handyman and caretaker of his great aunt.

16 I've had a chance to hear from his great aunt.
17 She's ninety-three years of age, Judge, and extremely
18 supportive. In fact, it was the great aunt who was
19 actually helping pay his way through South Carolina
20 State University.

21 He also has aunts and uncles and cousins in the
22 Bamberg area here in South Carolina, Judge. In the
23 way of siblings, he has six brothers and four sisters.

24 Regarding his education, Judge, Tykeem, I've
25 gotten to know him. He's a smart young man, he's --

1 and our position is that should the Court be willing
2 to show mercy, he does have a future and a way to help
3 contribute to society in a positive manner, Judge.

4 He graduated high school in Chesapeake,
5 Virginia. He's attended South Carolina State
6 University. Business and economics is his major.
7 And, in fact, he only had about nine to twelve classes
8 left, is my understanding after reviewing his records
9 as well as speaking with him.

10 He was a hardworking man, Judge, when he was not
11 incarcerated in pre-trial incarceration. He worked at
12 Dollar General for over two years. He worked for TKL
13 Security at nights, as well. And even before that, he
14 worked at Cook Out and he worked at Wendy's. He's not
15 afraid of work, Judge.

16 Regarding his priors, they're minor, Judge.

17 We understand the jury has spoken. We simply
18 ask for whatever mercy this Court may be willing to
19 show. We specifically request that if possible, the
20 Court sentence to the mandatory minimum of ten years,
21 knowing full well it's not parolable. We believe that
22 ten years would be sufficient for correction. We
23 believe --

24 Actually, I've also had the chance to speak with
25 some folks in law enforcement in this community, as

1 well. I think when we actually gauge it in comparison
2 to some other actions -- activity in the area,
3 although, yes, it is a serious offense, even the
4 mandatory minimum indicates that ten years is serious
5 time for such a serious offense, Judge. And I don't
6 think that it would be out of line for a mandatory
7 minimum sentence on a charge like this, given his
8 background, given his lack of a serious record, given
9 all the factors that make Tykeem May a young man that
10 can contribute positively to society. He's not
11 disposable, Judge, and we ask that the Court show
12 mercy. Thank you.

13 THE COURT: You're welcome.

14 Sir, is there anything you would like to say for
15 the record on your own behalf?

16 MR. MAY: I would like everyone to know, the
17 jurors --

18 THE COURT: Sir, I can't hear you.

19 MR. MAY: I would like everyone to know, the
20 jurors, and everyone in the court, that I am innocent,
21 that I didn't do this. There are such things as
22 coincidents. There are such things as this person
23 looks like that person.

24 And I feel like I have a lot of vows, that I
25 vowed to God, that I have failed in the lines of

1 helping other people like my great aunt, which Mr.
2 Stevens talked about. She is ninety-two. Her
3 birthday is the 31st of this month. She's going to be
4 ninety-three. And I would have took a plea for seven
5 and a half, or whatever, ten, a long time ago but I
6 had the intention of getting back to my great aunt.
7 So I told her and I vowed to myself I would fight this
8 so that I could win so I could go back to her and help
9 her, because she doesn't have anybody to help her.

10 And I just feel like I'm not a bad person, I'm
11 not an evil person. I never did anything to hurt
12 anybody. I always seek to help people. That was my
13 intention. I even, on the lines of helping people,
14 put myself in trouble and hurt myself by helping
15 others. And I just ask for mercy.

16 THE COURT: Where are your parents?

17 MR. MAY: In Chesapeake, Virginia. Well, my
18 father was in Chesapeake after my aunt -- I just
19 talked to her before we came and they deliberated.
20 And my aunt reassured me that my father isn't around
21 anymore, and that she isn't getting around the way she
22 needs to. And that was my intention of fighting this
23 so I can get back and help her.

24 My mother, she never really was around, so I
25 don't really know too much where she is right now.

1 But my whole intention was just to get back and
2 help my aunt, finish my college.

3 To be honest, Judge, as far as prison goes, I
4 don't think I'll make it. I'm just being honest from
5 my heart. This is not just an opinion, because I've
6 never been to prison. I don't know anything about
7 prison. But this is just an opinion from others that
8 have been around in jail that told me, you know, you
9 too kindhearted, you too green. I was told this just
10 the other day, you too green, they'll use you in
11 prison, soon as they see that you doing something,
12 they'll come to you and get whatever they want from
13 you, they'll ask you -- they see your kindheartedness
14 within the first couple of weeks, the first couple of
15 months. I just -- I just ask for mercy.

16 THE COURT: Thank you very much.

17 Anything further from the defense or the State?

18 MR. BELL: Your Honor, I would just like to say
19 I was looking up the statute, the possession of a
20 weapon. It reads it's five years. It's no less than
21 five years.

22 THE COURT: Well, yeah. It's a mandatory
23 imposition. It used to be consecutive but it's not
24 anymore.

25 MR. BELL: It can be done consecutively or

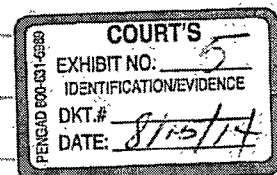

PETITION FOR ORDER TO RECONSTRUCT THE RECORD OF THE PORTION OF
APPELLANT'S TRIAL CONTAINING THE PARTIES' ARGUMENTS AND THE TRIAL
COURT'S RULING ON MOTIONS PURSUANT TO BATSON V. KENTUCKY, 476 U.S. 79
(1986)

Pursuant to Rule 240 of the South Carolina Appellate Court Rules, undersigned counsel requests an order requiring the parties to reconstruct the record of the arguments made in support of motions by both the State and appellant pursuant to Batson v. Kentucky, 476 U.S. 79 (1986) and the trial judge's rulings denying both the State and appellant's motions. The trial was held before the Honorable Deadra L. Jefferson in Orangeburg County. Breen Richard Stevens represented appellant. Harrison Bell and Ashley Cornwell represented the State.

The facts supporting this motion are contained in the affidavits of the undersigned and Breen Richard Stevens. Soon after being assigned the case, I discussed the possible issues for appeal with trial counsel, Mr. Stevens, a former appellate defender. He told me that he believed the denial of a motion made pursuant to Batson v. Kentucky, 476 U.S. 79 (1986) would be one of the significant issues in Mr. May's appeal. Upon reviewing the transcript, I saw that it contained nothing about a Batson motion by appellant but indicated a motion by the State and a bench conference after jury selection.


I contacted Mr. Stevens. He confirmed both the State and appellant's motions took place at the bench. Mr. Stevens recalled that Judge Jefferson placed a recording device on the bench to hear argument on the motions. During the bench conference the State made a Batson motion that was denied. Appellant also made a Batson motion that was denied. Undersigned counsel contacted the court reporter but was informed that the recordings for this trial were destroyed. It is my belief that it is necessary to reconstruct the arguments and ruling on the Batson motion in order to prepare this ground for appeal.

When a trial transcript has been lost or destroyed, the Court may remand to have the record reconstructed. Whitehead v. State, 352 S.C. 215, 574 S.E.2d 200 (2002); China v. Parrott, 251 S.C. 329, 162 S.E.2d 276 (1968); Koon v. State, 358 S.C. 359, 367, 595 S.E.2d 456, 460 (2004); Dolive v. J.E.E. Developers, Inc., 308 S.C. 380, 383, 418 S.E.2d 319, 321 (Ct. App.

1992); State v. Ladson, 373 S.C. 320, 325, 644 S.E.2d 271, 273-274 (Ct. App. 2007). An important portion of appellant's trial transcript has been lost and is no longer available through no fault of appellant. Therefore, meaningful review of the record below is not possible with the current transcript. Appellant seeks reconstruction of the record to permit meaningful appellate review of his trial. Appellant believes that since what must be reconstructed are primarily arguments of counsel and rulings by the trial judge, reconstruction should not be difficult nor involve extraordinary delay.

WHEREFORE, the undersigned counsel requests an order for the reconstruction of the portion of appellant's trial transcript as described above in order to perfect appellant's direct appeal in the case. While this petition is pending, appellant asks this Court to hold the deadlines for filing his initial brief and designations in abeyance.



1. I am an attorney licensed to practice in South Carolina.
2. I represented Tykeem K. May in his trial. The Honorable Deadra L. Jefferson presided. Harrison Bell and Ashley Cornwell represented the State.
3. I have reviewed pages 192-202 of the trial transcript, which is the record of jury selection. I have also reviewed the jury strike sheet.
4. Page 202 of the trial transcript omits motions made pursuant to Batson v. Kentucky, 476 U.S. 79 (1986).

5. As is reflected in the transcript, the trial judge asked the State if there were any motions regarding jury selection. Mr. Bell indicated he had a motion and both he and I approached the bench. Mr. Bell then made a Batson motion, and I argued a separate Batson motion for Mr. May.
6. Judge Jefferson took one of the court reporter's recording devices and moved it from one place on the bench closer to the attorneys. Judge Jefferson then heard argument from Mr. Bell and me on our respective Batson motions. The court denied both motions.
7. It was my belief that these motions were recorded.
8. The basis of the Batson motion for the defense was that the State used all of its peremptory strikes against black males. Mr. May is a black male. Mr. Bell stated that he struck them because they were unemployed. However, Mr. Bell did not exercise strikes on other white jurors who were unemployed. It is my belief that Judge Jefferson's denial of the defendant's Batson motion constitutes a significant issue for appeal.



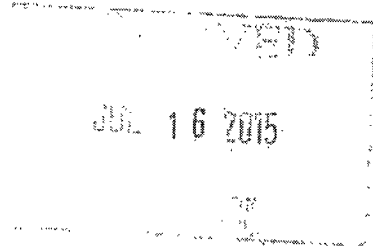

2 August 31, 2015, Orangeburg County Courthouse,  
3 Orangeburg, SC, in re the State vs. Tykeem K. May.)

4                   (APPELLANT EXH. 1 in evidence.)

5                   (APPELLANT EXH. 2 in evidence.)

6                   MR. ALEXANDER: Your Honor, I'm sorry  
7 to pull you up here for something like this.

8                   THE COURT: Well, that's okay. I was  
9 going to tell you all, in the future just ask the  
10 Court Reporter to transcribe it. I took a minute  
11 to schedule this hearing because I had her track  
12 down her records and she had it; you all just  
13 didn't request it.

14                   Once she produces the transcript, she  
15 waits 30 days, and once you didn't request it, she  
16 destroyed the tapes.

17                   MR. ALEXANDER: Okay.

18                   THE COURT: And so what happened was,  
19 if Hilda had -- Hilda had to -- and I don't mean to  
20 be informal calling her by her first name.

21                   MR. ALEXANDER: That's all right.

22                   THE COURT: She had to give some of her  
23 typing away, so she gave it to Miss Mia. If Miss  
24 Hilda had it, she would have automatically  
25 transcribed it, but since she gave her tapes to

1 somebody else who didn't know, she just didn't  
2 transcribe it.

3           So I had them both tracking down --  
4 trying to find it, and since Mrs. Hilda was like,

8           So then I had Miss Mia track down hers.  
9 And she said, once I produced it, I gave them  
10 30 days to request anything else, and once they  
11 didn't, I destroyed it because I didn't have the  
12 room to store it.

13           But I always -- I don't ever have bench  
14 conferences that are not recorded, so that you know  
15 that for the future for this very reason.

16           MR. ALEXANDER: That's what Mr. Stevens  
17 had told me.

18           THE COURT: Yeah, just because -- I  
19 think -- well, you know every courthouse is  
20 designed differently, and in Charleston, it's  
21 easier for me than other places to send a whole  
22 panel out and hear a motion and bring them back in.  
23 In places that are small, you don't have that  
24 luxury, so I always instruct the court reporter to  
25 put a mic on the bench to record everything.

1 MR. ALEXANDER: Right.

2 THE COURT: So that -- because we just  
3 don't have the luxury of sending people in and out,  
4 but I kept -- I always keep good notes just on the  
5 outside chance that something happens, something  
6 gets destroyed, or otherwise. So I have my notes  
7 from the Batson hearing.

8 MR. ALEXANDER: Your Honor, one quick  
9 note, are we on the record?

10 THE COURT: Oh, yes.

11 MR. ALEXANDER: Let me have my client  
12 come in. Get Mr. May.

13 THE COURT: Oh, I apologize. Yeah, you  
14 can go ahead and get Mr. May.

15 And you can communicate to him what  
16 I've said, unless you want me to repeat it again.

17 MR. ALEXANDER: Exhibit 1 is the strike  
18 sheet that came up with the transcript, Your Honor.

19 THE COURT: Okay.

20 MR. ALEXANDER: I had that marked as  
21 Exhibit 1 for purposes of this hearing, and the  
22 jury selection is Exhibit 2 in case the attorneys  
23 need it.

24 THE COURT: I'm not sure that we're  
25 going to need to take testimony because, again, I

1 have my notes, and I will tell you all what my  
2 notes reflected took place. And if we agree on  
3 that, I think we'll be done.

4 You can take your seats. And as I  
5 understand it, you all have had marked -- is this  
6 without objection, Mr. Bell?

7 MR. BELL: Yes, Your Honor.

8 THE COURT: And Number 1, which is the  
9 clerk's strike sheet, which I assume she has her  
10 own methods to doing this, and -- oh, I guess I see  
11 what she did. And then Number 2, is the transcript  
12 of the actual jury selection; is that correct?

13 MR. BELL: Yes, Your Honor.

14 MR. ALEXANDER: Yes, Your Honor.

15 THE COURT: And you all have marked  
16 that as 2 without objection; is that correct?

17 MR. BELL: That is correct, Your Honor.

18 THE COURT: Okay. And, for the record,  
19 this is the State v Tykeem Kalani May,  
20 2014-GS-38-189 and 190. This trial originally took  
21 place August 12th through August 14, 2014. The  
22 jury selection was conducted from 10:55 to 11:40 on  
23 August 12th.

24 The original court reporter was Hilda  
25 Jordan; however, her records were transcribed by

1 Mia Perron. Mr. Harrison Bell and Ashley Cornwell  
2 represented the State and Doug Miller and Breen  
3 Stevens represented the Defendant.

4 My record reflects that we selected a  
5 jury of 12 with two alternates, that both the State  
6 and the defense made a Batson motion. My records  
7 reflect that the State struck juror number 15,  
8 juror number 164, and juror number 50. And that  
9 the defense struck jurors 133, 39, 2, 29, and 193,  
10 with the level of offence the State had five  
11 strikes and the defense had ten strikes.

12 Again, at the conclusion of jury  
13 selection, the Court asked if there were any  
14 motions, both sides indicated they did. The State  
15 had a Batson motion which was heard first, and then  
16 the defense likewise had a Batson motion which was  
17 held subsequently.

18 The following reasons were given in  
19 support of the defense's strikes. Number 133 was a  
20 black female. He indicated he struck her because  
21 she was a school employee. Number 39 was a white  
22 female. He indicated that he struck her because  
23 she worked at a bank. Number 2 was a white female,  
24 and I have that the reason they struck her was  
25 because she was a wife and a teacher. Number 29.

1 was a white male, they indicated they struck him  
2 because he was a bank supervisor. And number 193  
3 was a white male, and they said they struck him  
4 because it appeared he did not want to be here.

5 The State then conceded that those were  
6 race neutral reasons and withdrew its Batson  
7 motion.

8 We then moved to the defense's Batson  
9 motion and the State indicated they struck number  
10 15 who was a black male, because he was unemployed  
11 and single, number 164 because he had a record for  
12 shoplifting in Georgia, and number 50, a black male  
13 because he was unemployed and single.

14 The burden then shifted to the defense  
15 to show that these reasons were not race neutral  
16 and they were pretext, and my records reflect that  
17 there was no representation regarding pretext and,  
18 therefore, the motion was denied, as they could not  
19 meet that burden of showing that the State's  
20 strikes were anything other than race neutral and  
21 were not pretextual.

22 MR. ALEXANDER: Your Honor, do your  
23 records reflect Mr. Stevens making any argument  
24 about pretext at all?

25 THE COURT: He could not meet the

1 burden on pretext. He could not show that there  
2 were similarly-laterally situated people on the  
3 panel. And so once he could not, the burden  
4 shifted to him at that point. And once he could  
5 not show that there were similarly jurors, the  
6 inquiry ends.

7 MR. ALEXANDER: I think I have to call  
8 Mr. Stevens at this point because what he told me  
9 is he made an argument concerning similarly  
10 situated.

11 THE COURT: I mean, I'll be glad to  
12 hear his testimony, but, you know, hindsight is  
13 20/20. I don't know how much weight I can give  
14 that in light of hindsight and the fact now that  
15 he's had a chance to study the venire. Again, I  
16 take meticulous notes for a reason. If he had made  
17 an argument, I would have noted it.

18 MR. ALEXANDER: I would still like to  
19 call him, Your Honor.

20 THE COURT: Sure.

21 And I guess I need to ask, Mr. Bell,  
22 what is your -- are my notes an accurate recitation  
23 of what took place?

24 MR. BELL: Yes, Your Honor, according  
25 to my notes. Honestly, I'm sure we're not worried

1 about the State's motion. We're more worried about  
2 the defense's motion, and those reasons are what is  
3 reflected of my notes from the time that I have  
4 them kept as well; that's why I struck those  
5 individual jurors.

6 THE COURT: Thank you. You may  
7 proceed.

8 MR. ALEXANDER: Call Breen Stevens.

9 THE COURT: Sir, if you would come to  
10 the stand to be sworn.

11 BREEN STEVENS,

12 being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

13 THE COURT: You can put your right hand  
14 down. If you will be seated and state your full  
15 name and spell your last name for the Court  
16 Reporter.

17 THE WITNESS: Breen Richard Stevens,  
18 S-T-E-V-E-N-S.

19 THE COURT: You may proceed.

20 MR. ALEXANDER: Thank you, Your Honor.

21 DIRECT EXAMINATION

22 BY MR. ALEXANDER:

23 Q. Mr. Stevens, you represented Mr. May?

24 A. Yes, sir.

25 Q. And you were just sitting here for

1 Judge Jefferson's recitation of the events at the  
2 bench conference?

3 A. That's correct.

4 Q. And up to the point where the  
5 discussion about pretext and similarly situated,  
6 did Judge Jefferson's recitation match your memory  
7 of what occurred at the bench conference?

8 A. Yes, sir.

9 Q. What can you tell me about the argument  
10 you made concerning pretext?

11 A. What I did was, I just pointed out that  
12 there were two -- at least two white females that  
13 were also on the jury that were unemployed, to  
14 which my recollection was the Judge said, well,  
15 they're not -- she found that they weren't  
16 similarly situated and ruled, and I asked to be  
17 noted.

18 She's really good about making sure  
19 that all of our conversations at the bench are  
20 typically recorded for judicial economy to make  
21 sure that the case keeps rolling. She's usually  
22 really good about that, not just from the trials  
23 I've been in with her, but also from many  
24 transcripts I've seen. She's very efficient.

25 Q. Do you remember which two white females

1 that you made an argument about?

2 A. Let's see, I think one was an  
3 unemployed housewife and -- let's see here, Ms.  
4 Sweatman I think was one and Ms. Jeffcoat was the  
5 other, 174 and 190.

6 Q. Do you remember any response from  
7 Mr. Bell?

8 A. Not that I can recall.

9 Q. Did Judge Jefferson rule immediately  
10 after that argument?

11 A. Yeah. I mean, she was quite clear  
12 about her ruling, that they weren't similarly  
13 situated. And once Judge Jefferson makes the  
14 ruling, she's -- she means it; Rule 18 is in full  
15 force and effect in Judge Jefferson's court, and I  
16 respect that.

17 Again, it's how she moves cases along  
18 very efficiently.

19 MR. ALEXANDER: I don't think I have  
20 any more questions.

21 THE COURT: Any questions, Mr. Bell?

22 MR. BELL: Yes, Your Honor.

23 CROSS-EXAMINATION

24 BY MR. BELL:

25 Q. Mr. Stevens, you stated that one said

1 was an unemployed housewife. Was that her terms or  
2 your terms? Didn't you just say she was a  
3 housewife?

4 A. I think that's what I had noted on my  
5 notes, but, in fact, when we were at the bench I  
6 remember, you know, saying that my wife might  
7 disagree with me, but I don't think a housewife is  
8 employed officially when it comes to it.

9 Q. Well, I mean, I think there's -- well,  
10 it's semantics, too, but --

11 A. Well, I don't think the IRS considers  
12 them to be gainfully employed in the workforce.

13 Q. But it's how they also present  
14 themselves as well, isn't it?

15 A. I don't understand your question.

16 Q. I'll withdraw that.

17 If I remember correctly, according to  
18 my notes, number 90 stated that they were  
19 retired --

20 A. Yes.

21 Q. -- is that correct?

22 A. Which, again, means you're out of the  
23 work force.

24 Q. But it doesn't mean they're unemployed,  
25 it means they have taken themselves out of the work

1 force, correct?

2 A. Well, regardless, if someone is out of  
3 the work force, I think they're unemployed.

4 Q. But there's a difference between  
5 unemployed, somebody seeking a job, and somebody  
6 that is taken voluntarily themselves out of the  
7 work force to be retired or to be a housewife;  
8 isn't that correct?

9 A. I think that would be semantics. In my  
10 view, unemployed is unemployed. You're --

11 Q. It's a life choice, too, isn't it?

12 A. Well, I think that a person not holding  
13 a steady job, they're unemployed.

14 Q. Okay. All right.

15 A. And, finally, there was also Ms. Steel,  
16 I think, but she was an alternate, 163, alternate  
17 juror.

18 Q. Who also said she was a housewife?

19 A. Okay.

20 MR. BELL: Nothing further, Your Honor.

21 THE COURT: Any redirect?

22 MR. ALEXANDER: Nothing, Your Honor.

23 THE COURT: Sir, you may step down.

24 THE WITNESS: Thank you, Judge.

25 THE COURT: You're welcome. Anything

1 further?

2 MR. ALEXANDER: Nothing, Your Honor. I  
3 would just ask the Court to find that the record is  
4 adequately reconstructed and Court of Appeals can  
5 conduct meaningful appellate review on this record.

6 THE COURT: And just for the benefit of  
7 Mr. May, because he was not in here when we first  
8 began talking, Mr. May, I took additional time to  
9 reconvene this hearing because I typically -- not  
10 typically, I mandate that my court reporters record  
11 all bench conferences. And so what I did was track  
12 down the Court Reporters to find out where their  
13 original records were so that that hearing could be  
14 transcribed.

15 Ms. Hilda, who did the original  
16 transcript, had to -- the Chief Justice is very  
17 adamant about people getting their typing done  
18 quickly so that people's can be heard quickly. So  
19 if a court reporter has more typing than she can  
20 handle, she's required to give that typing away.

21 So Ms. Hilda had to give her typing  
22 away to Ms. Mia Perron, who was required to  
23 transcribe the record. And what happened was she  
24 didn't transcribe the bench conferences because she  
25 wasn't asked to. And her general position is, she

1 transcribes them if she's asked to, whereas, Ms.  
2 Hilda probably would have went ahead and  
3 transcribed it because she knew.

4           And Ms. Mia used to be my court  
5 reporter, so she -- and that had been years, so she  
6 probably just forgot, but, nonetheless, in doing  
7 that for somebody else she just didn't look at the  
8 bench conferences.

9           So I had them track down their records,  
10 but, unfortunately, what happens under the court  
11 reporter rules, is that once a record is  
12 transcribed, in other words, once the State and the  
13 defense have requested whatever portions of the  
14 transcript, or requested the whole transcript, they  
15 have 30 days after that to request anything else.  
16 And if they don't request anything else, then the  
17 court reporter can destroy the original records,  
18 because technically she has already transcribed the  
19 record, certified it.

20           And most court reporters don't have the  
21 room to maintain all of those records, so they are  
22 allowed to destroy them and that's what happened in  
23 this case. And what Ms. Mia indicated to me was,  
24 she wished it had been requested during the 30 days  
25 because she would have transcribed it. It is her

1 memory that it was available, but since nobody  
2 requested it she didn't transcribe it. So it was  
3 destroyed within that 30 days and so as a result we  
4 had to reconstruct the hearing today.

5 And I just wanted to share that with  
6 you because that's what I shared with the lawyers  
7 prior to you coming into the courtroom.

8 THE WITNESS: Thank you, Judge.

9 THE COURT: You're welcome. Okay. The  
10 Court will stand by the original records regarding  
11 the hearing, which is that the reasons given by the  
12 State in support of its strikes -- that being  
13 number 15, a black male, unemployed and single;  
14 number 164, black male had a record for shoplifting  
15 in Georgia; and number 50, a black male,  
16 unemployed, the Court finds as it did at that time,  
17 that these were race neutral reasons, that there  
18 was no argument that rose to the level of -- and I  
19 don't have a record of pretext, no harm, no foul,  
20 I'll rule on it alternatively, although my records  
21 do not reflect the argument was made, but,  
22 nonetheless, the Court would find that the  
23 arguments raised by defense counsel do not rise to  
24 the level of creating a situation where the State's  
25 reasons given were pretextual and, therefore, would

1 not have been able to sustain its burden once it  
2 shifted to them regarding pretext.

3                   Number 36 -- and my notes -- this is  
4 weird. 36 says, N-F. I don't know what that  
5 means. I would have known at the time I guess. I  
6 don't know what N-F means. I guess female. I  
7 don't have any recollection -- let's see, 36 N-F.

8                   MR. BELL: That's what's on the strike  
9 sheet, Your Honor.

10                   THE COURT: Yeah. I don't know --

11                   MR. BELL: I think it means none.

12                   THE COURT: She may not have listed  
13 anything, and I don't have an independent  
14 recollection of what her race was, but she was  
15 female. I tend to think probably white female or I  
16 would have made some other designation on my note  
17 sheets -- on my jury strike sheet regarding that.

18                   Number 155 was a black female employed  
19 with South Carolina; number 17 was a black female  
20 who ran a Methodist program at a church; number 174  
21 was a white female who was a housewife, number 200  
22 was a black female who worked in family health  
23 care, number 22 was a black female who worked at  
24 the veterans medical center, number 7 was a black  
25 male who worked in a trucking occupation, 101 was a

1 white female who worked at Daniel's Pharmacy, 81  
2 was a black female who worked as an administrative  
3 assistant in state government, number 14 was a  
4 white female employed at Zeus as an accountant;  
5 number 121 was a black male employed at Sedexo;  
6 number 65 was a black male employed at Husquavana;  
7 number 90 was a white female retired teacher; and  
8 number 163 was a housewife, white female.

9 In total, there were eight black  
10 citizens who served on the jury and five white,  
11 five black females and three black males, five  
12 white females and no white males. Which, quite  
13 frankly, proportionally is very unusual for the  
14 makeup of a jury under these circumstances.

15 Taking into account Mr. Stevens'  
16 argument that there were other similarly situated,  
17 that being those unemployed, I find that that  
18 argument, again, does not shift pretext.

19 I do not believe or find that a  
20 housewife falls into the category of being  
21 unemployed. Generally, a person who is in the  
22 unemployed population is someone who was employed  
23 and who is actively seeking employment, who is able  
24 bodied and capable of employment, and a man is  
25 generally very dissimilarly situated from a woman

1 who is home, acting in a housewife capacity, taking  
2 care of her children, and in my estimation, is  
3 employed. She's just employed in her house taking  
4 care of her kids.

5           She may not receive monetary  
6 compensation -- although, there could be some  
7 argument regarding that, too; I don't know. Some  
8 women receive stipends and other things from their  
9 family budget for the week for whatever purpose.  
10 So I don't know that that necessarily would be a  
11 valid argument, but I certainly would not find for  
12 the record that that would be such that they would  
13 be considered similarly situated to juror number 15  
14 and juror number 50, such that the defense would  
15 have met any burden regarding pretext thus shifting  
16 it back to the State.

17           I find that those reasons given were  
18 appropriate and race neutral under those  
19 circumstances.

20           Is there anything further for the  
21 record, from the State?

22           MR. BELL: Nothing, from the State.

23           THE COURT: From the defense?

24           MR. ALEXANDER: Nothing, Your Honor.

25           THE COURT: Okay. Thank you very much.

1                   Mr. Bell, was there anything that you  
2 wanted to state for the record? I apologize, I  
3 didn't mean to ignore you.

4                   MR. BELL: No, Your Honor.

5                   THE COURT: I wanted to make sure that  
6 -- was there anything you needed to add other than  
7 what I've already stated took place.

8                   MR. BELL: I think what the Court has  
9 characterized is what went on -- is an accurate  
10 reflection of what went on.

11                  THE COURT: And in the future, ask the  
12 court reporter. They usually have it, unless  
13 there's some catastrophic situation where something  
14 is destroyed. Only time I think that happened was  
15 during Hugo.

16                  Thank you, guys. Have a good day.
