PROVISIONAL FIFTH SUPPLEMENT TO MOTION to Appoint Counsel for Rehearing

OR to Allow Petitioner to Argue Rehearing pro se;

AND, in either case, to Extend the Time to File for Rehearing.

Dr. Assa'ad-Faltas condoles this Court and herself on the death of Retired Chief Justice Finney and fondly recalls an encounter with His Honor circa 2007 in the front-yard of USC's law school, where and when Dr. Faltas lovingly "confiscated" His Honor's cigarette lighter but returned it to Mrs. Finney, who years later still had the mental acuity to recognize Dr. Faltas at a chance encounter in Columbia's then-Clarion Hotel.

Dr. Faltas also recalls few chance encounters with the late great Matthew J. Perry, and that when told "I'm trying to do for immigrants what Your Honor did for African Americans," Judge Perry responded "Keep the hope. Never give up." In that spirit, Dr. Faltas attaches hereto the *provisional* last installment of her fulfillment of her 28 November 2017 promise to this Court to, God willing and this Court permitting, to finish annotating the extracted Parts II and III of Ingram's testimony. For reasons with which this Court need not be burdened, Part III was finished before Part II; but it is numbered in page and footnote sequence to Parts I and II; and the annotations are hopefully self-explanatory. The provisionally-filed party-annotated Part II is meant to show this Court the work this effort entails and shall, God willing and this Court permitting, be replaced by the final annotated Part II, ASAP.

[page 203, line 25 to page 204, line 3] The Court: Any witnesses who have been subpoenaed in this case who are wishing to challenge the issuance of the subpoena we will be in touch with you as long as you make it known to us who you are.

[4-5] (Whereupon, the jury was brought into open court at 2:19 p.m.)

[6-7] The Court: Ms. Ingram, if you'll take your spot up here. The witness is still under oath. You may continue.

[8-9] Ms. Weiss: Thank you, Your Honor. May it please the court?

[10-11] Teresa Ingram, having been previously sworn and remaining under oath, testified as follows:

[12-16] Ms. Weiss: May it please the court? Your Honor, it's come to my attention that the witness had some information she wanted to take with her I think to help refresh her memory. Is there any objection by the defense to her having notes with her on the stand?

[17] Dr. Faltas: I need to see the notes.

[18-19] Ms. Weiss: It's not notes to be put into evidence. It's notes to refresh her memory.

[20] The Court: All right. You may proceed.

[21] Ms. Weiss: Thank you, Your Honor.

[22-23] (State's exhibits 1 through 6 were marked for identification only.)

[page 205, lines 1-2] Direct examination By Ms. Weiss:

[3-5] Q. Teresa, I'm going to show you what's been marked as State's exhibits 1 through 6 for identification at this point.

[6] Dr. Faltas: I object, Your Honor.

[7] The Court: It's noted. The objection is noted.

[8] Ms. Weiss: Thank you.

[9] The Court: You may proceed.

[10-13] By Ms. Weiss: Q. I'm going to show you what's been marked State's exhibits 1 through 6. Without identifying them, do you recognize these photos?

[14] A. Yes.

[15-16] Q. Going one at a time, let's start with... Going one at a time, can you describe what is depicted in those photos?

[17-18] A. Do you want me to show them to the jury or just tell you?

[19] Q. No, just describe them.

[20] A. Okay. In this first one it shows --

[21] Dr. Faltas: Your Honor, I'm sorry. May I move --

[22] The Court: Yes.

[23] Dr. Faltas: -- there? Yes?

[24 to page 206, line 7] The Witness: In this first picture it shows Richard apparently leaving. This picture just shows her in her car parked outside the mailbox taking pictures of my car and his truck in front of my building. This picture shows her peeking out her window just taking a picture of him leaving. This is another picture of him leaving. It's just showing the truck, no person, just the vehicle. And this picture shows where she tried to get a side picture of his truck, and Mitch's truck is in that.

[25-27] By Ms. Weiss: Q. And do these pictures accurately depict Richard's vehicle as well as your apartment complex as -- I mean, is there anything altered? Do they accurately depict --

[28] Dr. Faltas: Objection.

[29] The Witness: Accurately.

[30] Ms. Weiss: -- this location?

[31] The Witness: Accurately.

[32] Dr. Faltas: Objection. Compound.

[33] The Court: The objection is overruled.

[34-35] Ms. Weiss: Your Honor, at this time I move to admit State's exhibits 1 through 5.

[36-37] The Court: Any objection to those pictures being admitted into evidence?

[38] Dr. Faltas: Yes, Your Honor.

[39-40] The Court: All right. The objection is overruled. They're admitted over objection.

[41] Ms. Weiss: Thank you.

[page 207, line 4] (State's exhibits 1 through 5 were received in evidence.)

[42-43] By Ms. Weiss: Q. Now, if you'll just go through 1 through 5 just showing them to the jury and just tell the jury what the exhibit number is on the back as you show it to them.

[44] A. This first one is exhibit number 5,¹¹¹ and it shows Richard basically just leaving.

[45-46] Q. And if you can, since it's been since yesterday, who is Richard?

[47] A. Boyfriend.

[48] Q. And it's your boyfriend?

[49-50] A. Yes, my boyfriend. This picture which is exhibit number 4 depicts the building in which I live in, and it shows her rear-view mirror which shows that she sits out by the mailbox and takes pictures. That's my car and that's Richard's truck. This is exhibit number 2--

[51] Dr. Faltas: Your Honor --

[52] The Witness: --and this is--

[53-54] Dr. Faltas: -- may I ask that she raise it so I can see?

[22 to page 208, line 7] The Witness: This -- this depicts her peeking out her blinds just to be able to snap a picture, and it depicts him leaving as well. This is another -- exhibit number 1, she's doing the same thing. It's him leaving, and she's taking a picture. And this is exhibit number 3, and it just shows where obviously she was just trying to take a picture of his truck right here in the corner, and that's Mitch. That's the neighbor that lives in her building. So you see it's a little space -- it's a good piece in between. So she would have to make a way to actually see what goes on in front of my building.

[55-56] By Ms. Weiss: Q. And in State's exhibit 3, is that the side of your building?

[57] A. Yes.

[58-59] Q. That you can see out of her window? Okay, I show you State's exhibit 6. Can you identify what's in that photo?

State's Exhibit 5 is not the "first" photo chronologically in that set. Baseless renumbering of photos to falsify the chronology pervaded this trial.

114-117 **A.** In this photo this -- excuse me. In this photo it shows me talking with the policemen, and she's taking pictures of me talking with the policemen. I think on that day she called the police on the police.

118-119 **Ms. Weiss:** Your Honor, at this time I'd move State's Exhibit 6 into evidence.

120 **The Court:** Show it to Dr. Faltas.

121 **Dr. Faltas:** Objection, Your Honor.

122 **The Court:** Basis for the objection?

123-124 **Dr. Faltas:** And the continuing-- the second thing is she did not take the picture. She has no knowledge of why I took the picture. I also pray the Court to tell them to disregard her statement that that day I called the police on the police. She does not have personal knowledge of that.

125 **The Court:** All right. The objection is overruled, and the picture is admitted into evidence.

126 **(State's exhibit 6 was received in evidence. State's exhibits 7 through 99 were marked for identification only.)**

127 **By Ms. Weiss:** Q. And who is in this photo?

128 **A.** I am in the photo in the middle with two officers.

129-131 **Q.** And did you call the police or do you know if this is a day that you called the police?

132 **A.** I'm not sure.

133-134 **Q.** Okay. Your Honor, I'm going to try to do this a little bit more -- a little bit more easily. I'm going to ask you to look at Defense -- at State's exhibits 7 through 99.

If you'll just flip through these very briefly and just see if you recognize these photos.

135-136 **Dr. Faltas:** I object, Your Honor, to the huge number at once.

137 **The Court:** The objection is overruled.

138-139 **The Witness:** (The witness looks at the photographs.) They are all pictures of me and my family.

140 **Dr. Faltas:** May I see?

141 **The Witness:** Friends. My car.

142 **Ms. Weiss:** Just leave them in that order.

143 **The Witness:** Me doing nothing.¹¹²

144 **Ms. Weiss:** Just one moment. Let the defendant look at the photos. (Dr. Faltas looks at the photographs.)

145-146 **Ms. Weiss:** Your Honor, for the record the defendant was provided a copy of each of these photos represented.

147-148 **Dr. Faltas:** No, I was provided a black-and-white copy, and I object to Ms. Weiss saying that in the presence of the jury.

149 **(Dr. Faltas continues to look at the photographs.)**

150-151 **The Court:** Do you have further questions to ask the witness --

152 **Ms. Weiss:** Your Honor, they're all about the photos.

153 **The Court:** --- that doesn't relate to those photographs?

154-155 **Ms. Weiss:** Yes, they relate to the photographs, Your Honor. I can go ahead and I can take the ones she's already looked at. I can start with those.

156 **Dr. Faltas:** I'm almost through. Almost through.

157-158 **Ms. Weiss:** If you can let me have the ones you have already looked at.

159 **Dr. Faltas:** Almost through.

160-161 **By Ms. Weiss:** Q. Teresa, do all of these accurately depict you and your friends, your apartment and your car and your friends' cars?

162 **A.** Yes, and family.

163 **Q.** And family. Sorry. Family.

164 **Ms. Weiss:** Your Honor, at this time I move State's exhibits 7 to 99 into evidence.

165 **The Court:** What says the defense?

166 **Dr. Faltas:** Objection.

167 **The Court:** Objection is overruled. They're admitted into evidence.

168 **(State's exhibits 7 through 99 were received in evidence.)**

169-170 **By Ms. Weiss:** Q. Please show -- tell the jury what this picture depicts.

171 **A.** This picture shows me and my brother---

172-173 **The Court:** Just a moment. Anything that's in evidence that's referred to must be referred to by exhibit number.

174-175 **The Witness:** Oh, I'm sorry. This is exhibit number 7, and the picture depicts my brother and I. He was apparently trying to leave for work and she had blocked his car on that day, and you can tell by her rear-view mirror where she was almost in front of him,¹¹³ but by that time she could notice that my brother and I was on the phone trying to contact 9-1-1 at that time.

176-177 **By Ms. Weiss:** Q. Now, State's exhibits 8, 9, and 10, as far as you can tell, were these all taken on the same day? Is there a date on those photos?

178 **A.** Yes, it does have a date.

179 **Q.** And what is the date on the photos?

180 **A.** The date has the ninth month, 26, '09.

181 **Q.** 9/26/09?

182 **A.** Yes.

183 **Q.** And what do those photos depict? Show them to the jury and just talk about them by...

184-185 **A.** Exhibit number 8 just shows my brother's car right here, and it also has her rear-view mirror to show where she sits in the car and takes the pictures. Exhibit number 9, a different angle and still her rear-view mirror of my brother's car in front of my building. That's a dentist office beside the building. And this is a really close shot that has my brother's vehicle and license tag.¹¹⁴

186 **Court Reporter:** I'm sorry. That's your brother's?

187 **The Witness:** License tag and vehicle number and that was exhibit number 10.

188-189 **By Ms. Weiss:** Q. I show you State's exhibits 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, and 16. Going through each of these, will you please show these to the jury and tell them what the pictures depict?

190-191 **A.** [21 to page 213, line 10] Okay. This is exhibit number 11, and it shows a picture of my car at the far end of my building which would actually be in front of my building. This shows a picture of my car, the tail end of my car, and this is exhibit number 12, which is also parked in front of my building. This is exhibit number 13, and it depicts myself and a friend apparently leaving, and there she is snapping pictures and I'm waving at her just to say we see you taking pictures.¹¹⁵ [5-10] This is another picture of us the same day. She's still taking pictures, of course. That shows my car still on my side in front of my building, and this is a closer shot of her taking pictures. And this is another shot. It could be the same but different focuses maybe, but this is the same picture on the same day, me and my friend leaving.

192 **Q.** Which friend would that be?

193 **A.** Wendy Ceo.

¹¹² Teresa was not "doing nothing" in that photo. She was calling police on Dr. Assa'ad-Faltas to build a record against her.

¹¹³ By objective measurements, there are over 60 feet between the two cars in that photo.

¹¹⁴ Teresa and her brother admitted: (1) not knowing what a zoom lens is, and (2) no car is "blocked in" in any photo. [Tr. 272-3](#) and [pp 395-6](#)

¹¹⁵ Teresa admitted that it was her friend, Windy Ceo, who had a camera pointed at Dr. Faltas first. [Tr. p 240, infra](#)

¹²³ Q. And that's State's exhibits 13, 14, 15, and 16?

¹²⁴ A. Correct.

¹²⁵⁻¹²⁷ Q. All show you and Wendy. When you're waving in that picture, what was going through your mind? Was that a friendly wave?

¹²⁸⁻²¹ A. ~~It was not a friendly wave. It was a wave as to say: Please stop.~~¹²⁶ We see you. Just hey. Maybe she'd stop if you wave. I don't -- that doesn't work. ~~It was just a wave, a cynical wave.~~

¹²²⁻²³ Q. And were you and Wendy -- and what time of day was this? Do you know? Do you remember this?

¹²⁴ A. Maybe about three or four, something --

¹²⁵ Q. This was during the day.

[page 214, line 1] ¹²⁶ A. Yeah, it was during the day.

¹²⁷ Q. And do you have any idea where you or Wendy were either going or coming from?

¹²⁸ A. I have no idea.¹²⁷

¹²⁹ Q. And was there anything illegal going on --

¹³⁰ A. Oh, no.

¹³¹ Q. --- when this was happening?

¹³² A. No. Never.¹³³

¹³⁴⁻¹¹ Q. I'm going to show you State's exhibits 17, 18, 19, and 20. Can you tell the jury just in these four photos who's in the photos and what is in the photos, what's being depicted?

[12 to page 215, line 2] ¹³⁵ A. ¹³⁴⁻¹⁷ Excuse me. This is exhibit number 17, and it shows Richard Cooper and I. Obviously we were coming back from somewhere because we were walking into my building.¹³⁹ She had been saying words,¹²⁰ so I was waving to her once again cynical: "I see you; give it a rest." And as you can see, he's walking towards me as if to just go on in the apartment. ¹³⁵⁻²¹ So this just shows a closer picture of me asking her to please stop,¹²⁴ and it shows that Richard is kind of seeing or showing that just to go on inside, like she takes perfect pictures as to the conversations and movements. So she got me in conversation with her asking her to stop,¹²² and it's showing Richard telling me to go on inside. [24 to page 215, line 2] This is the same day. That's Richard now looking at her just in awe and amazement like this really goes on every day,¹²³ and this is just a picture of her obviously parked behind -- directly behind his truck right here to get a picture.

¹³⁶ Q. State's exhibit 21, what does this depict?

¹³⁷ A. That depicts the back side of the building where I live.

¹³⁸ Q. Okay. And --

¹³⁹⁻⁷ A. And in that top left square where the rail is, that would be the balcony to my apartment.

¹⁴⁰ Q. And do you know from what angle this photo was taken?

¹⁴¹ A. She would have had to have been on her balcony.

¹⁴²⁻¹² Q. State's exhibits 22, 23, 24, 25, and 26, I believe these are all taken about the same time, so if you can just state what this grouping of photos depicts.

¹⁴³⁻¹⁴ A. Okay. Do you want me to go over them separate or just ...

¹⁴⁵⁻¹⁶ Ms. Weiss: Your Honor, if it's okay just to go by the grouping of photos, that group I just named out?

¹⁴⁷ The Court: Okay.

¹⁴⁸ Ms. Weiss: Thank you, Your Honor.

[19 to page 216, line 3] ¹⁴⁹ The Witness: Okay. In these groups of pictures it shows me walking my company, Corey, downstairs and,¹²⁴ of course, he's not happy because she always calls the police whenever he's over or she always makes it her business to harass him.¹²⁵ So this would depict him being tired of her. This is her just constantly taking pictures, and that's her -- that's her windshield, as always, her rear-view mirror. That's him. We're either waiting on the police here or we're all outside, but that's still her taking pictures. It's all the same time frame. It's all the same evening.¹²⁶

¹⁴⁹⁻⁶¹ By Ms. Weiss: Q. Do you recall if this evening¹²⁶ if she was just taking pictures or if she was saying things?

¹⁵⁰ A. She had been taking pictures and saying things.¹²⁸

¹¹⁶ "Please stop" cannot possibly be read in Teresa's ecstatic smile; and she is standing across the car from Wendy Ceo, who is pointing a camera at Dr. Faltas. The true explanation is in Dr. Assa'ad-Faltas' testimony at Tr. p 702, lines 5-7. State's Exhibits 13-16 are pasted on a separate sheet. Teresa could not have had her friend photograph Dr. Faltas in her car to tell Dr. Faltas to "please stop" taking photos.

¹¹⁷ The photo sequence, proven by the frame numbers on the negatives and the progress of the shadows from the southwest-west sun, and Teresa's position at the car door establish that Teresa and Wendy were "going," not "coming." Weiss is aware of the conflict of the time of day of those photos with Teresa's false pretense that she was employed "seven to three" "five days a week." Tr. p 31, lines 17-22.

¹¹⁸ Ingram was later convicted of disorderly conduct which victimized Dr. Faltas, case Lo83175; so, clearly, something "illegal was going on."

¹¹⁹ Vide footnote 36, *supra*, and the separate sheet with this photo set pasted thereon. All three are early in the morning because Teresa's shadow is long in front of her from the east sun behind her. The white socks and black flip-flops are seen in all other photos where Teresa is neither going to, nor coming from, an address beyond 300/304 Byron Road, Columbia, SC 29209. Richard Cooper is also in home clothes. All three photos are clearly taken from a vehicle Dr. Faltas is driving. It is thus impossible for Dr. Faltas to have gotten Teresa "in a conversation" from that distance. The one photo of Teresa and Richard "going into [Teresa's] building" clearly shows Richard pulling Teresa in as she tries to make one more threat to Dr. Faltas. The photo-documented fact is that Teresa is standing in front of Building 304, where Dr. Faltas lived, which is south of Building 300, where Teresa lived. And the only non-intelligence-insulting explanation is that Teresa planted herself there to prevent Dr. Faltas from parking back in front of, and entering, her own building after she had finished circling with the lesser-used of her two vehicles to recharge its battery. Tr. p 699, lines 16-18.

¹²⁰ Dr. Assa'ad-Faltas' larynx is partly paralyzed, Tr. p 539, lines 9-16; so she could not have projected her voice across the parking lot.

¹²¹ Vide notes 119 and 120, *supra*.

¹²² Vide notes 119 and 120, *supra*.

¹²³ Undeniably, Teresa is standing in front of the building where Dr. Faltas lived, not the reverse.

¹²⁴ According to the frame-stamped negatives and to contact sheet on the non-active side of the CD containing digitization of those negatives, in Frames 1-3, PWID-cocaine and burglary convict Corey Lamont Curry was ALONE in the 300/304 Byron Rd. parking lot. In no picture is Teresa "walking [her] company, Corey, downstairs." Corey was already downstairs.

¹²⁵ The real reason Corey Lamont Curry was unhappy is that Dr. Faltas thwarted his drug drop that day.

¹²⁶ It was NOT "evening." Teresa's 911 call is automatically voice-stamped "Wednesday, October 21st 2009. The time: 13:38."

¹²⁷ Solicitor Weiss betrays her awareness that "Wednesday...13:38" is a time Teresa would not be home *is she were really employed then*.

¹²⁸ The recording of Teresa's 911 call does not have Dr. Faltas' voice at all, only the voices of Teresa, Corey, Tiffany and her toddler.

119 Q. Exhibit 27, do you know what this depicts?

119-120 A. That depicts her inside of her apartment out her window taking a picture of me talking to the police.

120 Q. Okay.

121 Dr. Faltas: What number was that? I'm sorry.

121 Ms. Weiss: State's exhibit 27.

121-122 By Ms. Weiss: Q. All right. State's exhibit 28?

122 A. That shows me walking my brother outside, and she's - I think on that picture she was talking to him, asking him about his work or something on that day.¹²⁹

123-24 Q. State's exhibits 29 and 30, do you know what these depict?

24 A. It depicts Richard leaving.

25 Q. Okay. And is there a date on these photos?

25 A. Yes. It says 9/10 - what? 10/9/11.

26 Q. I believe 10/11/09?

26 A. 10/11/09, yeah.

[page 217, lines 1-3] Q. State's exhibits 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, and 41, if you'll look at this grouping of photos. What does this group of photos represent -- depict?

127-131 A. That depicts - one day it was beautiful outside. I went on my balcony, and I noticed the man that lives downstairs from me had company and the guy was sitting outside. So I was on my balcony saying how nice of a day it was, and me and him was conversating (sic),¹³⁰ and she came outside with her camera, started calling me all kind of names, vulgar names,¹³¹ and was arguing with the man that was sitting outside. That's what those pictures depict, and I was inside of my balcony, so she was leaned over on her balcony.

132 Q. At any point did you call her out to her balcony?

132 A. Never.¹³²

133-134 Q. Were you actually have a discussion with her on her balcony?

134 A. Never.

135 Q. What types of vulgar names was she calling you?

135-136 A. Bitch, prostitute, killer, but mainly a bitch and prostitute.

137-138 Q. Do you have any idea why she would have been calling you this to your balcony in front of this man?

138 A. Well, no. She says that every chance that she gets.

139 Q. State's exhibits 38, 39, 40, what do these depict?

[page 218, lines 1-3] A. It depicts her obviously out by the mailboxes taking pictures of my vehicle and Richard's vehicle, and it's a perfect picture of the apartments.

140 Q. And these apartments, that would be whose apartment?

140 A. I live in that building, and she lives in that building.

141-142 Q. So two separate buildings. Okay. State's exhibits 42, 43, and 44, I show them to you.

142 A. It obviously shows me leaving.

143 Q. State's exhibits 45, 46, 47, and 48.

143-144 A. It shows the picture of the parking lot and my car and my brother's car and my neighbor's car, and it has - this picture right here which is exhibit number 45, it shows me talking with someone. I'm not sure who that is, but that's me in front of my building.¹³³

144 Dr. Faltas: Your Honor? Your Honor?

144 The Court: Yes.

145-146 Dr. Faltas: I object to what Ms. Weiss is writing on here. Victim. We have agreed that she's an alleged victim and she had not said anything - Ms. Weiss started writing before the witness spoke, and I object to her saying - writing victim.

146 The Court: All right. The objection is noted.

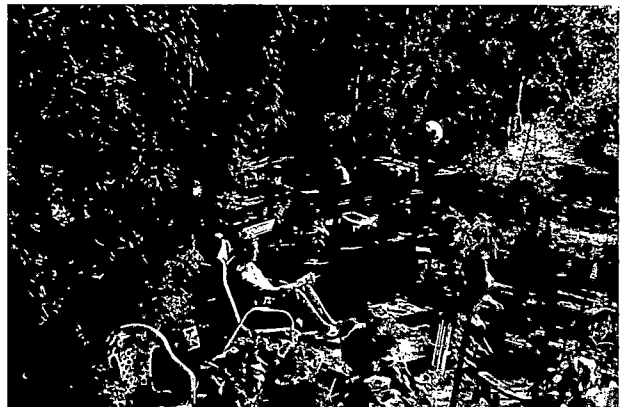
[24 to page 219, line 1] By Ms. Weiss: Q. State's exhibits 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 54, this series of photos, if you would please tell the jury what this series of photos depicts.

¹²⁹ Dr. Faltas is physically unable to project her voice across the 180-foot 300/304 Byron Rd. parking lot.

¹³⁰ Only the chronologically penultimate photo shows Teresa even looking towards "the guy." She turned to him only at the end. The true chronology of the events of that day is shown in a separate sheet with the photos in true chronological order.

¹³¹ An audio recording made by Dr. Faltas of that conversation proves Teresa insulted Dr. Faltas, not the reverse.

¹³² Solicitor Weiss had seized and concealed the chronologically first and last images of the 13 October 2009 set: Mitch Jones, standing under Dr. Faltas' balcony and calling out to her the sitting and smoking:



¹³³ The photo is NOT in front of Building 300, Byron Road; and Teresa later admitted she knows to whom she spoke.

121 A. That's the day my father and my two uncles came to Columbia. My father came to pick up some storm windows because they're remodeling their house. His truck stopped on him at my apartment. Because we all know how she is, I asked him to try to have somebody come from Sumter as quick as possible to not cause problems in my dad's life. [4] **A.** If you saw that, I don't see that. No.

[5-6] **Q.** State's exhibits 61, 58, and 59, is that Corey Curry flipping me the finger?

[7] **A.** Yes, it is.

[8] **Q.** And that is on October 21st, 2009?

[9] **A.** Yep.

[10-11] **Q.** Okay. Could you please look at -- is that you coming out there?

[12] **A.** That's me.

[13] **Q.** Okay. Could you please look at your fingers?

[14] **A.** For what? Okay. I've looked.

[8] **A.** Exactly.

[9-10] **Q.** Okay. And then you filed a lawsuit against a woman in June of 2008?

[11] **A.** I've never filed a lawsuit against anyone, never.²⁰⁹

[12-13] **Q.** The case of Teresa Ingram against Marjorie Russell Triffon is not your case?

[14-16] **A.** A car accident. You're right. One time.²¹⁰ You're right. It was a car accident I had maybe about two years ago. Well, ~~it was a car accident for car repairs,~~²¹¹ yeah.

[17-18] **Q.** Actually it's not one time. There is another lawsuit by you pending in Sumter also for a car accident.

[19] **A.** And what lawsuit was that? That -- that is not true.

[20-21] **Q.** Uh-huh. Well, we'll get it and we'll show it to the jury.

[22] **A.** Thank you.

121 A. Sure.

121 Q. Have you ever used automatic cameras?

121 A. Sure.

125-61 Q. Do you know that the flash doesn't go off when it's daylight?

121 A. I do know that it depends on how you have it set.

128-91 Q. Uh-huh. And do you know that even if the flash were set to go on, it wouldn't be seen when it's daylight?

110 A. That's not always true.

111 Q. Uh-huh. I am at quite a distance from--

112 Ms. Weiss: Objection.

113-151 By Dr. Faltas: Q. Do the pictures show that I'm at quite a distance from --

116 A. They sure don't.²²²

117-191 Q. They don't. All right. State's exhibits 54, 53, 52, 51, 50, and 49: Are you holding a coat hanger in your hand in some of them, in at least one of them?

120 A. I don't know what it is that you see, but no.²²³

121-221 Q. Specifically State's exhibit 54, do you see a coat hanger?

123-241 A. I don't see a coat hanger, and I would like for you to show me a coat hanger in this picture right here.

125 Q. That's what I'm pointing at.

125 to page 261, lines 1-31 A. No, no, no. But you're saying that there's a coat hanger in this picture. Just show me a coat hanger that's in this picture.

121 Q. Yes, right here in your hand.

125-71 A. It looks like something across the picture. I don't ever recalling having a coat hanger, but it does look like something across the picture.

121 Q. And on this one here also a coat hanger?

121 A. No.²²⁴

110-111 Q. And does it show that those people are going through a clear exit? No one is blocking them?

112-119 A. It does show that. It shows you sitting in your car taking pictures, yeah.

114 Q. Where am I in my car taking pictures?

115-181 A. Right here in every single picture in your rear-view mirror. You're so smart that you forget that it takes a picture of yourself in the car. As a matter of fact, there's pictures with you taking pictures of yourself in the mirror.

119 Q. This is very far from where you were --

120 A. No, it's not.²²⁵

121-221 Q. All right. The jury will see that. Are these people able to pull out?

123-241 A. You see they are directly in front of an entrance or exit. So, yes, they can pull straight out.

125 to page 262, line 1 Q. So they were not blocked. So I come home. I see somebody with a coat hanger --

121 A. You was already home.²²⁶

123-51 Q. *Could you please let me finish the question? I see somebody with a coat hanger in her hand and people hooking a car to a truck---*

125 Ms. Weiss: Objection, Your Honor.

127 The Court: The objection is sustained.

128-29 Dr. Faltas: *Would a reasonable person seeing this, seeing that someone was --*

130 Ms. Weiss: Objection.

131 The Court: Objection is sustained.

1251 A. If. Hypothetical.

1page 263, line 11 Q. *How would I know?*

121 A. How would I know?

123-51 Q. *Okay. And this is State's exhibit 82. Isn't that, in fact, your car pulling out of the exit that's closer to my building?*

127 A. *That's me leaving out of the entrance or exit that I chose, yes.*²²⁸

181 Q. *Isn't it, in fact, the exit closer to my building?*

19-101 A. *That is the entrance or exit that is on -- closest to the building that she resides in.*²²⁹

111-141 Q. *And since you started trying to run me off, isn't it true that one of the things you and your unquote/quote company were -- started doing is do a detour in front of my building and car and honk at me and yell obscenities at me?*

115-201 A. Actually you did that several times. As a matter of fact, I can remember calling the police because you kept continuously doing it as a way to irritate me, and when you used the race card about this old foreigner, I'm the only black person that lives in my building, and I've never been discriminated on.

121 Q. *Yes, of course, because you pay \$320 --*

122-231 A. I do not -- I wish I did, but you'll never know how much I pay because it's not your business.²³⁰

124 to page 264, line 11 Q. *What reason would you have to take this exit as opposed to the exit that's closer to your building as portrayed in the State's exhibit 82?*

12-41 A. It's my choice.²³¹ There's no entrance or exit. You can call it whatever or whatever we choose to call it. So I choose to use whichever one I want to just as well as you do.²³²

15-61 Q. *State's exhibits 85, 84, 44, 43, and 42. Is the red car a Corvette?*

17-141 A. It's a red car. I don't know who that car is. Everybody that comes to that address does not come to visit me. Three other people live in that building outside of me. I do not know every vehicle that comes in the parking lot. It's a red car; that's what I know. It's a Chevrolet, looks like it. That's all I know. Anything else, I don't know who the car belongs to, who drives it, how the person looks or anything.

115-171 Q. *Isn't it true that this car is driven by Larry Mason and that you followed him that day to go and file something against me?*

118-191 A. Once again, I don't know who drives that car, how the person looks.

1211 A. Corvette. This isn't a Corvette.

1221 Q. *Have you ever seen Larry Mason drive a red Chevrolet?*

1231 A. I've seen him drive a red Corvette.

124-251 Q. *And is a Corvette a Chevrolet? Is Corvette made by Chevrolet?*

1page 265, lines 1-21 A. I don't know, but I know that this red car is not a Corvette. That I do know.

124-4 Q. *In State's exhibit 44 is your car following a Corvette, a red Corvette?*

125-61 A. My car is leaving out following a red car. I don't know what kind of car it is,²³³ and I don't think you do either.

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114 Q. And these are taken from my window, aren't they?

115 A. Well, you would know.

116-117 Q. State's exhibits 40 and 43, do they show my building and your building and my pickup truck in front of my building?

118-119 A. This is a perfect picture of both of the buildings, not in its entirety, and there is a little beat-up truck in the picture.

120-121 Q. Have you ever seen me drive that old beat-up truck that's in the picture?

122 A. I don't know.²³⁴

123 Q. So you don't know.

124 A. I know you drive the little green raggedy car.

125 Q. What?

126 A. I know that you drive the green raggedy car.

127 Q. The green what?

128 A. Raggedy, rickety old car—

129 Q. Okay.

130-131 A. —that's filled with paper cups and straws and plastic and all kind of other stuff.

132-133 Q. So you look at my car.

134-135 A. Who can't see it? And when you came home last night, now the apartments look worse than what they do just by sight because you left your window up with all that stuff showing.

136-137 Q. The State's exhibits 45 and 46, isn't -- aren't these taken from my window?

138-139 A. Unless you're on the top of the building or the side of the building, yeah.

140-141 Q. Okay. And isn't it true that that day you were talking to someone loud enough for me to hear and telling them that my Egyptian —

142 Ms. Weiss: Objection, Your Honor.

143-144 The Witness: I don't know what you can hear. I don't know; I'm not you.

145-146 The Court: Objection — just a moment. The objection is sustained.

147-150 By Dr. Faltas: Q. And State's exhibits 29 -- and State's exhibits 29 and 30, do they not show this so-called Richard Cooper again making a detour and driving in front of my building?

151 A. It shows the so-called Richard Cooper leaving.

152 Q. Which exit? Can you tell?

153-154 A. The one that he chose on that day, and it's not an entrance or exit. So you can stop saying that. It's not an entrance or exit. You can use it as you wish: Entrance or exit.

155 Q. State's exhibit 27, is it taken from my window?

156-157 A. Yep, clearly from your window because it shows all the straws that I just said that you have. Yeah, yeah, yeah, your window.²³⁵

158-159 Q. And isn't it true that it shows you talking to a policeman?

160 A. Correct.

161-162 Q. And isn't it true that it shows the clear exit, that the exit is totally clear?

163-164 A. There's not an entrance or exit. If it shows something — it could be either/or.

165-166 Q. Either/or exit or entrance, it's clear, not blocked by anyone?

167 A. On that picture, no.

168-171 Q. And you had called the police falsely claiming that I had blocked your brother's exit or whatever?

172 A. If I called the police falsely, what have you done?

173 Q. What did you say?

174-175 A. I said if I ever call the police falsely, what have you done? Every complaint has been false and frivolous —

176 Q. Your Honor —

177 A. —because you want to be a real lawyer —

178 Q. Your Honor —

179 A. — on T.V.

180-181 Q. Your Honor, may I ask you to admonish the witness for interjecting —

182 A. But you do the same thing.

183 Dr. Faltas: Your Honor, this witness is out of control!

184 The Court: All right. Let's respond to the questions. Next question. Anything further?

185 Dr. Faltas: Yes, Your Honor. I was —

186 The Court: Next question.

187-188 Dr. Faltas: The State doesn't have the pictures in the correct order, so I was trying to find them in the correct order.

189-190 By Dr. Faltas: Q. Exhibits -- State's exhibits 19, 18, and 17. In exhibit 19 aren't you, in fact, standing in front of my building?

191 A. No.²³⁶

192 Q. You're not.

193-194 A. No, and the picture shows that.²³⁷ And you can't see that? Does that show me in front of your building?

195 Q. Okay. Is this my building?

196 A. Yeah.

197 Q. And is this your building?

122] A. Correct.

123] Q. And aren't you, in fact, in front of my--

124-25] A. No.²³⁸ Does that picture show your sign number on your door? That's not in the front of your building.

[page 269, lines 1-3] Q. And then in State's exhibit 6, does it show you talking to police after you called police and claimed that I blocked ---

14-5] A. I'm not sure who called on this day, but, yes, it does show me talking to the police.

16-7] Q. And it does show the exit that's closer to your building?

18] A. It shows an entrance or an exit.

19] Q. That is completely clear and unblocked. Yes or no?

110-111] A. The entrance or exit that's in that particular picture is not blocked.

112-13] Q. And then -- and then State's exhibits 26, 25, 24, 23, and 22.

114] A. (The witness looks at the photographs.)

115] Q. Do they not show the truck of Corey Curry?

116] A. Yes, it shows you sitting in your car taking pictures.

117] Q. Ma'am?

118-19] A. Yes, it shows you in your car taking pictures of his truck.

120] Q. Aren't the pictures taken from behind his truck?

121] A. You were in your car taking pictures of the truck.

122] Q. Aren't they taken from behind his?

123-25] A. You can't say that and I can't say -- well, you can say it, of course. I can't say that because I don't ... You make up everything.²³⁹

[page 270, line 1] Q. Does it show the license plate?

12-5] A. Not clear. Oh, this one right here you was real close on this one, almost directly behind him, and on this one.

Yeah, these pictures are showing you almost blocking him.²⁴⁰ Yeah.

16] Q. How could I block him --

17-8] A. I said almost blocking him, if you're that close.²⁴¹ Are you looking at these pictures?

19-10] Q. Yes, ma'am, and he was -- he could be driving out or stopped in the middle of the parking lot and not ---

11-12] A. How can it be the middle if it's on this end in front of my car? Come on now. You need to look at your pictures.

113-14] Q. It's not -- all right. What is your car -- where is your car? Show the jury--

115] A. Where it's always parked.

116-17] Q. So where is your car in this picture? Show the jury. Show the jury.

118-19] A. You can only see the rim of my car, the front rim, the front left rim.

120] Q. Where? Where?

121-22] A. See right here. If you could see a so-called hanger, you can see this rim.

123-24] Q. Okay. So this is Corey's truck blocking your car, not my car?

125] A. Correct.

[page 271, line 1] Q. I am not blocking any --

124] A. He's parked directly in front of my car. He was leaving and we was talking, and then you came outside and so, yeah, yeah, you're right.

15] Q. So he is the one blocking the parking lot.

16-9] A. He is the one on that particular picture parked where I asked him to, directly in front of my car. I never complained about him parking in front of my car or being parked or stalled in front of my car.

110] Q. Yeah, but it could have inconvenienced me.

111-13] A. No, it inconvenienced me to the point one day that the police had to literally make you put your foot on the gas to leave to stop harassing me.²⁴²

114-16] Q. Your Honor, could you please make her limit herself to the question? State's exhibits 7, 28, and 77, are they -- do they seem to be taken the same day and the same time?

117-18] A. I can't say that. You should have your camera fixed where it shows the date and time.

119] Q. Does it show you in all three pictures?

120] A. Does it show me what? Does it show myself? Yeah.

121] Q. Does it show your brother?

122-23] A. Yep, it shows him frustrated with you and doing hand gestures like, "I can't leave out."²⁴³ Yeah, it does. It shows all that.

124] Q. Is he wearing the same thing in the three pictures?

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[page 272, line 1] **A.** Yep.

[2] **Q.** Are you wearing the same thing in the three pictures?

[3] **A.** It looks like it.

[4] **Q.** Is it the same light conditions in the three pictures?

[5-6] **A.** That I don't know. Is it the same light condition? How was your camera set?

[7-8] **Q.** ~~And isn't it true that I am completely on my side of the buildings and the other exit is not blocked?~~

[9] **A.** ~~On the picture no exits are blocked.~~

[10] **Q.** All right. Thank you.

[11-12] **A.** I don't ... Well, how about the harassment part? What about that?

[13-14] **Dr. Faltas:** ~~Your Honor, could you please admonish the witness not to speak unless there is a question before her?~~

[15] **The Court:** Okay. She's so admonished.

[16] **Dr. Faltas:** Pardon?

[17] **The Court:** She is so admonished.

[18-19] **Dr. Faltas:** Thank you. Would you please tell the jury to disregard that comment by her?

[20] **The Court:** Proceed.

[21] **Dr. Faltas:** Thank you.

[22-23] **By Dr. Faltas:** **Q.** State's exhibit 9.

[24] **A.** (The witness looks at the photograph.)

[25] **The Court:** How many more photographs do you have there?

[page 273, lines 1-2] **Dr. Faltas:** **Your Honor, I have the rest of what the State presented.**

[3] **The Court:** How many are there?

[4-5] **Dr. Faltas:** There seems to be about 30, but I'm doing them in groups.

[6-7] **The Court:** Do you plan to ask her questions about all of them?

[8] **Dr. Faltas:** Not individually but in groups, Your Honor.

[9] **The Court:** Okay.

[10-12] **By Dr. Faltas:** **Q.** That picture shows my Toyota pick-up and your brother's car?

[13-16] **A.** I don't know the relevance of these pictures. It's like you're taking pictures of his car. What do you want me to say? It shows the entrance or exit. Yes, it has a picture of my brother's car.

[17] **Q.** ~~And it's not blocked in any way, is it?~~

[18-19] **A.** ~~Show the pictures that are blocking. No, it's not blocked on that one.~~

[20-21] **Q.** Okay. Have you ever used a camera that has a zoom photo -- a zoom lens?

[22] **A.** I'm sure I have.

[23] **Q.** Do you know what a zoom lens is?

[24-25] **A.** ~~I'm not a photographer. I'm not familiar with it like that.~~

[page 274, line 1] **Q.** So you don't know what a zoom lens is or do you?

[2] **A.** ~~I'm not familiar with it like that.~~

[3] **Q.** All right. State's exhibits 47, 10, and 8.

[4] **A.** (The witness looks at the photographs.)

[5] **Q.** Do they once again show your brother with a clear exit?

[6-11] **A.** It does not show that on any of these pictures you've just handed me. Really. It clearly shows you directly behind his car taking pictures. That's what these pictures are depicting: You in your car taking pictures. Why? Who knows. These are the ones that are -- you are blocking him from moving on that though, yeah.²⁴⁴

[12] **Q.** Isn't the mailbox here? So I'm on the other side of --

[13] **A.** I didn't point out that one either.

[14] **Q.** All right. State's exhibits 96, 91, 92, 97, 95, and 94.

[15] **A.** (The witness looks at the photographs.)

[16] **Q.** Do they show this Corey working on your car?

[17-19] **A.** It does not show Corey working on anything. What it does show is you in your car obviously moving to get closer to take the pictures. That's -- that's what it's showing.

[20] **Q.** Does it show your car with your hood up and --

[21] **A.** It sure does. Uh-huh.

[22] **Q.** With parts all over the lot?

[23] **A.** All over the lot?

[24] **Q.** Uh-huh.

[25] **A.** One car could be parked all over the lot? Really.

[page 275, line 1] **Q.** Parts. Parts. Parts. P-a-r-t-s. Car parts.

[2-4] **A.** Okay. So it's parts -- so you see parts all over here. I don't see parts right there. I see parts directly at the tire where he was working at.

[5] **Q.** Is this a garage? Is our parking lot a garage?

[6-8] **A.** Wherever said it was a garage? Whoever said that -- whoever said that I could not have my car worked on? That's not in the lease.²⁴⁵

111 Q. In a residential --

110 A. Here you go.

111 Q. In a residential area?

112 A. Here you go.

113-114 Q. And then State's exhibits 98 and 99, do they not show Corey in his blue truck in the middle of the parking lot and in one of them he's flipping a finger at me again?

116-117 A. Yeah. It shows him actually leaving. Yeah. Yeah, he flipped you for sure.

118 Q. And then State's exhibit 88?

119-121 A. That shows that obviously you had followed him to his residence, but then you don't do things like that? It shows you followed that man to his house.²⁴⁶ That's what that shows.²⁴⁷ But then you're so scared because he grabbed his crotch, but then you follow him to his house?

124-125 Dr. Faltas: Your Honor, could you please -- the witness hasn't heeded Your Honor's admonition.

126-127 The Court: She's responded to your question. Next question.

13-14 By Dr. Faltas: Q. So you know for a fact that that's his house.

15 A. You do, too. Yep.

16 Q. And that's his car in front of his house?

17 A. You know that, too.

18 Q. Minus a fire.

19-110 A. Minus what fire? What do you see? Where do you see minus a fire at? Oh, yeah, it is minus a fire. You was that close?

112 Q. Is that common sense?

113-116 A. I can't tell you. You was following somebody home who you're scared of, so from -- for just flipping you and grabbing their crouch (sic) in a so-called purported arousal state, but then you followed them to their house?

117 Q. How do you know I followed him?

118 A. How did you get the picture?

119 Q. How do you know I didn't get --

120 A. How did you get the picture?

121-122 Q. How do you know I didn't get the address from the police department?

123-124 A. Okay, but how did you get the picture? Even if you got the address and you went there, how did you get the picture?

125 Q. It's not following--

126-127 A. Are you stalking him as well?

128 Q. Ma'am?

129 A. Ma'am?

130 Q. You did not see me follow him.

131 A. It's your picture, your camera --

132 Q. It's --

133 A. It's with the same --

134 Q. Okay --

135 A. Okay. So your point is what?

136 Court Reporter: I can't take you both at the same time.

111 The Witness: I'm sorry.

112-141 By Dr. Faltas: Q. And exhibits -- State's exhibits 38 and 39, do you recall what you said about them?

115-118 A. I recall stating that -- I don't really recall, but the way it -- looks like you parked out by the mailbox, stalked out like you always are.²⁴⁸ These just are you taking pictures of nothing really.²⁴⁹

119 Q. Parked out by the mailbox.

120-121 A. These pictures prove the obsession and the constant harassment.²⁵⁰ That's what your pictures are proving.

122-123 Q. Isn't it clear that they are taken from the street, not --

124-125 A. I just said that. I didn't say from in your apartment. I said you're stalked out by the -- by the mailboxes.

126-127 Q. They aren't by the mailboxes. The mailboxes are on the other side.

128 Ms. Weiss: Objection, Your Honor.

14-71 The Court: The objections are -- the objection is sustained. You cannot testify. You'll get an opportunity if you want to testify. Do you have any more questions for the witness?

18-29 Dr. Faltas: Yes, Your Honor. I haven't finished going through the pictures.

110-111 The Court: All right. You need to ask her questions as opposed to testifying.

112-115 By Dr. Faltas: Q. State's exhibits 1, 2, 3, 5, and 20, do they not show on another occasion also Corey's car marking a detour to go in --

116 A. Excuse me? Whose car? Let's get it right.

117 Q. Richard's car.

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[18-19] **A.** It does not show any detour,²⁵¹ unless these pictures can talk. It shows you taking a picture of him leaving.

[20-21] **Q.** And State's exhibit 83, does it not show your car driving in front of my car?

[22-23] **A.** If you were sitting in your car when you took this picture, then, yes, I guess I did pass by you.

[24-25] **Q.** Okay. And then State's exhibit 21, does it show your balcony?

[page 279, line 1] **A.** Yes.

[2] **Q.** And Charlene's balcony?

[3] **A.** Yep.

[4] **Q.** And does Charlene's balcony have a ---

[5-6] **A.** I don't know what Charlene has on her balcony now. I don't know.²⁵²

[6-7] **Q.** Do you dispute that it has a big sofa there that people don't normally put in their balconies?

[9-11] **A.** And the eyesore from your apartment. Come on. If there's a sofa on her porch, what's the relevance of these questions?

[12] **Q.** Is there a sofa in her porch ---

[13] **A.** Wow.

[14] **Q.** ---or not?

[15-16] **A.** There's a sofa on her porch, and there's trash in your window.²⁵³

[17-18] **Q.** Did there come a time when you got furniture from Aaron's rent furniture or from Aaron's ---

[19] **Ms. Weiss:** Objection.

[20] **The Witness:** No, there wasn't.²⁵⁴

[21] **The Court:** The objection is sustained.

[22-23] **By Dr. Faltas:** Q. Did Corey ever work for Aaron's ---

[24] **A.** I don't know.²⁵⁵ I'm not Corey.

[25] **Q.** When did you meet Corey?

[page 280, line 1] **A.** A couple of years ago maybe.

[2] **Q.** How did you meet him?

[3] **A.** That doesn't matter.

[4] **Ms. Weiss:** Objection.

[5] **The Court:** The objection is sustained.

[6-7] **Dr. Faltas:** Did you ever come to know that he has many drug convictions ---

[8] **Ms. Weiss:** Objection.

[9-10] **The Witness:** That's not my --- that's not my business. See, that's the difference between me and you.

[11-12] **The Court:** Just a moment, ma'am. When there's an objection, let's stop talking. The objection is sustained.

[13-15] **By Dr. Faltas:** Q. And then State's exhibits 41, 37, 36, 35, 34, 33, 32, and 31, do they not show you in your balcony?

[16-22] **A.** Yes. This was the day that you came out, while I'm talking to the man that's downstairs in my building, calling names and cursing.²⁵⁶ This is a little feeble act that she plays in court when she gets in court that she can't talk, but then she screams all kind of obscenities and stuff all day, just like she just had her little tyrant just now. Yes, I remember these pictures on this date.

[23-24] **Q.** In fact, didn't you hear in one court where I played a tape ---

[25] **Ms. Weiss:** Objection.

[page 281, line 1] **The Court:** Objection is sustained.

[2-3] **Dr. Faltas:** Your Honor, may I play a tape for impeachment purposes?

[4] **The Court:** A tape from another court hearing?

[5] **Dr. Faltas:** No, a tape from her.

[6] **The Court:** From her?

[7] **The Witness:** She's saying me and ---

[8] **The Court:** Just a moment, ma'am. A tape from where?

[9-10] **Dr. Faltas:** Where she that day was yelling obscenities at me and I came out and recorded it.

[11] **The Court:** All right.

[12-13] **Dr. Faltas:** And took pictures to correlate both of them and that tape was played in a court.

[14] **The Court:** All right. You may proceed.

[15] **Dr. Faltas:** Thank you, Your Honor.

[16] **The Witness:** Play it.

[17-19] **The Court:** Ladies and gentlemen, let's stand for -- do you need a break? All right. Please go to the jury room for a break.

[20-21] ~~(Whereupon, the jury was excused from open court at 4:52 p.m.)~~

[22-24] **The Court:** Ma'am, you have prepared to play whatever it is when the jury comes back out. Are you preparing to play something?

[25] **Dr. Faltas:** Yes, Your Honor.

[page 282, line 1] **The Court:** Looking for something?

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121 Dr. Faltas: Yes, I'm looking.

13-14 The Court: All right. If you'd be prepared to go when the jury comes back out.

14 Dr. Faltas: Thank you.

16 The Court: We'll take a short break.

17 *(Whereupon, a short break was taken.)*

18-19 The Court: All right. If you'll take your seat and bring the jury, please.

1101 Ms. Weiss: Your Honor?

111 The Court: Yes.

112-161 Ms. Weiss: Due to the fact that it's 5:00 and we're still on this witness, we do not have any more witnesses coming today. I was just going to have everybody lined up for tomorrow. I'm hoping we'll finish this witness today. Does that sound ...

117 The Court: All right.

1191 Ms. Weiss: Thank you, Your Honor.

119-201 Dr. Faltas: Your Honor, I don't think I can finish this witness today.

121 The Court: She said she hopes that we will.

122-231 *(Whereupon, the jury was brought into open court at 5:04 p.m.)*

124 to page 283, line 21 The Court: It doesn't really matter... If someone wants to sit on that back row, it's fine with me. If some of the jurors want to sit on the back row, it doesn't matter to me even though the... All right.

14 Dr. Faltas: Your Honor?

16 The Court: Yes, proceed.

15-61 Dr. Faltas: Thank you. To save time, may I -- may I ask other questions and --

17 The Court: To save time, yes.

18-91 Dr. Faltas: I mean -- and when there is another break, I find the exact spot on the tape? I'm --

110 The Court: You're asking the questions. Proceed.

111 Dr. Faltas: Thank you, Your Honor.

112-131 By Dr. Faltas: Q: Ma'am, I'm going back in the order from the beginning -- I did the pictures that she did last, but I'm going back from the beginning of the questions Ms. Weiss asked you, and I hope I'll go over them quickly. You said you worked in Navy aviation for a year and a half and had a medical discharge. Can you tell us what does that mean - what medical condition you had?

1201 A: A medical honorable discharge.

121 Q: Yeah. What was the medical condition?

122 Ms. Weiss: Objection.

123 The Court: The objection is overruled.

124-251 The Witness: Migraines. Migraines is why I was dismissed from the military.²⁵⁷ My God.

[page 284, lines 1-21] **By Dr. Faltas: Q:** And you were how old then?

131 A: I don't know. I don't remember.²⁵⁸

14-51 Q: Okay. And then you said you went to South Carolina University?

161 A: Yes.

171 Q: And did you graduate?

181 A: No.

19-101 Q: You did not graduate. You also went to Benedict College.

111 A: Yes.

112 Q: Did you graduate from Benedict College?

113 A: No.

114 Q: No?

1151 A: That's the answer.

116-171 Q: I just didn't hear it. And you said you also went to Columbia College?

1181 A: No, I did not say that.

119-201 Q: Did you go to other colleges from which you did not graduate?

1211 A: Yeah.

1221 Q: Which other colleges or universities?

1231 A: I went to Midlands Tech. Wow.

1241 Q: Midlands Tech? And what else?

125 to page 285, line 11 A: That's it. If you found out something else ... I went to high school, middle school, elementary school.

127 Q: So you do not have any college degree?

131 A: No, I do not have a degree.²⁵⁹

14-51 Q: Okay. At one time in another court you claimed that you have an associate's degree.

161 A: When did I say that?²⁶⁰

171 Q: Well, there are tapes.

181 A: Okay.

19-101 Q: And you say that you're gainfully employed. What is your hourly rate?

111-121 A: That's irrelevant, and that's not your business. Huh-uh.²⁶¹

113-141 Dr. Faltas: Your Honor, may I ask that you have her answer?

115-161 The Court: The objection is sustained. It's irrelevant.

117-181 **Dr. Faltas:** *May -- may I offer her answer for the record?*

119 **The Court:** No.

120-221 **By Dr. Faltas:** *Q. And you have been divorced for only a year and a half?*

1221 **A.** That's what I said.²⁶²

123-241 **Q.** *Okay. So when you rented the apartment, you were not divorced?*

1251 **A.** No.

[page 286, lines 1-2] **Q.** *Okay. And, in fact, was it your brother, you, or your ex-husband who rented the apartment for you or someone else?*

13-71 **A.** Ask me some relevant questions because the questions that you're asking are -- it's like you're trying to be funny with the questions, and I'm not sure how you want me to answer your questions. I can't give you a yes-or-no answer to those questions.

18-91 **Q.** *Do you know if you signed a lease in your own name or someone else rented?*

110-111 **A.** If I'm renting the place and I live there alone, I, of course, signed my own lease.²⁶³

112-231 **Q.** *Did you have to offer proof of income before -- before --*

114 **Ms. Weiss:** Objection.

115 **The Witness:** I went through the same process you did.²⁶⁴

116-201 **By Dr. Faltas:** *Q. Your Honor, she obviously doesn't know what process I went through. I was asking if she ever -- if she had to offer -- to offer proof of income before renting the apartment.*

1211 **A.** Everybody has to show proof of income.²⁶⁵

1221 **Q.** *Ma'am, I'm not asking about everybody.*

1231 **A.** Wow.

1241 **Q.** *I'm asking about you. Did you have --*

1251 **A.** What's the relevance?

[page 287, lines 1-2] **Dr. Faltas:** *Your Honor, could you please make her answer?*

131 **The Court:** There's an objection that preceded your colloquy with the witness. State the nature of the objection.

1621 **Ms. Weiss:** Relevance to this line of questioning to the case.

181 **The Court:** And what's the relevance, ma'am?

19-151 **Dr. Faltas:** *Your Honor, you know that my defense is that this person has been engaged by Dinah Steele and Larry Mason to try to get rid of me so they can keep my land and the sewer on it, and I am trying to prove that she has a financial incentive to work with them on that, including that they either give her a low rate for rent or an exception or things like that. I'm trying to establish that, Your Honor.*

161 **The Court:** The objection is sustained.

117-181 **By Dr. Faltas:** *Q. So how did you know to rent this apartment?*

1191 **A.** What do you mean how did I not rent it?

1201 **Q.** *How do you know to rent it? I mean --*

1211 **A.** Because it had for rent sign outside.²⁶⁶

1241 **Ms. Weiss:** Objection.

1251 **The Witness:** Because I wanted to move.²⁶⁷

[page 288, line 1] **Ms. Weiss:** Objection.

121 **The Witness:** The same reason why you moved there.

13-1 **The Court:** She's answered the question. She wanted to move. Next question.

151 **The Witness:** Oh, man.

16-71 **Dr. Faltas:** *Did there come a time when other people paid the rent for you?*

121 **Ms. Weiss:** Objection.

191 **The Court:** Objection is sustained.

110-121 **By Dr. Faltas:** *Q. And you talked about a man whom you were dating, and it ended around Valentine's in 2009?*

1131 **A.** You made a statement. You didn't ask a question.

114-161 **Q.** *Do you recall in your direct examination by the State that you talked about a man whom you were dating and it ended badly around Valentine 2009?*

1171 **A.** Yeah.

118-191 **Q.** *Did you call the police telling them that he had threatened to kill you?*

120-231 **A.** I called the police and said I made threats -- that he -- that he made threats. I'm not even sure what the exact words were. Do you have that transcript or that tape when I called 9-1-1?

124-251 **Q.** *Your Honor, I cannot testify, but, yes, there is a police report where you said he had ---*

[page 289, line 1] **A.** Okay. Well, thank you.

121 **Q.** --- threatened to kill you.

131 A. Thank you.

14-51 Q. And did you also say that he left notes on your door and produced those notes to the police?

161 A. Yes.

171 Q. Okay. And —

181 A. I said he left a note.²⁶⁸

19-201 Q. Did you also tell the police that he called and talked to your brother?

111 A. I probably did, but what's the relevance of that?

121 Q. Okay.

131 A. Okay. Yes, he came. Yeah, I called the police.

14-161 Q. And did you tell the jury that the police were out in the parking lot talking to you when I saw you and asked what's going on?

17-241 A. I did not say that. What I said was when the police came up, then I went downstairs to meet him because our doors have a lock on it which means if you don't know the code you can't get in. I went downstairs to meet him. At that time she was already in her window yelling to try to get him to talk to her,²⁶⁹ and he told her to go back inside, to mind her business, that what was going on or what had happened didn't have anything to do with her.

25 to page 290, line 21 Q. And did you after that ask Dinah Steele and Larry Mason to change the lock code on the door to your building so that this man cannot come in?

31 A. Yes, I did.

41 Q. Okay. And did you tell them that?

51 A. Did I tell who that?

61 Q. Did you tell Dinah Steele and Larry Mason that that —

7-81 A. If they changed the code on the door, the answer is obviously, yes, **I had to tell them.** Right?

91 Q. You requested it. You requested that it happen.

101 Ms. Weiss: Objection.

11-121 The Court: The objection is sustained. She's answered the question already.

13-151 By Dr. Faltas: Q. And then the next day you called the police and said to forget about it; you didn't want the file.

161 A. Oh, that's so untrue.²⁷⁰

171 Q. What?

181 A. That's not true.

191 Q. So what happened to that complaint?

20-221 A. That's not your business. You want to know that.²⁷¹ I'm not going to — I'm not going into my personal business with you. I'm sorry.

23-241 Q. Did you testify -- do you recall testifying on direct examination that that was the end of that situation?

251 A. Yes.

26 to page 291, line 21 Q. Okay.

271 A. And it is.

28-31 Q. So someone threatens to kill you. You make a call, and that's the end of it.

32 Ms. Weiss: Objection.

33 The Witness: The same thing you did.²⁷²

34-37 By Dr. Faltas: Q. Do you recall testifying that you never knew me on a personal basis?

381 A. I don't. Still to this day I don't.

39-421 Q. Since the time I moved in, did I ever make an effort to visit with you or get close to you?

431 A. Yes, you did try.²⁷³

441 Q. When?

45-181 A. You tried with all the hellos and the little conversations up until I told you I wasn't going to be involved in that lawsuit thing or whatever about this — that little piece of land.

491 Q. Okay. So when did I say hello?

501 A. I don't know. Shortly after you moved in.

21-221 Q. Okay. So it's polite -- you don't think it's polite to say hello to a neighbor?

23-251 A. If I call back to you, yes, I think it's polite to do that. If it's a neighbor or a stranger or anybody, that's just the polite thing to do is to say hello.

page 292, line 1 Q. So I was politely saying hello to you?

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[2] **A. Yes, in the beginning you was.**

[3] **Q. Yeah. And the beginning was September 2008?**

[4] **A. When you moved in there.**

[5] **Q. Okay.**

[6] **A. Whenever you moved in there, that was the beginning.**²⁷⁴

[7-8] **Q. And you claim that the first time I asked you what your rent was was in March 2009.**

[9] **A. Yeah, around that time.**

[10-11] **Q. Okay. So from September 2008 'til March 2009, all I did was say hello to you; right?**

[12-13] **A. No, I never said all of that. I never said that whole span that all you did was say hello.**

[14] **Q. Okay. Did I ever try to come into your apartment?**

[15] **A. No. You know better. No.**

[16] **Q. Did I ever ask you out?**

[17] **A. You don't have a life. This is your life.**

[18] **Q. Did I ever ask you out?**

[19-20] **A. This is your life. You would invite me to court, yes. You would invite me to court often.**²⁷⁵

[21-23] **Q. Between September 2008 and March 2009, did I ever take you to court or invite you out or make a phone call to you or anything?**

[24-25] **A. Yeah. You wrote me a note.**²⁷⁶ Do you remember that little letter you wrote me?

[page 293, line 1] **Q. Okay.**

[2] **A. Do you remember?**

[3] **Q. What is the date of that letter?**

[4] **A. I don't remember.**

[5-6] **Dr. Faltas:** All right. Your Honor, I think it's Court's exhibit 6.

[7-9] **Court Reporter:** I don't know. The Court's exhibits are right here.

[9] **Dr. Faltas:** May I use it from the Court's exhibits?

[10] **The Court:** Yes.

[11] **Dr. Faltas:** Thank you.

[12-14] **By Dr. Faltas:** **Q. (Dr. Faltas hands Court's exhibit 5 to the witness.) Court's exhibit 5, is that a copy of it?**

[15-16] **A.** This is a copy of a letter that you wrote to me. We had a conversation. We was in the parking lot one day —

[17] **Ms. Weiss:** Objection, Your Honor.

[18] **The Court:** The basis for the objection?

[19-20] **Ms. Weiss:** If the defendant wishes for the witness to refer to the letter, I'd ask that she enter it into evidence.

[21] **The Court:** All right. Do you offer it into evidence?

[22] **Dr. Faltas:** Yes, Your Honor. I thought it was already.

[23] **The Court:** It's a Court's exhibit, not in evidence.

[24] **Dr. Faltas:** Oh.

[25] **The Court:** Do you offer it into evidence?

[page 294, line 1] **Dr. Faltas:** Yes. Absolutely.

[2] **The Court:** All right. It's Defense number 1.

[3] **(Defendant's exhibit 1 was received in evidence.)**

[4 to page 295, line 18] **The Witness:** [4-6] Okay. This is — ~~this is a letter that she wrote me~~ — me, her, and my neighbor that lives next door to me, Ms. Charlene. Me and Charlene was outside one day. She was sitting in her car just taking pictures.²⁷⁷ So on this day it's like, well, ~~let's just give it a try and see if we could just talk to her~~ and see if she could be civil. ~~We did talk~~ We did talk to the extent of why does she do the things that she does, and if ~~she's so highly educated and knows the judicial system as well as she does~~ why does she harass the people in Columbia? ~~Why don't you move somewhere else that's big-time and you can really be seen?~~ This is small stuff right here. And how she claims to be a doctor quote/unquote. [17-22] ~~So I said to her, "Well, since you're a doctor, can you see me? You're a doctor. You're my neighbor. Can you see me?" So at that time then she went on about, "Well, I don't have my license,"²⁷⁸ or whatever she said. So I said, "Well, can I get a prescription?" She went on and said, well, she couldn't do that.~~ [23 to page 295, line 5] Well, anyhow, she writes a letter in response trying to make it that I begged her for money and I begged her for pills and I said to her that I was impressed with the way — with the way that she handles herself in court and that she — and that I wanted her to teach me I guess the law maybe, but it was the — this letter to me was to say that we had a regular conversation,²⁷⁹ and she took the conversation and turned it into that. [6-18] So this clearly let me see that you cannot even

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have a civil conversation with her, and on that day I thought it was a civil conversation. As a matter of fact, at the end of our conversation **the neighbor that lives in her building, Mr. John, pulls up, and all of a sudden she goes into character: "Oh, my gosh. He's trying to kill me. Can you wait until I get in my apartment?"** And I'm standing there like, oh, no, I know you're not doing this. We done stand outside - **she's in her car the whole time for one now. She's in her car with her window wound all the way up on this side this much, but we still had a conversation.** As soon as she saw the man pull up, she started screaming and trying to run like I was trying to attack her. And the next day I got this in the mail.

[19-20] By Dr. Faltas: Q. What is the date of that letter?

[21-22] A. It's typed October 3rd, but it doesn't show the mailing date.

[23] Q. Can you read it, please?

[24] A. No.

[25 to page 296, line 3] Q. Does the last sentence before the signature say, "But please do not come uninvited near my car again, as when you did it yesterday it made me very uncomfortable and blocked my access to my home"?

[4-6] A. It doesn't matter what you read from off of that. Okay. You wrote the letter. What do you want me to say? Yes, you wrote the letter and what?

[7-8] Q. And that was the next day after you came next to my car ---

[9-14] A. That was after you invited me and Charlene.²⁸⁰ If I was uninvited to your car, how can I have talked to you for 45 minutes, if I was so much in uninvited? Yes, you were sitting in your car and your window was wind (sic) up, but there was enough cracked down, maybe about this much, to talk.

[15-16] Q. So the date of that letter is October 3rd, 2009. Where is the pen?

[17] Ms. Weiss: I'll be glad to take the sign down.

[18] Dr. Faltas: No, I want to put ...

[19] Ms. Weiss: No.

[20] Dr. Faltas: What?

[21] Ms. Weiss: Take my sign down.

[22 to page 297, line 1] Dr. Faltas: I want to put this letter in here. So in between two dates when you claim I was harassing you and making unwanted contact with you and all of that, you come, stand next to my car, ask me to write you a prescription, ask me to be your doctor ---

[2] Ms. Weiss: Objection.

[3-8] The Witness: Yes. Yeah, I did. Yeah, because it's like -- as intelligent as you claim to be, something has to be wrong for you to act the way that you do. So, yes, I gave you a chance, just you sitting in your car and you looking at us all crazy.²⁸¹ So let's -- if we can talk to you with sense -- you can't talk to anybody sensible.

[9-12] By Dr. Faltas: Q. And that is sensible for someone to approach somebody on whom you are calling the police and tell me to give you a prescription and to be your doctor?

[13-19] A. We're still neighbors, yes, and when I said for you to be my doctor,²⁸² that was said in a funny sense because you claim to be so much of a doctor. That's what I said when I said that, and as a matter of fact, on that day we made light of that. It was to the point where you even laughed as if the judicial system here is a joke to you, and I think you said that in court several times.

[20] Q. I said that the judicial system is a joke?

[21] A. Oh, yeah.²⁸³

[22] Q. Did I ever introduce myself to you?

[23] A. I don't -- yeah, I want to say you did. Yeah.

[24] Q. When?

[25 to page 298, line 1] A. I don't know when, but you did, probably the same day when you tried to get me to go to court with you.

[2] Q. What?

[3-5] A. The same day you wanted me to come to court with you. You already know who I was, so obviously you had been stalking me since then.²⁸⁴

[6-7] Q. So in March 2009 is when I asked you to come to court with me.

[8] A. Yeah, I think it was that time.

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19-111 Q. Yeah. **And I live in the next building to you or I lived there from September 2008, and you think I wouldn't know who you are except by stalking you?**

112-118 A. Exactly, because I have neighbors that's there - I've been there for two and half years. I just see these people. I've never known their name until she moved here with all that mess. I just see these people and that's it. I speak cordially. Hello. Good-bye. That's it.²⁸⁵ So, yes, it's possible for you to live and not know anybody's name. If you mind your business, you wouldn't know people's names.

119-201 Q. So, in fact, the other neighbors weren't even greeting you, and I was the one greeting you.

121-231 A. I never said that. What I said was I spoke, but I never knew their names. We spoke hello, goodbye's, but I never held a conversation.²⁸⁶ We never exchanged names.

124 to page 299, line 11 Q. So I was saying hello to you between September 2008 until March 2009, and then in March 2009 I asked you what your rent was. Right?

121 A. Yeah.

121 Q. Okay.

14-71 A. You asked the rent. I'm - yeah. There's so much stuff that's happened with you.²⁸⁷ Like if you're trying to make me be specific on dates and times, I'm not going to be that accurate.

121 Q. Okay.

121 A. So ...

1101 Q. And how much did you tell me your rent was?

111-121 A. I never told you,²⁸⁸ as I'm not going to tell you today because it's not your business.

113-151 Q. And did you testify many times that I responded that they are charging me much more rent than they are charging you?

113-161 A. Yes, you have, and in each response I said, "Who wouldn't love to have a rent for \$300?" If I can live somewhere and pay \$300 for rent, I would, but I'm not.

119-20 Q. And you still don't want to tell this jury how much your rent is.

121 A. It's none of their business either.

1221 Q. Your rent has always been less than \$550.

1231 Ms. Weiss: Objection.

1241 Dr. Faltas: Has your rent--

125 to page 300, line 11 The Court: The objection is sustained. Let's move on beyond the rent.

12-41 By Dr. Faltas: Q. And then you claim that I started harassing you after you said, no, you would not come to court with me.

121 A. Oh, yeah, nonstop.

16-81 Q. Okay. So did there come a time when I said, "Okay. See how I can harass you now. You will come to court with me," or anything like that?

121 A. Can you repeat that?

110-111 Q. I'm saying like if you said that I started harassing you in March --

121 A. Uh-huh.

113-151 Q. -- did there come a time afterwards like, say, in April I said, "See, I have harassed you for a month. Now you have to come to court with me"?

116-231 A. No, no, no, no, no. I did that on my own accord just to give you respect as an elderly lady. Maybe you were delusional or crazy in your own mind. So for me to call the police on an old lady that does not have a life and it's clearly (sic) that the things that you're doing is for attention, no, I did not call the police immediately and say that you was harassing me and you know that. I've stated that in court before, too.

1241 Q. That wasn't even my question.

125 to page 301, line 71 A. Well, what's the question? I don't understand the question.

121 Q. If you would please listen --

134-1 A. I answered it to the best of my knowledge that I thought you asked.

15-71 Q. If you would please listen. You said that I started harassing you after you said you will not come to court with me.

121 A. Yes.

121 Q. What do you think I was trying --

1101 A. I'm not you.

111-141 Q. Okay. Then did there come a time, say, in April or May when I said, "Okay. I've harassed you for two months. Now you've learned your lesson. You will come to court with me," or something like that?

115-181 A. It's like are you trying to be funny? I'm not understanding that question. It's like you're smiling when you're asking it like you're trying to make a point, but I'm really not getting it.

119 Q. And then you testified that you have ten acres of land?

120 A. I said several.²⁸⁹

121 Q. What?

122 A. I said several.

123 Q. You have several acres?

124 A. Several. Not a slab. Several.²⁹⁰

125 Q. Okay. And you call the land that I have a little slab?

126 A. That's what I call it. Compared to mine it is a slab.

127 Q. Okay. And I shouldn't be allowed to build on it?

128 A. I never said that.

129 Ms. Weiss: Objection.

130 The Court: The question has been answered.

131 By Dr. Faltas: Q. And you said that you mind your business and I should mind mine; right?

132 A. Yes.

133 Q. Okay. Is it my business if I'm charged more than others?

134 Ms. Weiss: Objection.

135 The Witness: You're right. That's your business. You said it correct: Your business.

136 Dr. Faltas: And how will I know if I'm charged more than others?

137 Ms. Weiss: Objection.

138 The Court: The objection is sustained. How much rent you're charged is irrelevant. Let's move to the -- beyond the rent, her rent and your rent.

139 By Dr. Faltas: Q. And then you claim that the reason you said that you wouldn't come to court is that you would be missing days from work.

140 A. Yes.

141 Q. And yet you stayed in one hearing for three days and in another hearing for one day and in this trial for what? Three days now?

142 A. Correct.

143 Q. Okay. All of these are things that you initiated.

144 A. I initiated? I never initiated you harassing me, so I don't understand your last statement, question, or anything.

I never asked to be harassed.

145 Q. You caused these charges to be brought against me.

146 A. I caused it? I caused you to harass me?

147 Q. Ma'am, did you file complaints against me that resulted in these charges being brought against me?

148 A. Obviously yes.

149 Q. Okay. And then Dinah Steele, the landlady, started --

150 Ms. Weiss: Objection.

151 The Court: I didn't hear the question.

152 By Dr. Faltas: Q. And Dinah Steele, the landlady, had started an eviction proceeding against me in which you went and stayed in court for three days. Yes?

153 A. I'm not sure when anything took place. Like I stated on yesterday, when all this stuff started with her about court -- when I say every day all the time, literally every day all the time. I'm not sure on dates and times. I never even kept a journal or a log of all this mess. I'm surprised it even got this far.

154 Q. Do you have a supervisor at work?

155 A. Yes. I do.²⁹¹

156 Q. What's that supervisor's name?

157 A. My supervisor's name is Ms. Washington.²⁹²

158 Q. What's her first name?

159 A. Sandra.²⁹³

160 Q. And the current job that you have, have you been in it for how long?

161 A. About two and a half years.²⁹⁴

162 Q. Were you ever fired for any reason from any job?

163 A. I don't know. Could -- you know, could be. I've been working since I was younger. I'm in my thirties now.

I'm sure. Maybe.²⁹⁵

164 Q. Did you tell us why you did not graduate from college?

165 Ms. Weiss: Objection.

166 The Witness: Oh.

167 The Court: Objection is sustained.

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119) **The Witness:** Okay.

120-221) **By Dr. Faltas:** Q. And you said you started noticing me in my car in March; right?

123) **A.** Yes.

124) **The Court:** The question has been asked and answered.

125) **Dr. Faltas:** That was?

[page 305, lines 1-2] **The Court:** You repeated the same questions over and over.

13) **Dr. Faltas:** Not the same. In my car. In my car.

14) **The Court:** The objection is sustained.

15) **Dr. Faltas:** All right.

16-81) **By Dr. Faltas:** Q. Isn't March the time I bought what you call the slab of land?

12) **A.** I don't know when you purchased it.²⁹⁶

114) **Q.** Okay.

111) **A.** I don't know anything about that.²⁹⁷

122) **Q.** Okay. And then you called me eclectic or weird or —

113-151) **A.** Or a gypsy. Exactly. You've taken my pictures. ~~You could have root on me, woodoo.~~ I don't know the purpose for that. Yes, I did say that.

116) **Q.** Do you know what the word eclectic means?

121) **Ms. Weiss:** Objection, Your Honor.

118) **The Witness:** Do you?

119) **The Court:** Overruled.

120-21) **By Dr. Faltas:** Q. Of course I do.

122) **A.** So do I.²⁹⁸

123) **Q.** So what does it mean?

124) **A.** I'm not answering.

[25 to page 306, line 1] **Q.** And then when you went to see Investigator Blanton, did you write a statement under oath for her?

12-71) **A.** Yes, I wrote a long statement of every incident that I could think — that I could just think about. It's humanly impossible for me to just sit at one period — let's say somebody gives me an hour to say everything that you've done pretty much in every court case. I could never sit here and say how much things that you have done.

116-17) **Q.** You were standing under my window and yelling at another neighbor.

118-19) **A.** That's where you're making the stuff up.²⁹⁹ You know I was not under your window.³⁰⁰

120-21) **Q.** And you wrote in your sworn statement to Investigator Blanton what happened after that.

[22 to page 307, line 11] **A.** [22 to page 307, line 2] She wants me to tell you that guys that she wanted to pray for me, and I was on the phone talking to my mom, and my mom could hear her in the background saying she wanted to pray for me. By this time I'm already kind of irritated because I'm already arguing, and here she is not minding her business. [2-11] My mom is in my ear saying, "Well, if she wants to pray with you or whatever, go ahead and let her do it." So I stand there holding the phone and she's reciting the Lord's prayer as if I don't know it. But she tries to play me as if I'm just stupid or don't know the Lord's prayer. I go to church every Sunday and³⁰¹, yes, I do know it, but I did let her say the prayer.³⁰² I didn't stop her. She did say it, and when she did say the prayer, I walked off from her. I didn't want to. Clearly I didn't want to, but I did, but she prayed.

112-14) **Q.** In fact, didn't you in your sworn statement to Investigator Blanton write that I told you that if you loved God you should go and apologize to that neighbor?

115-17) **A.** You said that and I'm good with God. If you love God and claim to know God the way that you do, the things that you do you should not do.

124) **Dr. Faltas:** No objection?

119) **Ms. Weiss:** What?

124) **Dr. Faltas:** These being Defendant's exhibits 2 and 3.

121) **Ms. Weiss:** You can mark them.

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122 *Dr. Faltas*: May I, Your Honor? May I?

123 *The Court*: May you do what?

124 *Dr. Faltas*: Mark them as Defendant's exhibits 2 and 3.

125 *The Court*: Any objection by the State?

[page 308, lines 1-3] *Ms. Weiss*: No objection to them being marked, Your Honor. As far as evidence, I think the best evidence is the witness's testimony.

126 *Dr. Faltas*: Prior inconsistent statements, Your Honor.

127 *The Court*: What are they?

128 *Dr. Faltas*: They are handwritten sworn statements by her.

129 *The Court*: All right. They can be marked.

133-134 *(Defendant's exhibits 2 and 3 were marked for identification only.)*

135 *The Court*: You have 15 more minutes.

136-138 *By Dr. Faltas*: Q. (Dr. Faltas hands documents to the witness.) Do you recognize Defendant's exhibits (sic) 2, please?

139 *A*: Yes.

140 *Q*: Is most of it in your handwriting?

141 *A*: Yep.

142 *Q*: Has it been sworn to by you?

143 *A*: Yes.

144 *Q*: Could you please read it for the jury?

162-163 *Dr. Faltas*: May I admit it into evidence since she identified it?

164 *The Court*: No, you may not.

165 *Dr. Faltas*: Your Honor, may I request argument on this?

[page 310, lines 1-2] *The Court*: No, you may not, not in the presence of the jury.

13-51 *By Dr. Faltas*: Q. Defendant's exhibit 3, do you recognize it as most of it being in your handwriting?

166 *A*: Yes.

167 *Q*: And did you file that under oath?

168 *A*: Yeah, both of them say the same thing, I think.

169 *Court Reporter*: I'm sorry. Repeat that.

170 *The Witness*: I said yeah. Yes.

171-172 *By Dr. Faltas*: Q. What is the date of that one?

173 *A*: 11/03.

174 *Q*: Which year?

175 *A*: '09.

176 *Q*: Is Tiffany's real name Stephanie?

177-191 *A*: There you go wanting to be nosy again. Tiffany and Stephanie are two different people. If you're so smart, you would have known that.

170-231 *Q*: You claim that -- you claimed -- yesterday you testified that the Commissioner HUD, the fire chief, and police officers come to your address wanting to -- in the hope of meeting who the prostitute who is on 300 Byron Road?

24 to page 311, line 14] *A*: [24 to page 311, line 4] Yes. Yes, because you tell everybody that, and there has been several cases or incidents where I've even asked her and the judge -- we've been in court and she has been asked why does she feel that I'm a prostitute. [5-14] Her response is because I wear nails and how I dress. Anybody that wears nails or wigs or weaves is a prostitute.³⁰³ As a matter of fact, she says Marilyn Monroe is a prostitute, and who else did you say? There was a couple of other people, but that's her reason. And she feels that I take my money and spend my money on clothes. As a matter of fact, in pertaining to her calling me a prostitute, an officer came one day and asked her as well why does she call me a prostitute, and she told the officer because I spend my money on clothes.³⁰⁴ So that's her reasoning for calling me a pros-

titute.³⁰⁵ So when people come, they want to know: Well, let me see the prostitute, so...

[151] Q. Okay. So did the commissioner of HUD proposition you ---

[16] Court Reporter: I'm sorry. The commissioner of what?

[17-19] By Dr. Faltas: Q. Of HUD proposition you, say, "I came in the hope of meeting the prostitute"?

[20] A. Okay.

[21] Q. "Come and be a prostitute with me"? Did anyone do that?

[22] A. Okay.

[23-24] Q. Did anyone come and say, "Okay. Since you're the prostitute ---

[25] A. Okay.

[page 312, lines 1-2] Q. ---of 300 Byron Road, here is money. Give us sex," or something like that?

[3-10] A. Okay. Nobody has ever and will ever proposition me for anything like that.³⁰⁶ My family is well to do.³⁰⁷ I've been brought up with both my mother and my father. They are still married today in the same household and everything. I have no kids or anything. So for you to have an opinion, that's fine. I'm not going to even defend that. If you think I'm a prostitute, that's fine. I think you're a lesbian.³⁰⁸ So now you see how it feels? It doesn't feel good; right?

[11-13] Q. I was asking those people whom you claim came in the hope of meeting the prostitute why did they hope to meet a prostitute?

[14] A. Because you go around saying that to everybody.

[15] Q. Yes, but what were they wanting to do with ---

[16] A. Why would you say it?

[17] Q. My question is: Did -- how did ---

[18] A. I can't answer for them, but why would you say it?

[19] Q. You testified that they came ---

[20 to page 313, line 12] A. **[20 to page 313, line 1]** Exactly. And his exact words were, "When I went to talk to Dr." Really "Faltas about her complaints with the HUD commissioner," he was -- like when he came in my apartment compared to hers -- the buildings do look kind of like an eyesore. It's not like -- okay. It wouldn't be anyone's first choice, but the insides are really nice, and my apartment is beautiful. **[2-12]** When he came from her apartment into my apartment, he was like, "Oh, my gosh. I thought these apartments were ..." She's got books in the refrigerator.³⁰⁹ Who lives like that? Books -- she doesn't even eat in her house,³¹⁰ but then this man is coming in his profession saying that -- maybe he wasn't supposed to tell me what she said, but he said, "Well, don't you know I went to talk to her and she says that you're a prostitute?" So I want to meet Teresa, quote/unquote. So he comes into my apartment, and it's like, "Wow," like it's unbelievable. Everybody else is living how normal people should live.³¹¹ I don't know her...

[13-14] Q. So the HUD Commissioner wanted to meet the prostitute, and you said the fire marshal also?

[15-19] A. Yeah, and not only did he just come to meet me, he came to look at the apartment because obviously she had complained that the apartments were I guess bad or in a condition that's not livable, but that was clearly unfounded because it's just the way she chooses to live in her apartment, so ...

[20] Q. Could you please stay on the subject?

[21-25] A. That is the subject. We are talking about the HUD commissioner that came and his reasoning for coming. That's -- that's on the same thing. You just don't want to know -- you don't want them to know the entire truth.³¹² Speak the truth.

[page 314, line 1] Q. Ma'am, could you please answer the question?

[2] A. I am.

[3-4] Q. And do you recall yesterday you also testified that the fire chief wanted to meet the prostitute on 300 Byron Road?

[5] A. Yeah.

[6-7] Q. So did that fire chief also tell you -- did he proposition you? Did he say I ---

[8-9] A. Again, nobody will never proposition me.³¹³ Never. That's what you need.³¹⁴

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[10-11] Q. And you also testified that the police officers come in the hope of meeting the prostitute?

[12-23] A. [12-18] Well, the police officers already know because they come out there almost on a constant basis, so they know who I am. But there's just one officer that came at a time when he could visibly see that I was upset with her, and he asked her why was she doing that, and this is the same officer that had to literally almost force her to put her foot on the gas and go. [19-3] She's arguing with the officer about not harassing me and not blocking me, and the officer is clearly telling her, "I'm here in your presence, and you're harassing her now." So the officers already know who I am.³¹⁵ So they already know that she calls me a prostitute.

[24] Q. And?

[25] The Court: You have five more minutes.

[page 315, line 2] Dr. Faltas: Five more minutes?

[2] The Court: Five more minutes.

[3] Dr. Faltas: Until we adjourn for today?

[4] The Court: Yes, five more minutes.

[5-6] Dr. Faltas: Thank you, Your Honor, but I will continue to cross-examine?

[7-8] The Court: Well, I don't know. You have five more minutes.

[9] Dr. Faltas: Well, Your Honor ---

[10] The Court: Ask your next question.

[11-12] By Dr. Faltas: Q. Ma'am, have you been on Zoloft and Vicodin?

[13] A. I never said ---

[14] Ms. Weiss: Objection.

[15-18] The Witness: It's fine. It's fine. I never said Vicodin.³¹⁶ I said Zoloft. And if you want to know or anybody else, I take Effexor for my anxiety attacks. So since you know so much but so little ---

[19-20] Q. And you had those anxiety attacks long before you met me.

[21-24] A. Well, actually I thought I was having one this morning and I wasn't going to make it and terrible migraines that I got discharged for.³¹⁷ Dealing with you, yes, is causing me physical anxiety.³¹⁸

[25 to page 316, lines 2] Q. Okay. And you testified that when you took somebody's credit card and signed their name on it and got merchandise and then went out and went ---

[3] Ms. Weiss: Objection, Your Honor.

[4] The Witness: You keep saying that like you just want to sneak that in. That didn't happen,³¹⁹ and if it makes you feel good to keep saying that that's fine. I've already explained how that situation happened ---

[8-9] By Dr. Faltas: Q. When did it happen?

[10-11] A. --- and that happened in 1998 which would make it over 12 years ago.

[12] Q. And when were you born?

[13] A. You don't know that?

[14] Q. Ma'am, I'm asking you: When were you born?

[15] A. 1976.

[16] Q. So at that time you were 22.

[17] A. Good.

[18] Q. So you weren't just out of high school ---

[19] Ms. Weiss: Objection.

[20] The Witness: Did I say that?

[21-22] The Court: Just a moment. The objection is sustained. Move beyond that line of questions.

[23 to page 317, line 1] By Dr. Faltas: Q. And when you sued a woman for allegedly a car accident, you said that that caused you anxiety and mental distress. Isn't that correct?

[24] A. Yeah, anything -- it doesn't have to be one particular thing that can cause a person to have anxiety attacks.

[25] Q. And that accident occurred in June 2008?

[26] A. I'm not sure. I don't remember.³²⁰ It happened.

[27] Q. Okay.

[28-31] A. And I don't think it was June. I don't think it was that far into the year.

[32] Q. Okay. And that was before you met me.

[33] A. Exactly. So why is that even any of your business?

[34] Q. And you had the trial in August 2009.

[35-38] A. You know all this better than me.³²¹ I don't know when the trial was.³²² If you say it was in August, it probably was in August.

[39] Q. Okay. And you did not get any money from it.

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116] **A.** I sure didn't, not a dime.

121] **Q.** All right.

124] **A.** I'm alive.

119-20] **Q.** And you claimed that that accident had been causing you anxiety and mental distress.

121] **A.** I never said that.³²³

122-23] **Dr. Faltas:** Well, Your Honor, may I show her the complaint?

124] **The Court:** No.

125 to page 318, line 1] **By Dr. Faltas:** **Q.** And you also claim that you never called me the B. Word.

125] **A.** Never.³²⁴ And in the tape that you want everybody to hear, if anybody can hear anybody calling anybody a bitch on this tape,³²⁵ the only person you can hear clearly on this tape is her arguing with us outside. So, yes, play your tape.

126] **Dr. Faltas:** I'm trying to find this --

127] **The Court:** Unless the tape is about 30 seconds, we're not going to hear it today. How long is the tape.

128] **Dr. Faltas:** Well, that part where she's --

129] **The Court:** How long is it?

130] **Dr. Faltas:** It's about 15 minutes, Your Honor.

131] **The Court:** All right. Well, I said we're leaving in 15 minutes and that was 15 minutes ago.

132] **Dr. Faltas:** Sorry?

133] **The Court:** I said 15 minutes ago that we were leaving in 15 minutes, so obviously we're not going to listen to a 15-minute tape.

134] **Dr. Faltas:** All right. So can Your Honor set --

135-20] **The Court:** So you have one more minute. (Pause) Now 40 seconds.

121-23] **By Dr. Faltas:** **Q.** Did you ever write in a sworn statement that there was an altercation by people other than me in the parking lot?

124 to page 319, line 1] **A.** [24 to page 319, line 6] That's something that -- actually, that's something you started when you followed me and Richard that morning when you accused him of fighting me, and a couple of days later a neighbor from down the street was just walking past and I was outside either washing my car or something, and he said, "Was you home when they was fighting in the parking lot?" And I was like, "Who?" He was like a girl -- actually he said it was a white girl and black dude fighting in the parking lot.³²⁶ So she clearly knew it wasn't me and Richard.³²⁶ So I put just put two and two together that when she accused him of that morning -- of me and him in the parking lot fighting... 115-19] **The Court:** All right. Ladies and gentlemen, that will do it for this day. 9:30 tomorrow morning. 9:30. 9:30. 9:30 tomorrow morning. Do not take any exhibits with you. We look forward to seeing you all. I'm sure you all look forward to seeing us. 9:30 tomorrow morning.

120-21] (Whereupon, the jury was excused from open court for the day at 5:55 p.m.)

12] **The Court:** You may step down, Ms. Ingram.

13] **The Witness:** Thank you.

14] **The Court:** Is there anything before we leave this day?

15] **Dr. Faltas:** Yes, Your Honor

16 to page 320, line 1] **The Court:** All right. Yes, ma'am?

125] **Dr. Faltas:** I have a municipal trial tomorrow morning and, of course, I'll be here all day. I didn't get a chance -- actually, it's before Executive Judge Turner, so I need something to --

16] **The Court:** She knows where you'll be tomorrow.

128] **Dr. Faltas:** So no more -- so I'll file a motion for a continuance. The second thing is --

19-11] **The Court:** She knows that you're in this trial. You have -- you subpoenaed her here today, so she knows that you'll be here tomorrow.

112-16] **Dr. Faltas:** Your Honor, I think I have about an hour and a half more of cross-examination of this witness. At this point may I know what the State's projected schedule is and when I will get to put up my case? I'm considering that Your Honor is not a resident judge here, how that would go.

117-21] **The Court:** All right. Well, tomorrow is Thursday. This session of court will end on Friday. I'm assigned to be in Fairfield County next week, Lexington the week thereafter, and not assigned to be back in Richland anymore for the next several months that I know of.

122] **Dr. Faltas:** So I mean --

123-24] **The Court:** Other than common pleas court in -- is that April? So I don't know.

125] **Dr. Faltas:** So --

16 to page 321, lines 1-2] **The Court:** On Saturday the mock trial will be in this courtroom.

12] **Dr. Faltas:** Pardon?

14] **The Court:** A mock trial will be in this courtroom.

15] **Dr. Faltas:** A block trial?

16] **The Court:** We won't be here on Saturday. Yes.

17] **Dr. Faltas:** Did you say block trial --

18-9] **The Court:** Mock trial with high school students. I won't be here Saturday nor Sunday.

110-11] **Dr. Faltas:** So, Your Honor, then may I ask that you make the State give a time certain so that --

112] **The Court:** Make the State rest?

113] **Dr. Faltas:** At a time certain.

114-18] **The Court:** All right. Well, I'll be happy to impose time limits on everything in the trial. I'll be happy to impose time limits on direct examination, time limits on cross-examination, time limits on arguments. I'll be happy to do that if that's what you would like for me to do.

119-20] **Dr. Faltas:** Well, so long as they allow for me a fair chance to put on my case.

121] **The Court:** Do you agree that --

122] (A telephone rings in the courtroom.)

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[23-25] **The Court:** Oh, boy. Oh, boy. Let's let her slide this time. She's worked hard being on a 403... She won't do it again. We'll let her slide
(page 322, line 1) **Lady in The Courtroom:** I apologize.

[25] **The Court:** But I appreciate you being on the case though. Yes, ma'am? You -- you think that there should be time limits so that you'll have an opportunity to get your defense in so that we can finish this case on Friday.

[6-7] **Dr. Faltas:** Yes, Your Honor, or possibly on Saturday. I mean --

[8-11] **The Court:** We can't be here Saturday. The court -- the county has already agreed to host the mock trial competition which takes place every year, and they'll be using these courtrooms.

[12] **Dr. Faltas:** All of them?

[13-16] **The Court:** Yeah, and the court reporter has a previous engagement on Friday. I have something else to do on Friday. What do you have on Friday? Saturday. Saturday. Saturday, not Friday. Saturday.

[17-18] **Dr. Faltas:** Well, Your Honor, of course, another court reporter can be brought in.

[19] **The Court:** But you can't bring in another judge.

[20-21] **Dr. Faltas:** No, I understand. I didn't know that Your Honor --

[22 to page 323, line 6] **The Court:** Well, we're on to something: Time limits to get this trial done. That's -- that's what we're on to. But, for example, this one witness has taken all day, and you say you have another hour and a half more of questioning of her, much of which you've been very repetitive in doing. So if we can agree on some -- you know, I generally do not like to impose time limits on folks asking questions, and even though I'm certain the jury would love for there to be time limits placed on the length of time people are on that stand asking questions ...

[7-8] **Dr. Faltas:** Well, Your Honor, I mean, what is the alternative? That I don't get to put a defense?

[9-11] **The Court:** Well, you have a right to put up a defense, but you've -- you've -- how many witnesses do you anticipate having?

[12-14] **Dr. Faltas:** Well, I don't even know who else the State will put on, but I definitely, God willing, plan to testify myself unless there is a directed verdict at the end of the State's case. But what I wanted to say: The State presented a hundred exhibits and the witness, you know, freelanced on everything. I asked simple yes or no --

[15-21] **The Court:** Well, you were asking her about photographs that you took, and you intend to testify. So you want her to tell what's in the pictures, then later you want to say what's in the pictures, and then after asking her what's in the pictures, then you want to put the pictures down and then ask her more questions about what happened regarding what was -- what was in the pictures. So, you know, much of that can be condensed

(page 324, lines 1-2) **Dr. Faltas:** Your Honor, I was following the State's direct examination, and I think I have a right to do that.

[3-5] **The Court:** Well, I'm not questioning that at all. We're just discussing the means to which this matter can be shortened somewhat. That's what we're talking about.

[6-8] **Dr. Faltas:** All right. Can the State tell us how many witnesses it has and can there be a time certain for the State to finish its case?

[9] **The Court:** All right. State?

[10] **Ms. Weiss:** Yes, Your Honor.

[11-12] **The Court:** She wants a time certain for the State to finish. How many more witnesses do you have?

[13-19] **Ms. Weiss:** I anticipate calling one, two, four, five, six, seven -- possibly seven to eight more witnesses. Depending on how the testimony goes, I may be able to shorten that. I would love to have -- time limits would be perfectly fine with the State. I don't anticipate -- most of these witnesses should be -- actually, all the witnesses should be very short.

[20] **The Court:** All right.

[21-22] **Dr. Faltas:** Well, Your Honor, unless the witnesses have admissible evidence, could we ask now who the witnesses are?

[23-25] **The Court:** The investigators and police officers and other people who were out there whose pictures were taken, et cetera. Those are probably the witnesses.

(page 325, line 1) **Ms. Weiss:** (Nodded head up and down.)

[2-3] **Dr. Faltas:** But, for example, Investigator Blanton admitted that she never personally observed anything.

[4-9] **The Court:** She's not testified yet in this trial. She testified in the suppression hearing.

[6-8] **Dr. Faltas:** Well, I'm sure she will testify at the different thing once she testified under oath that she never observed any event.

[9-19] **The Court:** Well, I don't know what she plans to testify to, but if you all want us -- want a one-hour limit to be placed on all witnesses - 20 minutes for direct exam and 40 minutes for cross-exam or 30 minutes for direct and 30 minutes for cross - I'll be happy to impose that.

[14] **Dr. Faltas:** Yes. Yes, please, Your Honor and -- but --

[15] **The Court:** Would you like for me to do that?

[16-18] **Dr. Faltas:** Yes, Your Honor, so long as the State rests by Thursday, God willing tomorrow, by 5:00 so I can get to present a defense.

[19-20] **The Court:** All right. All right. That means you might not have another hour and a half with Ms. Ingram up here.

[21-23] **Dr. Faltas:** Well, I mean, I don't know how long her witnesses will be, especially -- especially if they have no admissible evidence.

[24] **The Court:** Right.

[25 to page 326, line 1] **Dr. Faltas:** If they did not personally observe anything.

[2-4] **The Court:** All right. I understand. Well, we'll see how it goes, but based -- would you want me to impose those time limits as well?

[5] **Ms. Weiss:** Yes, Your Honor.

[6-9] **The Court:** All right. The parties have agreed for there to be time limits that the court will impose and that -- and that further that the State will rest by the end of the day tomorrow?

[10] **Ms. Weiss:** Your Honor, if we can --

[11] **The Court:** Can we go up 'til 6 tomorrow?

[12-14] **Ms. Weiss:** If we can set a limit on the cross-examination of the victim in the morning, I have no problem resting tomorrow.

[15-18] **The Court:** All right. And will necessitate your having no more than one-half hour more with the victim so that we can start with the other witnesses by 10:00, 10:15 at the latest.

[19-23] **Dr. Faltas:** Your Honor, I think I deserve an hour and a half with the alleged victim and after that we can -- she can shorten her other witnesses and especially -- I mean, I don't want her to be putting witnesses whom she knows have no admissible evidence --

[24] **The Court:** Right.

[25 to page 327, line 1] **Dr. Faltas:** ---and I try to object and, Your Honor, you know -- and I look bad to the jury.

[2-8] **The Court:** Yeah. Well, part of the hazards of a *pro se* litigant is that oftentimes no matter how many law books you might read -- but you still do not know proper trial procedures and the rules of procedure and the rules of evidence, and if you don't, then quite often you will have objections sustained and overruled that will not go in your favor.

[9-10] **Dr. Faltas:** Am I wrong in that witnesses who did not observe things personally cannot testify? Am I wrong?

[11-16] **The Court:** Any witness the State calls can testify and any -- you object to whatever testimony that the State offers, and I will rule based on every objection that everyone makes. I cannot foretell the substance of any testimony or what my rulings would be as to any testimony offered.

[17-18] Dr. Faltas: *Has Your Honor considered further the issue of the unconstitutionality of the statute?*

[19-20] The Court: Yes, I've considered it further. I will - I will rule on that by day's end tomorrow.

[21] Dr. Faltas: Thank you, Your Honor.

[22] The Court: Okay?

[23-24] Ms. Weiss: Your Honor, may I ask a question about the timeliness?

[25] The Court: Yes.

[page 328, lines 1-3] Ms. Weiss: *If the State does not go for a full 30 minutes, it's still 30 minutes for the defense. We each have 30 minutes.*

[4] The Court: Yes.

[5-6] Ms. Weiss: *So if I choose to go shorter to try to get the witnesses in more quickly ---*

[7-10] The Court: Right. That limitation will not be imposed on Ms. Ingram. She has another full arsenal of questions for her tomorrow that will take at least up to an hour and a half you think?

[11] Dr. Faltas: Yes, Your Honor.

[12] The Court: All right.

[13-15] Dr. Faltas: *And, Your Honor, may I say that if the State finishes before the end of the day tomorrow, may I start before then?*

[16] The Court: Yes, absolutely.

[17] Dr. Faltas: *Unless there is a directed verdict.*

[18] The Court: Absolutely.

[19-21] Ms. Weiss: *But, Your Honor, I will say that it is the State's burden of proof, and I do intend to call all the witnesses that I need to call to put up my case.*

[22-23] The Court: Absolutely. You have a right to call whatever witnesses you choose to call.

[24] Ms. Weiss: Thank you, Your Honor.

[25] Dr. Faltas: *Your Honor, have I offended you?*

[page 329, lines 1-2] The Court: *Not in any way. You've been most pleasant and gracious, and you have not offended me in any way.*

[3-7] Dr. Faltas: *Your Honor, I think -- in fact, I was surprised at the admissions that were made as far as the search warrant and I hope you -- I mean, I think the evidence was even better than I expected, and I hope you don't think I made the suppression motion frivolously.*

[8-11] The Court: *No. No, you didn't. I did not consider the motion frivolous at all. I thought it was appropriate for you to make the motion, and I ruled based on the evidence offered as I saw it, but I have no problem with ---*

[12-13] Dr. Faltas: *Should I brief the issue further of the -- that it should have been the ...*

[14-16] The Court: I've ruled on that issue of the -- I've ruled on the search warrant, and the evidence is in. The evidence consists of the photographs.

[17] Dr. Faltas: *Do I need -- I'm asking to preserve it.*

[18-20] The Court: Are there other -- is there other evidence other than photographs that were taken that you intend to offer?

[21] Ms. Weiss: *Photographs and audiotapes.*

[22-23] The Court: Yeah. Those things are, you know, matters that you'll be using as well.

[24] Dr. Faltas: *But they are my property.*

[25 to page 330, line 4] The Court: *Yeah. But, still, that's the -- under any analysis it's almost not the matter of the subject of a search. If you made -- if you take pictures and you're acknowledging that you took the pictures and all of that so --*

[5-7] Dr. Faltas: *Your Honor, the reason I needed the search to be declared invalid is that they are still to this day holding on to more of my property.*

[8-9] The Court: *Yeah. Well, those are separate issues, not germane to this trial.*

[10] Dr. Faltas: *Well --*

[11-14] The Court: *But I've ruled on that search warrant issue, and I am going to stand by that ruling. Anything regarding other property and all, that's another matter for another day, maybe even for another judge.*

[15-19] Dr. Faltas: *Well, Your Honor, all the motions were assigned to Your Honor, and I need to be able to -- I wasn't -- even after she was told to make the arrangements, the arrangements weren't honored, and I still wasn't able to hook my computer up.*

[20] The Court: What's wrong with the computer now?

[21] Dr. Faltas: *Sorry?*

[22] The Court: What's wrong with the computer now?

[23 to page 331, line 21] Dr. Faltas: *They didn't come at the time they said they were coming, and so I wasn't able to have enough time to take it to the apartment and connect it and test it. Besides, there are a matter of maybe 180 floppy disks that I need to test.*

[3-5] The Court: *Well, that's -- as I indicated, we're doing the trial now and that's -- to a great degree, that is a collateral issue not germane to the proof in this case. That's a matter involving -- almost of a civil nature, but we'll address any other relevant issues of this case that we need to including that if we need to.*

[6] Dr. Faltas: *Thank you, Your Honor.*

[10-11] The Court: *But that won't be right now because I am leaving. We're in recess.*

[12] Dr. Faltas: *Thank you, Your Honor.*

[13] Ms. Weiss: *Thank you, Your Honor.*

[14-16] (Whereupon, the trial concluded for the day at 6:11 p.m. and resumed the following day, February 25, 2010, as follows.)
