number of extensions previously granted and the order in which counsel attempts to manage her caseload, counsel hopes that no further extension requests will be required.



Counsel was a guest speaker at the Appellate Practice Project: Presenting Cases to the Appellate Courts seminar on November 30, 2017. Counsel filed the Initial Brief of Appellant and Designation of Matter in the case of The State of South Carolina v. Jamie L. Strom with the Court of Appeals on November 29, 2017. Counsel filed the Petition for Rehearing in the case of The State of South Carolina v. Christopher Jermaine Wells with the Court of Appeals on November 22, 2017. 
5. Counsel for the Attorney General's office consents to this request shown by signature below.




