MOTION FOR AN EXTENSION OF TIME
IN WHICH TO FILE THE INITIAL BRIEF OF APPELLANT
AND DESIGNATION OF MATTER

Counsel for Terry Lashawn Hooper respectfully requests an extension of a **final thirty (30) days, until April 4, 2018**, in which to file the Initial Brief of Appellant and Designation of Matter in this case. This motion is made pursuant to the Order of the South Carolina Supreme Court dated March 18, 2009. This is a fourth request for an extension. In support of this request, counsel shows:

1. The initial brief of appellant and designation of matter are due to be filed with the Court today. The Court has granted counsel three previous extensions.
2. Counsel for Terry Lashawn Hooper respectfully submits that extraordinary circumstances exist which warrant the granting of an additional extension of time. Given the

number of extensions previously granted and the order in which counsel attempts to manage her caseload, counsel hopes that no further extension requests will be required.

Counsel filed the petition for writ of certiorari and accompanying appendix in the case of K.C. Langford v. The State with the Supreme Court on February 22, 2018. Counsel filed the petition for writ of certiorari to the Court of Appeals in the case of The State v. Michael Antonio Williams with the Supreme Court on February 16, 2018. Counsel filed the petition for writ of certiorari and accompanying appendix in the case of Toby Eugene Moore v. The State with the Supreme Court on February 9, 2018. Counsel filed the petition for writ of certiorari and accompanying appendix in the case of Joseph Dante Satterwhite v. The State with the Supreme Court on February 6, 2018. Counsel filed the petition for writ of certiorari and accompanying appendix in the case of Lee Edward Tate v. The State with the Supreme Court on January 25, 2018. Counsel filed the petition for writ of certiorari and accompanying appendix in the case of Christopher T. Wilson v. The State with the Supreme Court on January 17, 2018. Counsel filed the petition for writ of certiorari and petition for writ of certiorari pursuant to Austin v. State along with the accompanying appendix in the case of Johnny Jones v. The State with the Supreme Court on January 11, 2018. Counsel filed the petition for writ of certiorari and accompanying appendix and accompanying supplemental appendix in the case of Robert A. Young v. The State with the Court of Appeals on January 4, 2018.


4. Counsel makes this request in good faith and not for purpose of delay. Counsel intends to continue to work on the cases with more than three extensions first so that the caseload

5. Counsel for the Attorney General's office consents to this request shown by signature below.






