ORDER





The parties move to exceed the page limit set forth in Rule 242(d)(4) and (f), SCACR. The motions are denied, as compliance with the page limit can be achieved by following the formatting requirements set forth in the South Carolina Appellate Court Rules.¹ The parties shall file an amended petition for a writ of certiorari and an amended return within ten days of the date of this order.

In the case of the petition, the questions presented for review shall be stated without unnecessary detail, as should the argument headings, and the statement of the case shall be concise. *See* Rule 242(d), SCACR. There is no need for the Arguments to be stated in detail in the Index where they are stated again in the form of Questions Presented, and again in the argument section of the petition. Sections of the petition that are not referenced in Rule 242(d), such as a Statement of the Facts and Preamble to the Arguments, shall not be included. The margins of the petition shall be one inch on all sides. *See* Rule 267(d), SCACR.

Likewise, the return shall not include a Statement of the Facts section or the section entitled "Constitutional Estoppel/Jurisdictional Issues." Instead, to the extent appropriate, the latter issues may be included in the return in the manner set forth in Rule 242(f), as an argument on a question or a counter-statement of the

case or of the questions presented for review.
