PLEA HEARING 3

1 which is count eight of the indictment. I'm handing up
2 his sentencing sheets and a copy of his indictment.

3 THE COURT: All right. Thank you.

4 (Whereupon, the defendant is sworn.)

5 MR. DONNARD: Your Honor, if I may, he's pleading
6 on the voluntary manslaughter under the hand of one is
7 hand of all -- hand of all theory. I tell you that
8 because the person who actually shot the deceased has
9 already pled guilty before you.

10 THE COURT: Right. Ms. Clark, you represent
11 Travis Jacquese -- how do you pronounce that? How do
12 you say it?

13 THE DEFENDANT: Jacquese.

14 THE COURT: Jacquese McFadden under indictment
15 2012-GS-43-781, counts one, seven and eight; is that
16 correct?

17 MS. CLARK: That's correct, Your Honor.

18 THE COURT: Have you had an opportunity to explain
19 to Mr. McFadden the charges contained in the
20 indictment, his constitutional rights, and the
21 consequences of his plea?

22 MS. CLARK: Yes, sir.

23 THE COURT: Do you think he's understood what
24 you've told him?

25 MS. CLARK: Yes, sir.

1 THE COURT: And does he intend to plead guilty or
2 not guilty?

3 MS. CLARK: Guilty, Your Honor.

4 THE COURT: And do you agree with his decision?

5 MS. CLARK: Yes, sir.

6 THE COURT: Okay. And based upon your
7 investigation of the facts and the circumstances, do
8 you believe that if this case were to go to trial under
9 the theories that they have, that there would be a
10 substantial likelihood he'd be found guilty beyond a
11 reasonable doubt?

12 MS. CLARK: Yes, sir.

13 THE COURT: And, Mr. McFadden, I need to ask you a
14 series of questions to make sure you're entering this
15 plea freely and voluntarily, knowingly and
16 intelligently. The first question I have is, are you
17 under the influence of alcohol or drugs today?

18 THE DEFENDANT: No, sir.

19 THE COURT: Are you taking any medications that
20 would cloud your judgment?

21 THE DEFENDANT: No, sir.

22 THE COURT: Are you aware of any physical,
23 emotional or nervous condition that would keep you from
24 understanding what's happening today?

25 THE DEFENDANT: No, sir.

1 THE COURT: Now, the indictment that you're
2 pleading guilty under, the charges of count one, seven
3 and eight -- count one, originally the charge was
4 murder, which they have reduced to voluntary
5 manslaughter. It says that Jimonte Jamal Gilbert,
6 Rhkeim Devontae Ingram, Robert Gerome McFadden, Travis
7 Major, Tobias Lorland McFadden and Travis Jacquese
8 McFadden, and Timothy Tyreese Singletary did in Sumter
9 County on or about December 26, 2011, wilfully and
10 feloniously and intentionally killed the victim,
11 Jayshwan Thompson, with malice aforethought either
12 expressed or implied, by means of shooting the victim,
13 Jayshwan Thompson, and the victim did die as a
14 proximate result thereof on December 26, 2011 in Sumter
15 County in Violation of Section 16-3-10 of the South
16 Carolina Code of Laws 1976 as amended.

17 As -- in reference to you, is what is stated in
18 this indictment the truth?

19 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

20 THE COURT: Under count seven, it reads that on
21 December 26, 2011 in Sumter County, South Carolina, at
22 10295 Lynches River -- River Road, Lynchburg, by use of
23 force, threats or intimidation, and while armed with a
24 deadly weapon, to wit a handgun, the defendant Jimonte
25 Jamal Gilbert, Rhkeim Devontae Ingram, Robert Gerome

1 McFadden, Travis Major, Tobias Lorland McFadden, Travis
 2 Jacquese McFadden and Timothy Tyreese Singletary Jr.,
 3 did take and carry away goods and/or monies from the
 4 person or immediate threat of Bahader El-Sokkary, the
 5 owner of Money Saver Convenience Store with the intent
 6 to permanently deprive him of possession thereof in
 7 violation of Section 16-11-330(a) of the South Carolina
 8 Code of Laws, 1976, as amended.

9 And as in reference to you in this charge, and
 10 this is one that has been reduced to strong armed
 11 robbery, is what's stated in this indictment the truth?

12 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

13 THE COURT: All right. Count eight reads that
 14 Jimonte Jamal Gilbert, Rhkeim Devontae Ingram, Robert
 15 Gerome McFadden, Travis Major, Tobias Lorland McFadden,
 16 Travis Jacquese McFadden, and Timothy Tyreese
 17 Singletary, Jr. did in Sumter County on or about
 18 December 26, 2011, combining with each other, and/or
 19 with other persons for the purpose of accomplishing a
 20 criminal or unlawful object, or object that is neither
 21 criminal nor unlawful, through criminal or unlawful
 22 means; to wit, armed robbery, which we now know is
 23 strong armed robbery, in violation of section 16-70-410
 24 of the South Carolina Code of Laws, 1976 as amended.
 25 As to what's stated in count eight, is it the truth?

1 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

2 THE COURT: All right. Solicitor, what are the
3 facts?

4 MR. DONNARD: Your Honor, on or about December 26,
5 2011 at 10295 Lynches River Road at what is known as
6 the Money Saver Convenience Store, and that is in
7 Sumter County, Mr. McFadden -- this defendant, Mr.
8 McFadden, known as Travis McFadden, did enter into the
9 store, was in possession of a gun at some time --
10 during the store -- during an armed robbery that
11 occurred at that store, Judge.

12 It is our contention that there was a decision
13 made by six persons to rob a -- carjack a car from the
14 store. But while they were at the side of the road
15 waiting, they decided to turn what was a carjacking
16 into an armed robbery of the store. That armed robbery
17 was effected.

18 Mr. Travis McFadden, this defendant, put on a
19 disguise on his face. He entered the store. He became
20 armed with a handgun during that time.

21 The victims in this case, Judge, are Mr. Aaron
22 Smalls, who is present in the courtroom. He was
23 actually shot in the back after leaving the store. He
24 approached -- he came to the store in another car that
25 was completely unrelated to the robbery. Entered, saw

1 a robbery was going on, turned around to leave and was
2 shot in the back. His contention is this is the
3 defendant that shot him. Mr. Smalls believes this is
4 the defendant that shot him. There's a video of the
5 robbery, and that would -- that's what law
6 enforcement's contention is the video would portray as
7 well.

8 Mr. Bahar -- Bahader El-Sokkary is present in
9 the courtroom as well. He was the -- the clerk, -- and
10 he's actually the owner of that store. He was taken at
11 gun point. There was a gun battle or a -- a shooting
12 that occurred. I don't think "gun battle" is the right
13 word for it, but it was certainly Mr. -- the clerk and
14 the robbers were shooting at each other across the
15 countertop. The clerk, with his own gun, which was
16 subsequently taken from him and used against him.
17 Ultimately Mr. Smalls was shot.

18 There's another victim in the room named Siera
19 Douglas. She was a driver of the car Mr. Smalls exited
20 from. And the other victim, Mr. Jayshawn Thompson, was
21 in -- Ms. Douglas is also present in the courtroom.
22 She, in a panic, drove their car into the ditch, and
23 the persons who were engaged in the armed robbery then
24 approached the car that was in the ditch. Mr. Jayshawn
25 Thompson exited that car, was ultimately shot by a

1 handgun -- not by this defendant, but by another
2 defendant we believe. But we're allowing this Travis
3 McFadden to plead guilty to the voluntary manslaughter
4 under the hand of one is hand of all theory because he
5 was an active participant in the armed robbery and the
6 subsequent shooting of Mr. Jayshawn Thompson.

7 We do believe that we could prove that there was
8 a conspiracy that existed amongst all six persons in
9 order to effect this armed robbery together.

10 THE COURT: All right. Do you agree with the
11 facts as stated by the solicitor?

12 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

13 THE COURT: Are you, in fact, guilty of each of
14 these charges?

15 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

16 THE COURT: Now, do you understand that on the
17 voluntary manslaughter charge, that I can sentence you
18 up to 30 years in jail?

19 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

20 THE COURT: And that is a violent, most serious
21 offense, which means that you -- this would be one of
22 your strikes, and that you will have to serve at least
23 85 percent of whatever I sentence you to?

24 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

25 THE COURT: Do you understand that on the robbery

1 -- common law robbery, strong armed robbery, that I
2 could sentence you up to 15 years in jail?

3 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

4 THE COURT: And do you understand on the
5 conspiracy charge, that I could sentence you up to five
6 years in jail?

7 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

8 THE COURT: And do you understand that if I decide
9 to run these consecutively, that I could sentence you
10 to a total of 50 years; do you understand that?

11 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

12 THE COURT: Now, so you fully understand the
13 charges against you and the consequences of your plea?

14 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

15 THE COURT: All right. Now, do you understand as
16 well that when you plead guilty, you waive certain
17 constitutional rights. The first right you waive is
18 your right against self-incrimination; not in this
19 courtroom or any other courtroom in this great nation
20 would you ever be required to come in and testify
21 against yourself. However, when you plead guilty,
22 you're doing that; do you understand?

23 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

24 THE COURT: So, do you wish to waive your right
25 against self-incrimination at this time?

1 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

2 THE COURT: All right. You're also waiving your
3 right to have a jury trial. At a jury trial, I would
4 instruct the jury that they were to presume that you
5 were innocent, that -- and the twelve people that we
6 selected from Sumter County would listen to the
7 evidence. And only after they have determined that you
8 were guilty beyond a reasonable doubt, could you be
9 convicted. And that during that trial, if you decided
10 not to take the stand, I'll instruct them they couldn't
11 consider that against you.

12 Further, if there were any legal defenses you
13 had, you could raise them during that trial. Further,
14 Ms. Clark could cross examine the witnesses presented
15 by the State. And if y'all felt it was in your best
16 interests, she could call witnesses on your behalf.
17 But when you plead guilty, the State doesn't have to
18 prove anything, and you don't get to ask any questions
19 about the evidence; do you understand that?

20 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

21 THE COURT: So do you wish to waive your right to
22 have a jury trial and confront the witnesses against
23 you?

24 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

25 THE COURT: All right. Has anybody threatened you

1 in any way to get you to plead guilty?

2 THE DEFENDANT: No, sir.

3 THE COURT: Has anybody promised you anything to
4 get you to plead guilty?

5 THE DEFENDANT: No, sir.

6 THE COURT: Is the only reason that you're
7 pleading guilty is because you are, in fact, guilty of
8 voluntary manslaughter, common law robbery, and
9 conspiracy?

10 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

11 THE COURT: Now, are you satisfied with the
12 services of Ms. Clark?

13 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

14 THE COURT: Has she done everything that you've
15 asked her to do?

16 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir, she did every bit.

17 THE COURT: And she's been available to answer all
18 of your questions?

19 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

20 THE COURT: And has she done anything that you
21 wish she had not have done?

22 THE DEFENDANT: No, sir.

23 THE COURT: And do you need any more time to speak
24 with her at this time?

25 THE DEFENDANT: No, sir.

1 THE COURT: Now, have you understood all my
2 questions today?

3 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

4 THE COURT: And do you have any questions for the
5 court?

6 THE DEFENDANT: No, sir.

7 THE COURT: Do you understand that -- has anybody
8 suggested to you how to answer these questions that I'm
9 asking you?

10 THE DEFENDANT: No, sir.

11 THE COURT: All right. And you understand that if
12 you change your mind about your decision to plead
13 guilty or the sentence that I give you, that you only
14 have ten days in which to file an appeal?

15 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

16 THE COURT: All right. Mr. McFadden, under
17 indictment 2012-GS-43-781, under count one, which has
18 been downgraded to voluntary manslaughter from murder;
19 how do you plead, guilty or not guilty?

20 THE DEFENDANT: Guilty.

21 THE COURT: Under indictment 2012-GS-43-781, count
22 seven, which was originally indicted as armed robbery,
23 which has been reduced to strong armed robbery; how do
24 you plead, guilty or not guilty?

25 THE DEFENDANT: Guilty.

1 THE COURT: And as to the criminal conspiracy, how
2 do you plead, guilty or not guilty?

3 THE DEFENDANT: Guilty.

4 THE COURT: I find there's a substantial factual
5 basis for the plea. I find this defendant has entered
6 into it freely, voluntarily, knowingly and
7 intelligently. He has had the advice of counsel, whom
8 he says he is well pleased. I will accept the plea.

9 What is his criminal history?

10 MR. DONNARD: Your Honor, he has a conviction for
11 criminal sexual conduct with a minor second degree in
12 2007. He has a conviction in 2011 for petit larceny
13 less than \$2,000.

14 THE COURT: Was he out on probation or anything
15 like that on this charge?

16 MR. DONNARD: Your Honor, I don't have that
17 information.

18 THE COURT: Mr. McFadden, is that a correct
19 statement of your prior criminal actions?

20 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir. I was on probation.

21 THE COURT: You were on probation at the time this
22 was committed?

23 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

24 THE COURT: Is there anybody here from the
25 probation department?

1 MR. DONNARD: No, sir. I don't believe so, Your
2 Honor.

3 MS. CLARK: Probation is here.

4 THE COURT: Yes, sir.

5 PROBATION AGENT: Judge, I'm not sure -- I don't
6 have our computer with me, but I --

7 THE COURT: He tells me he thought he was on
8 probation at the time he committed this offense; can
9 you confirm that for me before I sentence him?

10 PROBATION AGENT: Sir?

11 THE COURT: Can you confirm that with me prior to
12 sentencing?

13 PROBATION AGENT: Yes, sir, I can.

14 THE COURT: All right. Thank you. All right.
15 Ms. Clark.

16 MS. CLARK: Yes, sir, may it please the court.

17 THE COURT: Yes, ma'am.

18 MS. CLARK: His family is telling me he wasn't on
19 probation --

20 THE COURT: Okay.

21 MS. CLARK: -- but I -- it wasn't a charge that
22 was in Sumter County, I don't believe as well, Your
23 Honor.

24 Mr. McFadden is 23 years of age. And as you
25 probably heard, most of these -- these young men, they

1 knew each other. And he has -- he's graduated from
2 high school. He went to [REDACTED] High School. He was
3 working at roofing companies, Singletary Roofing
4 Company. So at the time of this incident, he was
5 employed.

6 He went out with them. And, Your Honor, this
7 transpired -- he's expressed to me from the very
8 beginning, Your Honor -- even though he did not give a
9 statement -- from the very beginning he has expressed
10 to me not only his remorse that this happened, but his
11 willingness to plead to what has gone on, and I think I
12 expressed that to the Solicitor from the very
13 beginning.

14 So he -- and even during this, Your Honor, we've
15 gone back and forth. I've explained to him what the
16 hand of one hand of all is, and how even if you don't
17 pull a trigger, your actions cause a result, then you
18 can be held accountable for it.

19 He has maintained to me that he did not pull a
20 trigger. And I know that the solicitor said --

21 THE COURT: Now, there was a -- I think the
22 statement was that he pulled the trigger on Mr. Smalls;
23 is that correct?

24 MS. CLARK: That's -- that's correct. That's what
25 they're saying, Your Honor, but he -- he maintains to

1 me that he has -- he did not. I mean, he has been
2 forthright, I think, from the very beginning --

3 THE COURT: Are you sure you want him to plead
4 guilty?

5 MS. CLARK: Well, he's --

6 THE COURT: I mean, if he's saying he didn't do
7 it.

8 MS. CLARK: Your Honor --

9 THE COURT: You're telling me now that he didn't
10 --

11 MS. CLARK: Well, he's pleading guilty under the
12 hand of one is the hand of all.

13 THE COURT: Okay.

14 MS. CLARK: He understands what that means. I
15 just wanted to point out, you know, we're not trying to
16 nitpick it, I just wanted you to understand what he
17 said to me thus far. He -- and he understands that he
18 has to pay for this crime. He's willing to pay for it.
19 He's very sorry, very remorseful.

20 He was in school, he was in tech school. He
21 should have been continuing on with that and he knows
22 that. He knows that this has been a mistake that's not
23 only ruined lives -- their lives, the victims' lives,
24 but it's ruined his as well. You understand, he knows
25 that there are long standing repercussions for this,

1 for everybody, and he is extremely sorry.

2 While he -- I should point out to the court as
3 well, he's been incarcerated since March of 2012 and
4 has not made bond. And even though, I think, the bond
5 was initially denied, he hasn't asked me to seek a bond
6 reduction or any of that, Your Honor, because he knew
7 he would have to pay for what he did. And he was
8 willing to do that again, like I said, from the
9 beginning.

10 While he's been incarcerated for this, his
11 mother passed, so it's been a difficult situation for
12 him so he knows that he's losing valuable time that he
13 could have had with his family. And, again, he's just
14 very, very sorry. He's not married. He doesn't have
15 any children.

16 We're asking the court to consider giving him a
17 sentence that's going to allow him at some point to
18 resume his life, and to try to be a productive person
19 in society. I think this is what he wants to do.
20 Again, he wants -- he's sorry and he -- he wants to pay
21 for what he did. He understands that this whole
22 situation got grossly out of hand. It shouldn't have
23 happened in the first place.

24 His family is here. It's the same family you
25 just saw, Mr. McFadden here to speak -- anybody who

1 might want to speak. His brother is here and has been
2 in contact with me, and I think they would like to
3 speak.

4 THE COURT: All right. Certainly. Please state
5 your name for the record.

6 MR. MCFADDEN: Johns (ph) McFadden. I'm Travis'
7 baby brother. Our mama just recently died. None of
8 this is easy. I mean, my brother was --

9 THE COURT: You've got to speak into the
10 microphone. I've got to hear you.

11 MR. MCFADDEN: My brother was there through thick
12 and thin, whatever I need he always gave it to me, as
13 well as my mom. After my mama had him, they thought
14 that she wouldn't be able to have no more kids, but she
15 had me. So her heart got weaker.

16 They put a trans -- a pacemaker inside her heart
17 on August 13th of this year, 2013. She passed away in
18 the hospital. Seeing my mama go through that in front
19 of my eyes, without my brother being there, it was
20 hard. He couldn't be there for her funeral. So the
21 preacher and me, by myself, out here, you know, I ain't
22 got nobody -- I mean, I got family, but my brother is
23 the only one that is close to me right now and he's the
24 only one that I got. So that's what I came to say.

25 THE COURT: Well, I'm sorry for your loss.

1 MR. MCFADDEN: Thank you.

2 THE COURT: Anyone else want to speak? State your
3 name again, we got to -- I'm doing a different record.

4 MS. MCFADDEN: Sylvenia McFadden. I'm Travis'
5 aunt also. The same as I asked for Tobias, I ask for
6 mercy. I mean, he's a good kid. He was on the right
7 path but, you know, he just got with the wrong crowd,
8 and this happened. But I just ask for mercy.

9 THE COURT: Okay. Thank you. Anyone else?

10 MR. MCFADDEN: My name is Danny McFadden. Travis
11 McFadden is my cousin. And all I can say is, he messed
12 around and got with the wrong crowd. He a good boy.
13 You know, he'll -- he'll go working and all, and doing
14 all he had to do until he got with the wrong crowd. I
15 just ask you -- can you look out for him, can you help
16 him.

17 THE COURT: Okay. Thank you.

18 MS. CLARK: That's it, Your Honor.

19 THE COURT: All right. Would he like to say
20 anything?

21 THE DEFENDANT: I would like to say I apologize
22 for my action, and every one else is. And I'm sorry
23 for your loss, the family members sitting here, I
24 apologize to them.

25 THE COURT: All right. Would the victims like to

1 say anything?

2 MR. DONNARD: Your Honor, the victims have
3 indicated they don't wish to address the court at this
4 time, but law enforcement would request --

5 THE COURT: All right. Who, in law enforcement,
6 would like to address the court?

7 MR. DONNARD: Your Honor, Sheriff Dennis would
8 like to address the court.

9 THE COURT: Yes. Sheriff Dennis.

10 SHERIFF DENNIS: Your Honor, if it please the
11 court, this occurred on December 26th, the day after
12 Christmas. And the owner of Money Saver, who is here
13 today, who has a convenience store in that community --
14 a small community, provides services to just about
15 everyone in that community, decided that evening that
16 he wanted to open his doors to provide services the day
17 after Christmas. Well, he decided to do that at
18 approximately 9:00.

19 And, Your Honor, I understand the Solicitor has
20 referred to "the gentleman". In law enforcement, our
21 profession, we refer to that group as thugs or gang
22 bangers that came into his store that night. Not only
23 came to his store that night, they attempted -- they
24 shot at the owner of the store several times. And
25 during that time Mr. Thompson and Mr. Smalls came up to

1 the store, and they not only shot Mr. Smalls, who may
2 never walk again, he also took the lives of the victim
3 -- Thompson's son.

4 Your Honor, we believe that our forensic team
5 and Investigator Addison, who did a great job in
6 preparing this case, and also they -- visiting their
7 Facebook, that this was a gang related -- gang -- call
8 them a gang. I did, at the time, let the State law
9 enforcement division to come in and investigate this
10 case as a gang related case.

11 I believe that there was no remorse, there were
12 no regards for safety and we ask the judge to take that
13 into consideration during these proceedings.

14 THE COURT: All right. Thank you. Anything else,
15 Solicitor?

16 MR. DONNARD: The court's indulgence?

17 (Pause.)

18 MR. DONNARD: No, Your Honor.

19 THE COURT: Ms. Clark, do you have anything else?

20 MS. CLARK: Your Honor, the only thing I would
21 just say is, I realize that this incident was
22 egregious. He understands that. It was bad. And it
23 happened unfortunately, but he is remorseful --

24 THE COURT: Well, it's just his opinion.

25 MS. CLARK: I understand. And so he is

1 remorseful. And I just would ask the court to consider
2 all of that. I mean, that's why he stands before you.
3 He knows what his situation is.

4 THE COURT: All right. Thank you.

5 MS. CLARK: Thank you.

6 THE COURT: All right. I'll break for five
7 minutes until we have another defendant. Yes, sir?
8 Let me give -- can you state on the record whether he
9 was -- can you state on the record whether Mr. Travis
10 McFadden was on probation at the time that this
11 incident occurred?

12 PROBATION AGENT: Yes, sir. It appears that the
13 case is still active. The case is from Florence
14 County. They've actually issued a warrant which is an
15 active -- which is an active warrant, which they issued
16 after he got this offense. The warrant hasn't been
17 served on him yet, but it appears that they'll want to
18 dispose of this case after he pleads guilty --

19 THE COURT: So they'll want that to run --

20 PROBATION AGENT: Run it concurrent. You need to
21 go ahead and tell me about it now because I'm going to
22 sentence him on it.

23 SHERIFF DENNIS: Your Honor, please, if the court
24 is of a mind, we'll contact Florence County tonight and
25 get the warrant over here in the morning. And we can

1 have that done at the same time that you sentence him
2 in the morning.

3 THE COURT: All right. Thank you.

4 MS. CLARK: I would just say, Your Honor, I don't
5 know anything about that case. I was appointed on this
6 case --

7 THE COURT: You were -- you were appointed on this
8 one.

9 MS. CLARK: Yes, sir.

10 THE COURT: All right.

11 MR. DONNARD: Your Honor, if it please the court,
12 the State calls Jimonte Gilbert...

13 (After a recess, the Court reconvened in the
14 McFadden case for sentencing.)

15 THE COURT: All right. The next two are ones
16 who I believe are the culprits in this, and I think
17 they were the ones who put this together. This
18 horrible situation probably would not have happened
19 without their planning. And this was, again, horrible.
20 You just think, one man is dead and one man is
21 paralyzed for life. And someone was saying that's a
22 sentence worse than death. I hope it's not, sir. I
23 hope it's not. I hope you can get your life back
24 together.

25 But for Travis Jaqueese McFadden, the sentence

1 is that on the criminal conspiracy, that you be
2 committed to the State Department of Corrections for a
3 period of five years. This will run concurrent to your
4 other charges -- or other sentences.

5 On the charge of common law robbery, strong
6 armed robbery, the sentence is that you be committed to
7 the State Department of Corrections for a period of 15
8 years.

9 On the charge of voluntary manslaughter, you are
10 committed to the State Department of Corrections for a
11 period of 30 years. Although this was one general time
12 frame, there were two victims, and these charges and
13 these sentences shall run consecutively.

14 Tobias Lorland McFadden, Mr. McFadden you seem
15 to be the man who put all this together, the sentence
16 for you is -- on the charge of criminal conspiracy,
17 that you be committed to the State Department of
18 Corrections for a period of five years. This will run
19 concurrent with your other charges.

20 And on the strong armed robbery, you're hereby
21 committed to the State Department of Corrections for a
22 period of 15 years.

23 On the charge of voluntary manslaughter, you're
24 committed to the State Department of Corrections for a
25 period of 30 years. These sentences shall run

1 consecutively. That is the ruling of the court. The
2 attorneys are notified they have ten days to file their
3 appeals or motions to reconsider.

4 Anything further from the State?

5 THE COURT: Anything further from the defense
6 attorneys?

7 MS. CLARK: No, Your Honor.

8 THE COURT: Court is adjourned until 10:00
9 tomorrow morning.

10 (Whereupon, the hearing adjourned.)

1 MR. DONNALD: Your Honor, may it please the Court.

2 THE COURT: Yes.

3 MR. DONNALD: The next matter, the last matter for
4 this week -- the last matter for this year, I suppose --

5 THE COURT: I believe it is.

6 MR. DONNALD: -- will be Travis Jacquese McFadden,
7 and I'll get into -- I can give you a little bit of
8 background, but just for the record, he is here on a
9 motion to reconsider, sentence handed down by Your Honor
10 back in 2013. The exact date of that was November 18th,
11 2013. If it please the Court, I'll proceed, Your Honor.

12 THE COURT: Yes.

13 MR. DONNALD: Your Honor, Mr. McFadden was one of
14 seven codefendants who were charged with armed robbery and
15 murder and attempted murder in a case where there was a
16 convenience store robbery.

17 Everybody that was in the case pled guilty. It was
18 actually Mr. Finney's case at the time. It was one of the
19 first ones that I was dealing with when I came back to the
20 Solicitor's Office. In particular, Mr. McFadden was
21 represented -- let me back that up there.

22 There was more -- there was more than one
23 Mr. McFadden in this case.

24 THE COURT: Okay.

25 MR. DONNALD: Travis McFadden in this case was

1 indicted under indictment number 2012-0781. It is a
2 multiple-count indictment. I'm not going to put them all
3 on the record.

4 He ended up pleading guilty with a recommendation
5 from the State before Your Honor to a charge of voluntary
6 manslaughter which was a reduction from a murder charge.

7 THE COURT: On a murder charge which carried life.

8 MR. DONNARD: That's correct. He pled to common law
9 robbery, which was a reduction from armed robbery, and he
10 pled guilty to conspiracy, criminal conspiracy, common law
11 conspiracy.

12 There was a recommendation at the time by the State
13 of 20 years, 20 years of total sentence to be served
14 currently. At least that's my best recollection. I
15 haven't gone back and looked at the transcript.

16 Your Honor sentenced him to 30 years on the voluntary
17 manslaughter, 15 years consecutive on the strong armed
18 robbery and five years concurrent on the conspiracy charge
19 for a total of 45 years.

20 I would like to hand up the sentencing sheets that
21 have been certified. I didn't get them marked because
22 they're part of the Court's file.

23 I also would like to hand up, Your Honor, prior to
24 his plea Mr. McFadden, Mr. Travis McFadden, with the
25 assistance of his attorney, Ms. Clark, signed an

1 Acknowledgment of Rights Given up by Entering a Guilty
2 Plea. This was in the Court's file, as well, but I have
3 this marked as Court's Exhibit No. 1.

4 THE COURT: All right.

5 MR. DONNALD: The reason -- and I also have the
6 indictment if you wish to have a true copy of the
7 indictment, Your Honor. The reason that this has taken so
8 long to -- let me give you a little bit more background.
9 Mr. McFadden was sentenced to 45 years. Another
10 codefendant was sentenced to 45 years, and I think he was
11 McFadden, too. I'd have to go look at --

12 MS. CLARK: Tobias McFadden.

13 MR. DONNALD: Tobias McFadden was also sentenced to
14 45 years. In this particular case, Your Honor, Mr. -- a
15 group of guys pulled up in a car at the Money Saver
16 convenience store which is almost out of Sumter County.
17 It's barely in Sumter County, went in armed, took --

18 THE COURT: This was near Lynchburg.

19 MR. DONNALD: That's correct.

20 THE COURT: I remember the facts. I remember that.

21 MR. DONNALD: Okay, took -- they took the owner of
22 the shop, held him for ransom. A gentleman by the name of
23 Jayson -- Jayshawn Smalls -- not Jayshawn Smalls.

24 Y'all come up here, please.

25 Your Honor, I have with me in the courtroom Sierra

1 Duncan and Patricia Thompson.

2 Erissa Smalls went into the -- what was -- ultimately
3 one of persons who was deceased. I have with me Patricia
4 Thompson. Patricia Thompson is the mother of Jayshawn
5 Thompson. Jayshawn pulled up while the robbery was going
6 on. He was in a car, pulled up while the robbery was
7 going on.

8 THE COURT: Just happened to be there at the wrong
9 place at the wrong time.

10 MR. DONNARD: That's right. Ms. Duplemy (phonetic)
11 who was also here and is a victim, sister of Jayshawn, was
12 in the car, as well. She actually was a witness to this.

13 Jayshawn went in the store, bad time, turned around,
14 went to leave, and he got shot in the back. He is
15 paralyzed. He couldn't be here this morning because he
16 had a -- he had a doctor's appointment.

17 Ms. Duncan's fiancée was a gentleman by the name of
18 Erissa Smalls. I'm sorry. I got the names wrong. I
19 think I did that during the plea.

20 (Pause).

21 I got the names wrong. Eris got shot in the back.
22 Jayshawn is the one who is deceased. I apologize for
23 that, Your Honor. Jay--- Eris got shot in the back and is
24 a paraplegic as a result of that.

25 Just -- it's nothing other than not only bad place at

1 the wrong time. It was almost an errant shot, and then it
2 hit him right in the right spot to leave him paralyzed.

3 While the deceased went, got out to help, he ended up
4 being shot in the chest and was deceased by the time
5 paramedics arrived.

6 My -- the State's recommendation and with going
7 through the victims and everybody involved was for a
8 20-year sentence, as I have said. Now, as you know, and
9 the reason I handed up the Explanation of Rights is
10 because you're certainly not bound by any recommendation
11 that I made.

12 THE COURT: No.

13 MR. DONNALD: But --

14 THE COURT: -- and I specifically said in this one
15 that I was not bound.

16 MR. DONNALD: Yes.

17 THE COURT: I made sure everybody knew that.

18 MR. DONNALD: Yes, sir. Part of the reason -- I'm
19 telling you all of this to lay out the reason why it's
20 taken three years to get back. I didn't intend for it to
21 take three years.

22 I meant for some water to go under the bridge after
23 -- as a result of the guilty plea, and I wanted to discuss
24 with my victims who were here the possibility that if this
25 Mr. McFadden or the other Mr. McFadden, whose motion to

1 reconsider was already been denied, if they were willing
2 to forgo their rights to appeal or to PCR if the family
3 would agree to let me ask the judge to reconsider the
4 sentence back to the 20 years that I had originally asked
5 for.

6 I only tell you that to explain the time. I wanted
7 there to be enough time for that to be made in a rational
8 way. Now, I can tell you three years has passed. The
9 family is happy with His Honor's sentence and happy with
10 the 45 years. So it's not asking you to change the
11 sentence. I'm asking you to leave the sentence as it is.

12 The two -- the only other thing that I need -- I wish
13 to put on the record is that Tobias and Travis McFadden
14 who were the two shooters in this got additional -- the
15 other defendants got 20 years.

16 My recollection is that you sentenced them to the 45
17 because they were the active shooters on the scene that
18 afternoon, and so with that, that's my introduction. But
19 it's Ms. Clark's motion, and I'll let her make her motion.

20 THE COURT: Ms. Clark.

21 MS. CLARK: Yes, sir. May it please the Court. This
22 is my motion to reconsider. In all of the years that I've
23 practiced law, this is only the second one that I have
24 ever done, Your Honor. It, of course, is in your sound
25 discretion as to whether or not you choose to reconsider

1 the sentence you have imposed.

2 I'm just asking the Court to consider the fact that
3 at the time of this, Mr. McFadden and all of these young
4 guys were all young men.

5 I do have the sentences of everyone else, Your Honor.



That on or about December 26, 2011, in Sumter County, South Carolina, at 10295 Lynches River Road, Lynchburg, by use of force, threats or intimidation and while armed with a deadly weapon, to wit: a handgun, the Defendant(s) Jimonte Jamal Gilbert, Rhkeim Devontae Ingram, Robert Gerome McFadden, Travis Major, Tabias Lorland McFadden, Travis Jacquese McFadden and Timothy Tyreese Singletary, Jr. did take and carry away goods and/or monies from the person or immediate presence of Bahader El-Sokkapy, the owner of Money Saver Convenience Store with the intent to permanently deprive him of possession thereof, in violation of Section 16-11-330(A) of the South Carolina Code of Laws, 1976, as amended.

ATTACHED TO AND BECOMING PART OF THE ORIGINAL INDICTMENT FOR JIMONTE JAMAL GILBERT, ROBERT GEROME MCFADDEN, TRAVIS MAJOR, TRAVIS JACQUEESE MCFADDEN AND TIMOTHY TYREESE SINGLETARY, JR. SHOWN THEREON:

COUNT EIGHT - CRIMINAL CONSPIRACY

That Jimonte Jamal Gilbert, Rhkeim Devontae Ingram, Robert Gerome McFadden, Travis Major, Tabias Lorland McFadden, Travis Jacquese McFadden and Timothy Tyreese Singletary, Jr. did in Sumter County on or about December 26, 2011 combine with each other, and/or with other persons, for the purpose of accomplishing a criminal or unlawful object or an object that is neither criminal nor unlawful through criminal or unlawful means, to wit: armed robbery, in violation of Section 16-17-410, S. C. Code of Laws, 1976, as amended.

COUNT NINE- CARJACKING

That in Sumter County on or about December 26, 2011, the Defendants Tabias Lorland McFadden, Rhkeim Devontae Ingram and Travis Jacquese McFadden did take or attempt to take a blue in color Chevrolet Caprice bearing SC HIA569 from Ciera Lashea Dunkley by force and violence or by intimidation while Ciera Lashea Dunkley was operating the vehicle or in the vehicle; in violation of Section 16-3-1075 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina (1976), as amended.

COUNT TEN - ACCESSORY BEFORE THE FACT TO A FELONY

That Robert Gerome McFadden, did in Sumter County on or about December 26, 2011, advised or agreed with or urged or hired or in some way aided, counseled or encouraged the principal felon to commit the felony of Armed Robbery, by providing co-defendants with one or more handguns and also allowed his co-defendants the use of his vehicle, a 1999 Chevrolet Tahoe, for transport to and from the crime scene, in violation of the Common Law and Section 16-01-0040, S. C. Code of Laws, 1976, as amended.

COUNT ELEVEN - ACCESSORY AFTER THE FACT TO CLASS A FELONY

That Robert Gerome McFadden, did in Sumter County on or about December 26, 2011, knowing of the commission and completion of the felony of armed robbery, harbor or assist such felon after the fact by accepting and receiving a portion of the monetary proceeds from Jimonte Jamal Gilbert, Travis Major, Travis Jacquese McFadden and/or Timothy Tyreese Singletary, Jr after the fact of an armed robbery of the Money Saver Convenience Store in which the co-defendants stole an undisclosed amount of money, in violation of the Common Law crime of Accessory After the Fact in commission of a class A felony.

Against the peace and dignity of the State, and contrary to the statute in such case made and provided.
