4 Your Honor, while he is coming up, may I approach?

5 THE COURT: Sure.

6 (Whereupon, a bench conference was held.)

23 DIRECT-EXAMINATION

24 BY MS. RICHARDSON:

25 Q. Mr. Collins, would you spell your last name?

RANDY COLLINS-DIRECT BY MS. RICHARDSON

1 A. C-O-L-L-I-N-S.

2 Q. And Mr. Collins, obviously you're in a uniform  
3 today?

4 A. Yes, ma'am.

5 Q. And are you currently in prison?

6 A. Yes, ma'am.

7 Q. Okay. And were you con -- convicted or serving a  
8 prison sentence for arsen in the death Science Combs?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. Or Dave Combs?

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. And that was back in November of 2018?

13 A. Yes, ma'am.

14 Q. And Mr. Collins, is your sentence or your  
15 conviction currently under appeal? You appealed it, your  
16 sentence?

17 A. Yes, ma'am.

18 Q. Okay. And you've got a lawyer helping you with  
19 that?

20 A. Yes, ma'am.

21 Q. Okay. And is he in the courtroom, Mr. Gaskins?

22 A. Yes.

23 Q. Okay. And you're here to testify today?

24 A. Yes, ma'am.

25 Q. Okay. And that's voluntary, nobody's forced you

1 to do that?

2 A. Right.

3 Q. Okay. And would you tell this Jury what you're  
4 hoping to get from this?

5 A. I'm hoping to get my sentence cut a little bit.

6 Q. Okay. And has anybody promised you that that's  
7 going to happen?

8 A. No.

9 Q. And you understand that that's up to the Judge?

10 A. Right.

13 A. Right.

14 Q. But it's completely up to the Judge?

15 A. Yes.

16 Q. Been no agreement as to what number it would be?

17 A. Right.

18 Q. All right. And Mr. Collins, do you understand  
19 that by testifying today that could hurt your appeal?

20 A. Right.

21 Q. And could cause you some problems there?

22 A. Right.

23 Q. Do you also understand that anything you say can  
24 be used against you if you were to have go back to court?

25 A. Right.

RANDY COLLINS-DIRECT BY MS. RICHARDSON

- 1 Q. On that charge?
- 2 A. Right.
- 3 Q. You understand that?
- 4 A. Yes, I do understand.
- 5 Q. And you went over your legal rights in that
- 6 regard?
- 7 A. Right.
- 8 Q. Your Miranda was read to you again?
- 9 A. Right.
- 10 Q. All right. And your lawyer was with you?
- 11 A. Right.
- 12 Q. Okay. So there's been no promise that this won't
- 13 be used against you?
- 14 A. That's right.
- 15 Q. All right. Mr. Collins, do you know Marissa
- 16 Cohen?
- 17 A. Yes, ma'am, I do.
- 18 Q. Okay. And tell me how you know her.
- 19 A. I know her -- I know her for a long time. My --
- 20 my -- well -- sister-in-law, Loretta, that's her niece.
- 21 Q. Okay. So, your sister-in-law Loretta, and what's
- 22 her last name?
- 23 A. Her name is Miller.
- 24 Q. Loretta Miller?
- 25 A. Loretta Miller.

1 Q. Okay. So -- and -- and do you call her Marissa?

2 A. Who?

3 Q. Do you call Ms. Cohen -- do you -- do you call her  
4 Marissa ---

5 A. Yes.

6 Q. --- or what do you call her?

7 A. Marissa.

8 Q. All right. Does she have another name that you --  
9 or a nickname that you use sometimes?

10 A. No, not as I know.

11 Q. Okay. So you -- what about Tina, have you ever

12 ---

13 A. Tina, yeah, yes.

14 Q. Okay.

15 A. Yes.

16 Q. All right. And tell me about James Miller. You  
17 knew Mr. Miller?

18 A. James Miller, that's my nephew.

19 Q. Okay. And how -- explain that relationship.

20 A. That's my brother -- my oldest brother son.

21 Q. And, obviously, you've known him his -- you knew  
22 him his whole life?

23 A. Right. We raised up together.

24 Q. And did you know Dave or who they called Science  
25 Combs?

RANDY COLLINS-DIRECT BY MS. RICHARDSON

1 A. Yes, I do.

2 Q. And how did you know him?

3 A. I knew him through Marissa, his mom.

4 Q. And what kind of relationship did you have with  
5 the mother, Marissa, and the child?

6 A. We was like family, like families. Raised up like  
7 families. I've known her and her son, he was like a son to  
8 me.

9 Q. And you remember the fire that happened in March  
10 of 2014?

11 A. I didn't see no fire, but I heard about it.

12 Q. Okay. And you knew about Science dying?

13 A. Yes, and that hurt me to my heart.

14 Q. Okay. And tell me, did you have some involvement  
15 in that?

16 A. Yes, ma'am, I do -- I did.

17 Q. And tell -- tell me and tell this Jury how that  
18 started.

19 A. How it started, Marissa, she had came (sic) to my  
20 house, and she used to pick the little children up, you  
21 know. I had a girl at the house named Chanda (ph) -- her  
22 name was Chanda. And she used to pick the girl up and they  
23 used to stay with her sometime, but they wasn't there.

24 Q. Oh.

25 A. And she said they had need to use the kerosene

1 heater because the house was too cold. And I -- I -- I  
2 said, "No, I can't do that, 'cause I need it." But she  
3 asked me again, and then I told her, I say, "Well, okay, you  
4 can use it, but just give it back to me." And she went on.

5 Q. And did she get the heater?

6 A. She got the heater, yes.

7 Q. And got it from your house?

8 A. Right.

9 Q. And then what happened?

10 A. And a couple of days after, she says, "Well, I got  
11 a job for you to do, I need a job done."

12 Q. And how did she tell you that?

13 A. She said, "I got a job done -- could you do a job  
14 for me?" I said, "What you mean? What you talking about?"  
15 And she was wanting me to burn her house down so she could  
16 get the insurance money. And I say, "No, I better not do  
17 that."

18 And then, a couple of days after, again, I saw her  
19 again, and she tell me, "You sure you ain't going to do that  
20 for me?" And I said, "Well, I'll go ahead and do it for  
21 you."

22 When I was fixing her car -- I was working on  
23 something on her car, I said, "Well, I -- I'll try to go  
24 ahead and do that for you." And that's how all of that  
25 happened, like that.

RANDY COLLINS-DIRECT BY MS. RICHARDSON

1 Q. Okay. And what were you supposed to get out of  
2 it?

3 A. She offered me \$5,000.

4 Q. And where was she supposed to get \$5,000?

5 A. The insurance company.

6 Q. Okay. And after you agreed to that, what  
7 happened?

8 A. After I agreed to it, she said she was about to  
9 move. She had -- she had everything organized for me. I  
10 said, "Okay." And she moved -- she said she moved and  
11 nobody supposed to be there.

12 And that night we went -- me and -- me and -- I  
13 tell my nephew -- I told my nephew at first, I say, "James,"  
14 I say, "You know your -- your cousin, she say she want me to  
15 burn her house down for the insurance money." And he said,  
16 "What?" And I said, "Yeah, that's what she tells me." And  
17 he said, "Well, I wouldn't mind making a little bit right  
18 now." and I said, "Okay."

19 So we went up town. Played a couple of games of  
20 pool and we drank a little beer. Then we ride around a  
21 little bit, and after we ride around a little bit, that's  
22 when we go ahead and check it out, and we went to check it  
23 out. Went through the field, you know, parked the vehicle,  
24 went through the back and went to the front.

25 She was supposed to already have stuff organized,

1 you know, the kerosene and things. But the time we went,  
2 whenever she say, well, the door locked, both of the doors  
3 were locked and all, so we couldn't get in.

4 Q. Was that supposed to be the case? Were they  
5 supposed to be locked?

6 A. It was supposed to have been open.

7 Q. Okay.

8 A. And he went near the window. You know, and the  
9 window was -- looked shut and stuff, and I told him, I said,  
10 "We don't need to do this." I said, "Let's don't do it,  
11 let's wait to the next day." But he light a cigarette, and  
12 he throw a match, and I didn't see nothing light up or  
13 nothing. But, the next minute afterwords, we left, ride  
14 around a couple more times, and then James took me home.  
15 And after he took me home, probably about -- about an hour  
16 or so, about 35, 40 minutes or so, Marissa called me and  
17 tell me Science is dead. And I say, "For real? You lying."  
18 It kind of shook me up. And I told her if there's anything  
19 I can do for her, I'd do it.

20 And I started worrying a little bit, 'cause I know  
21 we ain't do that. That's what I say to myself on that. And  
22 when James come to pick me up, and then after that, he  
23 picked his mom up. And when he picked his mom up, they came  
24 to me and tell me about it. But I know, because Marissa  
25 called me up on the phone, at -- at the house. But I'm

1 sorry about everything, if I -- if I did it like that, but I  
2 don't think we -- we light that fire.

3 Q. Let me ask you this: Did you have any idea that  
4 Science was in that trailer?

5 A. No, ma'am. I had no ideal (sic). Hurt me in my  
6 heart. I had no idea that was he was in that trailer.

7 Q. Okay.

8 A. No. And that's the truth.

9 Q. And you had said earlier that she -- she had said  
10 she had everything ready. How ---

11 A. Right.

12 Q. --- how did she let you know that?

13 A. She called me on the phone.

14 Q. Was that the same day?

15 A. She said everything is ready, I done (sic) moved  
16 now.

17 Q. And what was the -- was there a plan about the  
18 kerosene?

19 A. What you say again?

20 Q. Was there a plan about what was supposed to happen  
21 with the kerosene?

22 A. The kerosene was to start the fire.

23 Q. And whose idea was that?

24 A. Me. I tell them the best way to do it is -- is  
25 with kerosene.

RANDY COLLINS-DIRECT BY MS. RICHARDSON

1 Q. And where was the kerosene supposed to be?

2 A. Supposed to be in the room, on the side, but the  
3 doors were locked, and I couldn't get to it.

4 Q. Okay.

5 A. So I cancel -- to do it.

6 Q. But you and James were still there?

7 A. No, we had left.

8 Q. Okay.

9 A. We had left.

10 Q. But after the -- you found out the doors were  
11 locked, and did you all go -- or did James go around to the  
12 window?

13 A. Yeah, he went to the window. Like I just now had  
14 said that he went to the window, you know, I was at the  
15 window, too. And I told him, "Don't do it," again, because  
16 it was raining hard, too, that night.

17 Q. Okay. But did you see him light something?

18 A. What you say again?

19 Q. Did you see him light something up?

20 A. He light a cigarette and then he flick -- he  
21 throw -- throw -- he throw a paper -- a piece of paper.

22 Q. At the window?

23 A. Yes.

24 Q. Okay.

25 A. But we didn't see nothing.

RANDY COLLINS-DIRECT BY MS. RICHARDSON

- 1 Q. You didn't see it start, you're saying?
- 2 A. No.
- 3 Q. Okay. Let me show this picture, it's State's
- 4 Exhibit No. 5. Is that the trailer?
- 5 A. Yes, ma'am.
- 6 Q. Okay. And when you said you came around the
- 7 back ---
- 8 A. That's the window right there.
- 9 Q. Over here?
- 10 A. Right -- right there. That -- that one right
- 11 there looks small.
- 12 Q. Uh-huh.
- 13 A. That's the window, right there.
- 14 Q. Okay. And you came back from back here in the
- 15 woods ---
- 16 A. Yes.
- 17 Q. --- is that what you're saying?
- 18 A. Yes.
- 19 Q. Okay.
- 20 A. Ain't no way we done it. Ain't no way. There was
- 21 a plan.
- 22 Q. All right. And let me ask you ---
- 23 A. Ain't no way we done it.
- 24 Q. All right. And let me ask you this: You -- you
- 25 talked to the police? They talked to you about it?

1 A. Yes, I did.

2 Q. And when you met with them, did you kind of draw  
3 up a little sketch about what happened?

4 A. Yes, I did.

5 Q. All right. Let me show you -- this hasn't been  
6 premarked, yet. It's being marked as Number 34.

7 (WHEREUPON, State's Exhibit No. 34 was marked for  
8 identification only.)

9 All right.

10 Is that the map? The little sketch that you drew?

11 A. Yes. Yes. That's the swimming pool. The  
12 swimming pool in the front. Yes.

13 Q. Okay. And that -- that's the swimming pool in  
14 front of the house?

15 A. Yeah, that circle right there, yes, ma'am.

16 Q. Okay. And is -- this is the map that you drew?

17 A. Right. Right.

18 Q. And that was with the two police officers?

19 A. Right.

20 Q. Officer Garrett sitting over here?

21 A. Right. Yes.

22 Q. And on the other man ---

23 A. Right.

24 Q. --- with SLED?

25 A. Yes.

RANDY COLLINS-DIRECT BY MS. RICHARDSON

1 Q. Okay.

2 MS. RICHARDSON: Your Honor, at this time I'd  
3 offer State's No. 34 into evidence.

4 MS. WILSON: No objection, Your Honor.

5 THE COURT: 34 is admitted.

6 (WHEREUPON, State's Exhibit No. 34 was admitted  
7 into evidence.)

8 BY MS. RICHARDSON:

9 Q. Okay. And let me show you this, there's a -- on  
10 the top of this picture back here is a little marking. Is  
11 that where y'all parked?

12 A. Yes, ma'am, uh-huh. We parked and walked through  
13 the field. Uh-huh.

14 Q. And this right here, is that the woods or the  
15 field?

16 A. The field, yes, yes.

17 Q. Okay. And you said that little circle is what?

18 A. That's the swimming pool right there in the front  
19 of the house.

20 Q. Okay. And there's a little square drawn on  
21 there -- little square drawn on the big rectangle right  
22 there?

23 A. That -- that's supposed to be that door -- that  
24 little door right there, when I pictured it.

25 Q. Okay. The window?

1 A. Yeah, supposed to be up.

2 Q. Okay. All right.

3 Mr. Collins, have you had some fires before?

4 A. Yes, I did. I had about 10, probably. All in my  
5 lifetime I had about 10 fires. Those fires were in trailer  
6 fires (sic) fires, but they all was (sic) accidents.

7 Q. And on some of those did you get some insurance  
8 money?

9 A. Yes, I did.

10 Q. And obviously, you know, a lot of your family knew  
11 about that?

12 A. Huh?

13 Q. A lot of your family knew when your house burned  
14 down, your family helped you?

15 A. No, my family didn't -- help me do what?

16 Q. I said, but your family knew when this happened,  
17 like your other family ---

18 A. Oh, yes, my family knew, yes.

19 Q. And Mr. Collins, how do you -- how do you feel  
20 about what happened to Science?

21 A. I feel bad. I feel bad that happened to him. You  
22 know, I cry every day thinking of -- when I think about it.  
23 It hurt me bad. That's why I'm here today. That's why I'm  
24 here today, to tell the truth.

25 MS. RICHARDSON: All right. I have no further

1 questions. Answer any questions Ms. Wilson might have for  
2 you, okay?

3 CROSS-EXAMINATION

4 BY MS. WILSON:

5 Q. Mr. Collins, did you feel bad when you went to  
6 trial? Did you feel bad about ---

7 A. Yes, I did feel bad.

8 Q. Did you -- did you testify in your own trial?

9 A. My own trial?

10 Q. Yes.

11 A. I didn't have the nerve to do it.

12 Q. Okay.

13 A. Not right then.

14 Q. Okay. Now, how many times had you been to  
15 Marissa's house?

16 A. I've been to Marissa's house plenty of times.

17 Q. So, knowing the lay of that house or the lay of  
18 the land, wasn't nothing new to you, was it?

19 A. Well, the land, it was new to me, yes. Going  
20 through the back, that was new to me. Yes, it is.

21 Q. Okay. Who showed that to you?

22 A. Marissa husband. He used to go through the field.

23 Q. So you knew the lay of the land. I mean, you knew  
24 it?

25 A. I never walked -- went through there before. I'd

1 usually drive.

2 Q. Okay.

3 A. I'd usually drive a car.

4 Q. Okay.

5 A. That's what I used to do.

6 Q. You're not saying her husband was with you that  
7 night?

8 A. Oh, no.

9 Q. Okay.

10 A. No, uh-huh.

11 Q. Okay.

12 A. I'm telling the truth what I'm talking about.

13 Q. Okay. Now, when you talked with the deputies,  
14 they kept telling you, "It's either you or Marissa."

15 Well, let me back up.

16 When you first talked with the officers you kept  
17 telling them you didn't do it; is that correct?

18 A. I didn't do it, 'cause I ain't throw the light, or  
19 nothing. And I don't think that -- that my nephew do it. I  
20 don't think none of us do it do, to be real with you. We  
21 just planned -- we just had something planned.

22 Q. Oh, but you didn't do it?

23 A. No, I didn't do it, but I still feel bad about the  
24 situation.

25 Q. Okay. Had you ever done -- had Marissa ever had

1 you do a job before her -- before, any kind of work, you  
2 ever did any kind of work?

3 A. Yes, I fix her car. I do something to her car, I  
4 help her and her husband do the car for her.

5 Q. Okay.

6 A. Yeah.

7 Q. And so her wanting you -- saying she wants you do  
8 a job, that wasn't unusual to you?

9 A. Oh, yeah, that's unusual to me by doing a job,  
10 like that. You know, doing that, I -- I try to keep things  
11 confidential, you know, but I don't want it to get out.

12 Q. Okay. Well, let me ask you this ---

13 A. Afraid of that.

14 Q. Your memory's okay today?

15 A. Yeah, it's okay today.

16 Q. Okay.

17 A. My mind is clear, especially when I'm locked up.

18 Q. Okay. Now, the State has -- State has said they  
19 didn't -- they didn't promise you anything?

20 A. They didn't promise a thing.

21 Q. Okay. They promised that they wouldn't fight?

22 A. No.

23 Q. Your reduction?

24 A. Right.

25 Q. Okay. So they said they wouldn't fight against

1 your plea for a reduction in sentence?

2 A. Right.

3 Q. Okay. So you're really hoping to get your  
4 sentence reduced after ---

5 A. And if I don't ---

6 Q. --- after -- after ---

7 A. --- if I don't get it reduced, at least I've come  
8 to tell the truth.

9 Q. Okay.

10 A. You know.

11 Q. Did Marissa ever pay you any money?

12 A. No. Uh-huh.

13 Q. Okay. But you're saying it was you who told her  
14 the best way to do it is with kerosene?

15 A. Yes, that's what I told her. That would be the  
16 best -- the best way to do it.

17 Q. But you didn't see no fire, but you heard about  
18 it?

19 A. Right.

20 Q. Okay.

21 A. Yes, ma'am.

22 Q. And it was raining heavy that night?

23 A. Right. And the little boy get hurt. He get  
24 killed. And I -- that -- that do it to me.

25 Q. Okay. Now, you had how many fires?

1 A. I probably have about 10, probably, in my  
2 lifetime.

3 Q. Okay.

4 A. But all been accident. I had some that I didn't  
5 have insurance on, I lose.

6 Q. Okay. Did they ever accuse you of setting any of  
7 those fires?

8 A. A couple of people, you know, they tell and say  
9 I -- I might have done it. But, hey, they can talk what  
10 they want to talk. I know I didn't do it.

11 Q. Okay. Did you get paid every time you had  
12 insurance on the property?

13 A. Yes, yes, I did. That's what the insurance for.

14 Q. You didn't get none of your claims denied?

15 A. No, ma'am.

16 Q. None of them?

17 A. No, ma'am. I get my money.

18 Q. Okay. Now, you testified that Marissa borrowed a  
19 kerosene heater from you?

20 A. Yes, she borrowed one.

21 Q. Okay.

22 A. Because she said it was too cold in the house.

23 But it wasn't -- it wasn't because that she was going to  
24 do -- set the house on fire. She borrowed it, because --  
25 because we were close.

1 Q. Okay. When this incident happened -- Court's  
2 indulgence, Your Honor.

3 THE COURT: Uh-huh.

4 Q. How long have you been in -- when was your trial,  
5 Mr. Collins?

6 A. Where my trial been (sic) at?

7 Q. Uh-huh.

8 A. My trial right here.

9 Q. I said when.

10 A. I think about two -- '18, 2018.

11 Q. Okay.

12 A. I think November -- November the '18, that's when  
13 it started.

14 Q. Okay. November the 18th (sic). Okay.

15 No further questions -- well, Court's indulgence.

16 Initially -- your testimony is, initially you told  
17 Marissa you wouldn't do the job?

18 A. At first I told her.

19 Q. Okay.

20 A. Yes. But I ---

21 Q. And when you got to ---

22 A. --- changed my mind because she asked me again.

23 Q. Okay. When you got to the house doors were  
24 locked.

25 A. Right.

1 Q. Okay. Did that strange to you?

2 A. Yeah, it did seem strange to me, that's why I  
3 didn't do it. I told my nephew to back off, don't do it.  
4 But I don't know what happened.

5 Q. Okay. And it was you who -- there's no question  
6 about the fact that it was you who got your nephew involved?

7 A. Right. Right. Because my nephew ain't know  
8 nothing about -- he know about Marissa part, but he ain't  
9 wanting to hurt them, because he say she got too much her  
10 (sic) mouth.

11 MS. WILSON: Oh, okay. No further questions.

12 THE COURT: Any redirect?

13 REDIRECT EXAMINATION

14 BY MS. RICHARDSON:

15 Q. So the night that you went to the trailer, you and  
16 James, that's the night he lit something and through it at  
17 the window?

18 A. Yes.

19 Q. And that's the -- shortly after that, that's the  
20 same night that y'all found out Science had died in the  
21 fire?

22 A. Right. Right.

23 Q. And without saying what happened or talk about  
24 how, James is no longer with us. James is dead?

25 A. Yes, and I love him dearly.

1 Q. And you hate to say anything bad about him?

2 A. Right.

3 MS. RICHARDSON: No further questions.

4 THE WITNESS: Uh-huh.

5 THE COURT: Anything further, Ms. Wilson?

6 RE CROSS-EXAMINATION

7 BY MS. WILSON:
