Although the motion is incoherent and somewhat incomprehensible, it appears to seek the defendant's immediate release upon a claim of double jeopardy.


The motion alleges that the defendant was previously tried and acquitted on the charge for which he is now incarcerated. However, a review of the motion and supporting documents indicate that the defendant's first trial resulted in a mistrial after the jury failed to reach a unanimous verdict. Therefore, the defendant's right against double jeopardy has not been violated and the defendant's motion should be denied.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is hereby

ORDERED, that the "Emergency Petition For Ex Parte Motion of Terron Dizzley Pursuant To Immediate Release, Double Jeopardy, False Imprisonment, Lack of Trial Court's Jurisdiction To Impose Sentence" [sic] filed October 28, 2021, is DENIED.
